Regis makes good on its 2nd chance, 18-15

It was a second chance Regis quarterback Kurt Warner couldn't resist

After throwing an interception in the end zone to stop a scoring threat late in regulation Friday night, Warner floated a 10-yard scoring pass to Tom Petsche on his team's first play in overtime to lift Regis to an 18-15 Wamac Conference victory over Marion.

The win was Regis' first in three games. Marion, defending Wamac co-champion, slipped to 0-3 after a schedule which included playing top-ranked teams in the opening two weeks.

"The defense collapsed on the guy slanting in the middle (John Thinnes)," Warner said of the gamewinner. "Tom went outside and got open. The play was there all the way.'

Moments earlier, Warner didn't know if Regis would get another chance. He had driven the Royals all the way to Marion's 8 with less than two minutes to play, but the Indians' Rob McComas snuffed that drive with his end zone intercep-

"That was disappointing," Warner said. "I knew I shouldn't have thrown into the coverage. I should have thrown it away."

The feeling probably got worse when Marion's Tony Kautz kicked a 31-yard field goal to give Marion a short-lived 15-12 lead in overtime.

But on Regis' first overtime play, the Royals stuck with the shotgun formation they'd lived with all night. Petsche broke to the right side of the end zone and Warner timed the pass beautifully.

almost exclusively, Regis outgained Marion, 262-118. Warner was 15 of 32 for 169 yards against an Indian defense which came up with several big plays to keep the Royals from scoring more often.

"We've thrown out of the shotgun in the past," Regis Coach Gaylord Hauschildt said. "This week we got to messing around with it and found some things we liked.

The two teams played most of the first half without scoring but Regis finally broke through with Warner's 3-yard pass to Thinnes with four seconds left. Thinnes made a leaping one-handed catch to cap a 57yard drive following Brian Hoefer's pass interception.

The big play in the drive was wingback Rob Borelli's 31-yard pass to Hoefer. Borelli took a pitch from Warner and then spotted Hoefer over the middle.

Marion tied it midway through the third after McComas recovered a fumbled punt. Starting from the Regis 35, the Indians scored in nine plays. Mike Schmickle passed four yards to Jay Brandt for the score.

Warner was 4 for 6 on a drive which gave Regis a 12-6 lead early in the fourth. Jason Kelly bolted in from the 4 to cap it.

Just when Cedar Rapids Kennedy is trying to build a football program under a new coach, Class 4A's thirdranked Dubugue Hempstead has to march into Kingston Stadium and foul up the plans.
