# Michigan: greed and excellence

ren't we all just a little bit tired of the University of Michigan's football program?

I mean, would it kill the Wolverines to go 3-8 just once?

Michigan begins its quest for a sixth

straight Big Ten football title this afternoon when it hosts Iowa. Six in a row? Greedy, greedy, greedy.

Bo Schembechler did a great job of coaching Michigan football for 21 years. If anything, Gary Moeller has taken the program up a notch. But if you can't win at Michigan, you shouldn't be coaching

For starters, high school recruits have to be dazzled when they come to Ann Arbor for a Wolverines game and see 106,000 fans in one place to cheer on Michigan and sing "Hail to the Victor" 457 times in one afternoon.

For another, the school is a half-hour from metropolitan Detroit, and an easy drive for millions of people from Michigan and Ohio. The nearby population base from which to draw talent gives the school a whopping recruiting advantage over other league schools like Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa.

For all the talk that all the great skillposition players live in the Sun Belt, the Wolverines haven't had to go far to find some of the best and the swiftest. Sensational running back Tyrone Wheatley is from Inkster, Mich., a Detroit suburb. Marvelous wide receiver Derrick Alexander is a Detroiter.

Steve Morrison, a preseason All-America linebacker who is injured, is from suburban Detroit. Shonte Peoples, a first-team All-Big Ten first-team safety last year, is from Saginaw, Mich.

That isn't to say the Wolverines don't go to places like Texas, Florida and California to woo players, because they do. Their starting quarterback, Todd Collins, is from Massachusetts. But Michigan recruits nationally to fill spots, not large holes. That's an edge teams in small-population states — Iowa and Iowa State leap to mind — will never

**POSSIBLY THE MOST** impressive statistic in the Hayden Fry era at Iowa isn't the overall record or number of bowl appearances, but that the Hawks got four wins and a tie in 10 games ainst Michigan between The Wolverines were 89-30-2 in those 10 years, 21-3-3 since.

Michigan took another step away from the rest of the Big Ten last Jan. 1 when it beat Washington 38-31 in the Rose Bowl. It wasn't the victory that was stunning. It was the way the Wolverines played. They were fast. They were dynamic. They looked like more like Washington than Washington.

The Wolverines haven't played like a No. 1 contender this season and may not even win the Big Ten, but they'll probably bag a national title one of these years.

If Wheatley wins the Heisman Trophy this year — he and Florida State quarterback Charlie Ward are the frontrunners — that would give Michigan two Heisman winners (as juniors, no less) in three years. More potential Heisman types would surely flock to Ann Arbor.

Michigan is a national football team. There aren't very many of those. There's Miami, Notre Dame, and maybe Florida State. And there's Michigan. These are the teams that have their names and logos on ballcaps and sweat shirts across the country. You go to a high school in Connecticut or Texas or Iowa, and you're bound to see a kid wearing a Michigan shirt.

So yes, besides being one of the nation's finest state universities, the University of Michigan is a football factory. But at least it has a head coach who seems like a quietly decent fellow who runs a football program that is

apparently so clean you could eat off it. That's nice, but it doesn't make it easier for the rest of the Big Ten to swallow Michigan's football dominance.

Hail to the Victors? Give it a rest.

# Plate: Hawks to fight 'until the end'

# But will that end be embarrassing for Iowa in Ann Arbor?

Gazette sportswriter A college football game between Michigan and Iowa was often a thing of beauty from 1981 to 1990, with thrilling games decided by last-second field goals and the winner usually going to the

Rose Bowl. The Iowa Hawkeyes hope those days are not gone forever.

Michigan has scored 95 points against Iowa the last two years and the eighth-ranked Wolverines are heavy 24point favorites for today's Big Ten meeting in Ann Arbor.

Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said a 24point spread is "hard to digest," but he's prepared to swallow hard if his club does not get tougher and show

"You think that 73to-zip score that Texas A&M put on Missouri was bad?" he said this week. "You see a Michigan offense with the great, great people that they have, those people are capable of running up the score on anyone.

"That's in the back of my mind," said Fry. "If our players don't play hard we're going to get really embarrassed.

Fry prefers something out of the 10year period from 1981 to '90, when he posted a 4-5-1 record against Michigan with outstanding victories in 1981, 1985 and 1990 leading to Pasadena.

The last two years have been bad news, with the Wolverines winning 43-24 and 52-28.

"The last couple of years they have


Fry has challenged his defense to improve.

Barry Bonds and Terry Pendleton flexed their muscles Friday night, keeping things tied in the down-to-the-wire race in the National League West.

Pendleton, the catalyst in 1991 and 1992 for the two-time NL champion Atlanta Braves, drove in a season-high five runs and the Atlanta Braves put the pressure on San Francisco, beating the Colorado Rockies, 7-4, to take a half-game lead in the NL West.

The win improved Atlanta's record to 11-0 against the Rockies.

Then we clinched it on Saturday," Avery said.

And the outcome was very typical: City High 48, Wahlert 8. What wasn't typical were brief segments of the game where the Little Hawks seemed a little out of rhythm.

"We did some things right, but it was kind of hit and miss tonight," City High Coach Larry Brown said of the effort that lifted his squad to 5-0. "Defensively, I thought we played a great ballgame. We played tough.

But there was an uncharacteristic 80 yards in penalties assessed against the Little Hawks and a lost fumble deep in Wahlert territory. Nobody's per-

The defense was led once again by noseguard Corey Honore, who sacked Wahlert quarterback Jesse Tranel three times for losses of 24 yards.

Honore, Luke Donahue, Eric Nelson and a host of other defenders put enough pressure on Tranel to force five interceptions - two by Brad Seaton and one each by Tim Dwight, Andy Johnson and Jon Woodard.

And Brown saw another positive. His starters, who had played just more than two quarters in the Little Hawks first four wins, played well into the fourth quarter Friday night.

"We've decided we've got to let the starters play longer,' Brown said. "They work hard and they practice hard. They have to get more playing time. Some people won't like that, but we have to take care of our football team first."

Playing 31/2 quarters did wonders for many of Brown's start-

Junior quarterback Zach Grabinski completed 13 of 17 passes for 189 yards and three touchdowns. His touchdown passes were to Matt Gabel, Joe Cilek and Gabe Cook and covered 11, 25 and 12 yards. Seaton had four recentions for 42 yards


City High completed its first half scoring when Gabel booted his 27-yard field goal and Cilek caught his 25-yard touchdown pass from Grabinski.
