It's all on the line today

t the risk of alarming Iowa football fans, let me calmly inform you that the Hawkeyes' entire season is on the line today.

Honest. Everything revolves around this afternoon's game against Michigan. Does this frighten you? If it does, there's time to get out now. Watch Harvard play Dartmouth on ESPN, rake some leaves, or go to the library. I hear Joan Collins wrote a book.

But if you have the nerve to face facts, walk this way. I know, I know. If you could walk that way you wouldn't need the talcum powder. Sorry, Groucho.

Fact No. 1: If Iowa wins today, it will be a certified Rose Bowl contender. This season, for the first time since the preseason, will be exciting.

Assuming Iowa beats Purdue and Michigan downs Indiana next week, the Hawks would roll into Indiana in two weeks at 3-0-1 in the league, with Indiana and Michigan 3-1. Illinois, the potential wild card, will have to be dealt with later if the Illini have proven they're not a fluke.

Fact No. 2: If Iowa loses today, its chances for a Big Ten title are nil. Not mathematically, but realistically. The 1-1-1 Hawks would need 3-0 Michigan, 3-0 Indiana and perhaps 3-0 Illinois to all lose twice. Highly unlikely.

With a loss, Iowa falls to 3-3-1 overall. That means they could afford only one more defeat to keep alive hopes of a bowl berth.

The bowl matchups are almost all finalized before the last week of the regular season. A 6-4-1 mark going into the Minnesota game might get Iowa into something like the Liberty Bowl, Peach Bowl, All-American Bowl, or (dare I say it?), the Holiday Bowl.

Not even the proven December migration pattern of Hawkeye fans could get Iowa into a bowl with a 5-5-1 record.

BUT IT'S TIME to stop dancing around the issue. Which club will succeed today in Kinnick Stadium, and which will fail?

I'm of the opinion Michigan isn't as good as most people think. For one thing, the Wolver-

ines are a Big Ten team. Yes, Michigan gave Notre Dame a great battle. And lost.

Yes, Michigan gave Miami a great battle. And lost. After leading by 16 points with 51/2 minutes left. That's icky.

Yes, Michigan held Wake Forest to nine points. And won. You can't lose 'em all.

Michigan's defense is the class of the Big Ten. And its offense is decent. But Iowa should have the edge in emotion, and that could put the Hawks in line to counter the big, bad Wolverines. If the Hawkeyes aren't breathing fire today, you can flush this season down the Iowa River.

Emotion in itself won't get the job done, however. Iowa needs big efforts from Chuck Hartlieb and Marv Cook and Tony Stewart and Dave Haight and, well, everybody. Michigan's a 6-point favorite. That sounds about right.

WHILE MOST TV sets in Iowa and Michigan will be tuned today to ABC and the Wolverines-Hawkeyes, the rest of the nation's football fans will be watching Miami at Notre Dame.

Most experts can see no way that Miami can lose. The Hurricanes are way too good, way too explosive. Notre Dame's offense doesn't have enough dimensions,

Miami loves not only to beat the Fighting Irish, but to humiliate them. Miami made Notre Dame's Tim Brown look like a bum last year. Brown still easily won the Heisman Trophy, which tells you the power Notre Dame has on so many minds.

But if there's a way for Notre Dame to win today, Lou Holtz will find it. He'll have millions rooting for his team. People hate Miami. The 'Canes are too good, too cocky and too close to the pro level for most people.

Some students on the Notre Dame campus this week have worn shirts with the slogan, "Catholics vs. Convicts."

That's freedom of speech. So is this:

I hope Miami wins by 50 points.

Cougars put the boot to Wash, 26-0

Gureno's 130 yards, 2 TDs help Kennedy vent frustrations on Warriors

Senior tailback Augie Gureno rambled for a season-high 130 yards and two touchdowns as Cedar Rapids Kennedy vented a season's worth of frustration on Washington in a 26-0 football romp Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

Gureno, a 195-pound senior, carried 24 times and scored on runs of 48 and six yards. Kennedy improved its overall and Mississippi Valley Conference records to 2-5.

The Warriors (2-5) suffered their fifth consecutive loss and fourth by shutout. It was the third Cougar shutout over Washington in the 22-game series, and second largest win since a 27-0 triumph in 1975.

'Augie had a decent night, had a nice run early and that's Augie Gureno," said Kennedy Coach Don Knock. "Our offensive line did a nice job for him. Coach (Jim) Lewis and Coach (Jerry) Mauren did a nice job. They had Wash defensed pretty well."

Kennedy, regrouped after last week's 33-12 penalty-marred visit to Iowa City High, built a 14-0 halftime lead and never looked back.

'It was a big turnaround from last week," said Knock. "There was a lot of frustration from last week, and it wasn't all self-inflicted. We're proud of our program and we have a lot of support from our community on that side of town.'

Washington Coach Wally Sheets praised the Cougars' effort.

The only comment I could make is that Kennedy looked a lot better than a 1-5 ballclub," said Sheets. "They played well up front. You win them up front and we got whipped up front. We had some fumbles

Iowa-Michigan rivalry a product of Fry's success

OWA CITY — In the beginning, it was Minnesota. Today, it's Minnesota, Iowa State, Michigan State, Michigan and perhaps one or two others.

One of the measures of how far Iowa's football program has come under Coach Hayden Fry is the number of rivalries it has spawned. For years,

the Iowa-Minnesota game and the battle for the bronze pig, Floyd of Rosedale, was the "big game" for the With the renewal of the Iowa

State series in 1977, natural intrastate competition heated up. With Fry's arrival in 1979, great games with the Spartans and Wolverines have been the exception rather than the rule.

"I don't think you'll ever replace Minnesota as a great rivalry," Fry said Friday. "(The other games are) just an addition. The people of Iowa would not lessen the Iowa-Minnesota



rivalry. It's kind of like playing Iowa State. But in recent years Michigan and Michigan State rivalries have taken on another dimension because of the closeness of the ballgames."

Today, you'll find just as many fans viewing the Hawkeye-Wolverine game (kickoff 2:35 p.m.) as the biggest game of the year as any other.

"I'm proud this game has turned into a classic, much like Michigan State," Fry said.

In the Fry era, the Hawkeyes have defeated Michigan three times and lost four times. Two of the wins were by two points (9-7 in 1981 and 12-10 in 1985) and the other was a blowout (26-0 in 1984.)

Two of Michigan's victories have been by a field goal (16-13 in 1983 and 20-17 in 1986) and two have been blowouts (37-10 last year and 29-7 in 1982.) More times than not, the • Please turn to 3B: Fry

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Too bad they already made a movie called "Trading Places" with Hollywood actors. There's a better plot at the World Series starring the Los Angeles Dodgers and Oakland Athletics.

Tim Belcher, the Dodgers' starter in Game 1 tonight, was traded away by Oakland in late 1987 as baseball's version of a stand-in, the player to be named later.

"Yeah, I'm excited to pitch against them," Belcher said during Friday's workout. "Fourteen months ago, I was 21/2 years away from the major leagues as far as the Oakland A's were concerned." Dave Stewart, a two-time 20-

game winner, will open for heavily favored Oakland. He was traded by the Dodgers in 1983. Another twist: Stewart and

Belcher were both involved in trades for Rick Honeycutt, now an Oakland reliever. Then there was the big deal.

Dodgers General Manager Fred Claire and Oakland counterpart Sandy Alderson went jogging last fall and talked about their teams'

At the winter meetings, they produced this: Bob Welch and Matt Young from the Athletics to Los Angeles with Jay Howell and Alfredo Griffin going the other way, part of a three-team trade with the New York Mets last

Lions keep Rams without a win, 21-7

Dubuque Senior may have taken away Linn-Mar's passing game, but it gave away the football

Aided by six Senior turnovers and two blocked punts, Linn-Mar turned back the winless Rams, 21-7, Friday night in a Mississippi Valley Conference game at Armstrong Field.

The Lions' 19th consecutive homecoming win moved them into a three-way tie for third in the Valley at 4-3.

"I have to give a lot of credit to the Senior High coaching staff. They did a terrific job of defensing us," said Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell.

Senior, which entered the game as the Valley's worst defensive club, surrendering 297.3 yards per game, held Linn-Mar to 158 yards of total offense and only 16 yards of passing offense. The Lions' had been averaging 241.2 total yards, 134 passing yards.

"They took the passing game away and we had to run the ball," said Purnell. "If they don't turn the ball over, that's a nip-and-tuck

But five interceptions and a fumble deep in its own territory spelled doom for Senior.

"It's the same old story," said Senior Coach Roger Bentley, who saw his Rams drop to 0-7. "We had a good offensive game plan and the kids executed it well, but those two blocked punts and that fumble really killed us.'

Linn-Mar's Kent Ochs blocked one punt and the Lions' Brian White recovered a fumble to set up two 14-yard scoring drives in

the second quarter. Junior Marc Lillibridge, starting at fullback for leading rusher Jon Teberg, plunged 2 and 6 yards for

Teberg suffered a broken ankle in the Lions' 27-20 win over Cedar Rapids Jefferson last week and is out for the season.

Despite trailing 14-0 at halftime, Senior dominated play in the second half. The Rams took the second-half kickoff and drove 53 yards to Linn-Mar's 13 before being thwarted by the first of two Blake Dooley interceptions.

Senior's second possession resulted in a 59-yard touchdown drive that cut Linn-Mar's lead to 14-7 with 10:51 to play.

Doug Kosman's 41-yard return of the ensuing kickoff put Linn-Mar in Senior territory at the 49, but the Lions were forced to punt.

Taking over on its own 14. Senior moved the ball 33 yards to the 47 where, on 4th-and-1 and with 5:39 to play, Linn-Mar's Eric Busler stuffed fullback Devin Frye for a two-yard loss.

"That was the game," said Bentley. "We had the right play called. We had the right play blocked. But the running back ran the wrong way. I don't know why it happened, we've only run the play 6,000 or so times in practice. If we make that first down it's a different ballgame."

Little Hawks rip Jeff to stay perfect

IOWA CITY - One down, two to go. That's how Iowa City High's coaches and players must feel about the football season after Friday night's 32-0 victory over Cedar Rapids Jefferson at Frank Bates Field.

The win, the Little Hawks' seventh in as many games this year, locks up a playoff berth for the team. City High stands atop the Mississippi Valley Conference at 7-0 with two games remaining.

The state playoffs are goal No. 1.

Goals two and three are a conference championship and an undefeated season.

"That's our big goal, to go undefeated," said City High tailback Brent Roth, who rushed for 87 yards and a touchdown, and caught a 50-yard TD pass to help defeat the J-Hawks. "We'll keep working for an undefeated season."

It will be the first visit to the playoffs since 1986 for City High, which also tied for the MVC

The Little Hawks haven't played much better this season than they did Friday night against Jefferson. City struck for two quick touchdowns in the first quarter, one on a Shad Flynn-to-Corey Landeen pass and the other on Mike Roan's 1-

JEFFERSON, WHICH fell to 4-3 with the loss, had a hard time playing catch-up football with its

wishbone offense. The J-Hawks suffered an additional blow when starting quarterback Adam Wright, already playing with an injured hand, suffered an ankle injury on the second series of downs. Wright, who was replaced by Shawn Fisk, did not return to the game.

City High's defense, led by nose guard Landeen and linebacker Tim O'Donnell, held the wishbone in check. Jeff managed only 47 yards of offense by halftime and 158 for the game.

"I thought on defense we put it right back at 'em pretty good," City Coach Larry Brown said. "We felt if we could get ahead early, we could

force them into doing some things they don't normally like to do.' Roth's 9-yard run late in the second quarter

gave the Little Hawks a 19-0 halftime edge. Jefferson moved into City High territory only twice in the first half and four times in the game. In fact, the J-Hawks deepest penetration was to

the City High 35 on the last play of the game, a 12-yard pass from Fisk to Brien Freerksen. It was Jefferson's only completion in six attempts.

Roth suffered a bruised knee early in the second half and spent much of the time on the sideline. In his place, 150-pound senior fullback Lance Bolton picked up 77 yards and sophomore tailback Jeff Smith gained 60, including a 5-yard scoring run.

Fullback Shaft Baker led Jefferson with 59 yards in 15 attempts.

Hempstead's lightning strikes down Prairie

Visitors score to open, close 21-6 Valley victory

Dubuque Hempstead's offense scored on its first and last play Friday night.

Each stunned Cedar Rapids Prairie, and each left some questions in the Hawks' minds.

Hempstead beat Prairie, 21-6, in a Mississippi Valley Conference football game at John Wall Field. Both teams are 4-3 and tied with Linn-Mar and Cedar Rapids Jefferson for third place.

Aaron Clark's 70-yard touchdown pass to Rob Lewis on the game's first play did not surprise Prairie coaches, but a non-call did. Lewis went up for the ball at

the Prairie 40-yard line (30 yards downfield) and appeared to nudge defender Jason Joens. Lewis made a nice catch and ran easily into the end zone. "I thought he pushed our guy,"

Prairie Coach Ed Johnson said. "My dad told me they were practicing long passes after we went into the lockerroom before the game, so we expected it. But the first play really cut our legs out from underneath us.'

Hempstead Coach Bob Timmerman even wondered about the play, saying, "To tell you the truth, I thought the coverage was excellent on the play. Let me just say we were happy to get the touchdown."

With 1:50 remaining and Hempstead ahead 14-6, Clark tossed a 26-yard pass to Lewis on thirdand-7 at the Prairie 35. Hempstead was called for aiding the ballcarrier two plays later on Clark's two-yard TD run. But on the next play, Terry Ruffridge scored on a 16-yard inside reverse with 33 seconds remaining.

Timmerman said he called the pass to Lewis merely to try and gain a first down and prevent Prairie from getting the ball.

"We were trying to make a first-and-10," Timmerman said.

Prairie didn't make a first down until 2:55 remained in the third quarter. The Hawks had just six yards rushing, six yards passing in the first 33 minutes.

The Hawks put four first downs together, but failed on downs at the Hempstead 9.

Behind the passing and running of junior Aaron Vlcko, Prairie drove 59 yards to its touchdown. Joens scored on a 1-yard run with 3:06 remaining. Vlcko completed 10 of 23 passes.

Prairie entered with the Valley's No. 1 rushing defense and No. 2 total defense. Hempstead gained 187 yards rushing and 296 total yards. The Hawks had just 51 yards rushing on 23 attempts.


