Maybe the Lisa Olson-New England Patriots story of the last couple of weeks shocked some people. Some of us weren't at all surprised.

Olson is the now-famous Boston Herald sports reporter who was allegedly approached by five naked Patriot players in the team's dressing room. They made unseemly remarks and gestures towards her.

I saw a similar incident at Wrigley Field this June. A female reporter was in the visiting clubhouse to get comments from New York Mets pitcher Ron Darling after he beat the Chicago Cubs. A few Mets taunted her, calling her a word I can't use here. One, a so-called superstar, was in his naked glory harassing the woman, who didn't respond to the players' insults.

You wondered if that was just a day in the life of a female reporter covering a big-league ballclub. While Lisa Olson and her employer fought back, perhaps many other women sports reporters deal with similar situations in silence, or leave the profession for something that offers a little dignity.

Those adolescent athletes who purport to be professionals may hate it, but women continue to make their moves into sports writing and broadcasting. The Cedar Rapids-Waterloo television market was recently introduced to someone believed to be its first female television sports-caster.

Debby Kaufman, 24, began work late this summer as the

weekend sports anchor at KWWL-TV (Channel 7) in Waterloo. She already had experience covering the pros, colleges and preps. She went to Waterloo from Marion, Ill., where she occasionally covered the St. Louis Cardinals baseball team and Southern Illinois University.

"I would have to say I feel pretty removed by (the Olson-Patriots controversy)," Kaufman said. "It's strange that something like that has come up again now. Things seemed to have run smoothly for many years. There has been equal access for more than a decade."

"I don't think it signals anything. I think it's an isolated incident, and it's unfortunate."

She admitted having a couple of minor problems at her job because she's a woman, but "nothing serious. You just deal with it. I would stress it was nothing serious."

Reporting sports on television looks like a glamorous job to outsiders, and it does have its rewards. Still, just about every one you see giving scores and interviews — nationally or locally — got on the ladder at the bottom and didn't skip many rungs.

While in high school, Kaufman worked for 2½ years as an intern at a St. Louis television station. She attended and graduated from the University of Arizona, then spent two years at cable sports network ESPN as a trainee in producing. Realizing she had to go the local route if she ever wanted to be an on-air personality, she chose to pay some dues. She was at the Illinois job for six months before moving on to the bigger Waterloo market. Now she must convince local viewers she knows of what she speaks.

"The most important thing as a woman in sports is to be credible," Kaufman said. "I think you can only be credible as long as you're yourself."

Kaufman wouldn't mind returning to ESPN as an anchor after several years in the trenches, but she noted, "You've got to learn your craft. I'm pretty new at this, and I have a long way to go. By no means have I arrived."

## Iowa, ISU open league slates

Hawks' Fry puts streak at MSU on line

The Iowa Hawkeyes and Michigan State Spartans renew their classic football rivalry in East Lansing today, but this time the Spartans have a little "Voodoo" on their side as they try to snap the hex of Hayden Fry.

Fry is undefeated at Spartan Stadium during his 12 years with the Hawkeyes, winning four and settling for a disputed 10-10 tie in 1988.

But that was before Brian "Voodoo" Vooletich joined Michigan State as a reserve defensive back.

Vooletich, a regular readers of The Gazette know by now, is the son of Iowa assistant coach Milan Vooletich. Under normal conditions, Brian wouldn't play much against the Hawkeyes, but this is not a normal series.

In this series, goal posts fall down, field goals get lost in the fog, and refs don't see two-point conversions.

And in this series, the guy who plays ahead of Vooletich — somebody with the

equally unusual name of Mike Iaquaniello — gets hurt so "Voodoo" can see a little action.

Strange? Naw.

Michigan State Coach George Perles sees nothing strange at all in his series with Fry, which stands 3-3-1. Iowa has scored 125 points in the seven games and the Spartans 121.

Nobody has won by more than six points.

"I think it's coincidence, over a long period of time, because I don't find any rhyme or reason," said Perles.

The oddsmakers think today could be different, with MSU a 9½-point pick. A sellout crowd of 76,000 will pack Spartan Stadium for the kickoff at 12:05 p.m. (Iowa time).

There's no guarantee that Vooletich will start for MSU, since Perles could juggle other spots in the defensive secondary. But don't bet against "Voodoo" from weaving a magic spell.

When you've got a Yugoslavian name like Vooletich, a nickname like "Voodoo" is a natural. "I hope I can use some of that some day to put a hex on somebody," he joked earlier in the week.

Walden: Cyclones 'cannot afford loss'

Iowa State's Big 8 football season starts today, and already the Cyclones are in a bind.

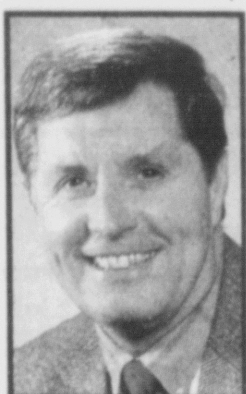
Instead of heading into league play with a 3-1 or 4-0 record, Iowa State is 2-2 after letting a victory get away at Minnesota and making too many mistakes in a failed upset bid at Iowa.

"We've painted ourselves into a corner," said Coach Jim Walden, who leads the Cyclones against Kansas (1-3, 0-1) in today's homecoming battle. "If we're sitting here 4-0 or 3-1, we wouldn't be so desperate."

"Now, we are a little desperate. We cannot afford another loss."

Iowa State, which has won five straight against Kansas, will have the same offense it opened the season with today.

Quarterback Chris Pedersen returns from a knee injury and running back Blaise Bryant is ticketed for his first start since suffering a deep shoulder bruise. Pedersen has not played in two weeks. Bry-

ant didn't start but ran for 83 yards on 11 carries in last week's 34-20 win over Western Michigan.

"Pete's had a great week of practice," Walden said. "I don't think we'll miss a lick there. Blaise has looked great."

Iowa State must have its offense ready against a huge Kansas defense. Tackles Gilbert Brown (6-foot-3, 315 pounds) and Dana Stubblefield (6-3, 305) anchor the Jayhawk defense, which has chopped over 90 yards off its defensive average this fall.

Kansas held mighty Oklahoma to 43 second-half yards in a 31-17 loss at Oklahoma last week.

"What you try to do is stay away from them," Walden said of Stubblefield and Brown. "You make them chase you instead of running right at them. There's really not any need to see if you can knock those big guys out of there. That's like beating your head against the wall."

"You try to keep control, cut them off and run away from them."

That could mean the Cyclones will need a big game from Bryant.

"They've got a premier running back in Blaise Bryant," Kansas Coach Glen Mason said. "I trust that he's 100 percent healthy."

Little Hawks kind guests  
as Cougars notch shutout

Cedar Rapids Kennedy unfolded a two-part homecoming football drama Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

First, the queen candidates met on a podium and peered into envelopes on their respective chairs to learn senior Tara Troendle was the winner.

On the field, more dramatics. The Cougars struggled to a wacky 14-0 Mississippi Valley Conference shutout over Iowa City High. Kennedy cashed in on timely defensive plays and assorted Little Hawk "gifts" along the way.

Kennedy hiked its record to 5-1, to remain tied for second place in the league with Dubuque Wahlert. City High is 4-2, and hosts Class 4A top-rated Linn-Mar (6-0) next Friday.

"Luck was on our side tonight," said Kennedy Coach Don Knock. "Someone was watching over us. City High was ready to play, and I told our kids at halftime you got to expect people are going to be ready to play you. All of a sudden it's a different ball game. Nobody got up for Kennedy in the years past, now people are getting up for Kennedy."

City High led in total yards, 365 to 324, but the Little Hawks — who had executed flawlessly the past several weeks — misfired repeatedly in prime scoring territory.

Meanwhile, Kennedy fumbled four times, losing one on a muffed punt return, but survived. The Cougars' defensive secondary intercepted three passes and the front line didn't crumble.

"Our defense really sucked it up once they (City High) got down on the goal line," said Kennedy senior Joe Gureno, who doubled as offensive and defensive star. "They gave our offense the chances. They really put it to Iowa City High."

Gureno logged one of the three interceptions of City High sophomore quarterback Chris Hamdorf. The 6-foot-2, 180-pound Gureno then rushed

CINCINNATI (AP) — Because the Pittsburgh Pirates and Barry Bonds drew even in outfield mistakes, the Cincinnati Reds and Paul O'Neill evened the National League playoffs on Friday.

Bonds and Cincinnati's Eric Davis are the only major leaguers ever to hit 30 homers and steal 50 bases in a season. Now they also share the ignominy of

This time, Bonds lost Paul O'Neill's fly ball to left and the Cincinnati Reds beat the Pirates, 2-1, to even the playoffs 1-1.

balls today," Davis said. "But all the fans see is you missing the ball."

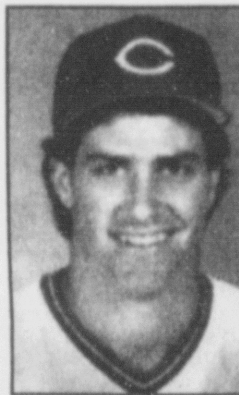

price of admission

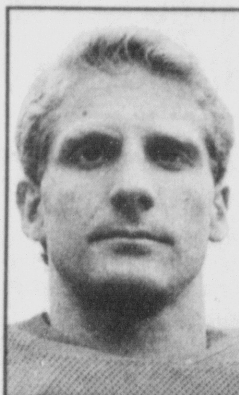
When he announced that Coe College would charge admission for its football games this fall, athletic director Bill Quinby described the prices — \$3 for adults, \$1 for students — as "the bargain on 14th Street."

Fans who've followed the career of Kohawk No. 33, senior tailback Ryan Kolpin, aren't apt to argue. This is a young man who says, "I like to run," and shows it.

In four games this season, the muscular 5-foot-10, 175-pound Aurlia native has totaled 801 yards and 11 touchdowns rushing and receiving. Also, after misfiring on his first pass because "I got kind of excited," he's 2-for-2 passing, for two touchdowns.

Entering today's home game with Grinnell, Kolpin has 504 yards and nine touchdowns on 79 rushing attempts, 297 yards and two TDs on 22 pass receptions.

His 30 career rushing touchdowns put him six over the Coe record Tom Kaloupek set 1983-85. His 36 touchdowns rushing and receiving combined put him 11 over Kaloupek's career mark.

And, his 180 points are just 27 short of the school mark kicker Rims Roof set 1982-85.

If he maintains his current rushing average of 126 yards a game for the five remaining, Kolpin will eclipse by 95 the Coe season mark of 1,039 set by Greg Trosky in 1980, and by 98 the career record of 2,149 Dan Heeren set 1972-75.

If he continues his pace over the first four games, he will also eclipse the Coe season rushing TD record Don Flagel set in 1973.

# 1 great pitching duel left

Stewart, Clemens to mix it up in Game 1 of ALCS

BOSTON (AP) — Koufax vs. Marichal. Palmer vs. Hunter. Gibson vs. Drysdale.

There was a time when great games were defined by great pitchers. So what ever happened to those days of duels?

They're gone, lost in the era of more relievers, more injuries and more money. All except for one.

Stewart vs. Clemens.

Tonight at 7:30 (Iowa time), they meet again in Game 1 of the American League playoffs.

Dave Stewart, the soul of the Oakland Athletics. Roger Clemens, the blood of the Boston Red Sox. They may not hang out together during the off-season, but there's a reason they respect each other — they are baseball's top two winners in the past five years.

"There is a tension," Stewart said Friday as the A's worked out at Fenway Park. "If we're on the field at the same time, I don't look at him and he doesn't look at me. If we're close enough to talk, we'll speak. But I don't think either one of us goes out of our way to have a conversation."

Ah, an edge. Even better to spice it up.

Here's why: since joining Oakland in mid-1986, Stewart is 6-0 in head-to-head meetings with Clemens, including three victories this year. Plus, Stewart has won 20 games for four straight seasons.

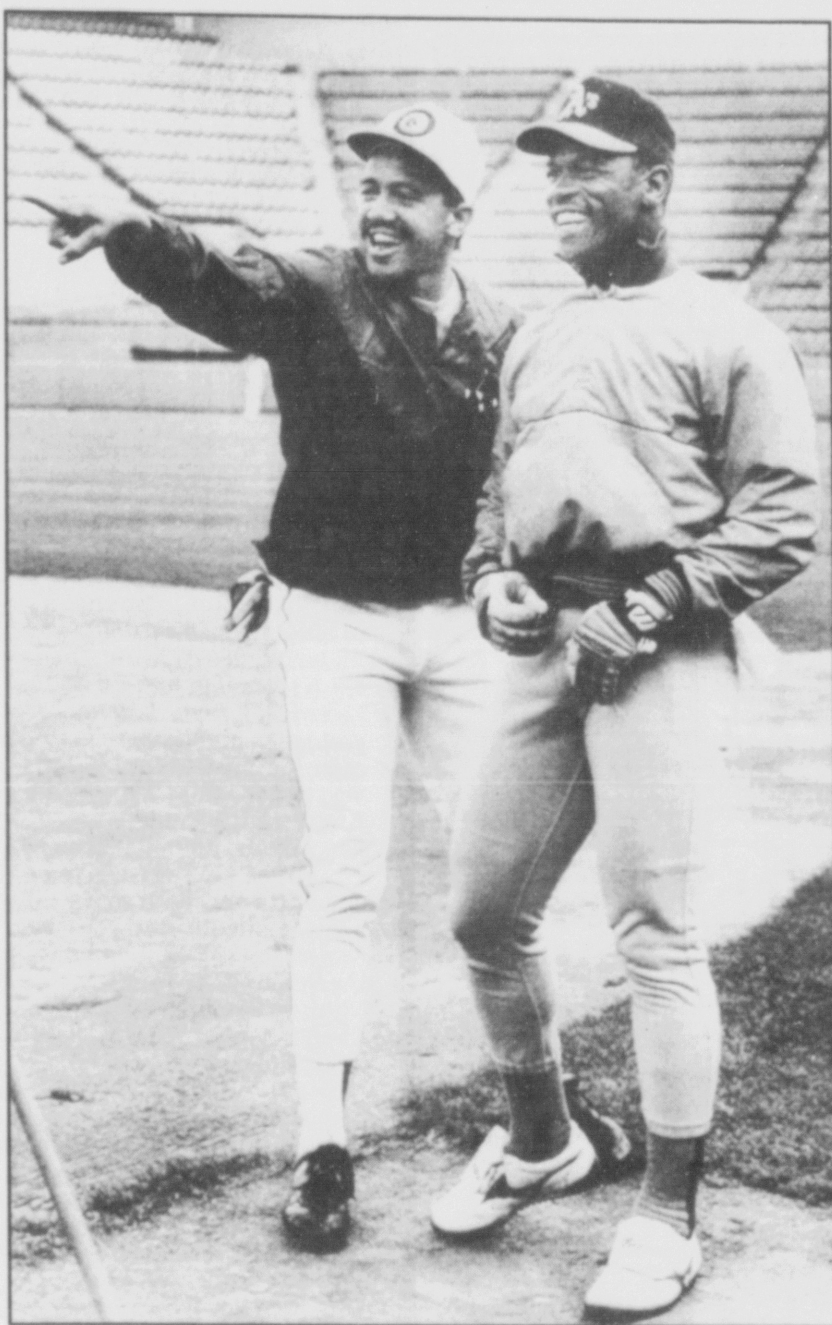
But Clemens has shut out Stewart in the race for recognition. He's won two Cy Young Awards and could make it three when the voting is announced next month; Stewart has none, and griped in 1987 after losing it to his nemesis.

"To me, Dave Stewart is the best pitcher in baseball and has been," A's pitching coach Dave Duncan said. "That's because I've seen every game he's pitched. I don't think it's fair for me to evaluate Roger Clemens, seeing him only three or four times."

"I do know one thing, though, I'd like to see how Dave Stewart would be perceived by the public if he pitched for Boston or the Yankees and was in a position to be appreciated the way Roger Clemens is."

Clemens did not comment about Stewart on Friday, sticking to his policy of not talking on the day before he starts. The rest of the Red Sox already know enough about the Oakland ace.

"We've had our chances against Stewart, especially early," Boston Manager Joe Mor-

gan said. "We've had men on base countless times and he keeps getting out of it."

Still, Stewart wins. He was 4-0 with a 1.65 earned run average this season against the Red Sox, and has beaten Boston seven straight times since Game 1 of the 1988 playoffs.

Stewart (22-11) was at his best when he faced Clemens, giving up only four runs on 18 hits in 22 2-3 innings in three starts against Boston's ace.

Clemens, meanwhile, seems to get a little too anxious when he goes against Stewart. In those same three games, Clemens gave up 11 runs, nine earned, on 16 hits and 14 walks in 18 1-3 innings. That is a 4.42 ERA; he was 21-3 with a 1.71 ERA in all other games.

And yet the games are always close. In their first matchup in 1986, before the competition became a duel, Stewart beat Clemens 1-0. This season's first meeting also was a 1-0 Stewart victory.

Clemens won his only other 1990 start against Oakland, beating Mike Moore. Clemens is 3-9 lifetime against the Athletics, the only team to hold a winning record against him.

"It seems we've been able to cause him some problems," Jose

Canseco said. "We try to make him throw a lot of pitches. One of the keys is not swinging at his high fastball."

In the past five years, not many batters have been able to lay off that pitch. Clemens is 100-42 during that span, while Stewart is 93-50.

How well Clemens will pitch this time is uncertain. After missing four weeks with tendinitis, he returned last Saturday and shut out Toronto for six innings.

"He may pitch nine," Morgan said. "He has had a lot of rest and should be sharp."

Stewart will be ready, as always.

"I'm aware that I've done well in some games against Roger, but I'm not pitching against him. I don't have to get him out, I just have to get their batters out."

No matter, it will again be interesting, like the old days.

"You don't see those great pitching match-ups you used to," A's general manager Sandy Alderson said, sitting in the Oakland dugout dressed in a sweatshirt, jeans and sneakers.

"You might have Gooden versus Hershiser these days and the quality is there, but the history isn't," he said. "This should be fun."

## Wyche slapped with big fine for barring woman reporter

NEW YORK (AP) — Cincinnati's Sam Wyche was given the largest fine ever for an NFL coach Friday when Commissioner Paul Tagliabue assessed him nearly \$30,000 for excluding a woman reporter from the Bengals' locker room.

The league refused to disclose the amount of the fine, describing it only as one-seventeenth of Wyche's annual pay. Wyche, who reportedly makes \$500,000 per year, was not suspended and will be on the sidelines for the Bengals' game against the Los Angeles Rams Sunday at Anaheim.

Wyche, who kept the Bengals on the west coast following a 31-16 loss at Seattle Monday night, held practice Friday at Renton High School and then talked with reporters outside the women's locker room at the school's stadium.

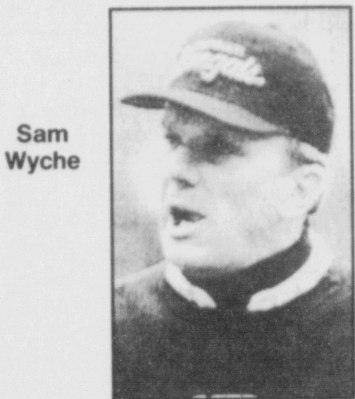
"I'll end up, I guess, paying the fine," he said. "No amount of fine will force me to change my conviction on this matter. We need to find a way for women to have a decent and open access to all these athletes."
