### The preps are a changin'

s one who grew up (well, got older) in Cedar Rapids, I always viewed Regis High School as the Notre Dame of Iowa prep athletics.

Sure, the two schools share the same religion, but that's just the tip of the cathedral. Like Notre Dame. Regis defied the norm and stayed away from a conference affiliation. Like Notre Dame, Regis was more than happy to play a football schedule loaded with powerhouses. Like Notre Dame, Regis has had many more good teams than bad.

So when a Regis joins a league and makes serious schedule alterations, you know change is in the air everywhere.

If you pick up our paper tomorrow morning to check tonight's prep scores, don't think we're suffering from temporary amnesia and forgot who plays in which conference. Things have been shaken up around our area more than any time in the last 25 years.

Regis, for example, has left its independent status to join the Wamac Conference. To accommodate a Wamac schedule, and because Mississippi Valley Conference schools have so few open dates for non-conference foes, Regis will not play long-time rivals Cedar Rapids Washington and Linn-Mar.

It will take some getting used to at Regis. Instead of meeting the Washingtons and Linn-Mars and Prairies of the area, the Royals' traditional rivals now will include Independence and West Delaware.

THE WAMAC HAS undergone more cosmetic surgery than Elizabeth Taylor. For decades, the Wamac was as stable as the quality of air in Cedar Rapids. That isn't a reflection on the Wamac, by the

It was always Anamosa, Independence, Maquoketa, Marion. Monticello, Tipton, Vinton and West Delaware. The most radical Wamac change in the post-Roosevelt era was several years ago when Manchester changed its name to West Delaware.

On many occasions, the Wamac politely listened to applicants for membership, then politely said, "No, thanks." Eight was enough.

Then, Tipton decided it didn't have enough students to stay with its Wamac brothers, so it departed last year to hook up with the Eastern Iowa Hawkeye Conference.

Then, Anamosa, Maquoketa and Monticello bolted to join a reformed Big Bend Conference. Enter Benton Community, LaSalle and Regis into the Wamac.

Now, it's a brave new world. Incidentally, The Gazette has

always referred to the Wamac as the Wamac. However, in some Wamac towns, the Wamac is known as the WaMaC. My sources tell me the W is for Wapsipinicon, the M for Maquoketa and the C for Cedar. Rivers, one and all.

Just one problem. The Maquoketa River no longer flows by, near or into a Wamac town. So shouldn't the league now be called the Wac? Or WaC?

WELL, THINGS ARE different all over. The East Central Iowa Conference is gone, gone, gone. Did the name of any conference roll off the tongue better than the "Eee-see,

eye-see?" The Upper Iowa Conference is another league that seems to be going through a mid-life crisis. After an eternity of fostering eight teams, the UIC suddenly is a 12team outfit. Guttenberg, Lansing Kee, Turkey Valley and Wapsie

Valley have attained membership. There is an unusual aspect to this situation. Twelve is too many teams for a conference, particularly for football. They play only nine games a season. So, the UIC has split into two divisions, Large School and Small School.

That makes sense, but I think the divisions should have different names. Small School and Smaller School, for instance. This is no knock on a North Fayette or Wapsie Valley, but it seems silly classifying them as Large Schools.

I mean, does that put them on the same level with a Linn-Mar or Iowa City High? Or are those two and their Mississippi Valley counterparts considered Giant Schools?

Something that stays constant is Iowa's prep football playoff system. There are five classes with 16 playoff qualifiers in each. That's too

many qualifiers for a state this size. That's Iowa prep sports, folks.

# Vlasic faces big day in NFL battle

Today, Vlasic hopes to play well enough against the New York Jets in an NFL exhibition game to continue his football

small, he's too slow, he doesn't have enough size," Vlasic said. "But he's got a good arm. He proved he can play in this league after two preseason games.


Vlasic, who was Most Valuable Player in the 1986 Holiday Bowl on the Chargers' home field, San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium, missed nearly four games of his senior year at Iowa with a shoulder injury. He was the fourth round pick of the Chargers and the 88th player selected overall last spring.

Last week, the Chargers let two quarterbacks go, Tom Flick and Mike Moroski, both with NFL experience. Flick started three games for San Diego last year. Moroski played for the 49ers and Falcons.

In three preseason games, Vlasic has completed 17 of 29 passes for 152 yards and one touchdown. He's also been intercepted once.

"I've made some mistakes," Vlasic said. "I look for improvement each time out. I feel a lot more comfortable since the (opening day) Dallas game."

# Thurness feels good about Coe

Dr. Robert Thurness enters his sixth season as head football coach at Coe College with a squad of 94 players, 39 of whom have earned a total of 61 letters.

The Kohawks' substantial experience does not include losing. They do not appear likely to acquire much of that experience this fall, in a campaign they open on Sept. 12 against rebuilding Simpson of the Iowa Conference in Coe's first on-campus game since 1951.

Only the 18 Coe seniors have experienced a regular-season defeat, that in the 1984 finale with Cornell.

After winning the Midwest Conference title and earning the school's first NCAA Division III playoff bid in 1985, Coe relinquished the MCAC crown last season with a 14-10 loss to North Division titlist Lawrence.

Oddly, the two-time defending South champion Kohawks this fall are ranked behind 1986 runner-up Monmouth in the division race, but 18th in Division III. Thurness (34-12-2 at Coe) predictably

discounts the ratings. "I'm sure the kids feel good about being ranked nationally," he says, "and it's nice for the program. But these players also are pretty intelligent — they know ratings don't

mean a thing on the field." Heading Coe's returnees are all-MCAC offensive guard Brian Chezum, kicker Dave Drahn, defensive end Brian Tuttle and defensive tackle Damon Walker; and honorable mention offensive tackle Mike Donahue, center Tim Voels and strong safety Kevin

Among the departed are all-America linebackers Harold Phillips and Jim Dostal, all-MCAC defensive back Steve Topping and all-MCAC fullback Pat Cain.

Phillips and Dostal totaled 251 of Coe's 509 tackles last fall. Phillips also had a

school-record nine interceptions for 261 yards, and averaged 36.5 yards punting.

"It makes a difference, knowing you've got a couple of big-play guys behind you," 215pound senior Walker acknowledges. "But the linebackers we have are as good as any in the conference, and we're stronger than ever up

To split end Ed Petsche, "this year looks better than ever. We've got real good experience in the offensive line.

He could have added that the heart of Coe's passing attack also returns - Petsche, wide receiver Tony Callahan, tight end Scott Sage and quarterback Larry Brennecke.

Sage is a 6-foot-2, 205-pound fourth-year starter from Starmont. The rest are juniors. Brennecke completed 50.5 percent of his passes for 1,321 yards last fall. Speedsters Petsche and Callahan caught 32 for 427

### Kennedy too much for Regis

For 20 years, Cedar Rapids Regis had found a way to make autumn evenings miserable for Kennedy's

On Thursday night at Kingston Stadium, the Cougars found a way to erase a nightmare. Lad by senior cornerback Brian Norris' 68-yard third-quarter interception return, Kennedy scored the go-ahead touchdown on the way to a rousing 24-14 season-opening football victory.

The Cougars not only snapped a three-game winning streak in the series by Regis, but also made firstyear coach Don Knock's debut memorable. The two schools will likely not play again, since Kennedy enters a round-robin Mississippi Valley Conference schedule next

KENNEDY CAPPED the crosstown rivalry on the arm of senior quarterback Chris Weise, who hadn't played football since he was a freshman but passed for one touchdown and ran for another. He was 8 of 15 for 165 yards, with one interception.

Weise, who attended Central College's summer camp, guided the Cougars on their opening series for a 55-yard scoring drive that was completed on Greg Freeland's four yard scoring run. Weise then countered a 20-yard Regis scoring pass by Warner to John Thinnes with his first varsity TD pass.

He hit a wide-open Scheetz on the left sideline, which turned into a 68yard scoring play with 1:13 to go in the first quarter. Regis tied it with 7:52 to go in the

half on a tipped pass of six yards from Warner to Brian Hoefer. Warner ran the conversion.

And, the Cougars sailed on the 121 yards in receptions of senior tight end Jeff McGuire, plus the defensive play of linebacker Troy Montgomery and end Jeff Vrchoticky, who is as hard to stop as his last name is difficult to pronounce.

"I told the kids to not listen to the soothsayers," said Knock, who came to Kennedy after building a Class 2A powerhouse at Grundy Center. "People will say things, but I told them not to listen. Most of them have more than average ability, and they worked their tails off the past two weeks. They're not only great young men, but great persons. Right now I don't feel any different than I did in Grundy Center."

### Corked bat costs Hatcher 10 days

HOUSTON (AP) — National League President Bart Giamatti, continuing a crackdown against scuffed baseballs and tampered bats, handed a 10-day suspension Thursday to Houston's Billy Hatcher for using a corked bat.

Astros Manager Hal Lanier was fined an undisclosed sum because Giamatti holds that a manager is responsible for illegal bats used by his players.

Hatcher was ejected from Tuesday's game against the Chicago Cubs after his bat splintered, revealing it had been injected with cork. Hatcher said in a telephone interview late Thursday

night he would decide today whether to appeal the

East Germany also got an upset victory from Thomas Schoenlebe, who beat Nigeria's Innocent Egbunike and American Butch Reynolds in the men's 400-meter dash, and an easy win from women's intermediate hurdler Sabine Busch.

# Long shines as Lions rip Eagles

PHILADELPHIA — Chuck Long threw two touchdown passes and the Detroit defense contributed two pass interceptions and seven sacks as the Lions buried the Philadelphia Eagles, 36-3, Thursday night in the final exhibition game for the two NFL teams.

Long, who played three quarters, completed 14 of 18 passes for 248 yards as the Lions finished exhibition play 2-2.

The Eagles, 1-3, scored only on a field goal by Paul McFadden for the second game in a row. Philadelphia was beaten, 35-3, last Saturday by

Eagles quarterback Randall Cunningham completed 24 of 40 passes for 253 yards.

Except for one drive to the Lions' 5, resulting in McFadden's 30-yard field goal, the Eagles never threatened against one of the league's poorest run defenses.

After the Eagles cut the score to 10-3 on McFadden's field goal, the Lions moved 68 yards in four plays, scoring with 13 seconds left in the half when Long connected with Pete Mandley on a 55-yard pass-run play.

The Lions increased their lead to 24-3 only 3:32 into the third period, going 26 yards in four plays after free safety Devon Mitchell of Iowa intercepted a Cunningham pass and returned it 23 yards. Long passed 13 yards to Chadwick for the touch-

After the Eagles lost the ball on downs at the Lions' 28, Long directed an 11-play, 72-yard drive capped by Alvin Moore's 2-yard touchdown run with 20 seconds left in the third period.

"Hopefully, I'll have time to check things out in the off-season," the 6foot-3, 206-pounder said. "And I have a chance to make some good connections and meet some great people here."


