### Bobby faces toughest battle

onight in Texas, Pernell Whitaker and Julio Cesar Chavez meet in what is rightfully hyped as the boxing match of the year.

In Cedar Rapids, local boxing favorite Battlin' Bobby Amsler has a far more serious fight.

The 29-year-old Mid-America Boxing Association junior welterweight champion has leukemia, one of the sneakiest, dirtiest opponents around.

Amsler lost a fifth-round technical knockout to Joey Gamache in Bangor,

body shot that dropped him to one knee, and the referee stopped the fight despite Amsler's protests. After flying

Maine, on June

27. He caught a

back to Cedar Rapids the next day, Amsler went to a hospital because he was urinating blood. One of his kidneys was swollen

to almost three times its normal size.

Amsler was his typical friendly, talkative self at a Freedom Festival concert July 3. He was convinced he was going to be fine with a little healing time. Days later, hospital test results showed Amsler's problems were much worse than he realized.

"They said something was wrong with my red blood cell count," Amsler said. "I was asked to go to the hospital at the University of Iowa.'

U of I internal medicine physician Dr. George Weiner said Amsler was very ill.

"It was touch and go for about a week," Weiner said. "I'm almost certain he had the leukemia before the fight."

Amsler agreed, saying he experienced exhaustion, blurry vision and vomiting weeks before the fight, which he attributed to training at the time.

'I was devastated when I found out I had leukemia," Amsler said. "It stunned me completely. The first thing I said was 'How long have I got to live?' The doctor came back with 'How long do you want to live?' That was good for me. The doctor had the hope I needed.'

What immediately followed for Amsler was six weeks of hospitalization for tests and chemotherapy

"I was actually ahead of course," he said. "The normal time is nine weeks. My conditioning from boxing helped me

AMSLER IS IN the third phase of a five-phase treatment program that will extend over the next year and a half.

"The first phase was the most intense," he said Thursday. "It's getting easier, but I have hard times like now when I feel run down and weak from the drugs I have to take."

Amsler expects to return part-time to his job at Rockwell International in about two months. As for now, he said he's doing "a little bit of nothing." He is, however, back in his role of co-promoter for a boxing card at FB and Company in Waubeek Saturday at 2 p.m. Included are bouts featuring Rob Bleakley and Todd McMurrin of Cedar Rapids.

"We are still going to have pro boxing in Cedar Rapids," Amsler insisted. "There will be other fighters coming in to take my place."

For a while, anyway, Battlin' Bobby won't be excitedly and effectively darting around the Veterans Memorial Coliseum ring like he has so many times the

last few years. "What I'll miss most about boxing is the fans and the drive of their voice, their inspiration," Amsler said. "But I've got a positive outlook on it. You could say my goal is to box again within

the next 18 to 24 months, which the doctors say I could do.

"I just want to show that people with cancer can deal with life and still succeed at what they want to do.'

The Cyclones went 6-5 and finished fourth in the Big Eight Conference,

which under today's rules would have sent ISU to the Copper Bowl in Tucson, Timing is everything, said Walden, and his timing

was all wrong. In 1989, his Cyclones stayed home for the holidays. Back then, the Big Eight did not have a contract

team a bid. It bugs Walden.

"In 1989, I had a helluva football team," he said. "We finished a solid fourth, had a chance to be third

with the Copper Bowl, guar-

anteeing the fourth-place

in the conference, and we don't go anywhere. "Everybody around here goes, 'When are you going to take us to a bowl game?" he continued. "I say, under today's standards, I've already

been to a bowl game.

"It's just irony. Timing is everything. I laugh about that.'

Posting a 6-5 record with that club in 1989 was a minor miracle. The Cyclones had less than 60 scholarship players in '89, his third year on the job after inheriting a messy situation from Jim


> "I'm a 6-and-5 coach, and one of the few that didn't go to a bowl game," said Walden. "Everybody else goes to a bowl at 6-and-5 and they go, 'Coach, oh boy, you're doing a helluva job. You took us to a bowl game in just your third year

That's as close as the Cyclones have gotten to a bowl during Walden's sixplus years.

When Gene Smith became ISU's new athletic director this year, he said

his top priority was devoting more resources to football and having a winning team. Walden likes that approach, but Smith

## Kennedy throttles Warriors, 32-10

An opportunistic Cedar Rapids Kennedy football team took out a week's worth of frustration on Cedar Rapids Washington Thursday night.

The Cougars, still stinging from a seasonopening loss to Iowa City High a week earlier, turned three Washington fumbles into touchdowns and beat the Warriors, 32-10, in a Mississippi Valley Conference inter-divisional game at Kingston Stadium.

"I thought we came back very well after what happened last week," Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "We've had real grueling practices the last five or six days . . . and our kids really showed up tonight."

Kennedy finished with 257 yards of total

offense, but 116 of those came on two plays.

Quarterback Scott O'Shea completed a pass to

Shane Brekke that covered 57 yards in the first

quarter and Donnie Karr broke loose on a 59yard touchdown run with just a minute left in the game.

"(The offense) clicked tonight," said O'Shea, who threw touchdown passes of 20 yards to Shane Gladwin, 6 yards to his brother, Chris O'Shea, and 4 yards to Jason DeGroot. "We ran what we wanted to in certain situations, and it all got together — that's what we wanted.'

He said it was a special thrill to hook up with his brother for six points.

"I saw the (defender) trailing him, so I just threw it up and he got to it. It was great," Scott O'Shea said.

## A whole new ballgame for '94

#### If players' union agrees, the deal is done

OSTON (AP) -Major league baseball, following the lead of other pro sports, voted Thursday to divide each league into three divisions and add another round of playoffs that includes two wild-card teams.

The proposal, passed 27-1 over the objection of the Texas Rangers, is subject to the approval of the Major League Baseball Players Association, which said Thursday it expected to give its go-ahead. The new divisions would

look like this next year. although it has not been decided where Atlanta, Florida and Pittsburgh will play: AL East - Baltimore.

Boston, Detroit, New York Yankees, Toronto. AL Central — Chicago White Sox, Cleveland, Kan-

sas City, Milwaukee, Minne-

AL West - California, Oakland, Seattle, Texas. NL East — Montreal, New York Mets, Philadel-

phia. NL Central — Chicago Cubs, Cincinnati, Houston, St. Louis.

NL West — Colorado, Los Angeles, San Diego, San

Atlanta, Florida, Pittsburgh will be split among the NL East or NL Central.

The new arrangement gives major league baseball a look similar to that of the NFL, which has six divisions, and the NBA and NHL, which have four divisions each.

"Our surveys have shown it will enhance fan interest in the waning days of the season, really months," said John Harrington of the Boston Red Sox, who formulated the plan in his role as chairman of the scheduleformat committee.

The Marlins eliminated the final opposition in the NL when they agreed, if necessary, to move from the East Division to the Central. The Braves had wanted to be in the East and shift Pittsburgh to the Central, the reverse of the plan Harrington proposed.


Under the adopted resolution, the NL will determine the divisions of those three teams within seven days. The teams waived their right to veto realignment.

"Obviously, there are disagreements but they'll be taken care of," NL president Bill White said.

#### Hawk wrestling class No. 1

Three-time defending NCAA champion Iowa has won the recruiting wars for the second year in a row, according to Amateur Wrestling News.

The Hawkeyes' incoming class includes two four-time state champs, a three-time state titlists and a pair of two-time winners.

This year's group is led by Iowa City High's Jeff McGinness and Chicago Mount Carmel's Joe Williams. Both won four state titles. The Hawkeyes also signed Cory Christensen, a three-time state champ from Winterset, and two-time champs Adam Greiner of Mid-Prairie and Mark Ironside of Cedar Rapids Jeffer-

Illinois, coached by ex-Iowa assistant Mark Johnson, is second. Arizona State is third.

#### C.R. JEFFERSON vs. C.R. REGIS

Site and time: At Kingston Stadium, 7:45 tonight. Regis is the home team and its fans are asked to sit on the west (press box) side of the stadium.

said the WBC welterweight champion from Virginia Beach,


"I know he will try to throw my mind off, to clown around and make me desperate," said Chavez, whose WBC super lightweight title won't be at stake tonight in the Alamodome.
