## Hawkeyes try to keep 'Iowa jinx' alive against Wisconsin

Troy Vincent is a marvelous football player for the Wisconsin Badgers. He's a premier cornerback and kick returner, and a possible first-round pick in the NFL draft next spring.

Aside from that, though, he's endured lots of losing during his years in Madison, and before leaving he'd like to get even with a few clubs.

Vincent and the Badgers can start today by upsetting 17th-ranked Iowa at Camp Randall Stadium.

"They say it's called the Iowa Jinx," said Vincent. "We're going to try and change that this year."

Vincent has struck out against the Hawkeyes, going 0-for-3 the last three years, but the "Iowa Jinx" extends all the way to 1977, with the Badgers 0-13-1 against the Hawks since then.

Iowa arrived as a 19-point favorite today, but

Wisconsin has made strides in Year 2 of the Barry Alvarez Era.

"Hey, we're a 3-and-1 football team," said Vincent. "We're capable of winning a big game."

It starts at 1:05 p.m., with no TV.

Both clubs dropped their Big Ten openers last week, Wisconsin losing 31-16 at Ohio State and Iowa having its Rose Bowl hopes dented in a 43-24 loss to Michigan.

Iowa Coach Hayden Fry is anxious to see how his team responds after a disappointing defeat.

"I'm not going to know until after the Wisconsin game how much we come together or bounce back, or how much it hurt us," he said.

The Hawkeyes host 20th-ranked Illinois next Saturday, but they can't afford to look past Vincent and the Badgers.

Vincent, a 6-foot, 190-pound senior from New Jersey, can hurt you in lots of ways. The speedster has scored three touchdowns on punt returns during his career, he's a rock on defense and he's also seen spot duty at wide receiver.

He currently ranks second in the country in punt returns and seventh in kickoff returns, and he's a nominee for the Jim Thorpe Award as one of the top defensive backs in college football.

But Vincent would trade some of his personal accomplishments for a victory today. Wisconsin has lost 14 straight Big Ten games.

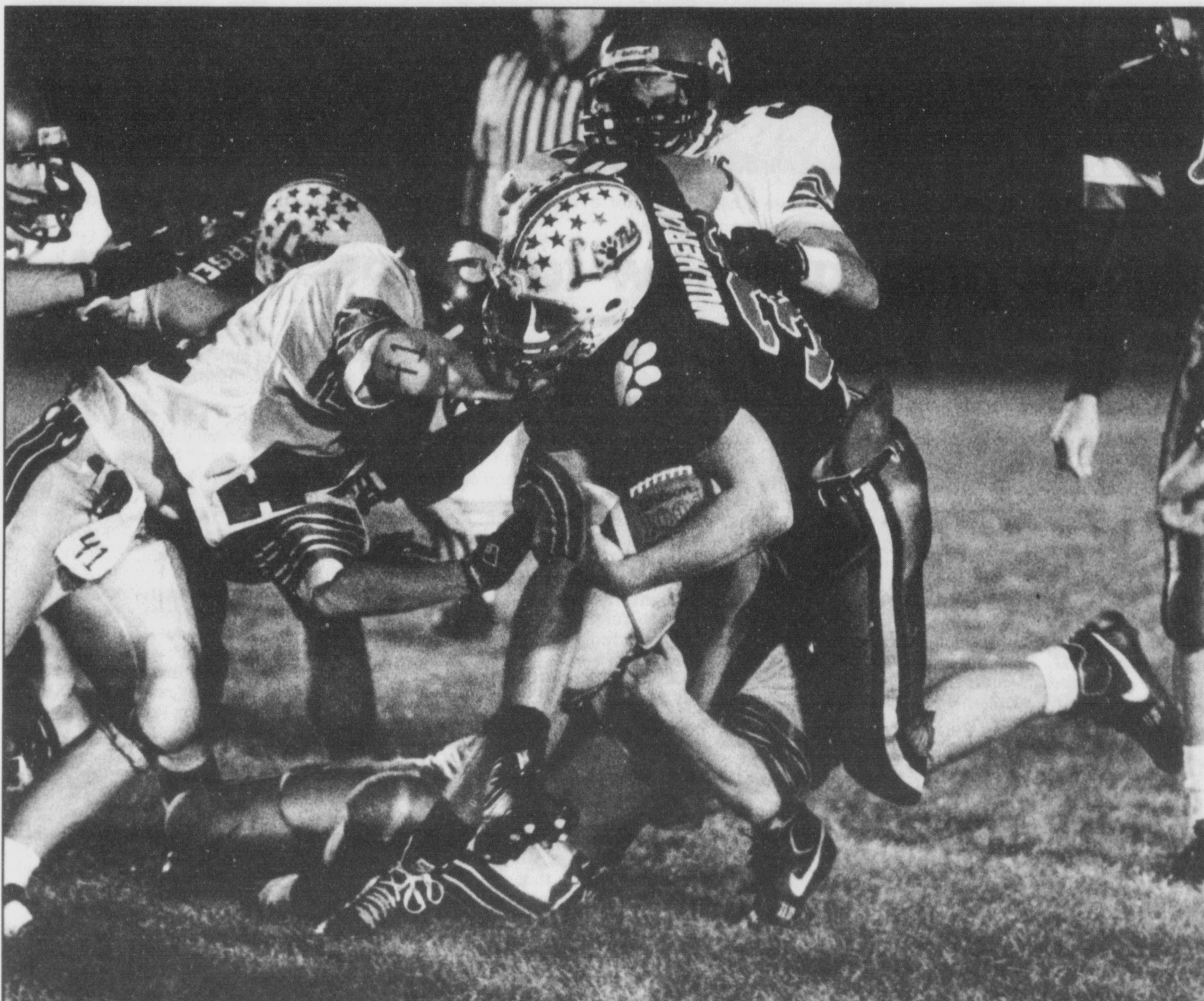
"The Iowa game is a special game," he said. "We have five coaches from the Iowa staff. It's friend versus friend. It's going to be one of those get-after-it games."

The Badgers hope to get after it with a young club, with 15 freshmen in key roles. Get this: Wisconsin's top three receivers, top four scorers and top rusher are rookies.

"We're extremely young," said Alvarez.

## Lions pound City High J-Hawks stun Kennedy

Just when fans of Linn-Mar football think they've seen their team at its best, the Lions seem to go one better.

The question now is, how much better can they get?

Linn-Mar totaled 492 yards of offense and put the clamps on the Iowa City High running game en route to a 41-15 win over the Little Hawks in Mississippi Valley Conference football Friday night at Armstrong Field.

The win was the fifth straight for Linn-Mar (5-2) and goes a long way toward assuring the Lions their third straight Class 4A playoff berth. Linn-Mar hosts

Cedar Rapids Jefferson Friday night before finishing off with lowly Iowa City West in two weeks.

The loss had the opposite affect on City High, which lost for the third straight time and fell to 3-4.

While the Linn-Mar offense was prolific for the third straight weekend, its defense also shined in this game, limiting the Little Hawks to just 193 yards, including a meager 37 on the ground.

"The kids are really playing well at this point in the year, and that's really all you can

The Cardiac Kids came up short Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

## Pagliarulo delivers Twins win

TORONTO (AP) — Mike Pagliarulo beat the Blue Jays and their bullpen with one swing of the bat.

Pagliarulo hit a pinch-home run with one out in the 10th inning Friday night to give Minnesota a 3-2 victory over Toronto and a 2-1 lead in the American League playoffs. The homer off Mike Timlin also broke a streak of 12 consecutive scoreless innings by Blue Jays relievers.

Game 4 of the best-of-7 series will be played tonight when Jack

Morris, the winner of the first game, faces Todd Stottlemyre. Of the seven previous AL playoffs tied 1-1, the team winning Game 3 went on to win the series five times.

Tonight's game will be televised by CBS (KGAN, Channel 2) at 7:26.

Toronto got a good performance from its bullpen, but the Twins were even better. David West, who slumped in the second half, pitched 2½ shutout innings, allowing one hit, and series surprise Carl Willis worked two scoreless innings, giving up one hit.

Mark Guthrie got the final out of the ninth and gained the victory, and Rick Aguilera finished for his second save of the series.

Pagliarulo was batting for rookie Scott Leius, who was 0-for-3. It was the sixth pinch homer in playoff history, and the third in the AL. The last in the AL was by Kansas City's Pat Sheridan in 1985, also against the Blue Jays.

The Blue Jays kept a late-arriving SkyDome crowd of 51,454 on their feet in the first inning when Joe Carter hit Scott Erickson's 3-2 pitch 451 feet to center field with two outs. Candy Maldonado made it 2-0 with an RBI double later in the inning.

Toronto, however, could have had much, much more. In the first seven innings, the Blue Jays were 1-for-8 with runners in scoring position.

Erickson (20-8) staggered through four-plus innings, allow-

ing three hits and walking five, the latter his season high. He walked the first two batters in the fourth with no damage and the Blue Jays wasted two walks and two David West wild pitches in the fifth.

In 13 of the previous 14 games between the teams this season, the club scoring first went on to win. In Game 3, the Blue Jays' inability to apply a knockout gave the Twins reason to hope.

Minnesota scored a run in the fifth when Shane Mack tripled to right field leading off and beat second baseman Roberto Alomar's ill-advised throw home on Kent Hrbek's slow grounder. On Mack's triple, Carter got his foot stuck on the plastic wall and appeared to sprain his ankle. Carter left in the seventh for a pinch runner.

Rookie Chuck Knoblauch, 6-for-10 in the series, doubled with one out in the sixth and scored on Kirby Puckett's single to right. Carter's strong throw home was cut off by first baseman John Olerud, whose relay home was too late to get the sliding Knoblauch.

After a walk to Olerud and a single by Kelly Gruber in the first, Maldonado snapped an 0-for-15 playoff slump with a run-scoring double.

Erickson is only 8-5 in the second half.

## Friends remember Leo Durocher

Mays: 'All I can say is I have lost a dear father'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Leo Durocher was remembered as a nice guy at last Friday.

About 40 family members and friends, including former players Willie Mays and Bobby Bragan, bid a tearful farewell to the man who built his career on toughness.

"I can't stress the feeling that I have for this man," Mays said, his voice cracking, during a memorial service at the Old North Church at Forest Lawn Hollywood Hills. "All I can say is that I have lost a dear father."

"All the things you heard about Leo, how evil he was . . . he never treated me any way but perfect. So much has happened to me with Leo Durocher, I can't put it into words."

Durocher died Monday at Desert Hospital in Palm Springs, Calif., of natural causes at age 86.

Durocher played for 17 seasons, almost all as a shortstop, with the Brooklyn Dodgers, Cincinnati Reds, St. Louis Cardinals and New York Yankees, the team he broke into baseball with in 1925.

He managed in the big leagues for 24 seasons and ranks sixth on baseball's all-time managerial list with 2,008 victories.

"He was the greatest manager I've ever heard of," said Bragan, a member of the Texas Rangers front office who delivered the eulogy before introducing Mays. "It's a real injustice he's not in the

Hall of Fame.

"He did step on some toes, (but) his accomplishments overshadowed the negatives. Only five managers have more wins, but being sixth on the list isn't enough."

Before the hour-long service, Bragan smiled when reminded it was Durocher who once said, "Nice Guys Finish Last."

"He was a nice guy, compassionate," Bragan said. "Two years ago when he came to the oldtimers game in Texas, 40,000 fans were singing happy birthday to him, and tears were coming down this tough guy's cheeks."

"I've been in baseball 54 years and the highest honor I've ever been accorded is happening today, being asked to say a few words in honor of Leo. Before today, it was being one of Leo's boys, one of Mr. (Branch) Rickey's boys."

Rickey owned the Dodgers when Durocher was their manager, and it was Rickey who paved the way for Jackie Robinson to become the first black player in the major leagues in 1947.

KNOWN AS "The Lip," Durocher was managing the New York Giants four years later when Mays, one of the few blacks in the big leagues at the time, joined the team.

Mays recalled his slow start with the Giants after he'd been brought up from the minor leagues.

"I went 0-for-12, I was crying, very disturbed," Mays said. "This man came to me, said, 'You're my center fielder. You don't have to hit. Just be Willie Mays.'"

## Beck breaks barrier with 59

LAS VEGAS (AP) — It took 14 years, but Chip Beck finally gave the PGA Tour another 59 Friday.

That's 59, as in 29-30, as in the second sub-60 round in tour history, as in 13 under par, as in 13 birdies and five pars.

"I knew it was going to happen. I'm surprised it hasn't happened sooner. I'm just amazed it happened to me," Beck said.

Beck, 35, in his 13th season on the tour, birdied the last three holes on the Sunrise Golf Club course near the glitz and glitter of the Las Vegas Strip to reach the target that had been the goal of professional golfers since it was first achieved by Al Geiberger in the 1977 Memphis Classic.

It was worth a \$1 million bonus, half to Beck and half to charity, and the lead in the third round of the \$1.5 million Las Vegas Invitation.

Sunrise is a members' course that Beck had never even seen before Friday, and it's unlike-

ly he'll ever play it again.

It's listed at 6,914 yards but plays shorter in the dry desert air and has a par of 72. It is being used as a fill-in this year in the three-course rotation used for the first three rounds of the Las Vegas tournament.

"It was a team effort," Beck said. "I hadn't seen the course before. I couldn't have done it without my caddy, Dave Woosley."

In the end, however, it was Beck who had to pull the trigger and make the shots.

"I'm felt it could happen. I was so pleased I didn't get in my own way, that I let it happen," Beck said. "After the Ryder Cup it was like a walk in the park."

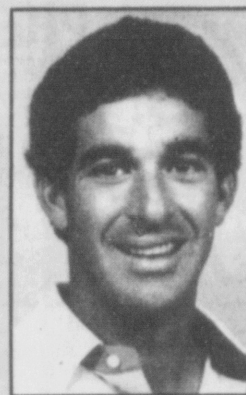
There were some nervous moments, however, in a round that had some remarkable parallels to Geiberger's tour of the Colonial Country Club.

Both rounds came on Friday, both players began from the 10th tee, and both need birdie on the final hole to crack 60.

Geiberger did it with a 10-foot putt. Beck didn't want to face that.

"I wanted to get it close and kick it in. I didn't want to be standing over any 10-footer for 59," he said.

After an eight iron to his final green, Beck had only a slippery three-footer left for the 59.

# West Delaware routs Marion

After his team's 13-7 loss to Regis last week, West Delaware Coach Dave Jacobson figured the Hawks would respond one of two ways when they traveled to Thomas Park to play Marion Friday night.

They would either struggle the rest of the season. Or, they would get it back together and continue a run at the Class 3A playoff field.

"We have great kids and they came back and responded," Jacobson said after the Hawks, led by a brilliant performance by Rick Hilby, rocked Marion, 42-13.

West Delaware stays in the playoff hunt at 6-1 overall and 4-1 in the Wamac Conference.

Hilby set the tone with his 96-yard touchdown return of a first quarter punt. It was the first of his five touchdowns on the night. He finished with 266 all-purpose

yards, including 104 rushing and 46 on two pass receptions.

"We had a big loss last week and we really wanted this one," said Hilby, who also had one of West Delaware's three pass interceptions. "We knew if we lost, our playoff hopes would be over."

Hilby got the Hawks started on his dazzling long punt return. He juggled the ball slightly inside the five, broke a couple of tackles and then ran into the clear.

"We made a lot of mistakes," Marion Coach Dave Messerli said. "From not tackling the kid (on the punt return) when three guys had him to a lot of other mistakes."

Mistakes like three fumbles lost and the three pass interceptions.

"Our kids were really hitting out there," Jacobson said. "We have physical kids and they were really getting after it."

West Delaware exploded for 21 points in

the second quarter to break the game open.

After Marion came back with Ben King's 8-yard touchdown run to cut the margin to 7-6 after the first, Hilby capped a 62-yard drive with his 7-yard run with 10:35 left in the half.

Then Terry Wegmann intercepted a pass to give the Hawks the ball on the Marion 30. Six plays later, Hilby bolted in from the 3.

After Andy Ehresman returned the kick-off 66 yards to give Marion a start at the Hawk 32, the Indians missed a chance to get back in the game. On fourth and one at the 23, King slipped short of the first.

West Delaware then drove 76 yards to put the game away. Kilby ramblled in from the 8 for a 28-6 halftime lead.

Early in the second half, Marion lost a fumble and Kilby scored from the 19 to end any hope the Indians had of coming back.

# Quality fields for Hospice races

IOWA CITY — Sunday's 15th annual Hospice Road Races are shaping up to have good fields from 5K to half-marathon.

Prize money is at stake in the 10K only. The top five male and female finishers split \$3,200.

"Despite the fact there's no prize money in the 5K or half-marathon, you see athletes selecting their race based on their training," said race director Peg McElroy Fraser.

The half-marathon seems to be a popular event among the elite men, many of whom are training for fall marathons.

Saimon Axon, who left Scotland for his first trip to the states Thursday, has a personal best of 1 hour, 4 minutes, 23 seconds in the half-marathon.

He is joined in an international half-marathon field by Richard Kaitany of Kenya, Cholon Kim of Korea, Ken Frenette of Canada and two-time U.S. Olympic qualifier Brent Friesth of Boulder, Colo.

Friesth is running his third race in Iowa this year. Winner of the Dam to Dam 20K in Des Moines in June, he placed 24th in the All Iowa Festival of Races 5K ("not my race") in May.

"I'm amazed myself how many good races they have in Iowa," said Friesth, who finished 10th in the 1988 Fifth Season 8K. "(The Boulder area) is known for running and they have only a few competitive races there."

Friesth and Chris Chattin, who will run the 10K, both have qualified for the 1992 Olympic marathon trials.

Chattin said the 10K race will be "a matter of who's fit and who's having a good day."

Benji Durden of Boulder comes in with one of the best 10K personal bests of 28:37. Also expected to contend are Chattin, Marc Oleson, Anders Kingsted, Dave Probst and Dan Hostager.

Three of the race favorites — Sue Lee in the 10K, Kaitany in the half marathon and Kathryn

Evans in the 5K — are coming off injuries, said Fraser.

Lee, who has recently moved to New Mexico from Canada, will have her first go at racing since June. She finished second in the Festival of Races 5K and shortly after that took three months off running with a foot injury.

"Mostly what Sunday will tell me is about my general conditioning," Lee said. "I'll just be out there racing and see where I'm at."

A course record isn't out of the question but Lee's shooting more to win.

"Coming here my goal was I'd like to run around 34 minutes. When I heard the record was 34:20, it all was in the same ballpark," she said.

Fellow Canadian Jacqueline Gareau, Monica Signahl of Sweden and Louise Mohanna should challenge her.

Kaitany, a former Iowa State all-American, placed third in the 1988 Chicago Marathon. Evans ran a 5K personal best time of 16:29 at Cedar Rapids in May and will run that event Sunday.

Sunday's races begin and end at the corner of College and Gilbert streets. They start with the children's run at 8 a.m. The mile (open to all ages) follows. At 9, the gun goes off for the 5K, 10K and half-marathon.

Race packet pick-up, registration and a sports expo exhibit will take place from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. today at the downtown Holiday Inn.

# Ward's late plunge boosts Washington

DUBUQUE — Dedric Ward's 1-yard, 4th-down touchdown plunge with two seconds left gave Cedar Rapids Washington a 30-24 victory over Dubuque Hempstead in a Mississippi Valley Conference prep football thriller Friday night.

The win improved the Warriors to 4-3. Hempstead dropped to 2-5.

Ward's 89-yard run and Bo Clancy's extra-points pass to twin brother Gunnar had sent Wash ahead, 22-17, in the third period, after the Warriors halted a 10-minute Hempstead drive at the Wash 2.

The Warriors spotted Hempstead a 7-0 first-period lead on Clyde Kay's 25-yard run, then edged ahead early in the second period on Jeff Shaw's 1-yard plunge at the end of a 65-yard march begun after Hempstead fumbled an 11-yard Wash punt. Bo Clancy's extra-points pass to Chris Peterson gave the Warriors the lead.

After Kay ran 4 yards to cap a 67-yard drive that sent Hempstead in front again, Bo Clancy's 86-yard pass to Matt Stulte restored the lead to Wash, but R.J. Lang's 22-yard

Kennedy had tied the game, 13-13, three plays into the second half when Wiese hooked up with Chad Hartke on a 58-yard touchdown pass. Hartke caught a 16-yard touchdown pass in the first half.

The teams traded field position, Kennedy stopping Jeff once inside the 10-yard line.

But early in the fourth quarter, facing a fourth-and-1 at their own 49, the Cougars gambled and went for the first down. Wiese fumbled the snap and Lehnher pounced on it at the Kennedy 48.

Cedar Rapids race car driver Dudley Fleck has qualified for the Sports Car Club of America National Run-offs today at Road Atlanta. The National Run-offs determine the SCCA's national champions.

Fleck, a member of the Jim Beam racing team, will guide a Spec Racer in today's event.

He normally races Late Models at Hawkeye Downs, quite a difference from the car he's worked with this week.

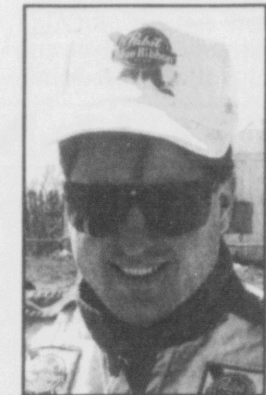
His SCCA car has 95 horsepower compared to 400 in his Late Model car. His sports car goes 1,585 pounds compared to 3,050 pounds on the Late Model.

He's averaged 88 miles per hour during qualifying on the 2½-mile Road Atlanta layout, about the same as he does in his Late Model.

"The biggest difference is the configuration of the tracks," Fleck said. "Here, we run road courses with any number of right- and left-hand turns. There's a lot of braking and shifting involved. We average about the same speed. It's just a difference of how we get there. It's a lot more interesting for the driver."
