

## Colorado one buffalo short

t will be interesting to see the Colorado football team today, but it won't be nearly as fascinating as if Iowa was playing the Buffaloes in Boulder.

Not that Boulder is any better than Iowa City, mind you. Though if you want to be objective - aw, forget it. At Colorado's home games, however, a certain unforgettable mascot is on hand.

He weighs 800 pounds, and is still growing since he's rather young. His name is Ralphie. He is a buffalo. And he stampedes across the field after every Colorado score. It is an awesome sight. This is no Bucky Badger or Herky the Hawk, fans. This is a real live beast.

Forgive me, but I can't help but reminisce. It was a beautiful October Saturday afternoon in Boulder four years ago. It was a great day for a drive in the mountains or a hike. The only thing that could have spoiled that day was sitting in a stadium to watch a football game between two teams destined to have a combined record of 3-17-2.

But hey, life's not perfect. So I saw Colorado beat Iowa State, 23-21. The Cyclones went on to go 2-7-2. It was Colorado's only win of the year.

The Gazette's headline on my story said, "Rocky Mountain Low." Darn good headline.

The game may have been a turkey, but I got to see Ralphie rumble four or five times. Decent.

HAD I BEEN a betting man, I would have wagered Ralphie would stay at Colorado longer than Buffs Coach Bill McCartney. The 1-10 mark in 1984 gave McCartney a three-year record of 7-25-1 at CU.

But Colorado pulled an uncharacteristic move for a major university. It stuck with a coach after three losing years.

Still, McCartney must have been feeling pressure going into the 1985 campaign, so he did something radical. He scrapped the Buffaloes' conventional offense, and installed the wishbone. Desperation, right?

Maybe. But it worked magnificently. In that 1985 season, the Buffs went 7-5 and appeared in the Freedom Bowl. Colorado started 0-4 in 1986, but won six of its last seven regular-season games, including its first win over Nebraska since 1967. A Bluebonnet Bowl trip was the reward.

Last year, Colorado was shut out of a bowl, but managed a nice 7-4 mark. Overlooked in the preseason as one of Iowa's four supposed nonconference patsies, the Buffaloes looked tougher and tougher the closer Iowa fans and reporters scrutinized them.

The fact a visiting team is only a 5-point underdog in Iowa City speaks volumes.

SO WHAT'S GOING to happen today? There has been just one constant this season involving Big Ten teams, and that is they've been humiliated.

This is a big, big game for the Hawkeyes. A loss, which Iowa fans thought inconceivable weeks ago, now seems possible if unlikely. Should the Hawks go in the dumper for the second time in three weeks, a third straight trip to the Holiday Bowl might seem like a noble goal.

People around here are very nervous. Iowa's defense has its fans fearful of what lies ahead. To all of you, I offer this sound piece of advice from a chart-topping song of the present:

Don't worry. Be happy. It's just a nonconference game. Big Ten coaches have spent much of the last week telling us while they'd like to win nonconference games, of course, the most impor-

tant thing is getting their teams ready for the Big Ten season. Hence the league's 3-9 record against outsiders, only one of which has spent time in the Top

20. We are to believe Big Ten teams become super squads the moment they start playing each other. But we are wising up, and are realizing the super squads don't reside in the Big Ten. Teams like Colorado are as good as anything the Big Ten owns,

and we must live with that. Still, Iowa will claim an impressive victory today. Bring on the Big Ten.

Browning struck out seven and didn't go to three balls on any batter as he pitched his way into baseball history with a spectacular display of

"He pitched perfect. I guess that's the best way to describe it," Manager Pete Rose said. "He pitched perfect."

He was even better than his previous brush with fame this season, when he had one of six no-hitters that have been broken up in the ninth inning this year. This time, he finished what he started for the first

no-hitter in the major leagues since Milwaukee's Juan Nieves no-hit Baltimore on April 15, 1987.

"When I got to the eighth inning, I felt a little bit antsy," said Browning, 16-5. "I don't know how to explain it. Everything fell my way.

"It was just one of those days where everything worked, and every ball was hit right at people.'

In the ninth, Browning completed the perfect effort by getting Rick Dempsey on a fly ball to Paul O'Neill at the warning track in right field, Steve Sax on a grounder to shortstop

Barry Larkin, and pinch-hitter Tracy Woodson on a swinging strikeout to end the game, bringing a stream of teammates onto the field for a pile-up near the mound.

The Dodgers didn't come close to getting a hit and Browning didn't need any luck to pitch this no-hitter.

There weren't that many balls hit that hard, really," catcher Jeff Reed

Earlier this year, another Cincinnati pitcher came close to a perfect game when Ron Robinson was one strike away.

## Kennedy staggers Jeff, 13-12

Cedar Rapids Kennedy waited almost five years for a football moment like Friday night's at Kingston Stadium.

Senior fullback Greg Freeland made it seem like New Year's Eve when he blasted eight yards with 2:36 left to play, giving Kennedy a 13-12 Mississippi Valley Conference upset victory over previously-unbeaten Jefferson.

It was Kennedy's first win over the J-Hawks since Oct. 20, 1983 (7-0). Kennedy snapped a fourgame losing streak dating to last year, and is 1-2 overall and in the Valley. Jefferson is 2-1 and 2-1.

"The offensive line came together this week and began developing some pride," said an ecstatic Kennedy Coach Don Knock.

"I'm just happier than heck. I can't say enough about the kids, and the parents who back us. I hope it's uphill from here . . . It's going to be an enjoyable weekend, that's for sure."

Kennedy outrushed the wishbone-oriented J-Hawks, 169-107, and had 53 offensive plays to Jefferson's 36.

Knock made perhaps the personnel change of the season, moving 6-foot-5, 250-pound offensive tackle Tony Booth back to his old center spot. Suddenly, massive holes opened.

KENNEDY'S WINNING drive was set up on a fumble by backup J-Hawk quarterback Shawn Fisk, filling in when starter Adam Wright was shaken up four plays earlier.

Fisk's fumble was recovered by Kennedy's Dan Larson at the Cougar 38. Quarterback Chad Hannen then led an 11-play march, featuring two clutch plays by wide receiver Colby Burke. He saved a near-interception by the J-Hawks' Todd Richardson, then grabbed a tipped pass on fourthand-7 for a first down at the J-Hawk 17. Three plays later, Freeland scored the game-winner. Hannen's conversion pass fell incomplete.

## Prairie cashes in on Wash miscues, 7-0

Cedar Rapids Washington was called for two penalties in Friday night's prep football game against Cedar Rapids Prairie. It turned out to be two too many for the previously unbeaten Warriors.

Prairie's Jeff Schulte scooted 24 yards to cap a 95yard fourth-quarter touchdown drive that carried the Hawks past Washington, 7-0, in a hard-fought Mississippi Valley Conference game at Prairie's John Wall Field.

"This was a sweet victory for a bunch of hardworking kids," said Prairie Coach Ed Johnson, whose Hawks have surrendered two touchdowns in three games but are 1-2. "They're frustrated." Washington fell to 2-1.

Prairie dominated the game statistically, holding a 271-123 edge in total yards, 248-40 in rushing yards, and an 11-minute advantage in time of possession. But Prairie, which marched the opening kickoff to

the Washington 12-yard line only to lose a fumble, could not score. After playing to a scoreless tie in the first half,

Washington took advantage of excellent field position, getting the ball on the Prairie 33 after pinning the Hawks inside their own 10 and forcing a

The Warriors moved the ball to the Prairie 4 and faced second and goal as the fourth quarter began. But a holding call on Scott Stewart's off-tackle

plunge pushed the Warriors back to the 14.
"That was the turning point to me," said Washington Coach Wally Sheets. "We should have scored. That was a big penalty."

After working the ball back to the 7, Trien Tran attempted a 24-yard field goal. But it was blocked by the middle of the Prairie line and rolled dead at the

PRAIRIE THEN went 95 yards in 12 plays, taking

nearly six minutes off the clock in the process Senior tailback Jason Joens carried six times for 42 yards and junior Aaron Vlcko, starting his first game as the Hawks' quarterback, carried three times for 15 yards, including a seven-yard rollout just prior to Schulte's winning gallop.

Schulte, who had been the Hawks' quarterback, was starting his first game at fullback in place of the injured Gary Kalous. He charged off left-tackle, saw an opening to the outside and scampered untouched into the end zone with 5:09 left to play.

"We had our backs against the and we sucked it up," said Johnson.

Wash nearly did likewise.

On the third play after the ensuing kickoff, Warriors quarterback Pat Nelson spied a wide-open Mike Ledford in the right flat. Dan Marsch's sealing block on a Hawk defensive back sprung Ledford for a 53-yard touchdown. But an illegal motion penalty nullified the play.

## Seoul Games get under way with a breathtaking opening

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) -South Korea strutted onto the world stage with a breathtaking 24th Olympiad opening ceremony of Oriental mythology and Hollywood extravaganza wrapped in a shiny ribbon of national pride.

Some 11,000 performers, amateur dancers, high school students, farmers, military bands and waving children had parts in the spectacular at Seoul's new Olympic Stadium, mixing Korean custom and legend with bits of Busby Berkeley, Bruce Lee and Cecil B. DeMille.

The three-hour show began as a 500-ship armada sailed past the stadium on the Han River, led by windsurfers, representing the 160 countries at the Games.

As a chorus sang an ancient seafaring ballad, and thousands of blue and white balloons floated skyward, the massive 1,000-pound Yong-ko, a replica the dragon drum used in ancient Korean ceremonies, was transferred from ship to shore then carried to the stadium.

Huge balloons were released from a Shindan Tree, sacred in Korean mythology, and then the Olympic flame was revealed on a 72-foot pedestal resembling a traditional Korean candleholder.

Korean dancers in Greek tunics and flowing gowns danced and whirled as silver-colored confetti rained down from the sky.

## **Bruce hopes UNI** can slow up speedy foe

Morgan State football coach Ed Wyche said he will be operating in the dark tonight at the UNI-Dome in Cedar Falls.

Wyche, who took over the struggling Golden Bears' program this year, did not receive film of Northern Iowa, ranked eighth in Division I-AA.

Meanwhile, UNI Coach Earle Bruce resorted to other means late in the week to cram for his first home test.

Game time is 7 p.m.

The Panthers spent a week off preparing for Morgan State (0-2), after opening with a 59-10 loss at Pittsburgh.

Bruce's staff finally got a peek at Morgan State's wishbone-dominated offense after calling upon Virginia Union - which opened with a 20-10 win over the Golden Bears two weeks ago.

Morgan State fell at Bethune-Cookman, 13-6, last week.

"Morgan State is big and a team like theirs normally has speed, and we need to defend speed," said Bruce. "We're looking to cut out our mistakes on offense and play a game where we don't give up the big, big play like we've given up earlier.

"Morgan State has stayed in their football games because of their defense. They are big up front. They haven't scored a lot of points, but they're not giving up many points. So, they're playing pretty decent defensive football."

This is the first meeting between UNI and Morgan State, the third road game in a row for the Golden Bears and their first indoor game.

Wyche, an assistant at Cheyney State last year, inherited 16 starters from last year's 1-9 unit.

Wyche by telephone from his office in Baltimore, Md. "We don't know anything about Northern Iowa. We couldn't get together on trading film for some reason."

Morgan State is led by halfback Marco Kornegay, who missed last season after leading the Golden Bears in rushing in 1986. He has rushed for only 81 yards this season. Quarterback Daryl Jackson has completed 13 of 35 passes for 217 yards and one touchdown.

The Golden Bears have an experienced defense, led by all-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference cornerback Vernon Bears and defensive back Alton Gowdy, who missed last season due to injury.

UNI's offensive line took the heat against Pittsburgh, and Bruce said he is looking for marked improvement. He said he may alternate several seniors in the line, possibly shifting No. 2 right tackle Steve Spoden (Dyersville Beckman) into ex-Linn-Mar star Mark Botkin's No. 1 left tackle spot. But Botkin maintained his No. 1 berth on the depth chart Friday.

Meanwhile, red-shirt freshman Mike Schulte of Cedar Rapids, a former Regis prep tailback, has moved into the No. 2 flanker spot behind veteran Wes Anderson. And quarterback Troy Alexander, sidelined in preseason with a dislocated shoulder, returns to back up starter Ken Macklin.

# Tragedy mars Pointers' 14-8 victory

## Death, injury to kin of 2 Starmont players puts damper on win

CENTER POINT — When the players left the field after Center Point's 14-8 win over traditional rival Starmont Friday night, they were somberly aware that, whatever its significance as a game, it was, after all, only a

In the combined huddle that coaches Dave Barclay of Starmont and Ted Rogers of Center Point have made a regular post-game feature of the series, Barclay explained the lengthy delay midway through the third period.

The grandparents of Starmont junior tackle Chris Burco had been killed in an accident en route to the game, and the parents of senior tackle Steve Koch were in critical condition.


