Jitters, then Cyclone deluge

MES — So Iowa State whipped Northern Illinois, 54-10, in its season-opener Thursday night. Does that make the Cyclones a good, or even competent, football team?

Let's keep the jury sequestered for another eight days until ISU hosts Iowa. We did learn the Cyclones are capable of quashing a lesser opponent after getting rid of early queasiness. There have been recent Iowa State teams that couldn't do

This game showed us we have to be patient, very patient," Cyclones fullback Chris Ulrich said. "Things opened up, and nobody really knew when it would

It stopped, mercifully, at the final gun. Iowa State scored 37 second-half points, maximizing virtually every opportunity after a shaky first quarter.

The Huskies had the marquee running back in LeShon "Cowboy" Johnson, a big bull who moves like a frisky calf. But the big play wore a cardinal-andgold jersey all night long.

Between the second quarter's start and the halfway mark of the third, the Cyclones ripped off plays of 50, 46, 53 and 48 yards. Two were by air, two by ground. ISU led 31-10.

Forty-two seconds later, Kevin Fulton went 41 yards with a Johnson fumble for another Cyclone TD. The Huskies clearly weren't ready for prime-time.

James Brooks had a 77-yard touchdown reception from ISU quarterback Bob Utter with 2:28 left in the third quarter. Eleven minutes and three touchdowns earlier, Brooks scored on a 53-yard Utter bomb.

Brooks, a junior from Houston, came from two steps out-of- bounds to reel in his first career TD.

"I got shoved out, came back in, and the ball was right there," Brooks said.

And typically, the defender wasn't. If the Huskies weren't buying into Utter's pump-fakes, they were fumbling the ball away. Or committing one of their 14 penalties. Or putting a knee on the turf after catching a kickoff at their

The Cyclones, meanwhile, were adhering to the principal goals of the sport. Their defense didn't allow a touchdown, while their offense scored them quickly

and in large volume. Chew-'em-up drives weren't Iowa State's specialty this game, but yardage counts just as much in single clumps of 50 as in 10 patches of five.

"BIG PLAYS just take the heart out of you," ISU Coach Jim Walden said, "and I think that's what happened to North-

A 54-10 win over Northern Exposure University would be uplifting to a program that had gone 4-7 last year. Though one can't help but reserve judgment on Iowa State's football merits until it has played someone, its coach calmly insists a tendency for big-yardage plays should be a Cyclone staple.

"Last year, even though we were 4-7, we had more gains of 25 or more yards than any team I've ever coached," Wal-

The trick will be to save some for the teams ahead that will remind no one of Northern Illinois. Iowa comes to mind, with the following games at Wisconsin and Rice two more examples.

Walden said the thing that should make his squad's triple-option offense explosive is an effective passing attack ("our ace in the hole") for when defenses lock into the run.

You watched Thursday's game and thought it couldn't be this easy. If it is, the oranges a few fans tossed onto the field after Iowa State's first touchdown will be symbolic of more than sarcasm.

The lackluster first quarter was forgotten as 35,706 fans headed home. Northern led 7-0 at quarter's end, and that old familiar fear of another underwhelming performance against an underwhelming opponent swirled through Cyclone Stadium.

The Braves cut San Francisco's lead in the NL West back to 3½ games, winning their last scheduled meeting against the Giants, 5-3, Thursday night on Ron Gant's ricochet single off pitcher Dave Burba.

The Braves, who swept a three-game series at Candle-stick Park last week with 10

Dwight dominates; City High rolls

Any lingering doubts about the ability

of Iowa City High football player Tim Dwight were washed away once and for all Thursday night at Kingston Stadium. This kid's as good as advertised.

Dwight rushed for 196 yards on just eight carries and scored 26 first-half points to lead Iowa City High to a 42-20 Mississippi Valley Conference win over Cedar Rapids Kennedy in the season opener for both teams.

A preseason all-Amnerican, Dwight played just over two quarters before sitting down with the rest of City High starters after building a 42-6 lead over the Cougars. Kennedy's offense, stagnant most of the first half, finally put 14 more points on the board in the fourth quarter to make the final score a little more respectable.

Dwight scored four touchdowns, all in the first half. They came on runs from scrimmage of 3, 48 and 97 yards and on a 50-yard pass interception return. He also caught a pass for 23 yards and had a 66-yard kickoff return negated by a pen-

The Little Hawks dominated the game on both sides of the ball.

Led by Dwight and Corey Honore (61 yards on 11 carries, two TDs), they totaled 294 rushing yards. City High also

had 121 yards through the air, with junior quarterback Zach Grabinski completing seven of 10 passes for 106.

Kennedy started to move the ball on its next possession, when Dwight once again took center stage. He intercepted an O'Shea pass at midfield and sprinted the 50 yards for his third TD of the first quarter. Matt Gabel booted the second of his three extra points and the first quarter ended with City High ahead, 22-0.

Thanks to a booming 49-yard punt by Gladwin to end the first period, Kennedy finally got City High pinned deep in its own territory. You can never get deep enough to stop Dwight, however. Working from a third-and-30 situation

on their own 3 yard line, Grabinski handed the ball to Dwight, who broke a couple of tackles, found open field and raced 97 yards for his fourth touchdown of the half. City High's lead was 29-0 with 8:23 left in the first half.

Kennedy finally got on the board with 2:17 left when Donnie Karr covered the final 4 yards of a five-play, 33 yard drive.

City High wouldn't rest, however, as Honore scored on an 8 yard run with 1:40 left following an 80 yard kickoff return by Rob Thein.
