# Prairie makes it back to playoffs

Cedar Rapids Prairie is rushing into the state football playoffs for the third straight season.

A solid ground game and tremendous defense against the rush carried the Hawks to a 21-14 Mississippi Valley Conference win over visiting Cedar Rapids Kennedy Friday night.

Prairie (6-3) earned a berth in the 16-team Class 4A state field Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. Its firstround opponent is a return engagement at Linn-Mar, which will make its fourth straight playoff appearance. Prairie won at Linn-Mar on Sept. 23, 14-6.

"That's the ultimate goal, the playoffs," Prairie Coach Ed Johnson said. "We may not have the best skill people in the world, but we have the best coaches in the conference.

"The reason this is a successful program is because of the coaches, Dave Bennett, Craig Jelinek and Mike Trosky. That coaching staff is as good as any in the state." Johnson later acknowledged the assistance of volunteer Gerry Lowry, former Marion and Simpson College player.



disintegrate. The proof is in the last three years. 1985: Indiana starts 4-0, finishes 4-7. 1986: Indiana starts 4-0, finishes 6-6 including a loss in the All

American Bowl. 1987: Indiana starts 4-0 in the Big Ten, but finishes with losses in three of its last five games including a Peach Bowl defeat. Indiana's Bill Mallory was voted the Big Ten Coach of the Year in 1986 and 1987. However, most ballots are sent back to the Big Ten office before the season ends.

One theory for the Hoosiers' late-season collapses is that they haven't been that great, and their toughest opponents have come later in the season.

My theory, naturally, makes more sense. It's called "Hoosier Hysteria Isn't Caused By Football, Baby.'

Bloomington is not like the other nine Big Ten cities. It doesn't resemble Columbus, Madison, Minneapolis or even Iowa City. It's basically a small town, hence the John Cougar Mellencamp song "Small Town." Mellencamp grew up near Bloomington, dontcha

Towns near Bloomington include Beanblossom, Needmore and Hashtown. Interstate highways do not run through Bloomington. The tallest building in town is the county courthouse.

It's quaint. It's out of an era that most of us have passed by.

Mom-and-pop diners. Clean, safe streets. Hearts full of American pride. A U.S. Senator named Danny Quayle.

## J-Hawks' playoff bid denied by Wahlert

Cedar Rapids Jefferson needed the best out of its oft-injured yet speedy backfield to earn a state football playoff berth Friday

Unfortunately for Jefferson, No. 9-ranked Dubuque Wahlert kept up its own blistering pace, sidelining the J-Hawks, 32-12, at Kingston Stadium.

Wahlert (7-2) ended the regular season as the Mississippi Valley Conference runner-up and marched to its second straight Class 4A postseason appearance. Jefferson retired 5-4

The two clubs combined for 706 yards, including 614 on the ground. Wahlert finished its Valley slate with a league record 2,501 rushing yards.

The Golden Eagles also handed Coach Tom Kopatich his 16th straight victory in Kingston Stadi-

"I was upset at halftime with us turning the ball over three times," said Kopatich, an admitted perfectionist. "Jefferson has the speed that really concerns you. After we settled down, we had guys flying around like crazy on defense. Our toughest opponent has been us."

Wahlert jumped to a 7-0 lead only two minutes into the game, ripping off 73 yards in eight plays. Fullback Doug Hoefer plunged two yards to score the first of his two touchdowns.

Hoefer led the Golden Eagles with 125 yards on 28 carries, getting 96 the first half. Wahlert piled up 317 rushing yards to the J-Hawks' 297.

"The key for us is if we can somehow negate the pressure they put on defensively." Raetz said. "They are a very, very good defensive team.'

The Panthers are led defensively by Mike Kolpin, a 6-3, 225-pound linebacker from South Tama. Kolpin has collected 69 tackles this season, 34 solos, including two quarterback sacks. Tim Peterson is next with 54 tackles and Steve Peitler has 53.

Indiana State hopes to "generate some offense" with the running of Tori Victor and the passing of John Sahm. Victor, a 202pound senior, leads the league in rushing (92-yard average) and scoring (eight touchdowns). Sahm is second in the league in passing, completing 87 of 152 passes for 1,264 yards. He has thrown 10 interceptions




