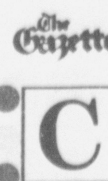

What a day for college football in our state. The nation's top two Division I-AA teams, Idaho and Numero Uno Northern Iowa, meet in the UNI-Dome.

Oh, Purdue's at Iowa, too. Let's not demean the importance of today's game to the Hawkeyes. If they lose, their season is cut off at the knees.

But Purdue's not very good, folks. That season-opening romp over California has no bearing over reality. The Boilermakers have lost at home to Northwestern and Toledo. Northwestern beat PU (appropriate initials) by two touchdowns.

The question of the day is whether Matt Eyde can be an effective quarterback. What's to prove? If he gets the ball to the running backs without messing up the handoffs, Eyde's performance will be an unqualified success.

Iowa's quest for the Florida Citrus Bowl has three potential potholes. Today isn't one of them. At least it shouldn't be.

Iowa State, meanwhile, is at Oklahoma State. To show you how lightly Oklahoma State is regarded, it's the underdog. And that's a team on a one-game winning streak, thanks to those ciphers from Missouri.

This space has tried to be kind by ignoring the Cyclones' incredible collapse last Saturday against Kansas. After that, ahem, defeat, ISU linebacker Malcolm Goodwin said he would walk back to Ames if his team loses to Okie State. Goodwin has since reneged on that vow.

If Iowa State does lose, Goodwin might want to re-think things again. There's no way he could walk the 450 miles from Stillwater to Ames in a week, which would guarantee he'd miss the Missouri-ISU game next Saturday in Ames. Should the Cyclones lose today, Mizzou-ISU would be a must-miss for any rational person.

NOW, ABOUT today's feature. If a sportswriter can't hype a No. 1-No. 2 game of any sort, he or she ought to leave the business and find honest work.

It's Godzilla against King Kong. It's Freddy Krueger against Jason. It's the Irresistible Force against the Irresistible Force. How's that for hype?

How's this for the truth: Idaho's average score is 41 for, 19 against. UNI's is 34-15. Idaho has the No. 1 offense in I-AA, and perhaps the No. 1 quarterback in Doug Nussmeier. UNI has the most explosive college player in the state in Kenny Shedd, and a running back named Tank Corner who rushed for a tidy 254 yards last week.

Then there's Idaho's star wide receiver, a fellow who has 40 catches for 773 yards in six games. His name is Yo Murphy. Honest.

Yo Murphy. There are certain teams in the country you can't picture with a Yo Murphy. Any Big Ten team, for example.

What's Yo Murphy doing with Idaho? Please forgive the stereotyping, but it's hard to fathom a speedster named "Yo" coming from Big Sky country. I guessed there was no way Yo Murphy was from Boise, Pocatello or Coeur d'Alene, and I was right. He's from Idaho Falls.

They play wild and crazy football in the Big Sky Conference. The pass is used to set up another pass. Idaho averages 506 yards a game, but is conservative because 208 yards of that comes from rushing.

I-AA offenses in general are more open and interesting than those in I-A. My theory is that there is a finite number of good defensive players and an infinite number of good offensive players. Kids don't have tackling drills in the back yard. They throw, catch and run.

Almost all the truly good defenders are snapped up by the big schools. But there's a wealth of first-rate offensive players thriving at UNI, Idaho, and across the I-AA map. That makes their games enjoyable.

UNI might win tonight. So might Idaho. It could be a 49-49 tie. But the safest bet is that it will be fun.

Battle of the biggies

No. 1 Panthers host No. 2 Idaho

Statistics might indicate a wide-open, high-scoring shootout tonight when NCAA Division I-AA top-ranked Northern Iowa hosts No. 2 Idaho.

Statistics can lie. The sold-out game at the 16,324-seat UNI-Dome kicks off at 6:30 p.m. It will be televised by KCRG-TV (Channel 9).

Big Sky Conference leader Idaho (6-0) comes into the game with the No. 1 offensive unit in the country, averaging 505.8 yards and 41.3 points per game.

Gateway Conference co-leader Northern Iowa (6-0) ranks 50th in total offense with a 347.2 yards per game average. The Panthers are averaging 33.7 points per game, however.

Despite those stats, both coaches are looking for a lower scoring game than might be expected.

"We're certainly not going to shut Idaho out, and they'll probably say the same thing about not coming in and shutting Northern Iowa out," said UNI Coach Terry Allen. "I don't think it's going to be your Big Sky game where it's going to be in the 40s, but I think it could very easily be similar to last week's game where the score was in the 20s."

Idaho Coach John L. Smith said he expects a

low-scoring game because of both teams' defenses.

UNI is ranked fifth nationally in total defense, allowing 259 yards and 14 points per game. Idaho is allowing 358.7 yards and 18.8 points per game.

Smith also acknowledged the ball could take some wacky bounces that produce a higher score. "Defense is the key on both sides of the football," Smith said. "But the ball is not round, so you never know. It could come down to a break in the kicking game."

That could favor UNI. Panthers freshman placekicker Scott Obermeier is 9-of-9 on field goals this season with a long boot of 47 yards. He also is 21-of-21 on extra-point kicks. He has had a field goal and PAT blocked. Idaho junior placekicker Mike Hollis is 6-of-11 on field goals with a long of 39 yards.

UNI also appears to have an advantage in the punting game, where junior Tim Mosley is averaging 41.5 yards per kick. Idaho senior Tom Sugg is averaging 35.1 yards per kick.

But where UNI has the big advantage is in kickoff and punt returns. Panther sophomore Jason McCleary and senior Kenny Shedd are averaging 34 and 25.5 yards per kickoff return, respectively. Shedd, a two-time all-American return

Iowa's Eyde gets chance to deliver

IOWA CITY — This is the moment Matt Eyde has been waiting for.

A packed house, an important Big Ten game for Iowa, homecoming, bowl scouts in the stands, his teammates counting on him to perform.

Some quarterbacks would be a nervous wreck, making their first start under these conditions.

But this is why Matt Eyde transferred from Michigan State to Iowa three years ago, so he could run an exciting offense and help the Hawkeyes win a big game at Kinnick Stadium.

"It's here, and he's ready," Coach Hayden Fry declared Friday morning.

The Hawkeyes host Purdue today, with 70,000 fans eager to see how Eyde performs in place of Jim Hartlieb, who dislocated his right shoulder a week ago and is out indefinitely.

Kickoff is at 1:05 p.m.

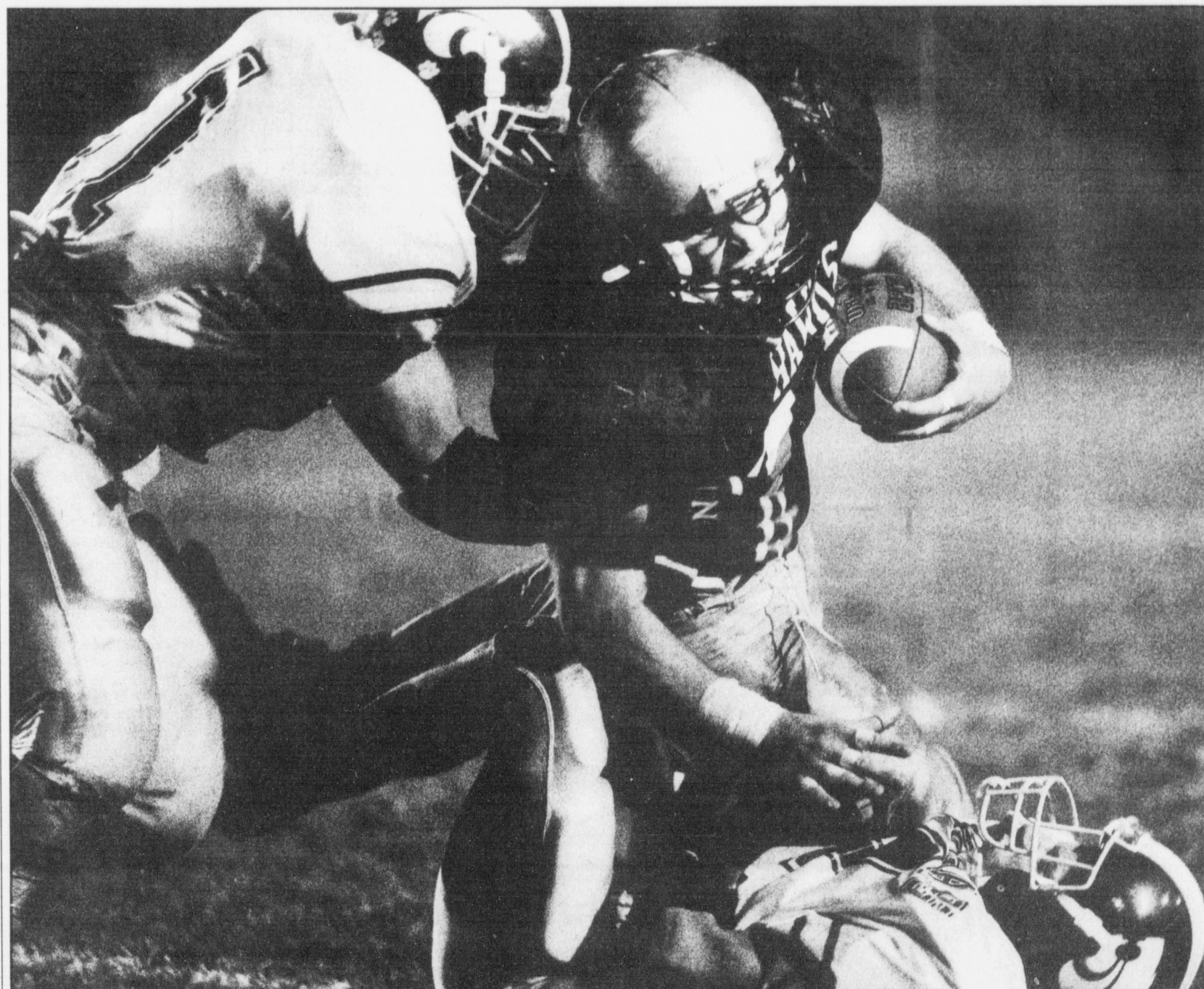
This is a big game for Eyde, and it's a big football weekend for the Eyde family, which is stocked with quarterbacks.

J-Hawks claim defensive battle, 7-0

There's an unwritten rule for the 1992 prep football season: Don't get into a defensive battle with Cedar Rapids Jefferson.

It's a lesson Cedar Rapids Kennedy learned the hard way Friday night.

In a head-knocking, pad-popping display of defensive blood and guts, Class 4A sixth-ranked Jefferson topped Kennedy, 7-0, in a Mississippi Valley Conference game in front of 5,000 fans at Kingston Stadium.

Neither team could move the ball against the other on the beautiful, Indian Summer night. Jefferson totaled only 99 yards of offense, Kennedy just 48.

"It's always nice to win," Jefferson Coach Jim Dostal said. "Kennedy is a good team. And any time there's an intra-city game, you can forget about records and all that. Nothing else matters."

Jefferson wrapped up its first playoff berth since 1979 with its seventh win in eight games. The J-Hawks — second in the Mississippi Division of the Mississippi Valley Conference — face Iowa City West Thursday night at Kingston.

Kennedy fell to 5-3 and will need a win against Cedar Rapids Regis next Friday night to even be considered for a playoff spot.

The J-Hawks entered play as the top defensive team in the Valley, while Kennedy ranked sixth. There wasn't that much difference Friday night.

"Our defense played great," Kennedy

King runs wild as Marion rolls

Needing a win to secure a Class 3A playoff berth, Marion got the job done handsomely Friday night with a routine it could label "Ben King and the Front Seven."

King rushed for 258 yards on just 17 carries and scored seven touchdowns — six in the first half — as the Indians ambushed South Tama, 50-14, at Thomas Park Field.

Its Seniors Night celebration lifted Marion to 4-1 in 3A District 5, 5-2 overall. South Tama dropped to 1-4, 3-5.

Coach Don Knock said. "My hat's off to Coach (Mike) Trosky, Coach (Dave) Ernst and Coach (Bret) Hoyer."

The game was scoreless until the final minutes. That's when the Cougars' fifth turnover of the game — a fumble on their own 23 that was jumped on by the J-Hawks' Chris Steele — came back to haunt them.

Jefferson used three plays to move to the 5 with a 9-yard pass from Tony Henderson on

Wade Hanson as the big gainer. Two plays later, Henderson bowled in from the one with 1:21 left on the clock. Chris Sarchett booted the PAT.

"I just tried to stop the play," Steele said of his fumble recovery. "Luckily, my helmet hit the ball."

Scott Micek picked off a Scott O'Shea pass on the Cougars' first play of their final possession, and Jefferson ran out the clock.

Jefferson's defensive heroes were many. Nelson Evans III sacked O'Shea three times for losses of 13 yards, and Zac Allison and Jason Rose also had big games.

"I honestly thought it might go into overtime," said Evans, who plays offensive guard in addition to his defensive tackle play. "Any time you play Kennedy, you know it'll be a tough game."

EVANS SAID he was confident the J-Hawks would find the end zone after Steele's fumble recovery.

"Once we got inside the 5, we were ready to go," he said.

Jefferson was also plagued by turnovers. The J-Hawks lost a pair of fumbles and Henderson was intercepted by Kennedy's Aaron Woods late in the second quarter.

"We were doing some good things on offense, but we self-destructed a few times," Dostal said.

This was the third game Jefferson has won by a 7-0 count this season. The J-Hawks have had shutouts in five of their seven wins.

Parade must wait for Jays

ATLANTA (AP) — So, on the afternoon they had expected to be riding through Toronto in a victory parade, the Blue Jays instead found themselves back in Atlanta on Friday, working out for another World Series game.

While the Blue Jays held a light practice and a 3-2 lead, the Braves took the day off. That is, all except Tom Glavine.

Glavine is scheduled to start Game 7 Sunday night for the Braves against Juan Guzman, if the Braves can force it that far. Still, his lone presence, throwing off a mound down in the right-field corner, was warily watched, by all of the Blue Jays, the way fishermen in a small boat notice when big sharks circle around.

Because, as much as the Blue Jays hate to keep hearing it,



their past failures make an inviting target. And both sides know it.

"The big game is tomorrow night," Glavine said. "Obviously, we're excited to be back here."

Steve Avery will pitch for the Braves in Game 6 tonight against David Cone. It's a game that Cone and the Blue Jays had not wanted to play.

"I don't look at it like we have a big advantage," Cone said. "We were hoping to put it away up in Toronto, but the Braves came back with a big win."

The Blue Jays and their fans had been all set for a celebration Thursday night. The limousines were lined up, the champagne was on ice, the hats and T-shirts proclaiming themselves champions were printed and ready to be worn.

And, just at the moment Jack Morris was intentionally walking David Justice in the fifth inning of Game 5, the Blue Jays radio announcers were describing how Friday's parade wound wind through downtown and end with a big blowout in front of 40,000 fans at the SkyDome.

About a minute later, Lonnie Smith changed all of that. With one swing, he did more than send the Atlanta Braves to a 7-2 victory. His grand slam swung the whole momentum of the World Series.

The Braves still trail 3-2, that's a fact. But here's something else to know: Of the last five teams to return home in the Series trailing 3-2, all five have won the final two games and the championship.
