Praise the Hawkeyes and pass the sweet rolls.

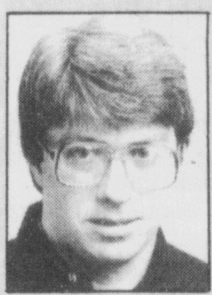
You are at a Johnson County I-Club breakfast at the Westfield Inn. They are held the day before each Iowa home football game. They were held years before Hayden Fry became the Hawkeyes' football coach. The band, cheerleaders, et al, are constants. Local Hawk fans gather to get fired up.

Fry speaks at each of these breakfasts. Without him, there would be no crowd. He is the focal point, the celebrity, the authority. He is the legend.

FEW WERE THE I-Club regulars who woke up at 5 Friday morning to the rain and even

some lightning, and decided to sleep in. This was the day before The Game. Michigan-Iowa. Any words Fry had to offer would be thought about and retold all day at work.

The food was put out at 6. Athletic Director Bob Bowlsby pressed a lot of flesh. Many other athletic department members were present. Wrestling coach Dan Gable, making a rare appearance at this function, arrived well before the 7 a.m. program.

The people kept streaming in from the rain.

"This is the biggest crowd of any in my 10 years here," Iowa athletic fund-raiser Mark Jennings said.

An I-Club veteran said the record attendance of 720 was set in 1977, the day before Iowa State and Iowa met in football for the first time in 43 years. Estimates of Friday's crowd varied, but at

least 500 people were present, and perhaps several dozen more.

Fry arrived at the Westfield a few minutes before 7. He and his wife, Shirley, strode to the dais from the back of the room to the accompaniment of a standing ovation.

Rev. Nancy English concluded a pre-program prayer by saying, "Lord, if you can't help us (the Hawkeyes), don't help them (Michigan)."

It was a lighthearted remark, and was received that way by the appreciative crowd.

Gable, who introduced Fry, was given his own standing ovation before he spoke.

"When I first came to Iowa," Gable said, "this would have been a huge crowd for a wrestling meet."

THEN CAME FRY. And another standing ovation. His speech would have been a good primer for those seeing him for the first time. It was partly humorous, partly fire and brimstone, and partly a level-headed assessment of today's game.

"Isn't it really kind of ridiculous to be up this early?" Fry asked in jest, and his followers replied with hearty laughter. "What's this all about? Well, this

### Rodgers: 'There's no holding back'

IOWA CITY — Don't be alarmed if you hear the Iowa Hawkeyes chanting a silly song just prior to today's kickoff against Michigan.

It's a special song, just for the Wolverines, and it's been a tradition with the Hawkeyes for the last 10 years.

It goes something like this:

"We're not afraid of the big, bad Wolves

We're not afraid of the big, bad Wolves

The big, bad Wolves are coming to our house

They're coming to Kinnick."

Wait, it gets better.

"That's just the preamble," said Iowa Coach Hayden Fry, drawing big laughs at the Johnson County I-Club breakfast Friday morning.

He then finished the verse:

"Who's afraid of the big, bad Wolves?

It damn sure ain't Iowa."

Fry attributed the chant to Mel Cole, an all-Big Ten line-backer for the Hawks in 1981.

It's silly, sure, but who's to argue with the results? Iowa has a 4-5-1 record against Michigan the last 10 years in what has become a classic series.

The game often comes down to the final seconds. The winner of

ten goes to the Rose Bowl.

"We've been waiting for this game for a whole year," said Hawkeye quarterback Matt Rodgers. "There's no holding back against a team like Michigan."

The Wolverines have been waiting too.

The Hawks won last year, 24-23, with an 85-yard touchdown drive in the final minutes.

They won in 1985, 12-10, on a Rob Houghtlin field goal on the final play of the game.

They won in 1981, when Tom Nichol kicked three field goals in a 9-7 victory to get this rivalry ignited.

They even won in a blowout in 1984, 26-3, but that's unusual in this series.

"I think it will be a real knock-down, drag-out," said Fry, "and if it comes down to the last play that's OK with me."

He'd love to see his team hang in that long with a "great Michigan team," he said.

"They're embarrassed from last week," said Fry. "They're going to play with extra vigor and enthusiasm."

Michigan Coach Gary Moeller hopes his club will rebound from a stinging, 51-31 loss to Florida State, but he's not sure the Wolverines can handle a rigorous slate of Notre Dame, Florida State and the Hawkeyes back-to-back.

"Hopefully those battles will help us," said Moeller, "but it also takes something out of you and makes it a little tougher to get up week in and week out. It's going to be hard."

A tricky opponent makes it harder.

"Hayden Fry likes to use trick plays just to keep teams off-balance, just like Florida State," said Moeller. "One year he'll try to run the ball down your throat, the next year he'll come out and throw screen passes to set a different tempo. You have to be ready for everything."

Judging from the weather forecast, the Wolverines should bring their raincoats and mittens and get ready for Iowa's rainy-day offense, whatever that may be. The weather in three words is supposed to be wet.

## 2nd-half rally keys Kennedy at City High

IOWA CITY — It's been said football is a game of inches, but Friday night's contest between Iowa City High and Cedar Rapids Kennedy was ultimately decided by a foot.

That foot belonged to City High's Tim Dwight, the standout sophomore who, with 29 seconds left in the game, caught a potential game-tying touchdown just a few inches out of bounds to enable Kennedy to prevail in the Mississippi Valley Conference contest, 14-7, on a cold, rainy evening at Frank Bates Field.

"I just have to give a lot of credit to my football team for this win," Kennedy Coach Don Knock

said. "It seems like when you're undefeated and state-ranked that teams come shooting for you. Give City High credit. They are a good football team."

Good enough, in fact, to have the third-rated Cougars down 7-0 at halftime, thanks in a large part to a gutsy performance from Dwight, who didn't play in a loss to Jefferson last week after being injured against Washington the week before.

He scored on a 12-yard run late in the second quarter to help the Little Hawks start thinking upset.

However, Kennedy got a wake-up call in the second half.

The Cougars took the third quarter kickoff and marched 84 yards in seven plays for their first score, a 1-yard plunge by quarterback Chad Wiese. The extra-point attempt hit the left upright, allowing City High to maintain a 7-6 lead.

Wiese teamed up with Mike Morrison on a 23-yard touchdown pass with 6 minutes left in the game to put the Cougars up for good.

"I have to give all the credit in the world to my offensive line," Wiese said. "City High has the best defense in the Valley, but the offensive line came through for us."

The defense also came through for Kennedy, especially in the second half. After allowing 141 yards in the first half, the Cougar defense gave up 14 rushing yards in the second stanza and did not allow a City High first down until the final three minutes.

"My defensive coaches, Mike Trotsky, Harold Robert, and Dave Ernst, did an outstanding job," Knock said. "They made the necessary adjustments that we had to win this game."

Kennedy improves to 6-0, while City High falls to 3-3.

## Walden: Cyclones need to run ball

Can Iowa State continue its magic against mighty Oklahoma?

Two years ago, Iowa State piled up first down after first down and came up just short in a 43-40 loss. The Cyclones gained 609 yards that day, the most a team has ever posted against the defense-proud Sooners.

And last year, ISU quarterback Chris Pedersen ran for 148 yards when the Cyclones upset Oklahoma, 33-31, in Norman.

"What happens in the past we can't undo," Oklahoma Coach Gary Gibbs said. "We're not going to sit here and rehash the '89 or '90 games. Players have memories. They know the score. They know how the game was played."

For Iowa State, the common denominator in those two games was rushing offense. Two years ago, Blaise Bryant helped keep the Sooners honest with 151 yards. Last year, Pedersen couldn't be stopped.

Iowa State Coach Jim Walden says the Cyclones must again have success in the rushing game if they hope to upset the fifth-ranked Sooners in today's Big 8 Conference opener in Ames.

The oddsmakers don't think Iowa State can get the job done. Oklahoma is an 18½-point favorite in the 1 p.m. game.

The order is a tall one for Iowa State. Oklahoma (3-0) has allowed just 105 rushing yards in three games. That's 105 total, and that's amazing.

"I believe this defensive team is the cream of the crop in the Big 8 Conference," Walden said.

So, how do you deal with that? It will be primarily up to former quarterback Kevin Caldwell, in just his second game as a running back, and Sherman Williams, returning in the nick of time from an injured ankle.

And of course, Iowa State's quarterbacks run as part of the offensive scheme and not just to avoid the pass rush.

Bob Utter will start his second straight game at quarterback for Iowa State, but Pedersen is expected to play. The Cyclones are trying to glide smoothly into a two-quarterback system.

When the offense sputtered early in the season, Walden pulled Utter from the red-shirt list for last week's game at Rice. Pedersen rallied Iowa State to a 28-27 win in the final minutes, but both played well.

Iowa State's defense also will be challenged today. As usual, the Sooners can run, but they know longer try to break you with just the wishbone attack.

With Cale Gundy at the controls, Oklahoma also is a dangerous passing club. Gundy completed a school-record 18 passes in a 27-17 win over Virginia Tech last week.

"It used to be they complemented the run with more runs," Walden said. "Now they complement it with the pass. That makes it tougher . . ."

Most people expect the Sooners to be fighting mad when they hit the Cyclone Stadium turf today, but some Oklahomans say revenge for last year is not a factor.

"It just makes us respect them more as a team," said defensive back Jason Belser.

## 21-year-old Avery cuffs Houston as Braves roll to 7th straight victory

ATLANTA (AP) — If 21-year-old Steve Avery felt any pennant-race pressure, it sure didn't show.

Avery pitched with the poise of a veteran Friday night and the Atlanta Braves began the final weekend with a 5-2 victory over the Houston Astros for their seventh straight victory.

The Braves temporarily took a half-

game lead in the NL West over Los Angeles, which played later at San Francisco. While Atlanta was winning, the Dodgers were watching on a scoreboard at Candlestick Park.

"We had to get off to a good start, and we have," Avery said. "It was a little tough in the first few innings. Everyone was pumped up. Once we got on the

board early, I settled down a bit."

Avery (18-8), ahead 3-0 after three innings, held Houston hitless until Luis Gonzalez doubled with two outs in the seventh. Avery took a two-hitter and a 5-1 lead into the ninth, but Ken Caminiti led off the inning with his 13th home run and Alejandro Pena relieved.

Pena closed for his 15th save, making

him 11-for-11 in converting save chances since being traded from the New York Mets to Atlanta.

A crowd of 45,815, the largest of the season in Atlanta, roared on the Braves all night with chants, cheers and the now-famous tomahawk chop.

"It's fun. We enjoy it as much as they do," Avery said. "I wanted to finish it,

just to be out there when the fans went crazy."

Avery, 3-11 as a rookie last year, won his fifth consecutive decision. He retired 18 straight batters before walking Javier Ortiz with two outs in the seventh, and Gonzalez followed with a double. Avery escaped the jam by retiring Andujar Cedenio on a weak grounder.
