Florida key to big Rose bash

here's a legitimate chance that the nation's two top college football teams will meet in the Rose Bowl.

No, I haven't taken extra hits from the helium tank. Not this early in the week, anyway. A few things, all well within the realm of possibility, must happen for Washington to be No. 1 and Michigan No. 2 when they tee it up in the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains.

First and foremost, neither Washington nor Michigan can lose until New Year's. Washington is at Southern California Saturday, then closes with cakewalks against Oregon State and Washington State. Michigan must still win at Illinois Nov. 16 and at home against Ohio State the following Saturday.

Those things seem likely. Since Washington is tied with Miami for No. 2 in the nation and Michigan is a mere No. 4, other forces will have to be at work for the Rose Bowl to have national title implications for the first time since Elvis was mistakenly presumed dead.

Top-ranked Florida State has to fall, and that's a tall order. Everything hinges on the Seminoles losing at Florida Nov. 30. That could happen. Florida is very good. Had the once-beaten Gators not lost at Syracuse Sept. 21, this year's FSU-Florida game would be the biggest thing to hit college football since, well, since the Miami-Florida State game two weeks before it.

Should Miami topple the Seminoles at Tallahassee, you can forget about a No. 1-versus-No. 2 Rose Bowl. Miami has two games left after Florida State, but won't lose to Boston College or San Diego State.

If FSU beats Miami, Michigan moves up to No. 3 in the rankings and Washington is the outright No. 2. Should No. 6 Florida then defeat Florida State, Washington and Michigan would probably be 1 and 2.

And what if Miami ties Florida State? The national title implications are unclear, but everyone outside the state of Florida will have a good laugh.

A Big Ten team playing for a national football title is a stunning thing to consider. This was written to brace you. You were warned here two weeks ago that Iowa could go 10-1 and settle for the Holiday Bowl, and now Indiana is the only real blockade for that scenario to occur.

Silence has turned to mumbles on that topic, and the mumbles will turn to audible griping. Had the Big Ten not shut itself out of the new bowl consortium, games as prestigious as the Cotton or Sugar might have wooed a 10-1 Iowa. Ah, well. Iowa hasn't beaten Indiana yet.

Here is the bowl lineup, if 999 things fall into place:

Rose: You already know this. Fiesta: Florida State-Notre Dame

Orange: Miami-Nebraska. Sugar: Florida-California. Cotton: Texas A&M-Alabama. Now it gets tough.

Florida Citrus: Clemson-Penn State. Hall of Fame: Colorado-East

Peach: North Carolina State-

Oklahoma

Gator: Syracuse-Georgia. Blockbuster: Tennessee-Ohio

'Former' Hawk fan Green coming back to Iowa

Trent Green had lots of good times as a little kid at Kinnick Stadium, cheering for

the Iowa Hawkeyes and scampering around the stands with his older brother. Green was born in Cedar Rapids, and even

after his family moved to Bloomington, Ill., when he was 6, he'd return to Iowa on football Saturdays and watch the Hawkeyes with his grandparents, who had season tickets for years and years.

"I grew up watching Iowa football," he

But Green laughingly describes himself as a "former" Hawkeye fan now, and for good reason. He's the star quarterback for the Indiana Hoosiers, and he'll be trying to beat the Hawks this Saturday at Kinnick.

"It's going to be very interesting," he said in a telephone interview. "I was just there for a family reunion in Iowa City in July. I got a chance to go over to the stadium and walk around and stuff like that. Yeah, I'm

Green might have played for the Hawkeyes if not for a guy named Jim Hartlieb. Both were considered for a scholarship in 1988, but Iowa's coaches gave the only QB grant that year to Hartlieb.

with the family ties to Chuck (Jim's older brother who was at Iowa) or not," said


But Green, who attended U of I football camps in high school, said he was not crushed by the turn of events. His rooting interest in the Hawkeyes waned after his family moved to St. Louis when he was in the sixth grade, and Iowa was not his only college opportunity.

He remembers thinking when he was not offered a scholarship, "That's fine with me, there are plenty of other places to go."

And now, ironically, it could be Green vs. Hartlieb this Saturday since Rodgers is questionable with a knee injury.

Green, a 6-foot-4, 215-pound junior, is having a banner year for the 25th-ranked Hoosiers. He's second in the Big Ten in total offense at 246.8 vards per game, and he's accounted for 17 touchdowns - 11 running

DUBUQUE — The members of the 1991 Cedar Rapids Kennedy football team are going to have nightmares about Dubuque Wahlert's Lance Massey and Dalzell Field.

Massey returned a third quarter pass interception for a touchdown to lead 10thranked Dubuque Wahlert to a 27-14 win over Kennedy in the quarterfinal round of the Class 4A prep football playoffs Monday night at chilly Dalzell.

The Golden Eagles (9-2) advance to Saturday's semifinal round against Bettendorf day for Wahlert.

It was the second time in 10 days the Cougars were beaten by Wahlert on the barren turf of Dalzell Field. The Golden Eagles won the regular-season finale Oct. 25, 22-8.

Regis pounds out OT win over Pella

PELLA — Jim Zachar scored on a 4-yard run in overtime to give Cedar Rapids Regis a 13-7 victory over Pella in a Class 3A quarterfinal prep football game Monday night.

The Royals (10-1) advance to Saturday's semifinals against Wamac Conference rival West Delaware. Pella ends the season 10-1.

Regis won the coin flip in overtime and chose to give Pella the ball first. Three runnning plays brought the ball to the 3-yard line, where on fourth down Rob Burns missed a 20-yard field goal.

On first down for Regis, quarterback Ross Wilken threw a 6-yard pass to Greg Hawthorne that brought the ball to the 4-yard line. On second down, Zachar found a hole off tackle and burst into the end zone for the winning score.


Zachar, who had 123 yards rushing, opened the scoring by scampering for a 62yard touchdown on Regis' first play of the game. His extra point made it, 7-0.

Pella stormed back to tie it midway through the second quarter when quarter-

Weather has price for IHSAA

Heavy snow and extreme cold temperatures in Iowa the past few days have played havoc with the high school football playoffs, and officials have been scrambling to find playable sites for quarterfinal games.

Iowa High School Athletic Association officials have had to rent the UNI-Dome in Cedar Falls for seven contests, three on Monday and four today, Iowa State University's Cyclone Stadium for a game this morning, and have even had to go out of state to rent the Dakota Dome in Vermillion, S.D., for four games.

"We've gotten a lot of cooperation from a lot of people," said Rick Wulkow of the Iowa High School Athletic Association. "We've just been scrambling."

Weather hit hardest in the Western part of Iowa, and schools from that part of the state have been particularly affected. Wulkow said this is the first time that teams have had to go out of state for playoff games. Two games were played in the Dakota Dome Monday night and two more will be played there this afternoon.

The UNI-Dome has long been a haven for high school football and Wulkow said UNI-Dome officials have been very helpful in providing several time slots to help alleviate scheduling problems. Iowa State was drawn into the fray when Roland-Story and Council Bluffs St. Albert found the original sight of their ballgame, Coon Rapids, unplayable.

"That's a part of the state where they were hit the hardest." Wulkow said. "Iowa State provided an open time slot.'

The moving of several games will leave the IHSAA's pocket book a bit lighter. Wulkow said that besides the obvious rental fee for places like the Dakota Dome and the UNI-Dome, each school is paid for travel expenses and for meals and overnight lodging if necessary. Regularseason fees are \$700 for a single game and \$1,000 for a doubleheader at the UNI-Dome. A fourgame day, like today, will cost the IHSAA \$2,000 plus an additional fee for support services.

"It's certainly going to cost us more money," Wulkow said.

The IHSAA gives a school \$600 for hosting a playoff game. Schools that would have hosted games will not receive host money or money that would have come in from concessions. The IHSAA will probably receive most, if not all, of the gate receipts from the neutral sites.

We're going to attempt to stay on schedule the best we can," Wulkow said about the remainder of the playoffs. "It's supposed to be nice (today) and then get cold again, so we'll see.'



ST. LOUIS (AP) — Unlike most coaches, University of Southern Illinois at Carbondale basketball coach Rich Herrin said Monday he relishes his team's selection as the front-runner.

"We're happy that the other coaches feel we have a good team," said Herrin, whose team was chosen as the one to beat in the Missouri Valley Conference this season, according to a poll of league coaches.

"I'd rather be picked at the top than at the bottom. We're kind of excited about it. Hopefully, we can live up to the challenge," said Herrin, in St. Louis Monday for the conference's media day.

With nine players coming back from last year's (18-14) National Invitational Tournament quarterfinalist team, including all-conference center Ashraf Amaya (15.3 points per game, 8.3 rebounds per game), Herrin's club was the overwhelming choice to win the conference title this season. Southern Illinois received seven first place votes and earned 71 points overall in

the poll. "I don't see being picked the favorite as being a disadvantage," Herrin said. "The only disadvantage I can see is that teams will be gunning a little more for you, but if you're on top of the league and playing well come February, they're going to be gunning for you any-

way. In addition to the 6-foot-8 Amaya, other starters who are returning for the Salukis include junior guard Tyrone Bell and swingman Kelvan Lawrence. While Southern Illinois might

have the team to beat on the floor, Herrin said he can't afford to take anything for granted. "There's a lot of talent in this league, and I'm telling you what, this is a coach's league," Herrin said. "There are some great coaches in this league like Tates
