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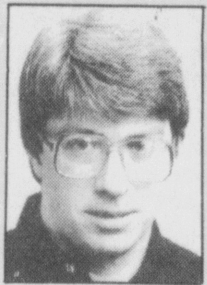

## A scrimmage in September

When Northern Illinois' football team was about to play Iowa in 1986, one marvelously insightful sportswriter termed the game "The Foregone Conclusion."

Iowa proceeded to mosh the Huskies, 57-3. Today the same two teams cross paths in Kinnick Stadium. Northern Illinois would have to better than it was in 1986 when it went 2-9. The Huskies have already won once this year, a 22-21 decision over the goliaths of Arkansas State.

Thus, there shall be no "Foregone Conclusion" label for today's encounter. That would be demeaning to a program that is learning to walk under new head coach Charlie Sadler.

Instead, today's game is "The Obvious Outcome."

Is there any point in trying to make a flamingo out of a turkey? Any team that loses 34-17 to Kansas State, no matter how improved K-State is alleged to be, shouldn't compete with the ninth-ranked team in the land.

Any team that needs a late field goal to ward off the behemoths from Arkansas State shouldn't challenge the ninth-ranked team in the land. Any team that opens its season with a 55-7 loss to Fresno State shouldn't pose a threat to the ninth-ranked team in the land.

Unless, of course, one of two things happen: The game is played in a nasty wind/rain combination or Iowa performs horribly.

The Huskies might do some wondrous things in the Sadler Era, but not quite yet. They are allowing 462 yards a game while gaining 288. They average 72 passing yards.

If this game is anything more than a glorified scrimmage for the Hawkeyes, they don't deserve their No. 9 ranking.

IOWA STATE, meanwhile, seems to have its act together in time for its game at Rice this afternoon. The Cyclones have moved tailback Lamont Hill to wide receiver. They shifted backup quarterback Kevin Caldwell to running back. They moved defensive back Lester Ridley to running back. They've taken offensive tackle Lance Keller off the starting unit because Keller somehow found a way to gain 30 pounds since the end of August.

Best of all, Jim Walden inserted Bob Utter, who was going to be red-shirted and didn't appear in ISU's first three games, as the starting quarterback.

ISU President Martin Jischke will return punts against Oklahoma next Saturday, if the Sooners ever punt.

Had someone told you last year that Rice would ever be a 6½-point favorite over the Cyclones, you would have had legal grounds to put that person in a home for wayward boys and girls.

Sure, Rice is 2-0, but the wins were against non-entities Tulane and Northwestern. Tulane amassed 435 yards against the Owls last week. If Tulane can, so can Iowa State. Right?

The Cyclone offense will be fine once the quarterback introduces himself to the running backs, the wide receivers meet the quarterback, and the offensive linemen learn to stop snacking between meals.

THERE IS ONE little game of importance out there that doesn't involve the Cyclones or Hawkeyes. Top-ranked Florida State is visiting No. 3 Michigan in the first official Game of the Year. This battle is of great concern to Iowa fans. Should the Wolverines win, they likely will be catapulted to No. 1. Next Saturday's Michigan-Iowa affair would then be subject to a mountain of hype and hysteria.

Florida State has a returning All-America cornerback, a potential All-America quarterback, two All-America candidates at linebacker, and other he-men. Michigan has at least four All-America types of its own.

Do you know what it will mean if Michigan wins?

Well, do you? It means a wave of hype and hysteria will roll this way. It's up to Florida State to stem it.

IOWA CITY — Here's a safe bet: Ninth-ranked Iowa will spank Northern Illinois this afternoon and climb even higher in the polls.

And it could get ugly. Danny Sheridan, the oddsmaker for USA Today, favors the Hawkeyes by 40 points.

A sellout crowd of more than 70,000 will gather at Kinnick Stadium for the 1:05 p.m. kickoff, with most looking for a slaughter.

But how good are the Hawks? Are they really the ninth-best team in the nation?

Better than Penn State, Syracuse, Auburn, Florida and Ohio State?

"It seems crazy," said Iowa quarterback Matt Rodgers. "We haven't really done that much this year yet. We haven't played any of the high-powered teams yet and still we're up there."

Here's a quick recap of what's happened so far: The Hawks have jumped from 18th to 15th to 14th to 10th to ninth in the AP poll by beating Hawaii and

Iowa State.

The Rainbows and Cyclones are not exactly Murderer's Row, by the way, and the Hawks haven't been pushed.

"That's exactly what I told my football team," said Iowa Coach Hayden Fry, not sure himself if he's got a national power on his hands.

But wait till next week, when Iowa hosts third-ranked Michigan. The big, bad Wolves could be No. 1 if they whip the top-ranked Florida State Seminoles today.

That's the game Hawkeye fans crave: Iowa vs. Michigan.

Iowa vs. Northern Illinois is just an hors d'oeuvre, maybe even a gimme, but

don't use that word around Fry.

"Anytime in our life that we think we've got a gimme, any time in our life we think we're going to get something without having to earn it or work for it, that's when bad things happen," he said Friday.

Even against Northern Illinois?

"I tell you," said Fry. "I'm worried. I'm very concerned."

Maybe he doesn't know the Huskies are 1-7 against Top 25 teams since 1968.

Maybe he doesn't know they're 1-14-1 against Big Ten clubs since 1971.

Maybe he doesn't know Northern Illinois ranks 105th in passing out of 106 Division I-A teams.

Maybe he forgot the Huskies got drilled by Fresno State, 55-7, three weeks ago, or that Bill Snyder's Kansas State club rolled up nearly 500 yards against them last Saturday.

Northern Illinois Coach Charlie Sadler knows. He said he's realistic about today's assignment.

His team has a chance to win, he said,

The Huskies need a big game from Adam Dach, who's rushed for 2,862 yards during his career; from Stacey McKinney, an option quarterback who passed for 178 yards last week; from Larry Wynn, who caught five passes for 109 yards against K-State; from their tailbacks, who are battered and bruised; and from Steve Henricksen, who makes 20 tackles a game.

If all those things happen — and if the Hawkeyes are thinking too much about Michigan — it could be exciting.

"Stranger things have happened," said Sadler.

But it would be strange indeed, because the Hawkeyes are a top-10 team, right?

"As far as I'm concerned, we're going to be one of the best teams in the nation," said Iowa cornerback Scott Plate.

"I think the potential is there," agreed Jason Olejniczak, who also roams the defensive backfield for the Hawks.

## Doyle's picks lift Kennedy

Just when it looked like Class 4A third-ranked Cedar Rapids Kennedy might shoot itself in the foot, D.J. Doyle gave the Cougars a shot in the arm.

Doyle, a speedy 5-10, 150-pound defensive back, returned fourth quarter pass interceptions 16 and 40 yards for touchdowns to lead Kennedy past pesky Cedar Rapids Washington, 26-14, in Mississippi Valley Conference football Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

The Cougars improved to 5-0 and remain alone on top of the MVC standings. Washington fell to 3-2 with its second straight loss.

"(D.J. Doyle) is a heck of a good kid and he did a great job tonight," Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "He won the ballgame for us, that's all there is to it."

The game was tied at 14 a third of the way through the final period when Doyle staged his heroics. Washington was working from a second-and-9 on its own 16 when Doyle picked off a Bo Clancey screen pass at the line of scrimmage and sprinted into the end zone untouched with 8:07 left in the game.

Kennedy kicked off to the Warriors who then moved to their own 32 before Doyle stepped front and center again. This time he snagged a Clancey pass on the Warrior 40 yard line and ran down the left sideline for the TD.

"I just set out there in the flat waiting for that screen all night and when he finally threw it, I just reached up and grabbed it and ran as fast as I could," Doyle said.

Kennedy dominated the game statistically. The Cougars' rushed for 179 yards, led by league-leading Mike Morrison with 98 on 20 carries. Quarter-

back Chad Wiese completed 8 of 17 passes for 99 yards, including completions of 17, 12 and 11 yards to Doyle.

In the first half alone, the Cougars ran 37 offensive plays to the Warriors 13, and out-gained

## Walden, Cyclones hope Utter is needed spark against Rice

HOUSTON — What Iowa State's football team probably needs more than anything else is a big win, a real confidence booster.

Today when the Cyclones face Rice, they'll turn to one guy who doesn't lack in confidence to lead them out of the doldrums. Bobby Utter has replaced Chris Pedersen at quarterback for the 3:45 p.m. game.

"The biggest thing that sticks out about Bobby Utter is he is a confident guy," Iowa State Coach Jim Walden said. "He believes so strongly in himself and I think that carries over to the team."

"Maybe that's what we need right now is somebody to make sure all our players don't lose their confidence. We're not a bad team and we're going to prove it before this thing is over."

A win today would go a long way toward helping the Cyclones (1-2) get back on track. They've lost two straight and have been miserable on offense.

Rice, on the other hand, is rid-

ing high with a 2-0 mark and the nation's leading rusher in Trevor Cobb. The Owls are favored by 6½ points.

Utter was put on the spot a year ago when Pedersen was hurt. He passed for 235 yards and two touchdowns in a 45-35 loss to Iowa and for 246 yards in a 34-20 win over Western Michigan.

"I have more confidence in myself and what I can do," Utter said this week, "not that I hurt in confidence before."

Iowa State has just one touchdown and three field goals in its last two games. In a 7-6 loss at Wisconsin last week, the offense "never made a play, not one," Walden said.

The perfect scenario for Iowa State would be to, at last, sustain some drives and keep the ball out of the hands of Cobb and his buddies, who are averaging 32 points a game.

Cobb averages 204.5 yards a game and has six touchdowns.

Rice has other weapons like speedy Eric Henley, who has eight catches, and Louis Balady and Kolis Crier, who average

better than 18 yards a catch.

Rice quarterback Greg Willig has kept the heat off Cobb, completing 24 of 39 passes for 319 yards. He has not been intercepted.

It's a lineup that will challenge Iowa State's defense, although defense hasn't been the Cyclones' problem.

Iowa State is third in the Big 8 Conference in total defense, giving up 303.7 yards an outing.

Tackle Matt Rehberg has been outstanding. The linebacker play has been solid and Mark DoujjBrava leads a talented young secondary.

It's the offense that has been a mystery.

Utter at quarterback isn't the only change for Iowa State, which has some injury problems on that side of the ball.

Kevin Caldwell has moved from reserve quarterback to starting running back for this game. Preseason starter Sherman Williams didn't make the trip as he continues to nurse an injured ankle. Freshman Leon-

## Twins can't get it done vs. Toronto

TORONTO (AP) — Pinch-runner Mookie Wilson streaked home with the go-ahead run on a sacrifice fly in the seventh inning, then hit a three-run double in the eighth as the Toronto Blue Jays beat the Minnesota Twins, 7-2, Friday night in a meeting of division leaders.

The Blue Jays heralded the return of manager Cito Gaston, who had missed 33 games with back problems, with their third straight victory. They began the day 2½ games ahead of Boston, which faced Milwaukee.

The Twins' magic number for clinching the AL West stayed at five. Second-place Chicago, which played Seattle, started the day eight games behind.

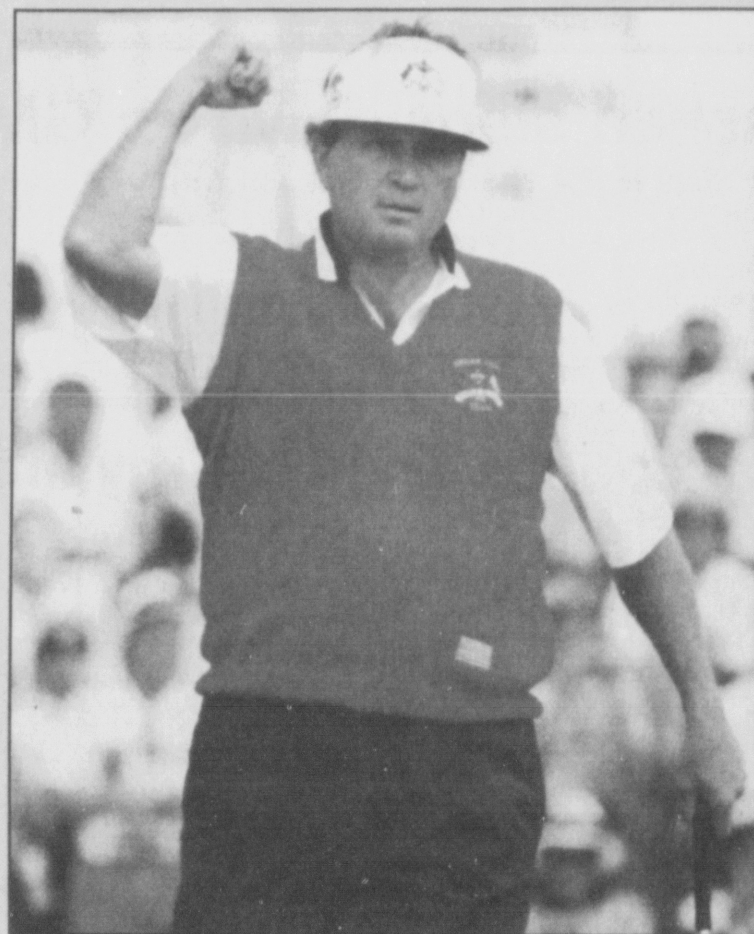
Juan Guzman (9-2) allowed three hits in eight innings and tied Dave Stieb's 1988 club record by winning his ninth consecutive decision. The streak ties Minnesota's Kevin Tapani for the league's second-longest this season.

Guzman, who hasn't lost since dropping his first two starts in June, walked three and struck out nine before Duane Ward relieved in the ninth.

For the second time this season, he outdueled Tapani (16-9), who gave up six hits and three runs in seven innings. Guzman also bested Tapani 1-0 on June 27 for his first victory. Tapani had won 14 of his previous 16 decisions.

After Paul Sorrento's homer off Guzman made it 2-2 in the top of the inning, Dave Parker led off Toronto's seventh with his second double of the game.

# Prairie near perfect vs. Hempstead

In the weekly rumble known as Mississippi Valley Conference football, some nights are diamonds.

Cedar Rapids Prairie sparkled under a full harvest moon Friday night at John Wall Field, combining a swarming defense and a 40-yard interception return by Brian Padgett to down Dubuque Hempstead, 14-7.

It was a near-flawless Prairie performance — no turnovers and key plays by a host of Hawks. Prairie improved to 2-3 while Hempstead slumped to 1-4.

It was Prairie's second consecutive win over Hempstead, squaring the series which began in 1988 at 2-2.

"It seemed whenever Prairie needed to have it they got it," said Hempstead Coach Roger Baylor, whose Mustangs dropped their fourth consecutive game. "We made a lot of mistakes tonight, but it was a team effort. Not just one thing."

"In this league you're never going to get a breather," said Prairie Coach Craig Jelinek, "whether you're 2-3 or whether you're 5-0.

The big difference here was when the defense had to go in and do the job it did we didn't hurt ourselves. If we had been doing that the whole season, who knows?"

The final tallies were almost even, with Prairie totaling 198 yards to Hempstead's 197. The difference? Execution.

"We played about as good from start to finish as you'd want," Jelinek said.

The league rivals are trademark defensive and ground-oriented units, testified by a rugged scoreless first half. Yet Prairie junior quarterback Troy Smith left his mark, despite suffering a knee injury just before halftime. He played the entire game, completing 9 of 15 passes for 77 yards. Teammate Bret Jones snared four passes for 57 yards, most of his receptions in traffic. Jones also threw a pass which was dropped by wide-open Kevin Subbert just before halftime.

"It was a courageous game by him," said Jelinek of Smith. "We didn't know if he was going to come back the second half and drive the team down."

Prairie took control by scoring twice in the final 1:27 of the third quarter. Smith

guided a memorable 15-play, 89-yard drive on the Hawks' first possession of the third quarter. Jeff Hupfer capped the march with a 3-yard run, and Jones booted the PAT.

Hawk senior linebacker Padgett then took over from there, picking off a pass by Mustang quarterback Jeff Stierman and racing to the end zone with 15 seconds left in the quarter.

"I just saw it, picked it up and kept running," said Padgett, who pocketed his second interception of the season and sixth in his career. "It's the first time I scored . . . ever. It felt great."

Hempstead answered on its next possession, with Stierman leading a seven-play scoring drive. Brent Siegert shook loose on a 35-yard counter run to the Prairie 1-yard line. Clyde Kay, the MVC rushing leader, dived the final yard with 9:36 to play.

Kay finished the night with 75 yards — 27 below his average — on 19 carries. Prairie's backfield tandem of Hupfer and Matt Hatcher grinded out a combined 131. Hupfer led his team with 75 yards on 17 carries.

## Driscoll hot as Lions win 3rd straight game

DUBUQUE — Senior quarterback Ryan Driscoll passed for 198 yards and three touchdowns Friday night as Linn-Mar won its third straight game with a 29-0 Mississippi Valley Conference football victory over Dubuque Senior.

Matt Mitchell, who caught one of Driscoll's TD tosses, had six receptions for 117 yards. The Lions are 3-2, Senior 1-4.

Linn-Mar rolled up 403 yards in total offense, but the defense was equally impressive. Senior had 83 total yards and five first downs.

Driscoll passed nine yards to Jason Feddersen for a first-quarter score and five yard to Casey Mulherin for a second-quarter touchdown. Driscoll passed to Feddersen for two-point conversions both times.

The Lions locked it up with two fourth-period scores, a 1-

yard run by Clint Nelson and a 26-yard pass from Driscoll to Mitchell.

Nelson had 88 yards rushing on 18 carries, Mulherin 79 on 16.

**Olin-O.J. 12, Lisbon 9**

■ LISBON — Matt Walshire found twin brother Tom in the end zone with 10:45 left in the game as Olin-Oxford Junction upset Class A third-rated Lisbon in the Mid-East Conference.

Matt, who completed 12 of 25 passes for 126 yards, hit Matt with the game-winner from four yards out. Lisbon had taken a 9-6 lead in the third quarter on Paul Henning's 24-yard field goal.

The game was tied, 6-6, at halftime thanks to a 4-yard run by Olin-O.J.'s Darrin Moore and a 16-yard run by Lisbon's Zach Light, who was playing his first game after missing the first four games for academic reasons.

The touchdown by Moore was the first scored against Lisbon this year. The Lions had outscored their first four foes, 116-0.

Both teams are 4-1 overall. Olin-O.J. is 3-0 in the Mid-East, Lisbon 2-1.

■ Senior quarterback s Andy Gahan passed for three touchdowns — on five completions in six attempts — and ran a yard for another as Iowa City Regina celebrated its homecoming with its first football victory since 1988, 34-15 over Durant.

Gahan's TD passes were for 31 yards to Justin Rios, 8 to Scott Brchoticky and 19 to Steve Dostal.

The Regals (1-3) won twice in 1988. Durant is 0-4.

■ Jason Ferrington rushed for 128 yards and one touchdown on 16 carries and Central City-Spi-

ngville downed North Linn, 21-0, in the Tri-Rivers.

George Robinson, who totaled 52 rushing yards, also scored for the Cat-Birds (2-2, 3-2), as did Jeremy Unker, who caught a 30-yard pass from quarterback Eric Rauch.

■ Jason Neighbor passed 26 yards to Greg Feldmann for one touchdown and ran 2 yards for another as Alburnett (3-2) bagged a 34-6 Tri-Rivers Conference win at Ed-Co (1-4).

■ Center Point-Urbana improved to 5-0 with a 38-12 thrashing of Clear Creek-Amana in a game at Center Point.

Tom Kree scored on one- and four-yard runs for Center Point-Urbana. Troy Bryant scored both touchdowns for Clear Creek-Amana, racing 67 yards with an interception and plunging one yard. Clear Creek-Amana is 2-3.

## U.S. lead is slim after 1st day's play

KIAWAH ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — Britain's best played so poorly they'll be broken up, but the Spanish juggernaut continued to roll and kept Europe close in defense of the Ryder Cup.

The former, Nick Faldo of England and Masters champion Ian Woosnam of Wales, lost twice and were largely responsible for the Americans' unaccustomed and strangely unsatisfactory early lead.

The latter, Seve Ballesteros and Jose Maria Olazabal, scored a pair of 2 and 1 victories in opening matches Friday.

"I don't think either team was real satisfied with what happened today," American captain Dave Stockton said after his team had salvaged a 4½-3½ advantage.

That is, of course, the smallest possible margin, but it is a lead. And it's the first time in four years that the Americans have come out of opening day play in anything other than a catch-up position.

It's far, far better, for example, than the 5-3 and 6-2 deficits faced by the Americans in the last two Ryder Cups, in 1987 and '89.

But it was unsatisfactory in that the lead could have been — and perhaps should have been — larger in the old biennial competition that has grown to enormous stature and prestige in recent years.

Ballesteros and Olazabal, for example, were 3-down at the turn in the morning foursomes, in which each two-man team plays alternate shots on the same ball.

After a brief confrontation about the rules, they won three of the next four holes and went on to the victory that prevented an American sweep of the morning matches.

In the afternoon fourball play,

with scoring based on the better ball of each two-man team, David Feherty of Northern Ireland dropped an 18th-hole, 10-foot, par-saving putt that capped a comeback from a 3-down deficit at the turn and salvaged a half against weary Lanny Wadkins and Mark O'Meara.

"I think Lanny and Mark could have come out of that a half-point better," said Stockton, whose team is attempting to break a six-year European hold on the trophy that first went up for play in 1927.

Another possible half-point was lost in the match that closed the 10½ hours of windblown play in the sand dunes and marshes of the new Ocean course on this resort island.

Again, it was Ballesteros and Olazabal doing the damage.

European captain Bernard Gallacher was less than happy with the performance of Woosnam and Faldo, a pairing that had won six of a possible eight points in team play in 1987 and '89.

They lost twice this windy day, a 5 and 3 drubbing by Ray Floyd and Fred Couples in the afternoon fourballs and 1-up to Mark Calcavecchia and Payne Stewart in the morning foursomes, and played so poorly Gallacher will break them up for the first time since 1987.

Ray Floyd, at 49 the oldest man ever to play in these matches and the only former captain to return as a competitor, and Fred Couples were the most productive of the American pairs.

Faldo and Woosnam were their second victims of the day. They beat Bernhard Langer of Germany and Mark James 2 and 1 in morning foursomes.

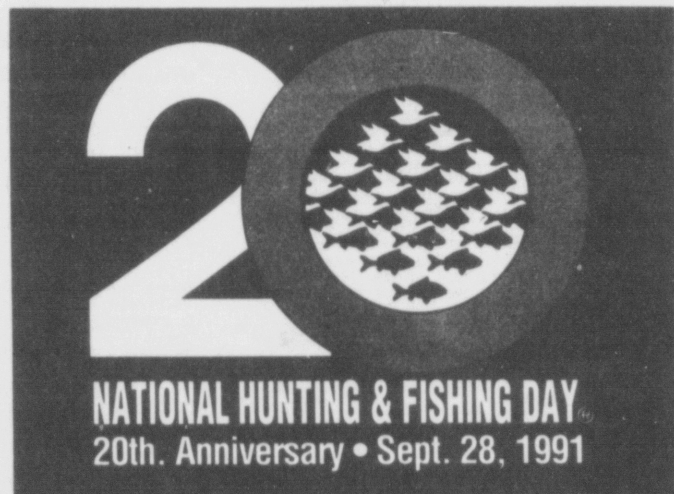
## More claimed in collusion settlement than available

NEW YORK (AP) — A total of 843 players filed more than \$1.3 billion in claims for the \$280 million collusion settlement, the Major League Baseball Players Association said Friday.

The claims, which were submitted last spring, will be evaluated by the union staff and by outside lawyers. Lauren Rich, a lawyer who has headed the union's collusion litigation, said she believed the evaluation process would take about a year.

The \$280 million settlement covers the damages for the clubs' conspiracy against free agents during 1986, 1987 and 1988. A total of 3,173 claims were

**Fact:** Hunters provide about \$16 million each year through the purchases of duck stamps which are required for the hunting of waterfowl. Purchases of duck stamps have provided over \$350 million for waterfowl conservation in the last 40 years.

**Fact:** Additionally, hunters and fishermen spend an estimated \$270 million a year to improve fish and wildlife habitat on private lands.
