

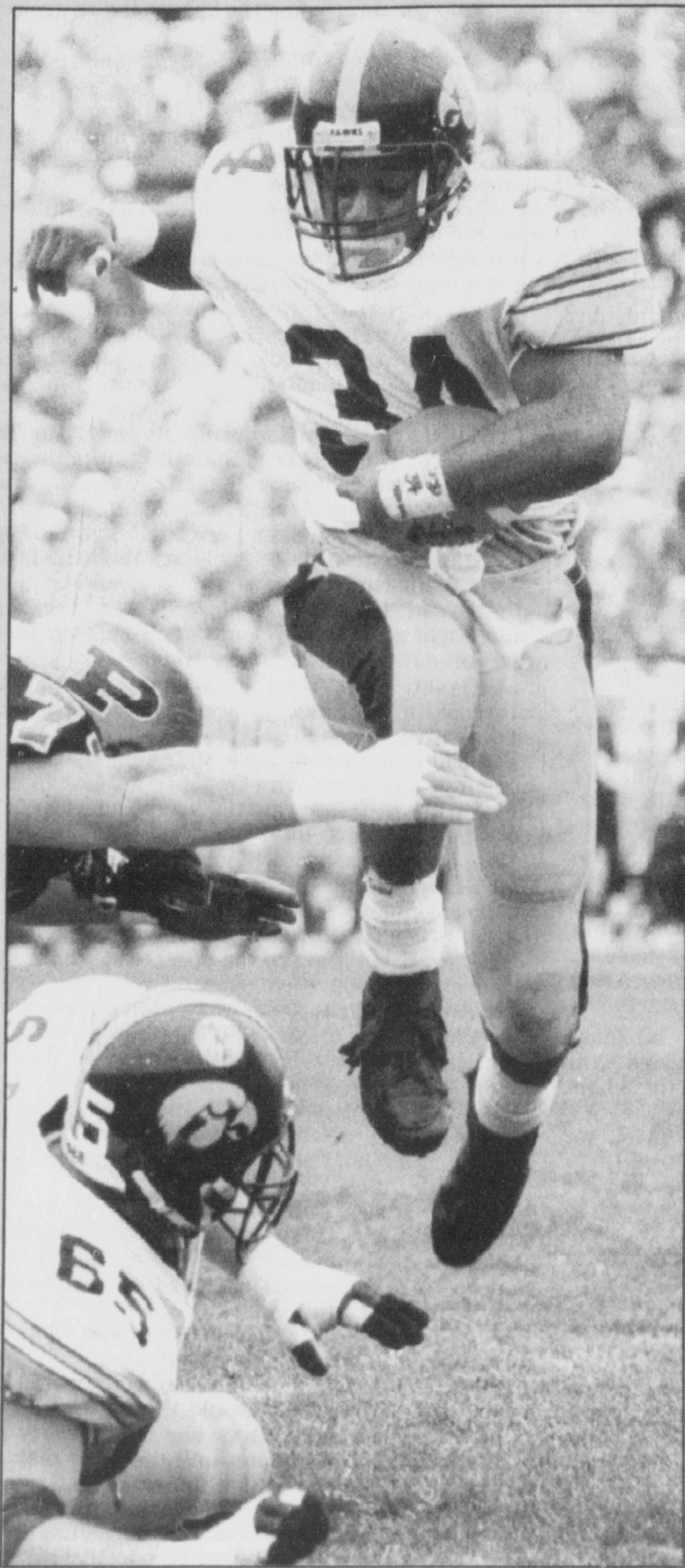

Lew's catching on as a Hawk receiver

IOWA CITY — Somebody should write a book about Iowa's Lew Montgomery and call it "The Little Fullback Who Could."

He could run, he could block, he could score touchdowns, he could play tailback when needed, he could catch passes.

Lots of passes. So many, in fact, he's leading the Hawkeyes in receptions with 26 heading into Saturday's game at Ohio State.

"It's something I really never expected to do, but I'm full of surprises," he said.

Indeed.

"At the beginning of the season, everyone thought I'd be running the ball more, but

surprisingly enough I'm catching a lot of passes," he said. "It's a great feeling."

"I think it adds another dimension to this team, because we don't have to rely totally on receivers to catch the ball."

Montgomery's 26 catches have produced 199 yards, mostly on little safety-valve passes. Danan Hughes is still Iowa's big-play receiver with 22 grabs for 437 yards.

When the season began, Mike Saunders was considered the best pass-catcher among running backs after spending the 1990 season as a wide receiver, but Iowa's coaches know other teams are watching Saunders coming out of the backfield.

That's one reason Montgomery has gotten open so much. Another reason is that he's good. "He's always had hands, he's just never had the opportunity to catch the ball," said Coach Hayden Fry.

Iowa lists Montgomery as being 6 feet tall. That may be an exaggeration, but there's no exaggerating his importance to the 11th-ranked team in the country.

He leads the Hawkeyes in touchdowns with seven and he's second behind Saunders in rushing with 211 yards.

His career stats are starting to add up, and he's only a junior: 125 carries for 448 yards, 45 receptions for 324 yards, and 14 touchdowns. He especially likes those TDs.

"I love the end zone," he said with a gleam. "I feel if it gets anywhere within the 10-yard line, I just have this internal burning feeling that if they call my number, I can score."

He proved that at Waterloo East High School, scoring 46 touchdowns in a career that ended with him being named the USA Today Iowa Player of the Year in 1987.

Montgomery came to Iowa City as a tailback, but that spot was a little crowded with Nick Bell, Tony Stewart and others. He switched to fullback, but got a little taste of his old position when Saunders could not start against Wisconsin due to sore ribs.

Montgomery got the call against the Badgers and played well, and he wouldn't mind getting another shot at tailback in 1992 after Saunders graduates. But he's not campaigning for the job.

"I just want to win here at the University of Iowa," he said. "I'm glad of the opportunity and I'm going to take advantage of it."

He's glad of the academic opportunity, too, he said. Playing in the NFL has been a childhood dream, but it's not his main goal.

"My main goal is to graduate, and it's something I'd like to tell all the youngsters out there," said Montgomery, a communications major. "When you focus on athletics, you have a tendency to get wrapped up in it."

"You can use athletics as a stepping stone to reach other goals, but you have to focus on your education because that's something no one can take away from you."

Kennedy kicks Lions

Cougars move on in 4A, 18-6

Mike Morrison added another job skill to his already impressive football resume Wednesday night, and as a result, Cedar Rapids Kennedy now has a playoff win in its football history.

Morrison, the Cougars' leading rusher during the regular season, threw a pair of touchdown passes and rushed for another to lead Kennedy to an 18-6 upset of seventh-ranked Linn-Mar in a Class 4A, first-round playoff game in front of an estimated 2,000 fans at Kingston Stadium.

Kennedy (8-2) advances to the quarterfinals and will play fellow Mississippi Valley Conference member Dubuque Wahlert Monday in Dubuque. Wahlert beat Kennedy in the regular-season finale last Friday.

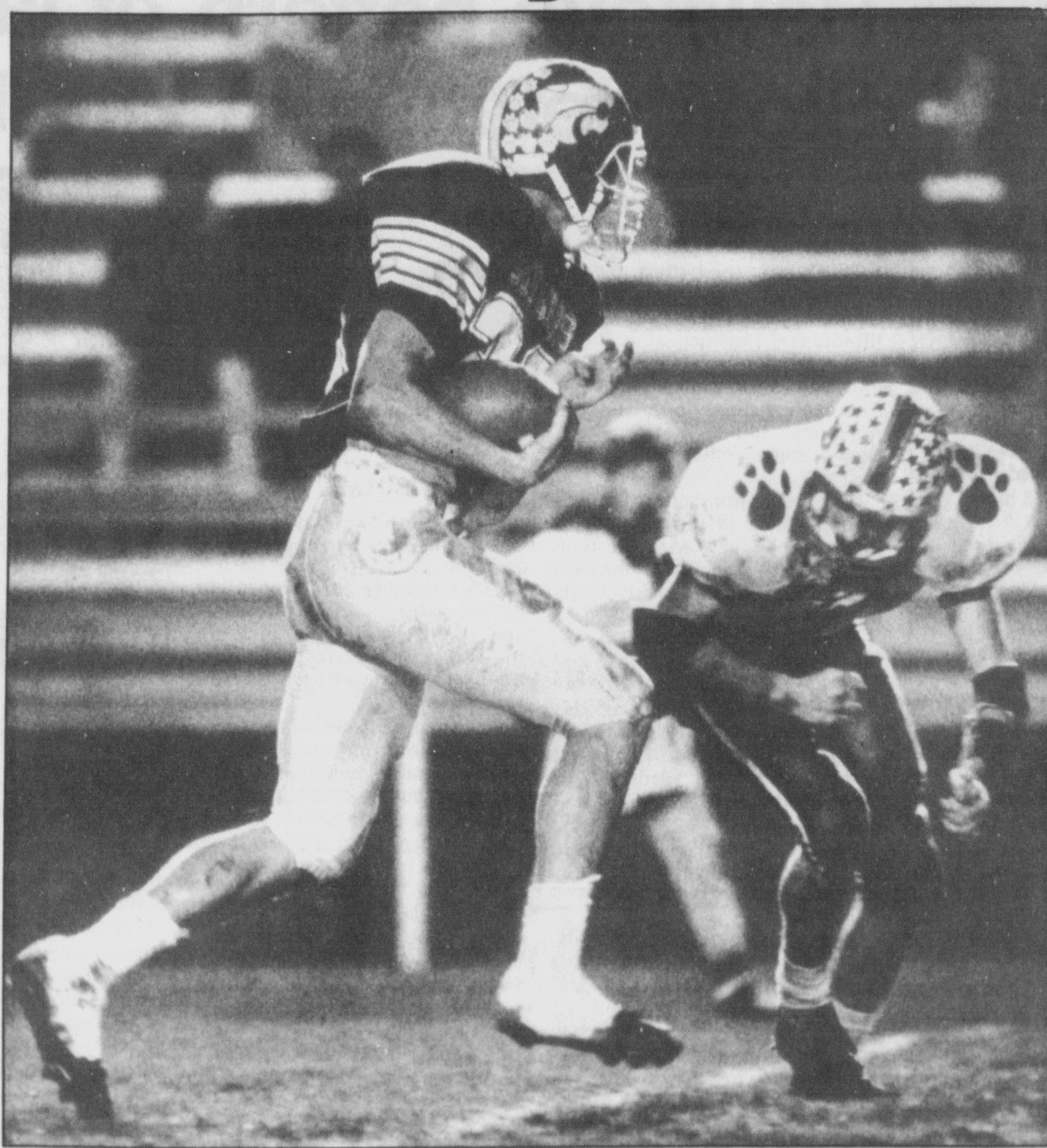
Linn-Mar, the two-time defending state champion, bowed out at 7-3.

"Last year we got in the playoffs, and I don't know if we were satisfied with that or not," said Kennedy Coach Don Knock, whose Cougars were beaten by Linn-Mar in the first round last year. "This year we got in the playoffs, and I think these kids wanted more than just to get in. You've got to beat the best to be the best, and we beat one of the best tonight, there's no doubt about it."

Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell had no comment.

Defense sparks Regis to easy 3A victory

Regis Coach Gaylord Hauschildt put his team's hopes in the hands of the seventh-ranked Royals' defense in Wednesday night's Class 3A prep football playoff game with Mount Pleasant.

They were very capable hands.

Royal defenders held Mount Pleasant to two first downs and 13 yards in building a 20-0 lead by halftime and eased past the Panthers, 33-6, in a first-round game played before a sparse crowd at frosty Thomas Park.

Regis (9-1) advances to play second-ranked Pella (10-0) Monday at Pella. Tickets for the game are on sale at the school office.

Mount Pleasant won the coin toss but deferred its choice until the second half. Rather than opting to receive, Regis kicked off.

"It was a wind situation," said Hauschildt. "We had a lot of confidence in our defense and when you have to punt into that wind,

the ball can do dumb things."

Mount Pleasant ran three plays for 1 yard and punted to the Regis 42.

Regis junior Jim Zachar dashed 14 yards on the Royals' first play from scrimmage. Seven plays later, on second-and-9 from the 10, Zachar shrugged off a tackler at the line of scrimmage, bounced outside and zipped in for the touchdown.

The rout was on.

"Our kids just didn't believe when they went out there," said Mount Pleasant Coach Bob Jensen.

A 72-yard punt return by junior Tony Campbell was followed by a 12-play, 86-yard touchdown march. Zachar's 1-yard scoring run gave Regis a 20-0 lead with 9:45 left in the first half.

Mount Pleasant crossed the 50-yard line only once in the first half. A 13-yard sack of quarterback Brant Miller by Regis' Nic Olberding pushed the Panthers back into their own territory just before the half.

"Our front eight people really put a lot of pressure on their offensive line," said Hauschildt, specifically mentioning tackles Matt Holtz and Shawn McVay, and ends Gerry Hoefer and Greg Hawthorne. "They didn't have a lot of time to pass."

Jensen pointed to Regis' size advantage in the lines. "When you see their shortest guy is 6-1 and our tallest guy is 5-11, it's a struggle," he said.

Mount Pleasant finished with 104 yards.

Led by Zachar's 75 yards and two touchdowns, Regis rolled up 118 yards rushing by halftime. Senior quarterback Ross Wilken, who was 7-of-11 for 154 yards, took over in the third quarter, completing five straight passes. He threw passes of 47 and 48 yards to Matt Drahos that set up both of the Royals' second-half scores.

Regis finished with 316 yards.

Mount Pleasant scored its only touchdown when Josh Bezone burst 21 yards against the Regis reserves in the fourth quarter.

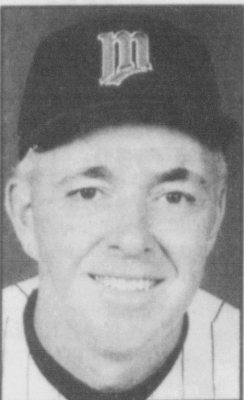
No shock: AL honor is Kelly's

Tom Kelly, whose Minnesota Twins became the only club in baseball history to go from last place one year to World Series winners the next, Wednesday was named American League Manager of the Year.

Kelly guided the Twins to a seven-game victory over the Atlanta Braves for his second World Series title in his five seasons. The Twins also won baseball's championship in 1987, Kelly's first season.

The Twins were 74-88 in 1990, last in the AL West. At Kelly's

urging, they pursued free agents Jack Morris, Mike Pagliarulo and Chili Davis and, after a 2-9 start that led to speculation Kelly would be fired, had the majors' best record over the last 151 games to finish 95-67.

Brewers tab Garner as manager for 1992

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Phil Garner, the feisty infielder nicknamed "Scrap Iron" who helped lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to the 1979 World Series championship, was named manager of the Milwaukee Brewers Wednesday.

Garner was the fourth former player in a month to be hired as manager without any previous major-league experience in the job. The others are Boston's Butch Hobson, Buck Showalter of the New York Yankees and Seattle's Bill Plummer.

"It's an exciting opportunity and one I hadn't anticipated

ed at this point," said Garner, a thirdbase coach last year with the Houston Astros.

New Brewers general manager Sal Bando said he picked Garner, his former teammate on the Oakland Athletics in the 1970s, to replace Tom Trebelhorn because of his personality.

"He has the work ethic and the personality. I just felt he was the right personality to take us to the next level," said Bando, who earlier said he was looking for a manager who could be tougher on players than Trebelhorn.

"We brought in people who we thought would help us win," he said. "I don't want to sound like I'm blowing my own horn, but I wanted (batting coach Terry) Crowley. I wanted Pagliarulo. When the owner says, 'If you get Morris, you've got to guarantee me first, second or third,' what you're doing as a manager is putting your guts right up there on the table. Now, you've got to win."

Gamble's back in Celtic fold

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP) — Dee Brown was gone. But Kevin Gamble was on his way back. And Larry Bird agreed to stay for two more years.

Boston Celtics coach Chris Ford wanted to spend the next-to-last day of training camp tuning up his team. Instead, he was surrounded Wednesday by a hectic series of comings and goings that may not be over.

With Brown, who underwent surgery on his left knee Wednesday, and Brian Shaw both ailing, the Celtics were searching for a backup point guard to an overweight John Bagley in time for Friday night's season opener against Charlotte.

Gamble, the former Univeristy of Iowa standout who was last year's starting small forward, signed a reported three-year contract Wednesday afternoon.

And Bird, who had one year left on his contract, on Wednesday morning signed a two-year extension through the 1993-94 season, reportedly worth at least \$4 million per year.

Bird, believed to be making \$7 million this season, left practice without talking to reporters, but his attorney, Bob Woolf, said negotiations were smooth.

Gamble's contract was believed to be worth about \$3.5 million. He has been working out and may play Friday night.

MINNESOTA DEFEATED the Toronto Blue Jays in five games in the AL playoffs before beating the Braves, who went from last to first in the NL. Tuesday, Atlanta's Bobby Cox was named the NL's top manager by the BBWAA.

The host Bobcats managed just 34 rushing yards and managed just one first down through the first three quarters of play.

West Delaware (9-1) advances to Monday's second round against the winner of Waverly-Shell Rock's game with Decorah. Western Dubuque, the co-champion in the Big Bend Conference, retires at 8-2.

West Delaware was able to capitalize on good field position throughout the game and had better luck mixing its offense. The Hawks had almost perfect balance with 133 rushing yards

The Big Red of Nebraska and the Golden Buffaloes of Colorado will be thinking Orange when they meet Saturday in Boulder.

The winner will have the inside track to the Big 8 championship and the league's automatic Orange Bowl berth.

"I thought at the beginning of the season that Nebraska would be the team to beat, and I still feel that way," said Colorado Coach Bill McCartney. "We will have to play our very best to beat them."

last year's playoff game with a broken ankle, enjoyed one of his finest nights of the season.

He carried the ball 20 times for 146 yards from his halfback position, and scored a third quarter touchdown on a 2-yard run. His touchdown passes covered 12 yards to Brent Paulson and 4 yards to D.J. Doyle.

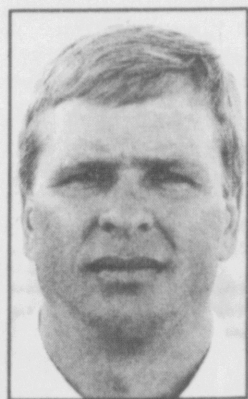
"We usually use (the halfback pass) on extra points, and it works real well, and tonight Coach decided to throw it in, and it really paid off," Morrison said.

"Coach really wanted to run the ball on Linn-Mar, and the linemen — they didn't need to talk or anything, they just showed it on the field."

The Cougars finished with 194 yards rushing and 154 passing. Quarterback Chad Wiese completed 10 of 16 passes for 138 yards and was intercepted twice. But the game's turning point was created by the Kennedy defense.

With Kennedy ahead, 12-6, Linn-Mar's Jason Feddersen intercepted a Wiese pass on the Cougar 17-yard line. Linn-Mar quarterback Ryan Driscoll dropped back to pass four straight times, and threw four straight incompletions, thanks to an aggressive pass rush and smothering coverage by the Cougars.

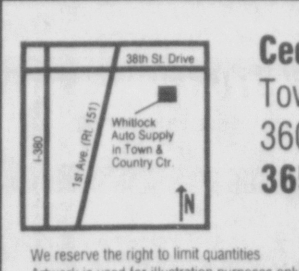
