



# Solon reaps another win

OLON — Football coaches who give their players helmet decals for meritorious service usually give them in the form of stars.

At Solon, ballplayers get skulland-crossbones stickers to put on their helmets. Ominous-looking things. And with good reason. In the last few years, defeating the Spartans has been about as easy as cheating the grim reaper.

Last season, the Spartans stormed to their second consecutive Eastern Iowa Hawkeye Conference title. Solon got as far as the semifinals in the state Class 2A playoffs, where it lost to Wapsie Valley, 15-12. Wapsie Valley beat Pocahontas in the championship game, 27-0, so Solon probably was a hair or two from winning the state

"Take State" was the slogan on a button many Solon supporters wore Friday night at the Mount Vernon-Solon game before a large homecoming crowd.

I don't know how Solon compares to the other top 2As in the state. Wapsie Valley is again very strong, and Cedar Rapids LaSalle must be decent to be ranked first in the state. But Solon is good, too.

Friday's game here was supposed to be your proverbial barn-burner. Both clubs entered the game 3-0, and they're long-time rivals. Seldom a year passes in which the state playoffs don't feature either Mount Vernon or Solon.

ON THIS NIGHT, Solon was dominant from the beginning. The Spartans had an 8-0 lead two minutes into the game, made it 16-0 less than four minutes later, and claimed a 25-6 halftime lead.

Solon senior Todd Linderbaum, who spent nearly the entire game on the field as quarterback and defensive back, returned the second half's opening kickoff 84 yards for another Spartan touchdown. Linderbaum then ran for the two-point conversion to make it 33-6 on the way to a final score of 39-6.

Linderbaum, who weighs all 150 pounds, also rushed 13 times for 108 yards. Good game. Good

After his kickoff return and twopoint run, he plopped himself on the Solon bench for a quick breather while his teammates kicked off to the Mustangs. Each teammate, statistician and water boy who offered Linderbaum words of praise or a pat on the shoulder got a thank-you.

Is that an example of small-town football or small-town people? Five or 10 or 50 years ago, the answer might have been yes. Now, to an outsider, it's not as clear what defines a small town other than a small population.

Bib overalls and seedcorn caps might have been a stereotype, but they were more in vogue than Reebok or Ralph Lauren. Kids now look the same everywhere.

MAYBE IT'S THE influence of television, MTV in particular. In Solon, even some sophomore football players had spiked, punk haircuts with that Vidal Sassoon goop in their hair.

What's with these crazy kids and their short hair these days?

A lot of the hometowners wore Solon Spartans shirts and jackets, but kids also displayed shirts from Georgetown, Michigan, North Carolina State and Stanford.

The last two high school games I've seen were in Central City and Solon. At both, there was someone wearing a Hard Rock Cafe T-shirt. Folks, this world is getting small. Real small

The football world is getting small, too. It wasn't that long ago when you rarely would see a smalltown team attempt a pass or kick an extra-point. Field goals were witnessed only at college games or

on television. Well, both Mount Vernon and Solon tried long bombs in the first quarter of their contest Friday. Though neither was completed, both efforts almost worked and

looked good. Solon's Ray Cooling, who rushed for 85 yards, kicked a 25-yard field goal Friday, and was a little wide

on a 32-yard try. By the way, you know a game's a biggie when both Cedar Rapids television stations are present to tape highlights for their 10:00 newscast. When The Gazette's Bob Hilton picks an Area Game of the Week, people pay attention.

# Jeff upsets top-ranked Hempstead

DUBUQUE — Cedar Rapids Jefferson quarterback Cam Johnson found Shane Dunlevy all alone in the corner of the end zone with a pass to convert a two-point conversion with 2:07 left in the game as the J-Hawks upset top-ranked Dubuque Hempstead Friday night, 15-14 in Mississippi Valley Conference action.


The win was the first in the Valley for Jefferson in four games and improved its overall record to 1-4. Hempstead, which took over the No. 1 ranking in Class 4A only this week, fell to 1-1 in the MVC, 3-1

The Mustangs got on the board first after recovering a J-Hawk fumble on the 50-yard line and scoring 10 plays later on a Troy Tigges 1-yard plunge with 2:02 left in the first half. The score stood 7-0 at intermission.

Hempstead started the second half from its own 36-yard line, moving to the Jeff 16 before losing possession on downs following a sack of Hempstead quarterback Tony Potts for a 9-yard loss.

The J-Hawks took over on their own 25 yard-line and promptly drove 75 yards in 12 plays including runs of 16 and 19 yards by senior tailback Tom Welsch and passes from Johnson to Adam Wright for 13 yards and Dunlevy for 16 - before Johnson scored on a

# Wash wakes up to beat Kennedy

For one half, Cedar Rapids Kennedy pulled Washington's Class 4A third-ranked Warriors down from above Kingston Stadium Friday

But Kennedy — trailing 14-7 entered the locker room and Washington returned to earth. A pair of third-quarter touchdowns by tailback Jim Ashley gave the Warriors inspiration to post a 33-21 Mississippi Valley Conference prep football victory.

The victory hoisted Washington to 4-0 overall and into a Valley firstplace tie with Dubuque Wahlert at 3-0. Kennedy's Cougars dropped to 1-3 and 0-3.

Though Washington gained 328 yards on the ground in 42 plays, it was a sub-par showing for a team which could be the state's next No. 1 choice based upon top-ranked Dubuque Hempstead's 15-14 upset loss to Jefferson and No. 2 Urbandale escaping Newton, 27-26 Friday

"I think the Kennedy kids came to play more than the Washington kids did the first half," said War-all-purpose yards and scored two riors Coach Wally Sheets. "Our kids were a little flat from last week (a 12-7 win over previously top-rated Linn-Mar). The intensity wasn't there, but you can't get pitch-high every week in the Valley. I think it is also a tribute to the Kennedy

24-yard scoring run on a counter play by wingback Anthony Beshears on the Warriors' second possession of the game. Kennedy responded to whatever cloud they were riding tie it 7-7 to open the second quarter. Quarterback Chris Weise's 2-yard plunge capped a nine-play, 70-yard

Warrior fullback Kurt Weakland, who gained 90 yards on nine attempts, gave Wash the lead for good with a 12-yard TD run with 9:59 left in the half. Sophomore place-kicker Thien Tran — making his first varsity appearance booted the extra point.

"I thought it would be great if we didn't have to go into the locker room, and could play non-stop," said Cougars Coach Don Knock. "We had played super defense up to then, and it didn't help us to slow down. If we can figure out a way to put together a whole game, we will be OK. I thought Wally (Sheets) was real nice to us.'

Washington's offensive line was enough to hold Kennedy after halftime. Ashley finished with a game-high 116 yards on 19 carries.

Beshears, a fleet 165-pound senior, rushed six times for 93 yards, including two 42-yard runs in the first half. He caught two passes for 66 yards, adding a 24-yard TD strike

# Talks break off, solidarity breaking down in NFL strike

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Talks that began with high hopes of ending the NFL strike broke off Friday, and no new negotiations were planned after both sides refused to budge on free agency.

In Denver and Dallas, meanwhile, union solidarity appeared to be cracking on the fourth day of the walkout. Broncos didn't report for picket duty even though 57

substitute players were practicing and some of the striking

Cowboys "may be ready to cross the picket line."

With this weekend's games canceled, owners were preparing for play on Oct. 4-5 with replacement teams of free agents and anyone else they could sign.

The two chief negotiators, management boss Jack Donlan and union head Gene Upshaw, met for three hours Friday morning before calling off the talks, which began Wednesday. "I thought we could better further the process by reevaluating our own positions," Donlan said. "When we left, it was on a nice note and we indicated to each other that we will

"I believe to meet just for the simple purpose of meeting makes no sense. In fact, it can make it worse because people

can become more entrenched in their positions," he said. No date for resuming the talks was scheduled.

DONLAN SAID there were no positions "etched in stone," except the union's demand for unrestricted free agency for players with four years' experience or more. Management wants only to liberalize the existing system of compensation.

Upshaw said free agency was the only issue where the union was "etched" in its position, "whether it's stone or butter or whatever it is.

He also said Donlan wanted to end bargaining to test the

'We came to bargain, they actually came to leave," he said. "This is actually a test for the players to see if players will

stick together." Donlan said breaking off talks may bring more pressure on both sides to reach a settlement.

"If you're meeting, people think maybe a settlement's around a corner," he said. "If you don't have meetings it brings pressure. I've got 28 owners. Gene has all his players. We both have the fans and the media."

# Hawkeye guard Fedders getting plenty of notice

IOWA CITY — There are three facts of life to which those men who choose to play football in the offensive line must resign themselves:

1). No one will notice you unless you miss a block.

2). No one will notice you unless you are flagged for a penalty. And,

3). You hope no one will notice you. But pro scouts have been noticing linemen at the University of Iowa the past several years, and not for the reasons mentioned above. Since 1982, three Hawkeve offensive linemen have been first round selections in the National Football League draft and five others have been drafted.

A strong recruiting enticement, indeed, but not the reason starting left guard Greg Fedders decided to cast his lot with the Hawkeyes back in the spring of 1986. It was much more basic than that.

"I was only recruited really by two schools — Iowa and Iowa State — and I had always wanted to go to Iowa," said Fedders, a red-shirt freshman little town like Le Mars, Iowa." from Le Mars.

"I wanted to come here. I wanted to come here for three or four years before I had the chance to. This is the only place I wanted to go."

LUCKY FOR IOWA. After being red-shirted last season, Fedders, a 6foot-5, 260-pounder, appeared in his first collegiate game two weeks ago at Arizona. He drew his first starting assignment, in place of the injured Greg Divis, last Saturday at Iowa

"He did a very fine job for a fellah that's never played," said Iowa Coach Hayden Fry.

It was an eye-opening experience for

"For the first series you lose all control," he said. "You don't know what's going on. Then you settle down and it becomes a little more like a practice situation. You just do what you've got to do and don't worry about the rest until it happens.'

"He's a very, very intelligent young man," said Fry of Fedders. "He catches on quickly for a fellah comin' from a
