"The doctors said Steve had a better chance of returning with the spleen removed. He had stitches from the bottom of his sternum to the bottom of his stomach. But, he was badgering the doctors to let him back. What he's done to return is remarkable.'

Fort Hays State is 1-2 after a 34-20 loss to Cameron, Okla., last week. The Tigers are a member of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, and the third Panther foe from a different classification. The 5,100-member school in Hays, Kan., carries a dual NAIA Division I and NCAA Division II affiliation.
