he law of averages would dictate today's Michigan State-Iowa football game will

Surely sometime, the Spartans and Hawkeyes will play a lackluster, one-sided contest. The last five games of this series have been extremely close and good.

Great offensive displays, crucial defensive plays and heart-stopping endings have been featured in the last five Iowa-MSU shootouts.

The Hawks have dominated the Spartans under Hayden Fry's rule. Fry's Iowa teams are 7-1 against MSU. But the mere memories of a few of those wins give Hawkeye fans sweaty palms.

No matter how good the two teams have been, one has always been a handful for the other. Today, Iowa is a 9½-point favorite. That seems realistic based on Michigan State's last two outings, lopsided losses to Notre Dame and Florida State. But

"Coach Perles, for some reason," Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said, "always saves up his little bag of tricks for us. When you're playing George, you always have to be ready for all sorts of things."

One wouldn't be surprised to hear Perles say the same things about Fry.

BEFORE A NATIONAL television audience last October, Fry started a quarterback against Michigan State who was recognizable to a tiny percentage of home viewers, and a barely larger percentage of the folks at Spartan Stadium. The coach himself couldn't correctly pronounce the quarterback's name.

Tom Poholsky was the red-shirt freshman in charge of directing the Iowa offense in a Big Ten Conference season-opener. It wasn't Mark Vlasic, who was hurt. It wasn't Dan McGwire, who was said to be the starter. It was Poholsky.

A few hours later, it was Poholsky who reveled in the glory. He completed 18 of 29 passes for 240 yards to neutralize a fine effort by MSU senior quarterback Dave Yar-

ema. Iowa won, 24-21. Yarema, the veteran, became the game's goat when he misfired a pass from the Iowa 4-yard line into the mitts of Hawkeye defensive back Ken Sims, who downed it in the end zone with 92 seconds left.

Michigan State, considered a contender for the Big Ten title in the preseason, then limped to a 6-5 mark. Running back Lorenzo White, an All-America in 1985, was hampered by a series of injuries last autumn. Against Iowa, he was

held to just 41 yards on 19 carries. "We had a year to prepare for that rascal," Fry said afterwards.

THAT YEAR MUST have made a significant difference. In 1985, White and the Spartan offense absolutely could not be contained when they came to Iowa City.

White ran the ball 39 times for 226 yards. What people forget is that White got hurt and missed nearly all of the fourth quarter. His replacement, freshman Craig Johnson, left the bench to carry 10 times for 89 yards.

If that weren't enough, frosh quarterback Bobby McAllister completed 18 of 27 passes for 275 vards. MSU totaled 580 total yards. And lost 35-31, after leading 24-13.

The Spartans led 31-28, but Hawk quarterback Chuck Long played out of his mind. Long whipped the Hawkeyes downfield on their last possession, then faked out another national television audience and everybody in Kinnick Stadium by feigning a handoff to Ronnie Harmon, keeping the ball, and trotting into the right corner of the end zone for the last-minute, game-winning touchdown.

Long completed 30 of 39 passes for 380 yards.

Three years ago, despite protests from the Hawkeyes, the officials ruled Long was stopped inches short of the goal line on a two-point conversion try, and Iowa lost at home to the Spartans, 17-16. That was after Long completed 14 of 17 passes in the second half to rally the Hawks from a 17-3 deficit.

Iowa beat MSU 12-6 in 1983, and needed a last-minute interception by Bobby Stoops in 1982 to secure a 24-18 win over State. It had been a 24-3 game, but you know those

Spartans. We thought there was no way the 1986 MSU-Iowa game could top the previous year's, but it came close. Who knows what's in store today

Kennedy crowned by Prairie

Hawks convert 3 Cougar turnovers into TDs in 34-12 Valley Conference win

in 20 attempts, scoring on touchdown runs of 4 and 43 yards only 52 seconds apart in the first quarter. It was Christopherson's fourth 100-plus yard performance in a

The win boosted the Hawks to 4-1 overall and into a three-way tie for second place in the MVC at 3-1 Kennedy is 1-4 and 0-4.

Kennedy pitched a second-half shutout at the Hawks, who lost their steam at halftime

"It was a lack of intensity the second half, but we're working with high school kids," said Prairie Coach Ed Johnson. "It was a hollow feeling. But, it was one heck of a victory for Prairie. Smiley may get 90 days

Iowa red-shirt DB enters guilty plea to lesser charge

Gazette Johnson County Bureau IOWA CITY — The prosecutor in Keaton Smiley's case will recommend that the University of Iowa football player spend 90 days in jail on a guilty plea of aggravated

Smiley, 20, entered the plea in Johnson County District Court Friday. He is charged in connection with an incident involving Iowa volleyball player Cheryl Zemaitis at his apartment June 9.

By making the plea, Smiley admitted to hurting Zemaitis by hitting her, Smiley's attorney said. The attorney, James Thomas, also said he would seek a deferred judgment and probation for Smiley.

In his first interview since being charged, Smiley said Friday, "All I want to do is get on with my life and be a student-athlete." Smiley is sitting out this fall's football season as a red-shirt.

"I've lived for 20 years and messed up two days out of 20 years," Smiley said. "And now I'm paying for it.'

As part of a plea bargain agreement revealed in court documents Friday, Johnson County Attorney J. Patrick White has agreed to drop three other charges pending against Smiley - assault with intent to commit sexual abuse, false imprisonment and assault causing injury.

Those charges involved Zemaitis. Two of them are from the June 9 encounter, while the other is from an incident Oct. 27, 1986. The sexual abuse charge was the

most serious, a felony carrying with it a maximum five-year prison term and \$7,500 fine. Smiley has denied the allegations

contained in each charge being dropped.


OWA CITY - The date was Oct. 4, 1986. The site, Michigan State's Spartan Stadium.

Hogan Vinton's hero as Vikings halt skid, 18-8

Vikings whip Marion to halt 12-game skid

Vinton discarded its wishbone and fulfilled its wish

Using an I-formation instead of the wishbone for the first time this season, the Vikings rode Kurt Hogan's 146 rushing vards and two touchdowns to an 18-8 Wamac Conference football win at Marion.

Vinton, 1-4, broke a 12-game losing streak dating to the final game of the 1985 season. Marion, which has won or shared the past nine conference titles, slipped to 1-4 overall and 0-3 in the league.

"I know it's a gamble to change offenses in midseason but we'd been averaging less than 100 yards a game in total offense," Vinton Coach Mike Timmermans

"Adjusting the game plan helped quite a bit. We planned to option a lot but the off-tackle stuff was working. We put Kurt at tailback because of his physical capabilities and he's a proven running back. If we have any true tailback, Kurt is it.'

Hogan achieved a career high rushing total, carrying the ball 31 times. He gained 78 yards in the first half, 68 in the second. The Vikings totaled 235 yards rushing.

Vinton's defense also kept Marion out of the end zone. Led by tackles Pat Patava and Sam Moen and end Jake Isbell, the Vikings sacked Marion quarterback Mike Schmickle five times for minus-51 yards.

Marion finished with minus-3 yards rushing on 23

"They just beat us off the ball," Marion Coach Dave Messerli said. "Vinton always plays us tough and it's always an extremely close game. I knew it'd be like

"We played the first four games with a lot of emotion. We get to the fifth game and play with little emotion. It's the head coach's job to get a team ready. We just didn't play with enthusiasm.'

Hogan's 10-yard run with 6:31 left in the second quarter was the only scoring of the first half. It capped an 11-play, 56-yard Vinton drive in which Hogan carried nine times for 38 yards.

Marion nearly scored just before intermission on a 3rd-and-1 play at the Vinton 36. Tony Kautz got behind defenders in the end zone but dropped Schmickle's

Jeff Blanchard's fumble recovery gave Vinton possession at Marion's 28 with two minutes left in the third. Quarterback Dave Boisen capped a 7-play series with a 1-yard sneak, putting Vinton ahead 12-0.

The Vikings sacked Schmickle three times on Marion's next series. Vinton marched 46 yards for its third score, Hogan scoring from the 9-yard line with

Marion scored when Aaron McLeod recovered a wild Boisen pitch in the end zone with 1:03 remaining.

Schmickle completed 11 of 19 passes for 167 yards. Kautz caught four for 49 and Jay Brandt had three receptions for 84. Andy Feller added 65 yards rushing
