Florida key to big Rose bash

There's a legitimate chance that the nation's two top college football teams will meet in the Rose Bowl.

No, I haven't taken extra hits from the helium tank. Not this early in the week, anyway. A few things, all well within the realm of possibility, must happen for Washington to be No. 1 and Michigan No. 2 when they tee it up in the foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains.

First and foremost, neither Washington nor Michigan can lose until New Year's. Washington is at Southern California Saturday, then closes with cake-walks against Oregon State and Washington State. Michigan must still win at Illinois Nov. 16 and at home against Ohio State the following Saturday.

Those things seem likely. Since Washington is tied with Miami for No. 2 in the nation and Michigan is a mere No. 4, other forces will have to be at work for the Rose Bowl to have national title implications for the first time since Elvis was mistakenly presumed dead.

Top-ranked Florida State has to fall, and that's a tall order. Everything hinges on the Seminoles losing at Florida Nov. 30. That could happen. Florida is very good. Had the once-beaten Gators not lost at Syracuse Sept. 21, this year's FSU-Florida game would be the biggest thing to hit college football since, well, since the Miami-Florida State game two weeks before it.

Should Miami topple the Seminoles at Tallahassee, you can forget about a No. 1-versus-No. 2 Rose Bowl. Miami has two games left after Florida State, but won't lose to Boston College or San Diego State.

If FSU beats Miami, Michigan moves up to No. 3 in the rankings and Washington is the outright No. 2. Should No. 6 Florida then defeat Florida State, Washington and Michigan would probably be 1 and 2.

And what if Miami ties Florida State? The national title implications are unclear, but everyone outside the state of Florida will have a good laugh.

A Big Ten team playing for a national football title is a stunning thing to consider. This was written to brace you. You were warned here two weeks ago that Iowa could go 10-1 and settle for the Holiday Bowl, and now Indiana is the only real blockade for that scenario to occur.

Silence has turned to mumbles on that topic, and the mumbles will turn to audible griping. Had the Big Ten not shut itself out of the new bowl consortium, games as prestigious as the Cotton or Sugar might have wooed a 10-1 Iowa. Ah, well. Iowa hasn't beaten Indiana yet.

Here is the bowl lineup, if 999 things fall into place:

Rose: You already know this.
Fiesta: Florida State-Notre Dame.

Orange: Miami-Nebraska.
Sugar: Florida-California.
Cotton: Texas A&M-Alabama. Now it gets tough.

Florida Citrus: Clemson-Penn State.

Hall of Fame: Colorado-East Carolina.

Peach: North Carolina State-Oklahoma.

Gator: Syracuse-Georgia.

Blockbuster: Tennessee-Ohio State.

Holiday: BYU-Iowa.

Hancock, Freedom, Copper, Aloha, Liberty, Independence: Who cares?

More importantly, the Big Ten robbed Northwestern of a shot to finish in the league's first division. The one Big Ten team the Wildcats don't face this season is Minnesota. That would have been the third conference win for Northwestern, with a possible fourth at Wisconsin.

'Former' Hawk fan Green coming back to Iowa

Trent Green had lots of good times as a little kid at Kinnick Stadium, cheering for the Iowa Hawkeyes and scampering around the stands with his older brother.

Green was born in Cedar Rapids, and even after his family moved to Bloomington, Ill., when he was 6, he'd return to Iowa on football Saturdays and watch the Hawkeyes with his grandparents, who had season tickets for years and years.

"I grew up watching Iowa football," he said.

But Green laughingly describes himself as a "former" Hawkeye fan now, and for good reason. He's the star quarterback for the Indiana Hoosiers, and he'll be trying to beat the Hawks this Saturday at Kinnick.

"It's going to be very interesting," he said in a telephone interview. "I was just there for a family reunion in Iowa City in July. I got a chance to go over to the stadium and walk around and stuff like that. Yeah, I'm

very excited."

Green might have played for the Hawkeyes if not for a guy named Jim Hartlieb. Both were considered for a scholarship in 1988, but Iowa's coaches gave the only QB grant that year to Hartlieb.

"I don't know if it had something to do

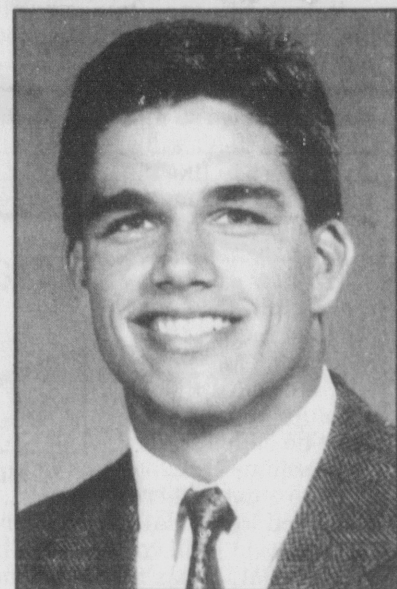
with the family ties to Chuck (Jim's older brother who was at Iowa) or not," said Green.

But Green, who attended U of I football camps in high school, said he was not crushed by the turn of events. His rooting interest in the Hawkeyes waned after his family moved to St. Louis when he was in the sixth grade, and Iowa was not his only college opportunity.

He remembers thinking when he was not offered a scholarship, "That's fine with me, there are plenty of other places to go."

And now, ironically, it could be Green vs. Hartlieb this Saturday since Rodgers is questionable with a knee injury.

Green, a 6-foot-4, 215-pound junior, is having a banner year for the 25th-ranked Hoosiers. He's second in the Big Ten in total offense at 246.8 yards per game, and he's accounted for 17 touchdowns — 11 running and six passing.

Wahlert bumps Cougars

DUBUQUE — The members of the 1991 Cedar Rapids Kennedy football team are going to have nightmares about Dubuque Wahlert's Lance Massey and Dalzell Field.

Massey returned a third quarter pass interception for a touchdown to lead 10th-ranked Dubuque Wahlert to a 27-14 win over Kennedy in the quarterfinal round of the Class 4A prep football playoffs Monday night at chilly Dalzell.

The Golden Eagles (9-2) advance to Saturday's semifinal round against Bettendorf

(9-2). Kennedy retires at 8-3.

It was the second time in 10 days the Cougars were beaten by Wahlert on the barren turf of Dalzell Field. The Golden Eagles won the regular-season finale Oct. 25, 22-8.

"(Kennedy) is a good football team," Wahlert Coach Mike Cooper said. "They're a big-play team, and they've won that way all year. We just had another great defensive effort, there's no question about that. I'm just happy to beat a good football team."

For the second time in 10 days, Massey came up with a defensive gem to save the day for Wahlert.

His interception halted a crucial Kennedy scoring drive in the Oct. 25 game. His pickoff of a Chad Wiese pass that he returned 35 yards for a TD with just 1:44 gone in the third quarter Monday gave the Golden Eagles a convincing 20-7 lead they never relinquished.

"Lance is a very good player," Cooper said. "His interception to start the second half got (Kennedy) down a little bit and got us pumped up to play some good defense."

Massey, an all-conference strong safety,

Regis pounds out OT win over Pella

PELLA — Jim Zachar scored on a 4-yard run in overtime to give Cedar Rapids Regis a 13-7 victory over Pella in a Class 3A quarterfinal prep football game Monday night.

The Royals (10-1) advance to Saturday's semifinals against Wamac Conference rival West Delaware. Pella ends the season 10-1.

Regis won the coin flip in overtime and chose to give Pella the ball first. Three running plays brought the ball to the 3-yard line, where on fourth down Rob Burns missed a 20-yard field goal.

On first down for Regis, quarterback Ross Wilken threw a 6-yard pass to Greg Hawthorne that brought the ball to the 4-yard line. On second down, Zachar found a hole off tackle and burst into the end zone for the winning score.

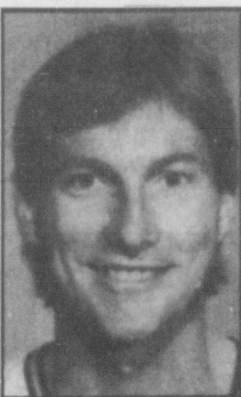
Zachar, who had 123 yards rushing, opened the scoring by scampering for a 62-yard touchdown on Regis' first play of the game. His extra point made it, 7-0.

Pella stormed back to tie it midway through the second quarter when quarter-

back Steve Brand threw an 8-yard touchdown pass to Burns, who also kicked the extra point to make it 7-7.

Both teams struggled offensively the rest of the game, partially because of an icy field and an extremely cold night.

"It was an unbelievable offensive struggle," Regis Coach Gaylord Hauschildt said. "I made a prediction to someone earlier that three touchdowns would win the game. I never thought one in overtime would win it."

Hansen for Hopson: Ex-Iowa star traded to Bulls

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The Sacramento Kings acquired shooting guard Dennis Hopson from the Chicago Bulls on Monday in exchange for former University of Iowa guard Bob Hansen and a 1992 second-round draft pick.

"We're very pleased to acquire a young shooting guard that still has outstanding potential. Dennis Hopson will have an opportunity to enhance his career," said Jerry Reyn-

olds, Kings player personnel director.

The Kings acquired guard Mitch Richmond from Golden State last week in exchange for the rights to forward Billy Owens.

Hopson was dealt to the Bulls from the New Jersey Nets last season for several draft picks. Playing in 61 games for NBA champion Chicago, he averaged 4.3 points playing 11.9 minutes per game.

Hopson, originally the third pick in the 1987 NBA college draft by New Jersey, averaged 9.6 points as a rookie. In the following two seasons with the Nets he averaged 12.7 and 15.8.

As a senior at Ohio State, Hopson was the Big Ten Player of the Year and the second-leading scorer in the nation at 29 points per game.

Hansen, acquired by the Kings from the Utah Jazz before the

1990-91 season, played in a career-low 36 games for Sacramento. He was sidelined by two surgeries — for torn cartilage in his left knee and then in his right shoulder.

Jerry Krause, Bulls vice president of basketball operations, said Hansen is a "tough, no-nonsense competitor with eight NBA seasons behind him. He was an excellent performer while at Utah."

Tyrrell's late heroics lift West Delaware

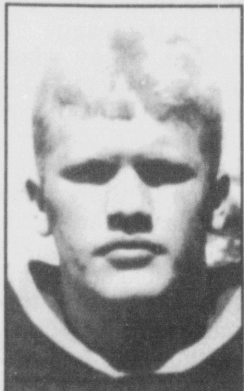

CEDAR FALLS — Adam Tyrrell had been having a terrible night throwing the ball for the West Delaware Hawks. But he hit the big passes when they were most needed.

Tyrrell hit Jeff Soppe with an 11-yard scoring strike with 28 seconds to play as West Delaware upset defending Class 3A champion Waverly-Shell Rock, 9-8, Monday night in a quarterfinal game at the UNI-Dome.

The win avenged a first-round loss to the Go-Hawks from a year ago.

against fellow Wamac Conference member Regis, a 13-7 overtime winner over Pella Monday. Regis beat West Delaware for the Wamac crown.

Waverly-Shell Rock bows out 8-3.

Trailing 8-3, West Delaware dodged a bullet when Ben Woltz's 17-yard field goal attempt sailed wide right with 6:45 to play.

Tyrrell, who had passed poorly to that point, then caught fire, completing tosses of 12, 11 and 29 yards to move the ball to the Waverly-Shell Rock 20. He finished with 10 completes in 25 attempts for 136 yards.

But on third-and-9 from the 19, Tyrrell was intercepted for a fourth time when Matt Paulsen stepped in front of Mark Lyness at the 13.

After pushing Waverly-Shell Rock back to the 10 and forcing a punt, West Delaware had another chance.

Rick Hilby gathered in the punt at his own 48 and returned it to the Go-Hawks' 25.

Tyrrell's 16-yard pass on third-and-12 gave the Hawks a first down at the 11 with under a minute to play.

Tyrrell then hit Nick Doyle over the middle but Doyle dropped the pass in the end zone.

After a Waverly-Shell Rock timeout, Tyrrell spotted Jeff Soppe with the winning score. Tyrrell's PAT pass was intercepted.

Hilby's 56-yard run on the second half's first play from scrimmage moved West Delaware to the Waverly-Shell Rock 13. Tom Harn made a touchdown-saving tackle for the Go-Hawks.

West Delaware came up empty, however, when Tyrrell was intercepted. Paulsen picked off the pass near the 5 and returned it to the Go-Hawks' 48.

Waverly-Shell Rock held an 8-3 lead at halftime.

Harn's 15-yard slant-in strike to Chris Davis with 8:45 left in the first half put Waverly-Shell Rock ahead, 6-3. The Go-Hawks added a two-point conversion when, lined up with a wall to the east side of the field, the ball was hiked to Chad Briggs who plowed in for the score.

The first of two interceptions by the Go-Hawks' Greg Woodin set up the score. Woodin nabbed Tyrrell's aerial at the West Delaware 21 and returned it for a touchdown but the score was negated by a clipping penalty.

Two previous Waverly-Shell Rock drives were thwarted by incomplete passes deep in West

Delaware territory.

After halting Waverly-Shell Rock at the West Delaware 33, the Hawks moved 56 yards in nine plays before stalling out at the Gohawks' 13. Jeff Harris' 30-yard field goal gave West Delaware a 3-0 lead with 2:48 left in the first quarter.

Hilby finished with 150 yards on 22 carries.

West Branch 7 Pekin 0

■ CEDAR FALLS — The West Branch Bears dominated everything but the score in advancing to the semifinal round of the Class 1A prep football playoffs.

The third-ranked Bears rolled up 318 yards of offense and held Pekin to 137, but had to overcome 110 yards of penalties.

West Branch (11-0) advanced to the semifinals against West Marshall, which beat East Buchanan Monday night. Playoff semifinals are slated Saturday, but West Branch officials said they had indications it could be Friday in UNI-Dome.

Pekin finished 9-2.

"We were lucky to make that many penalties and still win the game. It says a lot about our kids," said West Branch Coach Butch Pedersen.

West Branch senior Kevin Braddock rushed for 95 yards, senior quarterback J.D. Grimm shrugged off an injured leg to throw for 134 yards and the Bears set a school record for wins in a season.

"I don't think we played that well offensively, but our defense played great," said Grimm, whose 8-yard pass to junior Ryan Glazebrook with 5:32 left in the first quarter capped a 59-yard drive and accounted for the game's only score.

"I'm real sore," said Grimm, who did not start the Bears' first-round game with Columbus Junction because of a hamstring injury. "I took a hit in the first quarter and it stiffened up. Then it really started hurting."

Grimm did not show any ill-effects. He completed 10 of 15 passes and carried the ball six times for 17 yards, mainly on rollout keepers.

"He's got a lot of guts," Pedersen said of Grimm.

Grimm appeared to score another touchdown when he sneaked from 1-yard out on fourth down early in the fourth quarter. He was ruled down an inch or two shy of the goal line.

West Marshall 25 East Buchanan 13

■ CEDAR FALLS — Second-ranked West Marshall rolled up 397 yards and held off a late East Buchanan in a Class 1A quarterfinal at the UNI-Dome.

"They got the breaks in the first half and we got 'em late in the game," said East Buchanan Coach Mike Stafford, whose 10th-ranked Bucs finished the season 9-1.

West Marshall rolled up 249 yards in building an 18-0 lead by halftime. The Trojans had scoring drives of 80, 58 and 76 yards.

East Buchanan came back in the second half with a 58-yard drive of its own. Jason Short's 3-yard plunge off right tackle capped the 12-play drive that pulled the Bucs within 25-7 with 16 seconds left in the third quarter.

East Buchanan got the ball back when Joe Moroney intercepted a Surber pass in the end zone and returned it to the Bucs 8. Five plays later, the Bucs struck paydirt when Jeremy James found Nick Gallery from 18 yards out to pull East Buchanan within 25-13 with 6:30 left.

Wiese was effective at times, completing 11 of 21 passes for 184 yards. D.J. Doyle caught five of those for 133 yards.

Wahlert jumped to a 14-0 first quarter lead by scoring touch-

downs on its first two possessions. The first was on a 2-yard run by Chris Helle with 7:28 left in the first quarter and the second on a 46-yard option keeper by quarterback Matt Lovell with 3:41 left.

Kennedy never really recovered, although Morrison's first score on a 3-yard run with 3:39 left in the half cut Wahlert's halftime lead to 14-7.

Following Massey's interception return, Kennedy cut the lead to 20-14 when Morrison scored from 2 yards out. The TD was set up by a 68-yard pass from Wiese to Doyle that gave the Cougars a first-and-goal on the Golden Eagle 5.

Kennedy couldn't get a another drive going, however, and Helle ran in for the final TD of the game from 19 yards out with just 44 seconds left.

Lovell completed 5 of 10 passes for 71 yards, all to tight end Andy Petitgout.

Jeff, Cougars top Metro team

Green, Peyton, Fottral, Marovich are unanimous 1st team picks

Regional qualifiers Jefferson and Kennedy landed two players each on the all-Metro Volleyball team.

J-Hawk middle hitters Amy Fottral and Karen Schulte were selected as were the Cougars' middle hitter Kate Marovich and outside hitter Stephenie Wilson.

The seventh-rated J-Hawks play North Scott at Eldridge tonight at 8. The Cougars play 10th-rated Benton-Norway at 6:30 at Iowa City West.

Washington senior Stephanie Green, Linn-Mar senior Deha Peyton, Fottral and Marovich were unanimous selections to the all-Metro team. Prairie senior Marcy Brinegar and Regis senior Jenny McEnany round out the first team.

Fottral, a 6-1 senior, leads the J-Hawks in kills, kill efficiency and blocking. She set a season school record in blocks last year and is approaching the school's career mark.

Schulte, a 6-2 junior, ranks second on the team in kills and blocks, and is third with a .304 kill efficiency and 148 digs in the regular season. At 98 percent, she leads the J-Hawks in serving.

Marovich, a 5-11 junior, finished the regular

season with a .399 kill efficiency, 92 percent serving, and averages of 5.2 kills and 2.1 blocks. She eclipsed Rhonda Gardemann's season kill record last Friday, bringing her total to 561 with Gardemann in the audience.

Wilson, a 5-7 senior, leads the Cougars with her 97.5 percent serving and 3.4 digs per game. She ranks second in kills with three per game.

Green, a 5-11 outside hitter, ended the regular season with a .344 kill efficiency and 92 percent serving, and averages of 3.8 kills and 1.8 digs.

Peyton, a 5-9 outside hitter, led the Lions with 99 percent serving, a .252 kill efficiency, 27 blocks and averages of 2.8 kills and 2.3 digs.

Brinegar, a 5-5 outside hitter, led the Hawks in serving, serve reception and digs. She served 98.5 percent and averaged 2.59 digs. She ranked second on the team with 36 ace serves.

McEnany, a 5-10 outside hitter, led the Royals in kills (1.6), serve reception (83 percent) and digs (2.3).

EARNING SPOTS on the second team are junior Lisa Forquer of Linn-Mar, junior Stacy Winistorfer of Marion, senior Deanna Kramme and junior Christy Hebert of Jefferson, senior Taya Hovan of LaSalle, juniors Heather Bohr and Tammy Millard of Washington, and senior Amy Hosek of Prairie.

Zeller has high hopes for state

The sport of gymnastics is no longer available to Iowa high school athletes. But thanks to diving competition, its legacy lives on.

Jefferson junior Sara Zeller is just one of many young athletes carrying that legacy forward.

"I didn't start diving until I was a freshman in high school, but I was involved in gymnastics

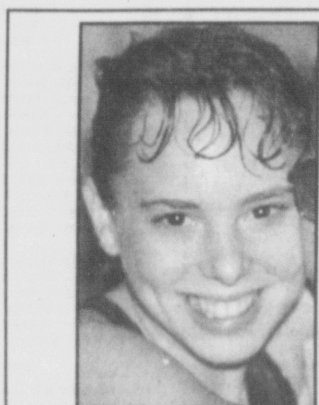
long before that," said Zeller, who used her expertise to win the district diving crown last Saturday at the Washington pool. "My gymnastic training helps me a lot with the twists and somersaults I use in diving."

Something was working well for Zeller at the district meet. She won the 11-dive competition with a point total 364.25, just edging Mandy Zeaske of Washington.

"I was pretty consistent with all 11 of my dives," she said of her performance. "I really didn't go out there thinking I'd take first place. My top priority was just getting back to state."

The state meet is this weekend in Fort Dodge, with the diving competition slated for Friday night at the Fort Dodge High School pool. Zeller was third at last year's state meet.

She entered the districts ranked fifth in the state, according to the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union's most recent power ratings. Zeller's district championship followed what she characterized as a disappointing fourth-place finish at the Mississippi Valley Confer-

ence meet just nine days earlier.

"I don't concentrate much on power ratings," she admitted. "I read them, but I don't think they mean a whole lot as long as I go out there and do my best."

"I was a little bit disappointed with my performance at the conference meet, but it made me want to go out and do better at districts."

Zeller trailed a pair of Iowa City High divers — defending state champion Amy Kaduce and Lindsay Clemons — and Zeaske in the final standings at the Valley meet. She's hoping to turn the tables Friday night in Fort Dodge.

"I'm confident I can have a

good state meet," she said.

Zeller and Zeaske have battled each other for most of two seasons now, but the rivalry is not a vindictive one.

"We've been friends a long time," Zeller said. "We use to take gymnastics together."

Her gymnastics training isn't the only thing that has helped Zeller become one of the top divers in the state. She said a lot of the credit goes to Dick Wilson, her diving coach at Jefferson.

"He helps me with my technique," she said. "He can watch and see what I'm doing wrong as far as my board work and my entry."

Zeller manages to keep very busy when not in the swimming pool. She serves as a wrestling cheerleader during the winter sports season and is a member of several vocal groups, including Jefferson's well-known and well-respected West Side Delegation.

State trips on line in 2A

In Region 5, Oelwein faces second-ranked Dubuque Wahlert at Dubuque, where Dubuque Senior plays Cedar Falls at 6:30.

Jefferson's Region 7 match will be at Eldridge. The seventh-rated J-Hawks play host North Scott at 8 p.m. Clinton and Davenport North square off at 6:30.

Benton vs. Kennedy

■ Senior Stephenie Wilson was a sophomore on Kennedy's 1989 state tournament team. That year, the unranked Cougars ousted fifth-ranked Jefferson in the regional semifinals.

"Stephenie's playing with the determination of a senior. She's going all out," said Kennedy Coach Rose Elvidge said.

Junior Kate Marovich leads the Cougar attack. Marovich set a school record for kills in a season Friday against West. She has 561 and a five-per-game average, and records two blocks a game.

Sophomore Tammy Brauer is playing the best volleyball of the season and will need to continue in order for the Cougars to extend their season, said Elvidge. The whole team will have to be on, she added.

District champion Benton-Norway hasn't lost a game since Sept. 17, when it fell in three games to Wamac winner South Tama.

In nine postseason games, Tanya Schminke (44 of 44) and Jolene Clinton (28 of 28) haven't missed a serve.

Jefferson vs. N. Scott

■ As district runners-up, the J-Hawks go into tonight's match as somewhat of an underdog.

Jefferson beat North Scott, 2-0, in pool play at the Bettendorf tournament Oct. 5.

"The biggest motivation we have is Friday night," said Jefferson Coach Jim Cox. "We beat Clinton earlier too. We've very much reminded ourselves it doesn't matter what you do earlier in the season. If we win it would be very natural to get up for North Scott."
