30 days till GBA tip-off

One month from today, professional basketball returns to Cedar Rapids.

A month. That's not much time for a team without a nickname or, officially, without a head coach. Rich Wolfe, the owner/creator of the Cedar Rapids Global Basketball Association franchise, is still in the process of raising the capital to pay Rick Barry's \$150,000 salary.

Barry, the former NBA superstar, will coach here. Wolfe has told too many people Barry will be his coach. Not landing him would be a public relations disaster.

Wolfe's real sales pitch will begin in earnest next week. He believes the best way to market a new pro basketball team is to hold the advertising reins until the month before the first game. He has said his media blitz will begin soon.

He says you can't compete against college football for a sports fan's attention in September, and now you have baseball's postseason. Once the World Series concludes and basketball weather sets in, Wolfe will try to take center stage in Cedar Rapids and Eastern Iowa.

Wolfe said he has advertisements and billboards ready to go. The team name and logo will most likely have a corporate tie-in. Players will be brought in. Wolfe said former Los Angeles Laker Mychal Thompson may be a player/assistant coach.

None of this is to say Wolfe has been waiting patiently for the calendar to skip ahead to late October. He's been working long days visiting as many local business leaders and service groups as possible.

Among Wolfe's primary selling points to the powers that be: 1) the team would be good for Cedar Rapids' financial health; 2) the team would be good for the city's national image; 3) they're not the Silver Bullets.

The late, not-so-lamented Silver Bullets endeavor is Wolfe's shining example to people of how he says he won't do business. He tells them the Silver Bullets didn't deliver enough entertainment to merit their rather high ticket prices, and he tells them in so many words that the Silver Bullets weren't in touch with the community from which they profited.

THE \$64,000 question lingers, and will linger until at least Nov. 16, when the SouthGA (Albany, Ga.) Blues visit the Five Seasons Center to face the Cedar Rapids Whatevers. Will this thing fly?

"I think it has a great chance," Wolfe said, to no great surprise, while walking toward downtown Cedar Rapids Thursday morning after trying to interest one of the city's top hospital administrators in a corporate ticket package.

"My dream is to build a prototype minor-league basketball franchise," Wolfe said. "I'm getting a lot of support from people in this city. Many of them were never really involved with the Silver Bullets."

Wolfe is promising almost everything but the kitchen sink for his team's opening night. He talks about having the San Diego Chicken, the Bud Light Daredevils, Miss Teen USA and former St. John's coach Lou Carnesecca all in the Five Seasons Center that night. And, he says, he's working on getting Harry Caray to visit and sing "Take Me Out to the Ballgame."

That's just Game 1. "We'll have 7,000 salesmen on the street the next morning," Wolfe tells potential customers. Undoubtedly, some will read that statement and scoff. The Silver Bullets never sold out the Five Seasons (basketball capacity: 7,247) in their three-year existence. It's a safe bet the GBA never had a crowd of 7,000 anywhere last season, its first.

It's difficult to imagine Harry Caray leaving Palm Springs in November to come to Cedar Rapids for any price.

It's not so hard to picture a Wolfe media assault in the next month that grabs the public's attention.

Classic prep confrontation tonight

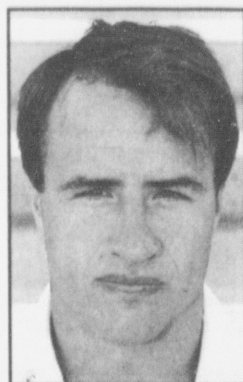
It's City High's potent offense vs. Jeff's stalwart defense

Jim Dostal thinks he knows a sure-fire way to shut down the explosive Iowa City High offense.

"Go recruit guys from Miami, Fla., who have size and 4.5 speed (in the 40-yard dash)," said Dostal, the second-year coach at Cedar Rapids Jefferson who will take his Class 4A third-ranked J-Hawks to Iowa City tonight to face the fourth-ranked Little Hawks in a key Mississippi Valley Conference football game.

Dostal was kidding, of course. But the J-Hawk defense, an impenetrable force

through the first six weeks of the season, will face its biggest challenge tonight. Kickoff is slated for 7:45 at Bates Field.

Both teams are 6-0, tied for the top spot in the Mississippi Division of the MVC.

The winner will not only take over the position as front-runner in the race for the Valley title, but will effectively wrap up a Class 4A playoff berth, as well.

The game is being billed as a classic

matchup between the City High offense, which averages almost 400 yards a game, against a Jefferson defense that is surrendering an average of only 117 yards per game.

City High has scored 234 points in its first six games — 109 more than Cedar Falls, the No. 2 team in the MVC in point production — while Jefferson has surrendered only 22. The J-Hawks have posted four shutouts.

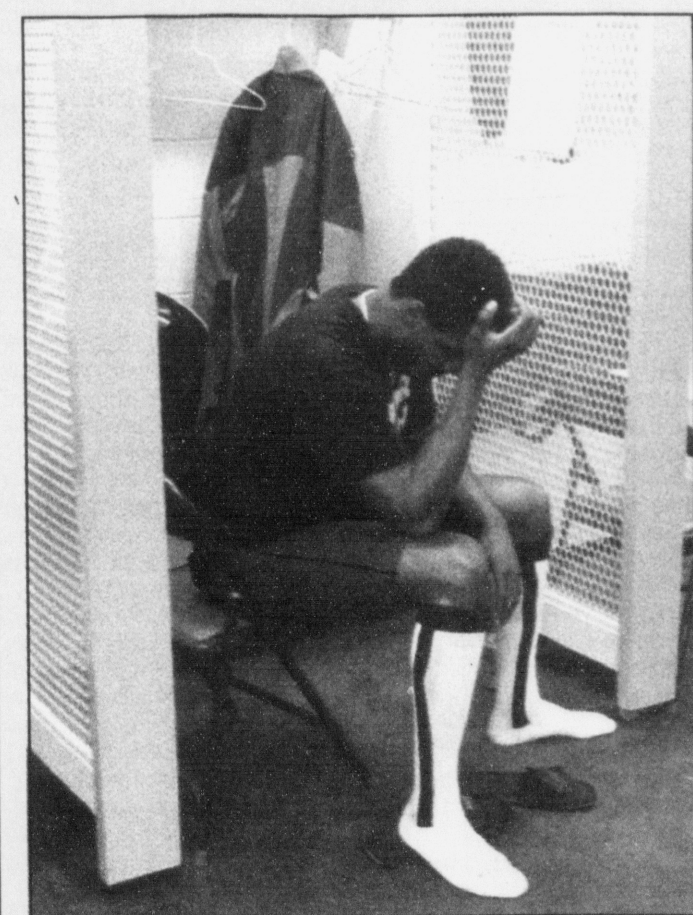
But both Dostal and City High Coach Larry Brown know the game will involve a lot more than how well the Little Hawks are able to move the ball against the J-Hawks.

"I think that simplifies things way too much," said Brown, in his 14th year at City High. "For one thing, I think we've got a pretty good defense, too, and I think

Purdy fits in well with Iowa's 'bulls'

IOWA CITY — The next generation of "Baby Bulls" is starting to arrive for the University of Iowa football team.

It happened last Saturday, when Matt Purdy stepped in for Ted Velicer at left guard and played a big part in Iowa's 23-22 victory over Wisconsin.

Purdy, from Cedar Falls, is one of the young bulls who perform on the offensive line for Iowa. There are seven of them, and they all signed with the Hawks in 1991 — Aaron Kooiker, Evan Kooiker, Casey Wiegmann, Jeremy Truog, Mark Hornok, Troy Foster and Purdy. They're all red-shirt freshmen now, and they're waiting in the bullpen to take over.

The "old" Baby Bulls — Mike Devlin, Scott Davis, Mike Feroni and Velicer — graduate this year. The next generation is ready.

"Another era of the Baby Bulls," said Purdy. "That's how we're being brought up right now."

Purdy got his first chance last week. Velicer was injured against Wisconsin, and he'll be sidelined at least three weeks following arthroscopic knee surgery.

All of a sudden, Purdy is a starter.

"I'll have a lot of jitters as the week goes on," he said Tuesday. "As soon as that first snap is over I'll be fine."

"Even when I got in last Saturday, my stomach was jumping

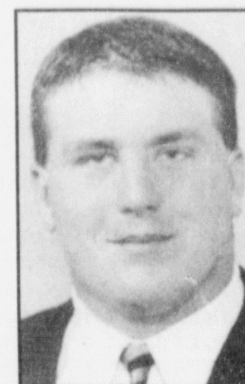

around like crazy the first couple of snaps. From then on things kind of clicked for me."

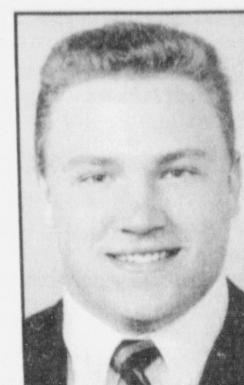
It helped when Purdy looked to his left and saw Davis, a fifth-year senior, at tackle. He looked to his right and saw Devlin, a fifth-year senior, at center. A little further to his right was Feroni, another fifth-year senior, at right guard.

Those guys have been around forever, and they were there to help.

But it worked both ways.

Davis, injured at Colorado Sept. 26, hadn't played or practiced in three weeks, and he wasn't expecting to play against Wisconsin. But when Bill Lange, his replacement, got injured against the Badgers, Davis was thrust into action.

A little foggy on his assignments, Davis got in the game and looked to his right for help and saw Purdy, a red-shirt freshman who hadn't played much all year.

It turned out OK. "When I came in the game on Saturday there were a couple of times I wasn't sure who I had," said Davis. "I went, 'Matt, who are you blocking?,' and he'd point to his guy. And I'd go, 'Who am I blocking?,' and he pointed to my guy."

"I said, 'Wow, he's going to be something special.'"

Purdy was right 100 percent of the time.

"I was glad he was so mentally sharp," said Davis.

O'Shea, Woods spark key win for Kennedy

The Cedar Rapids Kennedy football team discovered a potent new combination Thursday night, and may have unlocked the door to the Class 4A playoffs in the process.

Junior quarterback Scott O'Shea threw a pair of touchdown passes, and senior wingback Aaron Woods contributed just about every way possible offensively, leading Kennedy to a 20-17 upset of ninth-ranked Cedar Falls in a crucial Mississippi Valley Conference game at cold and wet Kingston Stadium.

Kennedy, which won for the third straight time, improved to 5-2 and moved into a third-place tie in the Mississippi Division of the Valley with Cedar Falls. The Tigers lost for the second time this season on the Kingston turf, and are also 5-2.

Trailing 17-14 with 7:32 left in the game, O'Shea — making his first varsity start in place of an injured Jarvis Allison — guided the Cougars downfield on 65-yard game-winning drive.

He dished to Woods on counter-trap plays twice for 30 yards and handed to Eric Martin five other times for 35 more during

the deciding drive. Martin ran straight ahead for the final 11 yards, plunging into the end zone with 4:47 left in the game.

The Kennedy defense shut down Cedar Falls on its ensuing possession, and Kennedy ran out the clock.

"This is a great win," Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "O'Shea came to play. He did a great job at quarterback. And Woody — he's just a player. He complemented Martin so well when we put him at wingback, and I think it gave (the Tigers) a different look than they were expecting."

O'Shea completed six of nine passes for 82 yards. Woods caught five of those for 64 yards, including a 20-yarder for a TD in the third quarter. The other scoring reception was by Matt Horak, an 18-yarder for the Cougars' first TD on their first possession of the game.

Woods finished with 199 all-purpose yards. He rushed four times for 50 yards and returned two kickoffs for 85 yards to go

Surprising Vikings make it 5-1 with stroll by punchless Lions

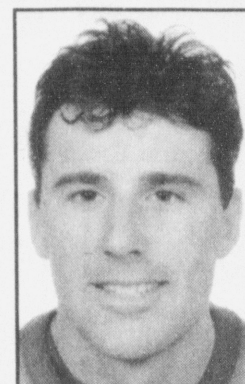
MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — This time, Rich Gannon and the Minnesota Vikings didn't wait. Now it looks like the Detroit Lions will have to wait until next year.

Gannon, who rallied the Vikings from a 20-point fourth-period deficit to a 21-20 victory over Chicago in their previous game, quarterbacked them to a 24-0 lead Thursday night and Minnesota beat punchless Detroit, 31-14.

"We jumped out hard and fast. We felt there would be chances to make big plays down the field," said first-year Coach Dennis Green, whose Vikings have lost only once in 10 games — including four exhibitions. "We like where we're sitting right now. We like being in first. We like it a lot."

The Vikings (5-1), one of the NFL's surprise teams after going 14-18 the last two seasons, took a 1½-game lead in the NFC Central. The last time they had a better start was 1976, when they went 5-0-1 en route to the Super Bowl.

Defending division champion Detroit (1-5) has lost once more than it did all last season,

when it reached the conference title game.

"When you go from the penthouse to the outhouse, you hurt, man," Detroit's Chris Spielman said. "When you've got big expectations and you don't reach them, it hurts."

Said Lions Coach Wayne Fontes: "We left the locker room with tremendous enthusiasm, and a very fine team just beat us. No excuses. We didn't think we were flat. They're just better than us."

Gannon completed 8 of 10 passes for 146 yards and two touchdowns before leaving early in the second quarter with a hyperextended left knee.

"I was excited about how we were playing. We were making big plays," said Gannon, who also reagggravated a thumb injury.

Green said he expects Gannon to play in Minnesota's next game, Oct. 25 against Washington.

Gannon's replacement, Sean Salisbury, struggled before clinching the victory with a 29-yard touchdown pass to Cris Carter 1:26 into the fourth period.

Carter, who tied a club record by catching a TD pass for the fourth consecutive game, was one of three Minnesota receivers with long scoring receptions. Gannon hit Anthony Carter from 47 yards and Hassan Jones from 43.

McCarver steamed at Deion

■ NEW YORK — Tim McCarver says Atlanta Braves outfielder Deion Sanders committed an act of cowardice when he dumped ice water on him three times, and he wants National League president Bill White to do something about it.

Sanders poured the ice water on the CBS announcer after Wednesday night's game, when the Braves beat Pittsburgh.

After he was doused a third time while doing interviews, McCarver said he went in search of Sanders in the Braves clubhouse.

"I didn't know what I would do or say, but as I was going toward the middle of the clubhouse, Sanders was creeping up with another tub of water," McCarver said. "He tried to hit me with another tub that missed me, and I said, 'You know, Deion, you're a real man, you are a real man.' I thought it was a deliberate, cowardly act."

Sanders questioned McCarver's label of coward.

"How can you be a coward for throwing water on someone?" Sanders asked. "This guy didn't want us to win and we did. We were throwing water on everybody, he just got wetter than anybody else. It's flat ignorant of him. He's more of a coward."

Enough for Lansford

■ OAKLAND, Calif. — In his last game in the majors, Carney Lansford was the last man out of Oakland's locker room.

"It took so long for me to take the uniform off for the last time," a weeping Lansford said. "It's not as easy as I thought it would be."

Lansford knew at the start of this season it would be his last, but that didn't make it any easier to say goodbye Wednesday night in Toronto after the A's lost the sixth and deciding game of the American League playoffs.

Perez eyes skipper's post

■ CINCINNATI — Hitting instructor Tony Perez would consider managing for another team if the Cincinnati Reds choose someone else to replace Lou Piniella.

Perez said Thursday he'd like to manage in the big leagues, a major switch for the former Cincinnati star, who's had no managerial ambitions until now.

"Right now, after six years of coaching, I think I'm ready for a manager's job," Perez said in a telephone interview. "It's not only with the Reds. I'm open to anybody who wants to talk."

Perez is considered a leading in-house candidate to replace Piniella.

Marlins like Lachemann

■ MIAMI — The Florida Marlins reportedly want to hire Oakland A's third-base coach Rene Lachemann as their first manager, but he was preparing Thursday to fly to Arizona, not to Miami.

"I have not talked to anybody (from the Marlins), and I've been here all day," Lachemann said from the A's clubhouse at the Oakland Coliseum. "I have not signed a contract. We have not even talked about a contract."

Several South Florida media outlets said Lachemann would be offered the job. The Marlins confirmed they had made a decision on whom to hire.

McSherry still hospitalized

■ ATLANTA — Umpire John McSherry remained hospitalized Thursday evening after leaving Game 7 of the National League playoffs complaining of dizziness.

McSherry, 48, was listed in fair condition at Piedmont Hospital, a spokeswoman said.

Refs blew the call

■ ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Officials were mistaken about a controversial, fourth-quarter fumble call Saturday that allowed Air Force to defeat Navy, the supervisor of officials for the Big East Conference said.

Daniel E. Wooldridge, in a letter received Thursday by Navy athletic director Jack Lengyel, said conversations with the game's officiating crew and a review of game film persuaded him that a mistake was made.

Air Force retained possession, and, two plays later, kicked the game-winning field goal for the final score of 18-16.

Starting nods go to Morris, Glavine

ATLANTA (AP) — Baseball took a day off to catch its breath Thursday, following a hysterical victory by the Atlanta Braves and a historical one by the Toronto Blue Jays.

Neither team worked out, and only one piece of news emerged: It will be right-hander Jack Morris of the Blue Jays against lefty Tom Glavine of the Braves in Game 1 Saturday night in Atlanta.

Two hours after the Blue Jays beat Oakland 9-2 Wednesday to win the AL playoffs, Morris was pitching in the secluded bullpen at the SkyDome, already tuning up for his next assignment. Morris was the MVP of the World Series last October, winning it with a 10-inning shutout against Atlanta in Game 7, and the Braves have not yet decided who will oppose him this time.

Toronto's triumph meant the World Series would move out of the United States for the first time. Manager Cito Gaston and pitching coach

Galen Cisco showed at the SkyDome briefly and talked about whether to add Jimmy Key to the pitching rotation, and they're leaning that way.

The Blue Jays were scheduled to take an early flight Friday to Atlanta, and planned to practice later in the afternoon at Fulton County Stadium.

The ballpark in Atlanta was empty. Braves Manager Bobby Cox spent the day at home, and was said to be resting his hoarse voice after Wednesday night's thrilling, 3-2 victory over Pittsburgh in Game 7.

Atlanta scored three times in the ninth inning, two on pinch-hitter Francisco Cabrera's two-out single. Sid Bream slid home just ahead of the tag, causing a huge pileup of Braves at the plate and pinning the hard-luck loss on Doug Drabek.

"I thought our chances were slim, but you never give up in this business," Braves General Manager John Schuerholz said Thursday. "That's the wonder of baseball. One swing of the bat and your fortunes change."

Cabrera knows that as well as anyone. He played for Toronto in 1989, albeit only three games as a catcher. Since then, he has bounced back and forth between the majors and minors in the Braves' system.

"I thought to myself, 'we're going to win this game because I want to go to Toronto,'" Cabrera said. "I was sure we were going to win. I'm very happy because I'll see my old teammates."

Cabrera was added to the Braves' playoff roster only a day or so before it was set. Atlanta and Toronto can change their rosters again before the Series, and there was speculation that Deion Sanders might be dropped by the Braves.

Hawkeye will play with 1 kidney

IOWA CITY — Billy Ennis-Inge, a freshman defensive end at the University of Iowa, will have one of his kidneys removed after the 1992 football season, his mother said Thursday.

Ennis-Inge will continue practicing with the Hawkeyes this year. He plans to resume his football career at Iowa after the operation, according to his mother.

Beverly Inge said her son has an "irregular" kidney, but she declined to specify the exact nature of the problem. She said a decision to remove the kidney was made this week.

"It won't affect him at all," she said in a telephone interview from her home in Kirkwood, Mo.

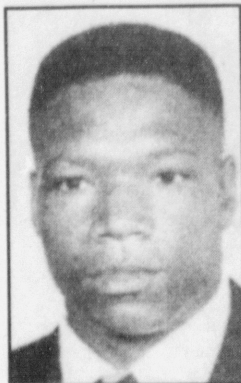
She said doctors have given her son permission to continue playing football. They left the final decision up to Inge and his family.

Tuesday, Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said Ennis-Inge had an ailment that could threaten his football career. "He's going to be a fine football player, if they let him continue," Fry said at the time.

Ennis-Inge, who is 6-foot-5 and 215 pounds, signed with the Hawkeyes last February after being named a high school all-American by SuperPrep magazine.

Playing football with just one kidney can be dangerous. U of I doctors did not let Aaron Norvell, now a linebacker at Wisconsin, join the Hawkeyes in 1988 after learning he had only one kidney.

Norvell has not had any kidney-related problems while playing for the Badgers.

JINXED CAPTAINS — Serving as captain for the Iowa Hawkeyes has been a risky proposition this season.

In four straight games, one of Iowa's captains has been knocked out of action with an injury.

Mike Devlin and Bret Bielema were named permanent captains last spring, and Devlin has survived the 1992 season without mishap. He's the lucky one.

Bielema suffered a knee injury against Michigan Oct. 3. He had arthroscopic surgery and is sidelined several weeks.

Coaches also appoint honorary captains each week. Three of them have been hurt.

Scott Davis, an offensive tackle, injured his left knee at Colorado Sept. 26. He missed the Michigan game and returned to action last Saturday against Wisconsin.

Teddy Jo Faley, a linebacker, served as one of the honorary captains against Iowa State Sept. 12 and broke his ankle.

Ted Velicer, an offensive guard, was one of the captains against Wisconsin last week and suffered a knee injury. He had arthroscopic surgery and will be sidelined about three weeks.

UNI STILL OK — Big Ten teams need at least eight wins against Division I-A opponents to assure themselves a spot in the Citrus and Holiday Bowls, which have contracts with the league.

Fry said the eight-win stipulation would not prevent him from playing UNI, a Division I-AA team. "Any time we win eight games in a season, there would be a bowl out there that would love to have the Hawks," he said.

ODDS AND ENDS — Iowa ran 98 offensive plays against Wisconsin, the most ever by the Hawkeyes during Fry's 14 years as head coach.

Fry was not happy with Scott Fisher's punting or Andy Kreider's field-goal kicking against Wisconsin. He said Todd Romano is pushing for both jobs.

for his work against Wisconsin. So did Hal Mady, a sophomore who subbed for Bob Rees at right tackle last week.

Iowa quarterback Jim Hartlieb, sacked 19 times in the first five games of the season, enjoyed a sack-free day against the Badgers, who were leading the Big Ten in that department.

"Mady and Purdy really did excellent jobs," said Fry. Hartlieb readily agreed.

"Any time I don't get any sacks, you won't hear anything bad about them from me," he said. "In a big game like that, they stepped it up and did an outstanding job. I have nothing but good things to say about those two guys."

FIVE OF THE new "Baby Bulls" are home-grown, having played their high school football in Iowa: Purdy at Cedar Falls, the Kooiker twins at Sioux Center, Truog at Estherville and Wiegmann at Parkersburg. Foster and Hornok are from Illinois.

Foster left school last year with aca-

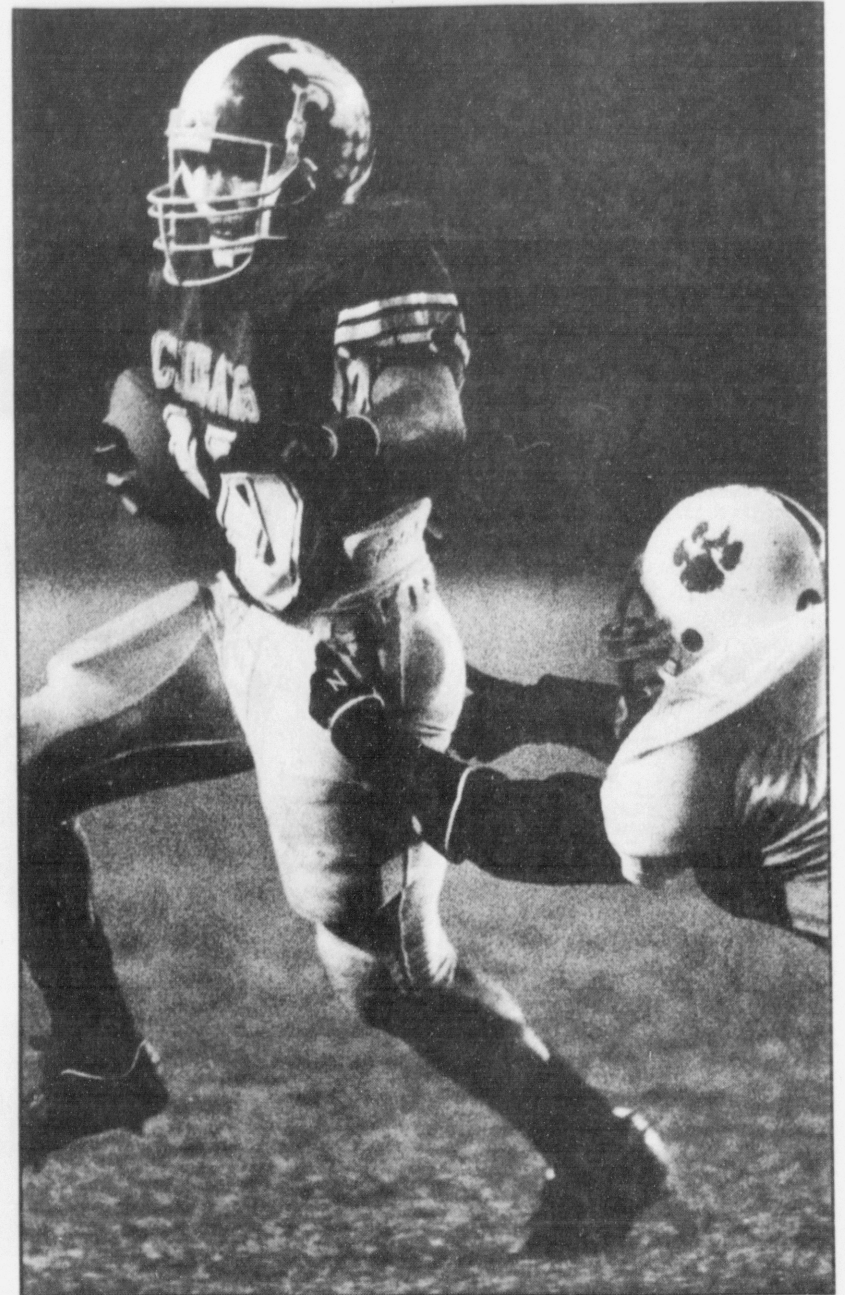
demic problems, but he's back in good standing now.

Aaron Kooiker is listed as the No. 2 left guard behind Purdy this week. Wiegmann is the No. 2 center behind Devlin. The others are further down the list, with Truog currently hobbled with a knee problem. Mady and Fritz Fequiere, the No. 2 right guard, are sophomores.

Purdy thinks the offensive line will be in good hands in 1993. For inspiration, he points to the 1990 season, when this year's fifth-year seniors were sophomores. The Hawks went 5-6 in 1989, then tied for the Big Ten title in 1990 and went to the Rose Bowl with a bunch of kids on the offensive line.

"No one expected anything from any of them," said Purdy. "I think we have to go into the season next year with the attitude they did."

"We're going to come out and surprise people. We'll work our hardest and good things will happen to us."

with his receiving yardage.

His first kickoff return of 33 yards gave Kennedy the ball on their own 42, and gave O'Shea the confidence he lacked.

"The first drive helped me a lot," O'Shea said. "We got good field possession and drove down, and that kind of took the nervousness away from me."

The game was a see-saw affair, with Cedar Falls grabbing leads of 7-0, 14-7 and 17-14 before Kennedy took its only lead of the game in the closing minutes. The Tigers finished with 321 yards of total offense, with quarterback Scott Andreasen completing seven of 12 passes for 130 yards and Seth Drenner rushing 25 times for 117 yards.

Cedar Falls scored TDs on a

pair of 3-yard runs by Andreasen and Drenner and finished its scoring when Scott Hagley booted a 22-yard field goal with 7:32 left in the game.

"We thought it would be close, and it certainly was," Cedar Falls Coach Pat Mitchell said. "Kennedy had a real fine game and they have a fine team. They deserved to win."

Mitchell said he and his staff considered going for six points instead of three when they were facing a fourth-and-four on the Kennedy 5-yard line, but ultimately opted for the field goal.

"The problem was, our quarterback was having trouble hanging on to the ball, it was so wet," Mitchell said, and that contributed to the decision.

Furious rally by Regis falls just short at Dubuque Senior

Senior holds on for 31-29 victory

DUBUQUE — After rallying from a 24-7 halftime deficit with 22 fourth-quarter points, Cedar Rapids Regis fell short of a moral-victory tie with Dubuque Senior Thursday night by the margin of a failed 2-point conversion with 1:12 to play.

Regis went 62 yards for its final score on a Charles Schimberg plunge from the 1. But quarterback Jeremy Greene slipped and fell before he could pitch to Zachar on the 2-point conversion try.

The Rams came away with a 31-29 victory that improved their Mississippi Valley Conference Valley Division record to 5-2. The Royals are 2-5.

Key factors for Senior were Joe Oleson's kicking — all four extra points and a 21-yard field goal — and quarterback Matt

Fitzgerald's 2-yard touchdown pass to Nate Courtney with five seconds left in the half, three plays after an interception at the Regis 30.

With Senior's lead reduced to 24-23, Jason Davis escaped for a 35-yard TD run.

Davis ran 10 yards for the game's first score, and finished with 135 yards on 18 carries.

Schimberg, a junior fullback, carried 17 times for 92 yards and three touchdowns for Regis. Halfback Jim Zachar netted 89 yards and a TD on 20 attempts, and ran for two 2-point conversions.

Greene completed 6 of 11 passes for 64 yards. Matt Cullen had four receptions for 52 yards, 23

on a catch from flanker Tony Campbell to open third scoring sortie. Greene threw two interceptions.

Fitzgerald was hit 10 of 14 passes for 171 yards. Rob Berkley caught five for 121.

Regis drove 68 yards for its first-quarter score. Jim Zachar went in from the 1. Ryan Jacobs' kick made it 7-7.

Oleson's field goal and Courtney's TD sent Senior into intermission leading 17-7, and an 8-

Davis went up the middle for his big run.

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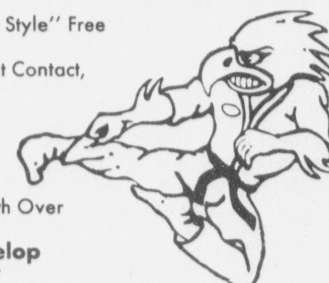
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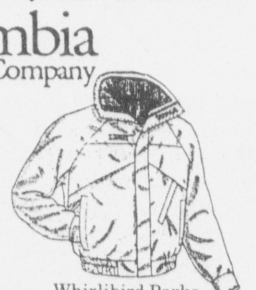

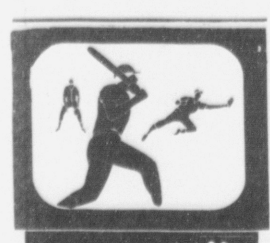
