# It's a sure thing Panthers' Jones is ready for Cyclones

Gazette sportswriter CEDAR FALLS - A sure thing.

Northern Iowa freshman defensive end James Jones knows only too well what it means to have it and to lose it.

In last week's 33-16 loss to Montana, the 250-pound Jones found himself overlooking a sure thing - a fundamental error that cost him a tackle and cost the Panthers. With UNI trailing 26-16 in the final five minutes, Jones was involved in a play in which Montana scored a touchdown to seal an upset win.

As the Panthers' starting left end today against Iowa State in Ames, Jones hopes he can find a sure thing — a consistent performance — as the 11thranked Division I-AA Panthers meet the Cyclones in their first football meeting since 1950.

"They've been laying back (resting injured play-

ers)," said Jones. "They're going to try to hit us like a storm. We got to be ready to take it on. We're just going to try to play aggressively and hope for the

Jones suffered a broken right ankle and played only four games his senior season at Davenport Central High School. He limped for three quarters in a 21-14 loss to Linn-Mar in the state Class 4A semifinals, then began shopping.

JONES CALLED several Big 8 and Big Ten schools, but nobody was taking the bait. Iowa State, which originally had shown interest when Jones was a junior, never followed up. Only a few weeks before signing a national letter of intent, did UNI Coach Darrell Mudra and Co. step into the picture.

"Iowa State had expressed a lot of interest in me and wanted me to come to their camp," said Jones. "I never went to their camp but then there was Nebraska and Missouri that talked to me. I was hoping to go to a bigger school. Iowa State was having a lot of problems

UNI became Jones' "sure thing" — a place to start. "I was one of the top kids in my neighborhood chosen for pickup games," Jones said. "Once I got here, I realize I'm a raw athlete. I'm nowhere close to

UNI Coach Darrell Mudra is happy with Jones' progress heading into today's important non-confer-

"He's going to be a good one, no question about it," said Mudra. "My 'Monday afternoon project' to convince my coaches to let Jones be the starter. But I think it will be a good choice."

JONES ALTERNATED with senior left end Allen come his way today.

Donnel throughout the Panthers' first five games, including a 24-7 loss at Minnesota on Sept. 12.

"We could have played a lot better at Minnesota, but they had an awesome tailback (Darrell Thompson)," Jones said. "They really didn't hit that hard, but their technique was so good. I feel the Iowa State game is a good opportunity to test my skills against a bigger school. They might not be in the top of the Big 8 Conference, but they will test our program overall."

Jones is a quick 250-pounder, but it has cost him, as it did against Montana.

# Christopherson runs amok again as Prairie romps

Bryan Christopherson got a little tired in Cedar Rapids Prairie's 26-0 whitewash of Fort Madison Friday

But Christopherson, who rushed for 147 yards, saved enough energy for the post-game dance, where he ruled as Homecoming King on a big prep football night for the

Fort Madison, averaging 31 points per game, went mostly sideways and backwards on John Wall Field as the Prairie defense held the Hounds to 3 yards rushing and 54 vards all told.

"I'll tell you what - our defense played one heckuva football game," said Prairie Coach Ed Johnson, whose Hawks raised their record to 5-1 with their fifth straight

"Fort Madison threw a lot of different things at us. Our kids didn't panic, we adjusted well and we stuffed

The Bloodhounds, 3-3, played without star tailback Steve Stanbridge, who has 14 touchdowns, nearly 800 yards and a back ailment. But FMHS Coach Tom Walljasper looked for no excuses.

"Prairie did a good job," offered Walljasper. "Nothing fancy. But they play the game, don't they?'

Christopherson, the tailback in Prairie's Veer-I attack, carried 25 times for his 147 yards, raising his season totals to 125 tries for 719 yards. He opened the scoring with an 8-yard burst on the Hawks' first possession.

"He's an oustanding athlete," said Johnson. "I don't think they can stop him. He's got too many tools."

Christopherson, no dummy, praised his blockers, in particular Matt Kulish, Tim Gavin, Dan Chadima, Mike Cerveny, Chuck Rohlena, Greg Canning, Cory Steele and fullback Randy Lamparek.

Steele also had two sacks on defense.

"If it wasn't for the offensive line it wouldn't have happened," Christopherson said of his fifth straight game over the century mark. "I'm pretty happy about

The 5-10, 185-pound senior wasn't present when Prairie's homecoming royalty was announced at halftime. "I heard it when I was walking out (of the locker room)," he said. "I was pretty surprised."

PRAIRIE WON the game in the first quarter. On its second possession, reserve fullback Gary Kalous scored standing up from six yards out, capping a 68-yard drive. That made it 13-zip.

The Hawks seemed to lose concentration after that, and five turnovers detracted from a 329-yard offensive show. But Fort Madison, a Class 3A school playing 4A competition 100 miles from home, was helpless.

A dozen FMHS plays lost yardage, and quarterback Chad Thornton was sacked four times for 51 negative yards.

Prairie QB John O'Dell had a good night, running for one touchdown and throwing for another. He completely fooled the Hounds with a fake handoff to Lamparek before skirting right end for a 20-yard touchdown. That made it 19-0 in the third quarter.

O'Dell finished the scoring when he found Kalous for a 16-yard TD pass on the first play of the final stanza. Rob Bleakley kicked two PATs.

Coach Johnson sounded wary after the game, with two big Mississippi Valley Conference outings against Metro foes standing between now and a playoff berth. "If we had played Jefferson or Linn-Mar tonight, we

would have gotten beat," he said. The Hawks host Jeff Friday, then visit Linn-Mar Oct. 23. The playoffs begin Oct. 28.
