Puckett a real key to Twins' success

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — In the next few days there will be lots of talk about how the teams in the World Series match up. For the Minnesota Twins, all that really matters is how well Kirby Puckett plays.

If Puckett doesn't hit in the Series, Minnesota's chances of winning are greatly reduced.

Take the playoffs. Puckett was 1-for-7 in the first two games against the Toronto Blue Jays and the Twins offense looked dead. He finished 9-for-21 with two homers, six RBI and the series MVP award.

"Myself, Kent Hrbek and Chili Davis weren't swining the bat well," Puckett said. "Sooner or later we were going to start swinging well and we did."

Puckett is not one to give up on himself easily.

He doesn't look like a baseball player. He's short and round with a body that resembles a clenched fist. When Puckett

builds up speed around the bases, he looks like a bowling bowl.

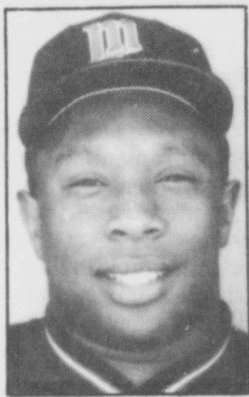
But he's a player, and a great one at that. In eight seasons, Puckett has an average of .320, including a career-high .356 in 1988.

He grew up on Chicago's tough south side and built up leg strength by constantly climbing the stairs to the 14th floor because the elevator didn't work.

Puckett never had the style and grace of Willie Mays or the pure power of Darryl Strawberry.

"All I ever wanted was for people to give me a chance when I was growing up," Puckett said. "I've been playing baseball since I was five years old. I knew I had talent. I just wanted the opportunity to succeed."

For the second time in five seasons, Puckett has that chance in the World Series. In 1987, he

hit .357 as the Twins beat the St. Louis Cardinals in seven games.

"I'm so lucky," said Puckett, the youngest of nine children. "I grew up watching a great player like Ernie Banks who never made it to the World Series. And now I'm going to my second. A lot of people never get that opportunity."

Puckett and the rest of his teammates worked out for the third straight day Thursday in the Metrodome.

"I just try to do my best out there," Puckett said. "I figure I'm working only five hours a day, including batting practice. If I can't bust my butt for five hours a day then there's a problem."

His teammates certainly have no problems with his effort.

"I don't know what to say about Kirby except that he's one of the best players in the game, if not the best," first baseman Kent Hrbek said. "He does everything well. It's a joy to go up to the plate after he hits and listen to the catcher talk to himself about how he was able to hit a certain pitch. I've been watching this guy for seven years and he just amazes me."

There were times this season, however, when Puckett was less than amazed. He hit .319 with 15 homers and 89 RBI. Certainly good numbers, but not always consistent.

28 by Hornacek guide Suns

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Jeff Hornacek scored 28 points, including four clinching free throws, as the Phoenix Suns ran their exhibition record to 4-0 with a 99-95 victory over the Atlanta Hawks on Thursday night.

Dan Majerle added 19 points for the Suns, who threatened to turn the game into an early blowout.

They led twice by 20 points in

the first quarter, but Atlanta fought back within 55-44 at half-time.

A three-pointer by former David Lipscomb University star Derren Henrie with 7:50 left in the game sparked a 9-0 run that tied the game at 83-83.

But the Suns' Cedrick Ceballos broke the tie with a jumper and Atlanta was never able to catch up again.

Kennedy bounces back in big way

Jefferson gave Kennedy a black eye, and Prairie paid the price.

Just six days after losing its first game of the season to Cedar Rapids Jefferson, the Cedar Rapids Kennedy football team took out its frustration on Cedar Rapids Prairie Thursday night, pummeling the Hawks in Kingston Stadium, 48-0.

It was the third shutout of the season for the Kennedy defense as the Class 4A sixth-ranked Cougars improved to 7-1 on the season. The homecoming win gives Kennedy a half-game lead in the Mississippi Valley Conference over seventh-ranked Dubuque Wahlert (6-1). The Cougars face the Golden Eagles in their regular season finale next Friday night in Dubuque.

Prairie fell to 3-5.

"We've been coming into (games) just thinking we can show up and win, but Jefferson proved us wrong on that," said Cougar senior quarterback Chad Wiese, who played a huge role in Thursday's win. "So we decided to take it out on Prairie."

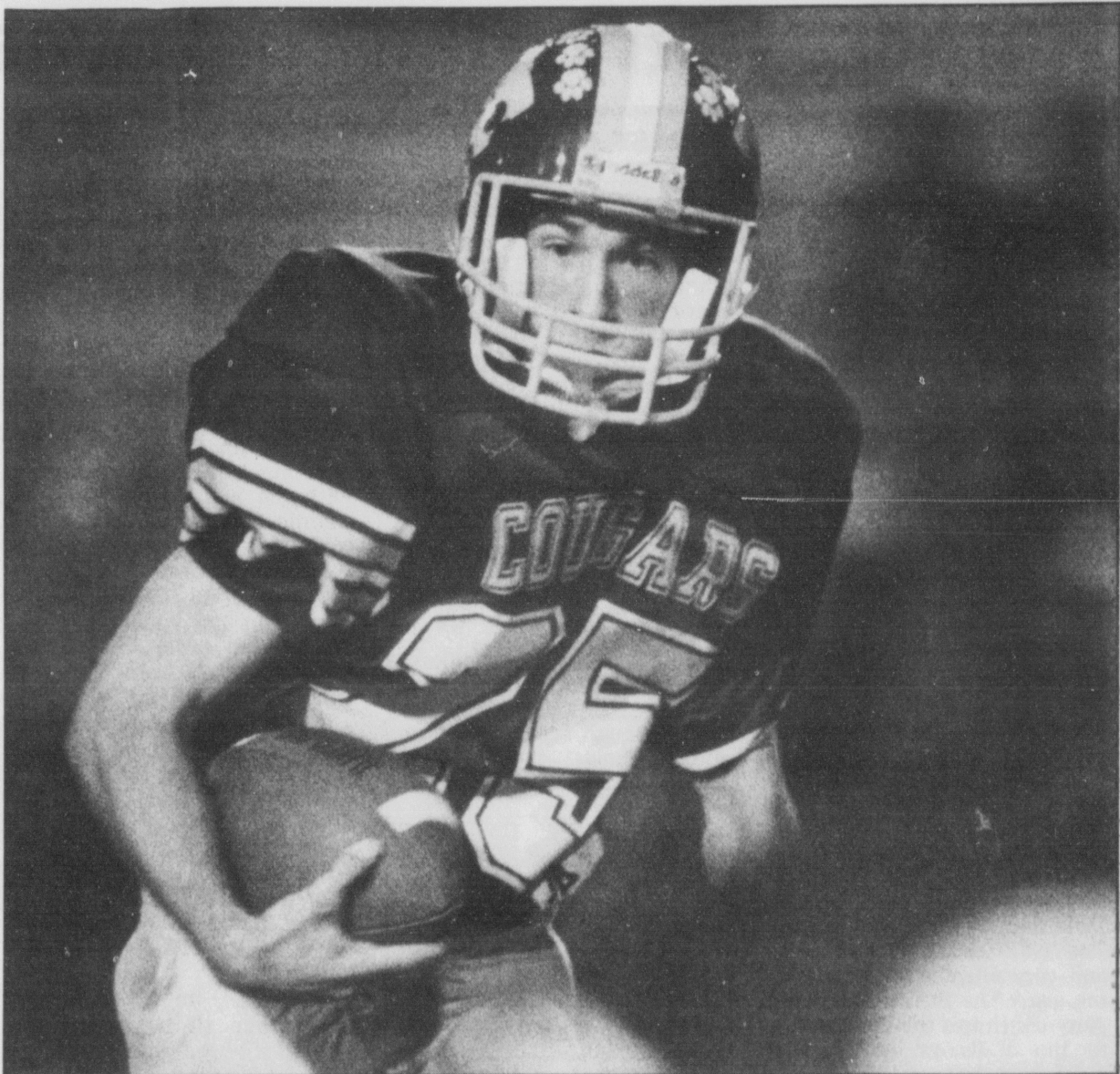
Wiese had his finest game of the season, completing 13 of 17 passes for 269 yards and three touchdowns. All of his TD passes came in a 28-point second quarter that gave the Cougars a 35-0 halftime lead.

EIGHT OF Wiese's passes were caught by speedy D.J. Doyle, who finished with 163 receiving yards. He caught TD passes of 46 and 7 yards.

"Everything worked well tonight," said Doyle, who has helped the Cougars win in a variety of roles this season. "Coach got us ready and told us to go out and play hard right from the first quarter. I think that helped a lot."

There was a lot of praise for Knock following the game.

"I thought Kennedy played an excellent football game," Prairie Coach Craig Jelinek said. "Coach Don Knock did an excellent job of preparing his team after they lost last week. We just happened to be the unlucky

team that played them next."

Kennedy led only 7-0 at the end of the first quarter thanks to a 15-yard touchdown run from Mike Morrison. But Wiese, Doyle, Morrison and company really went to work in the second quarter.

Wiese threw both of his TD passes to Doyle in the second period and also connected with Morrison on a 33-yard scoring play. Willie Bruner added a 13-yard touchdown run in the frame, his first of two touchdowns for the game.

Kennedy scored two more quick TDs early in the third period, and for a while it looked like the game might end early under the state's 50-point rule. But Knock began substituting, and there was no scoring over the final 16 minutes.

"I think (the team) kind of put everything together tonight," Knock said. "I think our offensive line did a great job. They gave Chad time to throw and he was really on tonight."

"This was a total team thing tonight. Everybody played to-

night and we're really proud of the way they came back after last week."

The Cougars added 184 rushing yards to go with Wiese's 269-yard passing effort. Morrison led the charge with 89 on 13 carries, and his three TDs gave him 15 for the season.

Prairie finished with 104 yards rushing, but 54 of those came in the fourth quarter against the Cougar reserves. Jeff Hupfer led the Hawks with 69 yards on 21 carries.
