Hawks need luau today

It was the start of the 1988 college football season. Iowa, coming off a 10-3 season that concluded with a Holiday Bowl victory, had high hopes for another highly successful year.

That season began in Hawaii. That game against the Rainbows began a two-year tailspin. It was a spin that, while it was happening, seemed to many like it might last a lot longer.

Hawaii shocked the Hawkeyes, 27-24. Iowa went on to a 6-4-3 year. It was a winning record, and the Hawks got to a bowl game, but it was a bummer of a season. Starting 0-1 was a downer to the team and its followers. Three ties in one season was flat-out weird.

The subsequent Peach Bowl was a lesser bowl than Iowa campers had gotten used to, and that was a poorly-played defeat to an unheralded North Carolina State team.

Then things got worse.

Iowa went 5-6 in 1989. Oregon humiliated the Hawks right out of the chute, and in Kinnick Stadium, no less. The score was 44-6. It was eerily similar to the season-finale, also in Kinnick. Minnesota mashed Iowa, 43-7.

Undoubtedly, the problems that had led to a 5-6 season ran a lot deeper than that one loss in Honolulu. But had Iowa triumphed over the Rainbows, perhaps their fall from grace would have been cushioned a great deal.

ANCIENT HISTORY? Perhaps, but another opening date with Hawaii stirs memories.

Still, the 1990 season erased all the doubting Danny Thomases. Happy days were here again. A Rose Bowl team came from one picked to have a hard time attaining a winning season. The Hayden Fry's-a-genius philosophy again was popular.

So the expectations are once again high. Most forecasters peg Iowa for second or third in the Big Ten. Some local birds are really thinking big. They're actually talking about an unbeaten season and national title.

They use the schedule as a big reason for their optimism. A great schedule, they say. There isn't a game that can't be won. True, quite true.

The non-conference slate is called soft by many. Me thinks Hawaii and Iowa State would beg to differ. Iowa does get Michigan at home right after the Wolverines have tangled with Notre Dame and Florida State. The Hawks play Ohio State later in the season, when John Cooper's program could be in tatters if Buckeye naysayers are right.

It's tailor-made for a big Hawkeye season, no? Again, maybe.

THERE ARE A few things that everyone who follows college football should be certain of by now. Among them:

- You never know.
- Predictions very seldom come true.
- The difficulty of a schedule is often misleading.
- Stuff happens.

A loss at Hawaii to open 1988 seemed highly unlikely. A blow-out loss to Oregon to begin the 1989 season seemed even less possible. A sweep of games at Illinois, Michigan and Michigan State last year didn't even register on the believability scale last September.

Injuries occur. Dissension occurs. Unity occurs. Stars come out of nowhere. Expected stars occasionally fizzle. Opponents often don't roll over and play dead just because fans and media swamis say they will.

Talent is certainly prevalent among the Hawkeyes. It's prevalent among a lot of teams. Beyond talent, what wins in college football is good health, good camaraderie, shrewd play-calling moves here and there, and good luck. Iowa had those things last year. They don't often linger anywhere for too long.

With all that in mind, the pick here for the 1991 Hawkeyes is 7-4, though it wouldn't surprise me if they exceeded that by a far sight. Last year, Iowa was a snake in the weeds. This year, the Hawks will need to slay some vipers.

Nervous Fry puts out the call

IOWA CITY — Once in a while, Hayden Fry gets so nervous before a ballgame that he calls on University of Iowa football fans for special assistance.

Today's game with Hawaii at Kinnick Stadium is one of those times.

"We're going to need your help," Fry told 450 folks at the Johnson County I-Club breakfast Friday morning.

"I don't do this but about once or twice a year, to tell you to try to be as vocal as you can be in the stands and encourage the Hawks to come up with the big plays. Because I think it's going to be a game of big plays."

Iowa, ranked 15th, opens the 1991 season as a 16-point favorite, but the Hawkeyes were 18-point choices when they lost at Hawaii, 27-24, in 1988. "This game is a whole lot tougher than some of the so-called experts across the nation would lead you to believe," warned Fry.

Hawaii Coach Bob Wagner once said it was "crazy" for his club to play back-to-back road games on the U.S. mainland, but after last week's 32-17 victory at Wyoming his club is anxious to deliver another Hawaiian Punch.

"The worst we're going to do is go home 1-and-1, which I'd have settled for a week ago," he said. "But I'm not going to be happy with that now."

Today's game is not a sellout. A crowd of 69,000 is expected at Kinnick, which holds 70,322.

The Hawkeyes are 16-point favorites because they went to the Rose Bowl last year, because they've got the all-Big Ten quarterback in Matt Rodgers, because

they've got an excellent offensive line and because they're home.

"I would think they'll try to hammer it at us," said Wagner.

But Hawaii is far from helpless. The Bows are quick and scrappy, their option off the run-and-shoot is hard to defend and their defense stole a package of stunts and blitzes from the Chicago Bears.

The Rainbows won 25 games the last three years, but only in 1989 did they dent the national rankings and go to a bowl game.

"If they ever have an opportunity to elevate their program and jump into the Top 20 and so forth, beating Iowa on national TV would probably do it," said Fry.

He's worried about the Rainbows.

He's worried about slotback Jeff Sydnor, saying the Heisman Trophy candidate runs a 4.28 in the 40-yard dash. "If he gets the ball in the open field we're in real trouble," he said.

He's worried about soph quarterback Michael Carter, who ran for 214 yards and two touchdowns in his first start at Wyoming. "We thought this would be real simple: We'll play against a quarterback who doesn't have any experience."

It didn't quite work out that way.

He's worried about Jamal Farmer, who's run for 1,765 yards and 28 touchdowns during his career. "This guy runs over and steps on people and makes touchdowns," said Fry.

Lots of reasons to worry, he said. But Fry is not too worried about his own club, although he regrets the loss of six all-Big Ten performers.

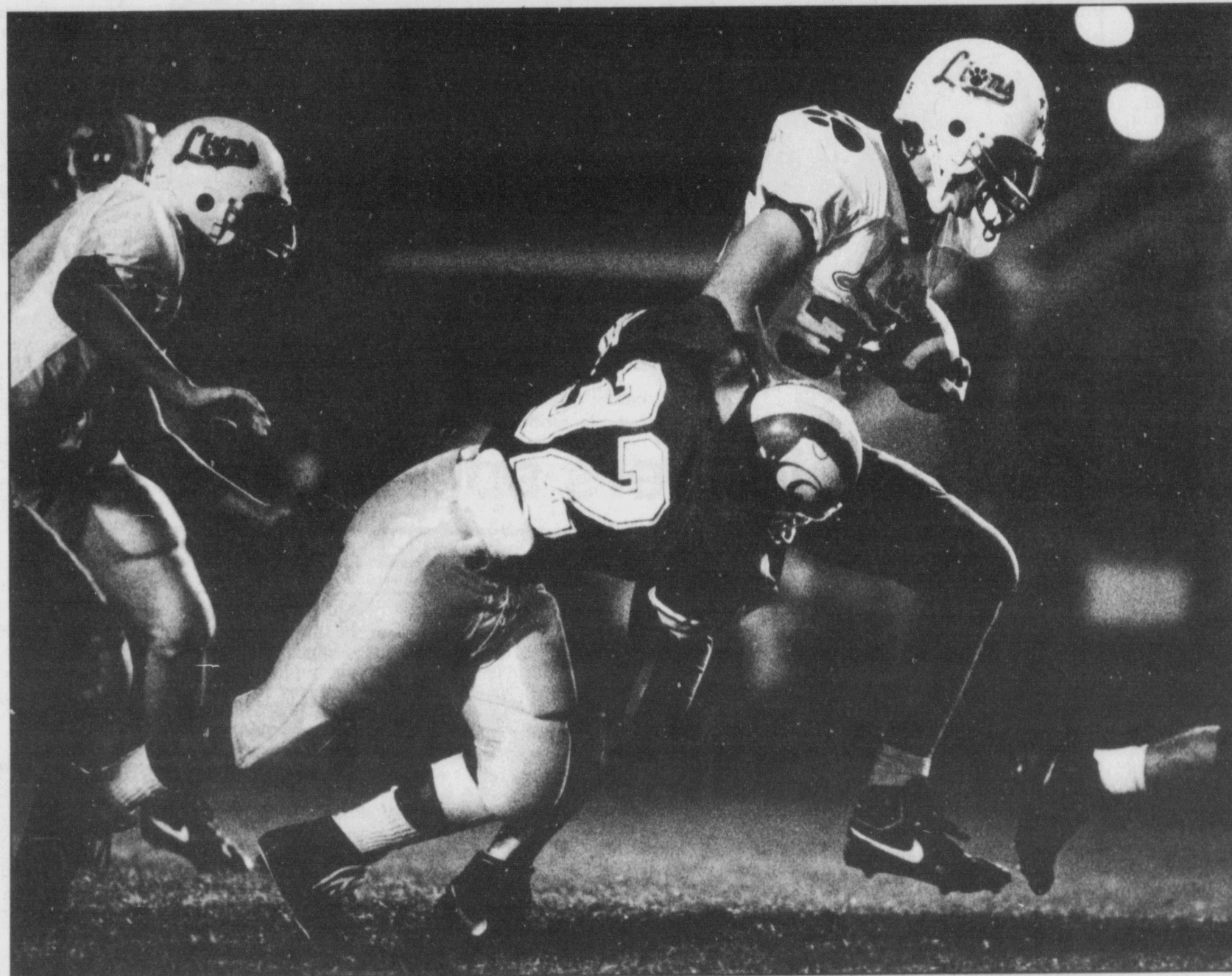
Nick Bell and Tony Stewart left a big hole at tailback when they left for the NFL, but Fry is confident Mike Saunders and Marvin "Scooter" Lampkin will do well. "They've got more moves than a Hawaiian belly dancer," he said.

They may need them.

Cougars hand Linn-Mar a loss

Kennedy Coach Don Knock knows his Cougars beat more than just a good football team when they whipped Linn-Mar, 28-14, Friday night.

"It's real tough to beat that tradition," Knock said moments after his ninth-ranked Cougars beat the 10th-ranked Lions in front of an estimated 5,500 fans at Kingston Stadium. "It's also real tough beating them when they're coming off a loss, because, hey — they're champions, you know."

The win was the second straight on the young season for Kennedy, which seems poised to make a run at the Mississippi Valley Conference title. The loss dropped two-time defending state champion Linn-Mar to 0-2.

"Kennedy played a fine football game tonight but our mistakes aided their effort," a very subdued Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell said.

It is certainly no understatement that this was huge win for the Cougars, whose only two losses during last year's 8-2 season were to Linn-Mar.

"This (win) ranks right up there with one of the best ones I've ever been around, as a coach or a player," Knock said. "I've been

through a few wars, and this is a war."

"That was a big one," senior receiver Chad Hartke said. "We've been looking forward to this one since eighth grade. We're trying to change the tradition."

Kennedy took advantage of several big plays to pull out the win. As an example, quarterback Chad Wiese completed only 2 of 6 passes, but one was a 47-yarder to Shawn Lang that led to a third-quarter touchdown and the other was a beautiful, 33-yard connection with Hartke that kept the Cougars' final scoring drive alive.

The Cougars jumped to a two-touchdown lead in the first quarter and never trailed. Their first score came on an 8-yard run by Willie Bruner with 5:41 left, culminating a five-play, 20-yard drive, set up by an 18-yard punt return by D.J. Doyle.

Doyle was also responsible for Kennedy's second score, returning a Linn-Mar punt 67 yards for a TD with just :58 left in the first quarter.

"I just ran down the sideline and I got great blocking in front of me," Doyle said of his touchdown trot.

A conversion kick failed after the first score, but Eric Martin hit Mike Morrison with a halfback pass for two points after the second one.

The Cougars added a third quarter touchdown when Wiese scored on a 1-yard plunge with 7:29 left following his 47-yard completion to Lang. They finished their scoring when Morrison went off-tackle for a 55-yard TD dash with just :37 left in the game.

Linn-Mar never really got its offense going Friday. Quarterback Ryan Driscoll struggled early — he completed only 4 of 15 passes for 35 yards in the first half — but used an explosive fourth quarter to finish 11 of 26 for 116 yards and one touchdown. He was intercepted twice.

Linn-Mar scored its only touchdown of the first half when Driscoll found Jason Pedersen from 8 yards out with 58 seconds left in the second quarter. The TD pass completed a 6-play, 47-yard drive set up by an Aaron VanMilligan interception.

The Lions final score came with 8:17 left in the game on a 1-yard run by Clint Nelsen. The 61-yard drive was Linn-Mar's finest hour, as Driscoll connected on six straight passes, including throws of 8, 27 and 7 yards to Matt Mitchell and 11 and 15 yards to Casey Mulherin.

Prairie pulls overtime stunner, tops J-Hawks

Field goal on 4th down gives Hawks victory over Jefferson

Cedar Rapids Jefferson collided with a big, black barrier Friday night before approximately 5,000 people at Cedar Rapids Prairie's John Wall Field.

Bret Jones' 27-yard field goal on fourth down in overtime lifted Prairie past Jefferson, 9-6, in the battle for west-side prep football bragging rights.

Both teams are 1-1 overall and in the Mississippi Valley Conference.

Jones' field goal came after three rushing

plays netted zero yards.

"I felt if we could stop them, we could win," said Prairie Coach Craig Jelinek, who chose to give the J-Hawks first crack with the ball in the overtime period.

That move paid off when Jeff's Scott Micek fumbled on second down at the 6 and Prairie's 5-foot-5 Josh Bell fell on it. It was Jefferson's fourth turnover.

"We did it to ourselves," said Jefferson first-year coach Jim Dostal. "Any team is going to get beat that makes that many mistakes."

Both teams turned the ball over four times. Prairie coughed it up twice inside the J-Hawk 10-yard line.

"I don't know if it was the humidity or just good hits," said Jelinek. "Jefferson has a heck of a good defense, and I have to give them all the credit in the world."

But it was a Prairie defense that limited Jefferson to 16 yards in the first half and 77 for the game that most impressed Jelinek.

"Our defense was embarrassed last week," said Jelinek, referring to the Hawks' 34-28 loss to Cedar Rapids Washington in which the Warriors scored two touchdowns in the closing minutes.

"We talked about pride all week and playing the type of defense Prairie is used to playing. I don't think I can remember a better defensive effort."

"Prairie was intense," said Dostal.

Jeff Hupfer's 46-yard touchdown dash early in the third quarter tied the game for Prairie, 6-6. Jones' PAT kick was blocked by the J-Hawks' Zac Allison. Hupfer's jaunt came on the first play after a Matt Hatcher intercept-

One known quantity apparently will not be available to the Cyclones. Speedy wide receiver Steve Lester isn't ticketed to play after the Supreme Court Thursday lifted a Polk County District Court injunction forcing Iowa State to admit Lester as a full-time student.

As a part-time student, Lester is ineligible to play football. Lester has been seeking admission as a full-time student since spending last year at a college in Chicago getting his grades in order. University officials have refused and Lester has been approved for just six hours of course work.

STILL, WALDEN is excited about his team's prospects.

The Cyclones return most key defensive players, but that's from a defense that gave up too many yards and points a year ago. Conversely, Iowa State's offense is virtually all-new although holdover quarterback Chris Pedersen led the Big 8 Conference in total offense last year and gives ISU reason for optimism.

"Personally, I feel much more comfortable," said Pedersen, who came into last season with virtually no game experience. "There are not as many questions for me. I'm anxious to be able to play."

"We've got a talented team, we just need to get a game under our belts and some plays on film so we'll know what we need to work on."

The Cyclones will have a re-
