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difficult. We are committed to having a very strong independent I-A football program, but

scheduling is just a lot tougher." In addition to Iowa, Florida, Kansas State and Fresno State, the Huskies have Arkansas State, Louisiana Tech, Western Michigan, Akron, Southwestern Louisiana, Illinois State and Toledo on their schedule this year.

"There's a motive to the madness there," laughed O'Dell. 'While it looks like a potpourri of opponents, there is a reason."

The reason is this: Northern Illinois wants a balanced schedule that's mixed with major independents, major conferences, medium-sized independents and smaller conferences. That way the Huskies can offer an attractive schedule to their fans but also make sure they win a few

The formula has worked fairly well. Northern Illinois finished 5-5-1, 7-4, 9-2 and 6-5 the last four years under Jerry Pettibone, who left after the 1990 season to become head coach at Oregon

(Bill Mallory, now at Indiana, coached at NIU from 1980-83, and Lee Corso, a commentator for ESPN, spent the 1984 campaign with the Huskies after spending a decade at Indiana.)

The Huskies' current head coach is Charlie Sadler, who was the defensive coordinator at Oklahoma. Sadler and O'Dell spent four years together at Iowa State from 1979-82 as assistant coaches under ex-Cyclone boss Donnie Duncan.

O'Dell thinks Sadler can lift Northern Illinois to new heights, but it will take time. Sadler has introduced new offensive and defensive schemes, and he inherited a young club. But the Huskies are not looking for quick fixes or temporary success. They want long-term happiness.

"In a society that revolves around fast-foot restaurants and overnight delivery, there's no overnight delivery when you're building a football program," said O'Dell.

He'd like to see NIU's Huskie Stadium expanded from 30,998 seats to 45,000 or 50,000, to accom-

modate more fans but also to position the school for the future. O'Dell said Northern Illinois is not actively seeking a conference affiliation, but he admits he's not sure if the Huskies can survive into the 21st century as an independent. He wants Northern Illinois ready should a major conference come calling.

O'Dell said not everyone in DeKalb applauded the school's decision to quit the MAC six years ago, but he's sure it was the right move to make at the time.

"I think there's some trepidation today, because people like to have that family feeling that a conference brings," he said. "But the decision to leave the MAC was to allow the opportunity to literally spread our wings to grow and become more than just regional team, and I think we've done that.

"There are going to be the skeptics who are going to come forth and say, 'Well, we told you so.' But I look back at what's happened over the last four years: We've done extremely

contract and then had him play in a tournament featuring rookies and free agents of the Pistons, Indiana Pacers, New Jersey Nets and Washington Bullets. Following that, Marble was asked to report to the Pistons' veteran camp that opens Oct. 4 at Saginaw Valley State in Saginaw.

"He told me 'do what you do best and be ready come October 4th," Marble said of his last conversation with McCloskey. But doing what he does best

has not always been the easiest task for Marble 'When I try to live up to other

people's expectations, I always seem to fall short," he said. Like his first year in Atlanta, when Marble found himself sitting at the end of the bench for

the first time since he picked up

a basketball as a kid. "I found I was trying to fit in and nothing seemed to work. Some days things would click but then I'd wake up the next day and not remember what I did that was so right the day before.'

After averaging 2.1 points in 24 games, Marble's season came to a halt that February when he tested positive for cocaine and was suspended by the NBA. He completed a treatment program at the NBA's Van Nuys, Calif., rehabilitation center and was

cleared to play again last season. But talent alone won't always

keep a player in the NBA. Being in the right place at the right time is also important.

Atlanta traded Marble to the Houston Rockets, where he made it to the final cut before being cut the eve of the season opener.

"I just got caught up in the numbers," he said. "They went with what worked best for them. I was being paid a considerable amount, and they went with some guys who weren't going to cost them as much.

So it was back to Grand Blanc, Mich., where Marble makes his home.

Meanwhile, the Silver Bullets made a deal with the Yakima Sun Kings for Marble's CBA rights.

After giving strong consideration to playing in Europe, Marble relented and signed with the Silver Bullets Dec. 3. He averaged 20.6 points and 6.1 rebounds in 42 games.

The CBA really humbled me. There were good times, and I had some good games. But the season was over just when I was getting into my own game. The CBA was good in two ways

for Marble.

"I gained a lot of confidence, and I think that was something I had lost the last couple of years. And it also told me where I didn't want to be.
