## Miami still selling self

MIAMI — This is a city of odd marriages.

Ferrari dealerships are a short walk from ramshackle apartments. Marinas littered with expensive speedboats are a splash from a disheveled man sleeping in a city park.

It's a city of Art Deco and crackhouses, of wealthy retirees and desperate poor, of fun, sun and 6,300 assaults with a deadly weapon last year.

Cubans mix with Anglos, who mix with African-Americans, Nicaraguans, Haitians and many transplanted Europeans.

And the city's largest university depends mainly on non-alumni to sustain its big-time athletic program.

Late Friday afternoon, the University of Miami Hurricanes went through a loose, light, high-spirited practice on their campus field in suburban Coral Gables. The only sign of outside life came when the elevated trains of Miami's new billion-dollar Metrorail system passed by.

The Hurricanes have won three national football championships since 1983, and seemingly haven't been out of the Top 10 in eons, but the city of Miami doesn't revolve around them.

You drive around Miami, and you don't see Hurricane this and Hurricane that. Not that many UM students are from the immediate area. Not that many UM alums live in the immediate area. Not that many Hispanics, which make up about half Miami's population, care about the school or football.

"It's an apathetic town," Tom Evans, a member of the Hurricane Club's board of directors, said Friday in the school's athletic center on Hurricane Drive. "You've got to win to get people's attention."

The Hurricanes sold 24,532 season tickets in 1983, the year of their first national title. That number has ballooned to almost 58,000 — more than the neighboring NFL Dolphins for the first time — so UM football has caught on in a fairly big way.

Still, were Miami coming off a 5-6 year like Iowa, there's no way the 'Canes would come close to the Hawkeyes' nearly 70,000 fans per home game.

"Obviously it's different here than being in a college town," said Larry Wahl, UM associate athletic director for communications. "The support has become much greater in recent years. We've gone out to do some things to be more a part of the community. Our players are constantly making appearances in the schools here."

Most of the 5,000 Hurricane Club members and the team's ticket-buyers don't have an affiliation with the university. They're simply college football fans.

"I WOULD SAY 80 percent are non-UM graduates," Evans said. "They may be Notre Dame graduates or Iowa graduates, but they've moved here and Miami football is now their world of athletics."

Even with a team that has an outside shot at a second straight national title, available tickets are usually plentiful. Tonight's Iowa-Miami game won't be a sell-out. The only likely full house on Miami's six-game home schedule will be for archival Florida State next Saturday.

The Hurricanes drew over 50,000 fans just twice in six 1989 home games at the 75,500-seat Orange Bowl.

However, things used to be much worse, and are getting better all the time. The product, after all, is quite good.

Men's basketball is another story. After a decade without the sport, the UM brought basketball back in 1985. The Hurricanes play their home games in the 2-year-old, 16,000-seat Miami Arena. Talk about seats being available on game day.

"We have not been that successful," Wahl said. "We have 1,800 season-tickets sold for basketball. Baseball is our second-biggest sport here right now."

# Glory or gloom waiting for Iowa

MIAMI — The Iowa Hawkeyes can recapture the glory of yesteryear in one fell swoop tonight by upending 10th-ranked Miami in the Orange Bowl.

Few people give Iowa, a 23-point underdog, much of a chance against the 1989 national champs. Even U of I Coach Hayden Fry has been spreading gloom and doom all week.

But this is 1990, not 1989, and these Hurricanes have yet to prove themselves. Nor, for that matter, have the Hawkeyes.

Miami lost to BYU, 28-21, in its opener and rallied to beat California, 52-24, in its second game. Iowa pummeled a weak Cincinnati ballclub, 63-10, then held off the injured Iowa State Cyclones, 45-35.

The jury is still out on both of tonight's contestants, but there's a feeling neither team has played its best game yet.

"We didn't show all of our hand in our first two poker games," remarked Fry with a sneaky grin.

Indeed, Fry buttoned down his offense

in the first two games, letting "Thunderbolt and Lightfoot" — a.k.a. Nick Bell and Tony Stewart — run loose while Matt Rodgers rested his throwing arm.

The Hawkeyes have barely involved Sean Smith, their fastest wide receiver, and Mike Saunders, their most versatile offensive weapon, in the attack this year. Could Fry be saving them for tonight?

Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

Iowa hopes to catch Miami thinking ahead. The Hurricanes host Florida State next Saturday in a big intrastate showdown that has national title implications.

Miami said it won't happen, but what's to fear from Iowa when Florida State is on the horizon?

Plenty, apparently.

"Repeating as national champion is so far from our mind right now it's unbelievable," said Miami Coach Dennis Erickson.

Also unbelievable in some quarters is the prospect of an Iowa victory. But Fry enjoys the underdog role, and he's done a masterful job this week keeping the pressure off his team.

"We don't have a chance against Miami unless we improve 100 percent," he said. "We could play well in this ballgame and still get blown out of the tub."

But the Hawkeyes, a steady top-20 club for much of the 1980s, could take a giant stride back in that direction tonight after two sub-par years.

"If we could win, geez, we'd be right up

there in the national rankings," said Rodgers. "We'd go on to have a great, great season, I'm sure."

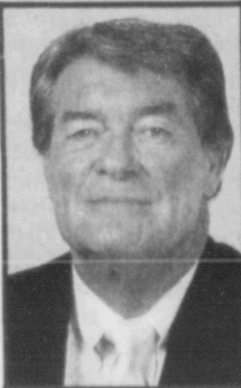
That's what Hawkeye fans are hoping for.

Iowa has another tough game next week, visiting Michigan State.

While the Hawkeyes have relied on the run this season, Miami has been its normal pass-happy self. The Hurricanes launched 101 aerials in their first two games, and there's no reason to expect anything different tonight.

Miami quarterback Craig Erickson has thrown for 766 yards and four touchdowns this year. His favorite targets are Wesley

## Unlikely hero Stone delivers for Red Sox

BOSTON (AP) — Jeff Stone, a journeyman outfielder who has spent most of the last 10 years in the minor leagues, never expected to get a chance to put the Boston Red Sox in first place.

In his first major-league at-bat this season, Stone drove in the winning run with a bases-loaded single in the ninth inning Friday night, lifting the Red Sox

to a 7-6 victory over the Toronto Blue Jays.

"With all the fans hollering and stuff, it was a weird feeling," Stone said after his one-out single to right-center field catapulted the Red Sox into first place in the AL East.

The Red Sox, 9-2 against Toronto this season, took the opener of the crucial three-game series at Fenway Park and lead the division by one game with five games left for both teams.

"I felt like 'The Natural' getting up there," said Stone, 29, who was called up this month when rosters were expanded. "In this series, I didn't think I'd get up at all."

The Red Sox bounced back against Toronto relief ace Tom Henke (2-3) after Junior Felix gave the Blue Jays a 6-5 lead with a two-run homer off Jeff Gray with none out in the ninth.

After Jeff Reardon (4-3) replaced Gray and retired three batters in a row, the Red Sox got two runs off Henke to go one game ahead of the Blue Jays in the division race.

Stone, used only as a pinch-runner in seven previous Boston appearances, ran for Dwight Evans in the eighth and got a chance to hit after Mike Greenwell tied the score 6-6 with a bases-loaded single.

"It's just one game," Toronto Manager Cito Gaston said. "It's tough to lose any time, but we still have two more games here."

Toronto, with Henke going for his 32nd save, went into the bottom of the ninth with a 6-5 lead. Jody Reed walked and went to second on a sacrifice before Wade Boggs walked.

ELLIS BURKS singled to load the bases before Mike Greenwell's single tied the score, with Boggs holding at third despite a bad throw to the plate by right fielder Felix.

With Toronto trailing 5-4 in the ninth, Greg Myers singled before Felix hit the first pitch from Jeff Gray into the Toronto bullpen in right for his 14th homer.

Boston took the 5-4 lead in the eighth on third baseman Kelly Gruber's two throwing errors.

Boston starter Mike Boddicker, a Norway native, allowed only two singles, one an infield hit, for six innings and appeared en route to the Red Sox' fourth consecutive shutout over Toronto.

Greenwell gave Boston a 1-0 lead with a bases-loaded single in the first.

## Cougars fend off Wash upset bid

Senior tailback Joe Gureno said this prep football season marks "a new age" at Cedar Rapids Kennedy.

Indeed, Cougar teams of the past would have had difficulty overcoming Friday night's valiant upset bid by injury-plagued Washington at Kingston Stadium.

But, this Kennedy unit rallied for two fourth-quarter touchdowns to snap a 20-20 deadlock and down the Warriors, 36-20, in a Mississippi Valley Conference battle.

Washington suffered injuries to six starters in the hard-fought game, while Kennedy was challenged repeatedly by the surviving Warriors.

Kennedy hiked its record to 4-1, while Washington is 2-3, dropping its

third straight game.

Kennedy finished the game rushing 16 times and scoring twice. Cougar backup tailback Mike Morrison pounded five yards with 4:59 left to play to provide the go-ahead touchdown — capping an 11-play, 80-yard drive. Brad Meskimen — the Valley's leading receiver heading into the game — then nabbed a conversion pass from quarterback Chad Wiese for a 28-20 cushion.

Kennedy held the Warriors on the next series, took over and the 195-pound Gureno — who had a game-high 171 yards on 24 carries — tacked on a 4-yard scoring run with 38

seconds left. Morrison fired a conversion pass to Meskimen.

"The fourth quarter we knew we had to get things done," said Gureno. "The running and hard work is starting to pay off."

"Our offensive line just went to work when we had to," added Cougars Coach Don Knock. "If they'd played like that all night maybe it might have been a different story. But, I'm proud of the kids. Because, maybe that's the sign of a good team when you go out flat and keep them (Washington) in the game and then get it in the fourth quarter that's nice."

Washington Coach Wally Sheets praised his team for its gallant effort.

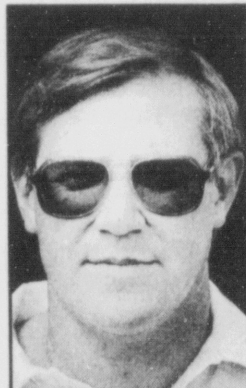

Brian Hansell's two-point reception with 1:57 remaining lifted Class 3A 10th-ranked Regis past Benton Community, 15-14, Friday night in a Wamac Conference prep football game at Bobcat Stadium.

Regis (4-1) remained unbeaten in the Wamac at 3-0. Benton fell to 3-2 overall, 1-2 in the Wamac. "The time factor was an overriding concern," said Hauschildt. "We want to make every effort to give our kids a chance to win the ballgame."

The Royals got that chance when David Schimberg crashed in for a touchdown from the 1-yard line with 1:57 remaining. His plunge capped a 39-yard drive.

# Fuller, Conway team up for Marion

During halftime festivities of Marion's homecoming football game against South Tama Friday night, seniors Travis Fuller and Brent Conway were named their school's co-homecoming kings.

As if to prove themselves worthy of the honor, they ruled the second half of the game iron fists.

Fuller hit Conway with a 15-yard touchdown pass with just 3

minutes, 47 seconds left in the game to lead the Indians to a come-from-behind, 33-27, non-conference win over the Trojans on Marion's Thomas Park Field.

The win upped Class 3A, play-off-minded Marion's record to 4-1 on the year. South Tama, 0-9 a year ago, dropped to 0-5.

South Tama, a Class 3A school, is playing the 1990 season as an independent. It will become the eighth member of the Wamac Conference — the league in which Marion plays — next season.

Fuller, who entered the game as the most effective passer in the state, didn't hook up with Conway at all in the first half but found him eight times for 112 yards in the final 24 minutes. The winning score — which culminated an eight-play, 83-yard drive engineered by Fuller — was the second 15-yard TD pass of the half that went from Fuller to Conway.

"I generally play on the side with double coverage but in the second half I was switched to the other side," Conway said of his performance in the second half.

Fuller, who finished with 291 yards on a 17-of-25 effort, was at the hospital having his sternum checked and unavailable for comment.

South Tama had taken a 27-13 lead with 7:03 left in the third period when Steve Murty ran 56 yards for his second touchdown of the game. But Marion scored the final three touchdowns of the game to pull out the win.

"We'd come back before, but things were looking pretty gloomy at that point," Conway said.

Marion Coach Dave Messerli

wasn't at all pleased with his team's play defensively in the first half. South Tama led, 20-13, at intermission.

"We did a very poor job (defensively) in the first half," he said. "We did not attack their offense at all. But we kept our pass offensive going and that kept us in the game."

South Tama scored on its first three possessions of the game, running its offense almost entirely on the ground. Led by a 155-yard, two-touchdown performance from Murty, the Trojans finished with 285 rushing yards on 48 carries.

Murty's touchdowns came on runs of 51 and 56 yards.

Marion scored on its first two possessions to keep pace with South Tama, but still trailed 20-13 at halftime. The Indians' first touchdown came on a 3-yard run from Andy Ehresman with 2:17 left in the first period and its second on a little razzle-dazzle from Fuller, Bryan Seedorf and Ehresman to kickoff the second quarter.

Working from his own 44 yard-line Fuller hit Seedorf with a pass 16-yards into the flat. Seedorf held the ball only seconds before pitching to Ehresman, who ran the remaining 40 yards for the touchdown. Fuller kicked an extra-point which gave Marion a short-lived 13-12 lead.

The Trojans scored on their next possession, with Werner capping a nine-play, 51-yard drive with another one-yard touchdown plunge.

"South Tama really wanted to win," said Messerli, who will take his team Vinton for a Wamac game against Vinton-Shellsburg this Friday. "We've beaten them handily the last three times we've played them but I guess they came out figuring, 'Hey, what do we have to lose?'"

Ehresman scored his third touchdown of the game with 11:51 left in the game and a conversion toss from Fuller to Ehresman knotted the game at 27, setting up Marion's late heroics.

# No. 1 Lions handle Senior

Jason Maloy ran for three touchdowns and figured in a fourth as top-ranked Linn-Mar hiked its record to 5-0 Friday night.

The Lions scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to down Dubuque Senior, 28-13, and win their 20th straight homecoming game at Armstrong Field.

Maloy, a senior fullback and linebacker, gave Linn-Mar a 21-13 on a 3-yard scoring run with 6:51 left. Less than a minute later, he tipped a pass by Senior's Randy Weber into the hands of junior Casey Mulherin, who ran 29 yards for a touchdown.

Linn-Mar won despite losing three fumbles, including one on the opening kickoff. The Rams, one of the Mississippi Valley Conference's better teams despite a 2-3 record, took a quick 7-0 lead two plays later on Scott Brock's 3-yard run.

"If we don't learn from our mistakes then we're not going to develop into a good football team," Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell said. "We made enough mistakes that we could've been down 14 points."

Linn-Mar outgained Senior 378-131, but had only a 14-13 lead after three quarters. And the Rams blew two first-half scoring

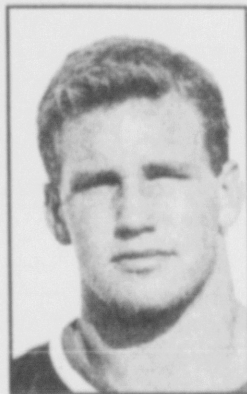
opportunities, fumbling at the Linn-Mar 11 and failing on downs at the Lions' 2.

The Lions' defense made the difference in the second half, limiting Senior to seven rushing yards. The Rams' Mike Francois, the Valley's rushing leader with a 101-yard average, was limited to 37 yards on 15 carries. His six second-half carries netted only one yard.

"If you go back over the years, when we've been successful it's been because of good defense and an opportunistic offense," Purnell said. "We shut Senior down and that was the big difference."

Linn-Mar tied the score, 7-7, with a 12-play, 89-yard scoring drive. Maloy capped it on a 3-yard run with 9:10 left in the half, and Shane Hayler hit the first of his four extra-point kicks.

Weber returned the ensuing kickoff 86 yards to the Linn-Mar 4. But the Lion

defense held, as Maloy tipped away a Weber pass into the end zone on fourth down.

Maloy, who finished with 125 yards on 19 carries, put Linn-Mar up 14-7 on an excellent 55-yard run with 7:42 left in the third. He slipped a tackler at the Senior 40 and shed three other pursuers inside the 20.

Senior closed to 14-13 on the first play of the fourth period, as Weber drilled a 9-yard scoring strike to Tim Speltz. However, Brock's extra point kick went wide right. Speltz had five catches for 47 yards.

Maloy's 38-yard kickoff return set up the drive which led to his third touchdown.

Mick Mulherin had 136 all-purpose yards for the Lions, gaining 68 rushing and 68 receiving. He had 17 rushes and three catches.

Ryan Driscoll, Linn-Mar's standout junior quarterback, completed 10 of 17 passes for 152 yards. He increased his season passing total to 709 yards. Chad Rubenow caught five passes for 53 yards.

Linn-Mar holds a one-game lead in the Valley over Cedar Rapids Kennedy, Dubuque Wahlert and Iowa City High. The Lions hosts Cedar Rapids Washington Friday, then play at City High Oct. 12.

## C.R. Prairie breaks into win column

DUBUQUE — Mike Kleppe was perfect on six passes during a first-quarter scoring drive as Cedar Rapids Prairie notched its first win of the season, 7-6, over winless Dubuque Hempstead Friday in Mississippi Valley Conference prep football.

Kleppe finished with 88 yards passing, completing 13 of 19

the flood pass or the screen.

"One of the officials came over to me after the play and said (Hansell) had to dive to get in there, that he barely broke the plane of the goal-line. But that's football. It's a game of inches."

Benton had one last gasp, moving to the Regis 43, but was handicapped because it had no timeouts left. The Bobcat hopes died on fourth-and-13 when Brian Stodola's pass nosedived to the turf and the ball went back to Regis with 17 seconds remaining.

Benton had taken a 14-7 lead on Stodola's 1-yard sneak with 9:47 remaining. That capped a 15-play, 69-yard drive and came two plays after Robert Kremer had crashed four yards to the Regis 1 on fourth-and-2.

Regis marched right back but was stifled when Schimberg came up inches short on a fourth-and-3 play from the Bobcat 14.

But Benton was unable to move the ball and was forced to punt. Pat Conley's 9-yard return gave the Royals the ball at the Benton

39 with 5:14 remaining.

Regis, which was dominated statistically by Benton's quick-hitting front line, came through with two clutch third-down plays — Martin hitting Matt Drahos for a 15-yard gain that carried to the Benton 12 on a third-and-8, and Schimberg crashing five yards to the 1 on a third-and-5 — in the winning drive.

"These kids don't like to lose," said Hauschildt. "They lost only once last season, and that was in the state semifinals. They have a lot of pride."

"You have to give a lot of credit to Benton. They took it to us in the first half and the better part of the second half."

Benton held a surprising 270-177 advantage in total offense. The Bobcats rushed the ball 61 times for 237 yards, Kremer — a 5-foot-8, 155-pound junior — picking up 123 on 34 carries.

"We totally dominated them up front," said Morgan. "The big difference was special teams and field position. That first punt

return was very critical."

Morgan referred to Schimberg's 77-yard gallop, after taking a handoff on a reverse from Conley, that carried to the Benton 8 and set up the Royals' first score late in the opening quarter. Schimberg, who rushed for 237 yards in the Royals' 35-14 win over Marion last Saturday but was held to 82 by Benton, strolled in from four yards out with 2:21 left in the first quarter.

"That certainly gave us a lift," said Hauschildt of Schimberg's return. "It covered a lot of yards without having to play their defense."

Following an exchange of possessions, Benton engineered an 11-play, 60-yard march, Kremer crashing in from the 2 on third-and-goal.

Regis' next game is Thursday against West Delaware at Kingston Stadium. Benton Community travels to No. 8 Waverly-Shell Rock next Friday.

"I couldn't be more proud of this group the way they played tonight," Sheets said. "To single out any one person, you can't do that. We talked to our line last night and tonight about controlling the neutral zone and they did a great job."

"We had key injuries to so many key people by the time the second half opened . . . They're (Kennedy) huge. That's why I have so many good feelings about the way we played the game."

Kennedy rushed for 160 of its 224 yards in the second half, and its defense limited Washington to 47 yards on the ground.

Gureno opened the game with a 35-yard scoring sprint down the right sidelines, but the extra point kick failed.

Washington's Dedric Ward then set the wild tempo for the evening returning the ensuing kickoff 86 yards — his second

scoring return in three weeks. Tyson Schwieger ran the conversion as the Warriors caught Kennedy's defense by having nine Warriors line up to the right side of center forming a wall for Schwieger.

The lead traded hands three minutes later as Jason Knupp snared a 31-yard pass from Wiese. The conversion pass failed.

Wiese, who has not been intercepted in 55 attempts in three starts, completed 8 of 17 passes

for 182 yards and two TDs — adding a 63-yard hookup with Meskimen with 7:44 left in the first half. Wiese was 1 of 4 the second half, but his arm wasn't in demand.

Warrior quarterback Derek Fulton passed for 162 yards, connecting on 11 of 20 attempts for one TD and was intercepted once.

The Cougars ganged up on Fulton, who stumbled for a safety and 20-14 Kennedy advantage at the 7:12 mark of the third quarter.
