Jeff leaves Kennedy in future shock, 29-7

Cedar Rapids Jefferson's football team of the future made its debut Friday night at Kingston Stadium, and it wasn't a pleasant reality for Kennedy's Cougars.

The J-Hawks forsook its passing game for the wishbone formation, piling up a season-high 357 yards to rout Kennedy 29-7 in a Mississippi Valley Conference

Jefferson improved to 2-6 and 2-4 in the MVC, while Kennedy remained in the league cellar at 1-6, and 2-6

Kennedy appeared to be ready for the physical J-Hawks, taking a 7-0 lead on Chad Hannen's 15-yard run with 7:43 to go in the first quarter, but that was it for the Cougars.

Jefferson scored 16-point second-quarter points and iced it by running 23 plays to Kennedy's one in the third period. Kennedy was held to six net yards in the second half, finishing with 118 yards rushing on 30 plays.

Jefferson ran 66 plays, with junior quarterback Adam Wright attempting only two passes. Things were that good on the ground.

J-HAWK SENIOR tailback Tom Welsh — who gained 128 yards in just nine carries — sophomore fullback Shaft Baker and junior quarterback Adam Wright ran the "bone" to its limits.

Baker is the 187-pound son of the late Larry Baker, a former J-Hawk prep All-American. He carried 21 times for 70 hard yards, and scored Jefferson's first TD on a one-yard plunge with 11:56 to go in the first half.

Dan Schreder added a 31-yard field goal, before teammate Welsh broke free for his third tape-measure touchdown run of the season. Welsh cut across the field and raced down the left sidelines 96 yards with 27 seconds left in the first half. That made it 16-7, but it was a play moments earlier which broke Kennedy's

The Cougars' Augie Gureno was tackled inches short of a first down at the J-Hawk 2-yard line. Two plays later, Welsh raced for the opposite end zone.

The J-Hawks padded their lead with two more TDs in the second half. Mike Stucker capped an impressive 18play, 85-yard scoring drive that consumed over 81/2 minutes. He ran the final three yards, and a two-point conversion run by Wright failed.

Kennedy had the ball only one play, long enough for Greg Freeland to be stripped of the ball and the J-Hawks' Luke Pilling to recover at the Cougar 20. Seven plays later, Welsh finished off a big Jefferson night with a one-yard run with 11:54 to play.

J-HAWK COACH Bill Calloway elected to sit in the press box — a la Northern Iowa's Darrell Mudra — to observe his club's operation. He liked what he saw from

"I did this before, but I felt I needed to be up there to see how the other team adjusts," said Calloway. "The big thing tonight was how we came off the ball, and controlled the line of scrimmage.

Kennedy Coach Don Knock added his praise from ground level.

"It was evident which team hit the weight room and which team didn't," he said. "We were two different teams showing up tonight. The first half we did a good job, and had we got the first down at the 1-yard line and they didn't get the big run, it might have been a bit

"But it's all part of the game. I thought he (Calloway) was smart in using the wishbone and canning the other

Calloway praised Welsh for his season-long pluck. "Tommy Welsh will be hard to replace next year. He's such a great person," Calloway said. "He ran the scout team all year as a junior, and wanted to do it this year. We needed a win for our seniors, and that's what's important tonight.'

It will be father against son both ways — when surprising 15thranked Indiana plays host to No. 20 Michigan today in a game that could help get the winner to the Rose Michigan and Ohio State no

longer are the Big Ten's Big Two. One or the other represented the conference in the Rose Bowl 13 straight times after Indiana's only appearance on Jan. 1, 1968. But Iowa has gone to Pasadena

twice and Illinois once in the past six years, while Indiana and Michigan State now lead the Big Ten standings at 3-0. Michigan, Ohio State and Minnesota are 2-1.

In addition, Indiana Coach Bill Mallory is the father of Michigan strong safety Doug Mallory. Another son, Mike, a graduate assistant at Indiana, also played at Michigan it's the fourth year in a row one of Mallory's sons plays for the Wolverines — and Bill's brother, Dave, played for Bo Schembechler at Miami of Ohio.

Former Michigan linebacker Andy Moeller, whose father, Gary, is Michigan's defensive coordinator and assistant head coach, also is a grad assistant at Indiana. And when Schembechler went to Michigan in 1969, Mallory succeeded him at Miami. Bill Mallory says he has "a lot of

respect" for Doug, who leads Michigan with 37 tackles despite playing most of the season with a broken hand. "He plays hard, he puts a lot into the game. He plays the way I

like to see it played. He'll be cranked up Saturday.

Doug, a senior, says he is "glad this the last one I'll have to go through. We definitely need to win to stay in the race and I'd rather see Michigan go to the Rose Bowl. But if it doesn't turn out that way, there's no other team I'd rather see go than

Michigan-Indiana is the weekend's only game matching members of the Associated Press Top Twenty.

In the Second Ten, Kentucky plays at No. 12 Georgia, Georgia Tech at No. 13 Tennessee, Illinois at No. 14 Michigan State, Minnesota at No. 16 Ohio State and No. 19 Oklahoma State at Missouri. Florida, Alabama and Penn State, Nos. 11, 17 and 18, are not sched-

Indiana became a factor in the Big Ten by trouncing Ohio State 31-10 two weeks ago, snapping an 0-30-1 streak against the Buckeyes. The Hoosiers have lost 15 straight times to Michigan and are one of the two teams - Northwestern is the other - which have never beaten Schem-

"Michigan has a lot of firepower offensively, they have as good a running back as there is in the league in Jamie Morris and they have a fine defense," Mallory said.

Michigan committed 21 turnovers - eight fumbles, 13 interceptions - in its first five games but didn't have one in last week's 37-10 victory over Iowa as Demetrius Brown completed 14 of 19 passes for 190 yards and three touchdowns.

Michigan will try to contain an Indiana offense that features quarterback Dave Schnell, who is ranked third nationally in passing efficiency and 11th in total offense, and flanker Ernie Jones, second in reception yardage (116.7 per game) and sixth in catches-per-game

"For us to get back in the race, we've got to beat Indiana on the road," says Schembechler. "It's going to be a battle. I think they are an exceptionally good team on both sides of the ball. Our defense is going to be tested because this could be the best offensive team that we've met this year."

OKLAHOMA IS home for the first time in six weeks and plays the first night game at Owen Field against Colorado, a team the Sooners have shut out the last two years.

"Over the past couple of years, Colorado has improved as much as any team in the (Big 8) conference," Oklahoma Coach Barry Switzer says. "They have been troubled by injury and I'm sure they are quite disappointed at not being 6-0."

Meanwhile, Nebraska should have its own way against winless Kansas State, a team Oklahoma blitzed 59-10 last week. The Cornhuskers have beaten the Wildcats 18 straight.

"We will approach the Nebraska game much as we did the Oklahoma game," Kansas State Coach Stan Parrish says. "We want to play hard, fight hard and attack them.

"Nebraska played a tremendous game against Oklahoma State (35-0 last week). Nebraska is a very solid team - the No. 2 team in the country. We played hard there last year (a 38-0 loss); we hope we play harder and even better this year."

Miami returns to action after an open date. The Hurricanes have won
