Simple formula for a little playing time at QB — quit playing

Bart Geiser loves the game of college football, but after three shoulder operations and four years of mounting frustrations he succumbed to the obvious: He'd never be the quarterback at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb.

He quit as an active player, his dream over, but returned this season as a student assistant coach, just to stay involved with the Huskies and help the younger quarterbacks improve.

That's what he did for the first seven games. He was a coach, not a player, wearing civvies Saturday afternoons instead of shoulder pads, a fifth-year senior staying active

and counting the days until graduation in December.

Then it happened. Geiser calls it a miracle, something out of a Hollywood script, something he still has trouble believing as he prepares to face Iowa Saturday as Northern's starting quarterback.

Scott Crabtree, NIU's top QB, separated his shoulder in the homecoming game against University of the Pacific Oct. 16, and the next day Coach Charlie Sadler found Geiser and popped the question.

"On Sunday Coach Sadler asked me what I felt about coming back," Geiser told The Gazette Wednesday in a telephone interview. "He kind of had a smile on his face, and I said, 'That's not funny. Don't be kidding COLLEGE FOOTBALL

around about things like that.' He said he was dead serious. That's how it all started." Northern Illinois had a backup quarterback in Ron Reichert, but Sadler wants to red-shirt his other QBs and save a year of their eligibility. This late in the season, he didn't want them to play and waste a year.

The thinking was this: Activate Geiser and let him be the No. 2 quarterback behind Reichert, in case of emergency. He wouldn't have to play much, just practice with the club and be there. That was the theory.

Geiser got in for the last two plays Oct. 23 in a 33-19 loss at Southwestern Louisiana and completed the first pass of his college career. He was happy with that.

Then last week in practice he got the stunning news: He would start on Saturday against Louisiana Tech.

"I was elated," said Geiser. "I was so fired up. I was so nervous Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, by the time Saturday rolled around my nerves were pretty much shot. I couldn't be more nervous, so I think I settled down a little bit and just went out and had a

If the Wildcats are put in a third-and-long situation, keep an eye on the kid from Iowa. Chances are,

K-State quarterback Chad May will be looking for Mitch Running.

Running is a sophomore wide receiver from Decorah. He's caught 33 passes this season and 27 have produced first downs. Eleven have come on third-down plays.

"I really didn't notice that until someone said something about it after the Nebraska game," said Running, who caught seven passes — all for first downs - in the Wildcats' 45-28 loss to the Huskers Oct. 16.

But Running, who has 4.5-second speed in the 40yard dash, doesn't necessarily want to be known


exclusively as a possession receiver.

"That's what the press down here has been calling me and I'll go along with it," he said. "We have someone (Andre Coleman) on the other side (of the offensive set) who runs a high 4.2 to 4.3 that's more of a deep threat, so we need someone to be more of the pattern receiver. But I can still get behind 'em."

Deception has been a forte of Running's since he left Decorah, where he was a four-sport standout and was named to all-state teams in football and baseball. A prep quarterback, Running walked on at K-State two years ago after being lightly recruited by Iowa's three state universities, all of whom wanted to make him a defensive

Running red-shirted his first year and earned a scholarship after catching seven passes for 176 yards

Mount Vernon takes a 9-1 record into a quarterfinal game at 7:30 Monday night at home against Sigourney-Keota. Center Point-Urbana ends the season 7-3.

Touchdown runs of 48 yards by Donnie Karr and 10 yards by Travis Johnson sandwiched a 28yard field goal by Washington's Jeremy McMurrin, and the Cougars led 21-10 at halftime. Kennedy amassed 272 of its 383 total yards in the half. Jimmy Bassett led a stalwart Cougar rushing game with 92 yards on 18 car-

The second-half score came late in the third quarter when the Cougars faced a third-andgoal at the Wash 33. A harried Kellogg flung the ball to the end zone. Senior tight end/linebacker/punter Shane Gladwin made a one-handed catch in traffic that could best be described as .

Linn-Mar exacts revenge

The Lions scored 20 third-period points and dominated the second half in a 34-10 triumph at John Wall Field in a Class 4A first-round high school football playoff game.

City High sets up the showdown with Bulldogs

Gazette sportswrite OWA CITY — The Iowa City High Little Hawks tamed one pack of Bulldogs Wednesday night. A more ferocious pack of 'Dogs awaits.

Second-ranked City High welcomed Ottumwa to play in Class 4A by whipping the Bulldogs, 35-14, in a first-round playoff game before an estimated 5,500 fans at Bates Field.

City High (10-0) will face the top-ranked Bettendorf Bulldogs (10-0) in a Class 4A quarterfinal game Monday night at Bettendorf. Bettendorf advanced to the quarterfinals with a 21-18 win over Davenport Assumption Wednesday. City High and Bettendorf also met in the quarterfinals a year

Ottumwa played an all-3A regular-season schedule and this was its first game against a 4A foe since it lost in to Newton in the first round of last year's playoffs.

City High built a 35-0 lead before letting Ottumwa on the board late in the game. The Bulldogs actually out-gained the Little Hawks, 355-341, but 254 of Ottumwa's yards came in the second half mostly against Little Hawk reserves.

"It was a very physical ballgame, but it was a win," City High Coach Larry Brown said. "They have a real good football team. They have good running backs, and we knew they'd come out and run the ball. They were ready to play.

City High was ready, too, most noticeably standout back Tim Dwight.

Dwight carried 19 times for 213 yards in just under three quarters of play. He scored three touchdowns.

His runs from scrimmage included scampers of

He also had two pass interceptions from his spot in the defensive backfield.

"The line did a hell of a job tonight," Dwight said, repeating a familiar refrain. "They were opening some big holes. (Ottumwa) has a good team. They really gave us a run for our money."

The Bulldogs were led by tailback Shane Hamersley, who carried 29 times for 214 yards. He gained 130 of those in the second half and scored a fourth CLASS 4A

quarter TD on a 7-yard run.

Dwight's touchdown runs covered 6, 53 and 24

City High took a 6-0 first quarter lead when Corey Honore capped a seven-play, 40-yard drive with a 4-yard run straight ahead with 6:40 left.

The Little Hawks and Dwight then put the Bulldogs away with 22 second quarter points, and led at halftime, 28-0.

Their only sustained drive went 73 yards on 10 plays and ended with Brad Seaton catching an 11-yard pass from Zach Grabinski with 11:25 left in the half. Brad Seaton caught a 2-point conversion pass from Grabinski, and it was 14-0.

Ottumwa fumbled the ensuing kickoff and City High took over on its own 6. Dwight covered those 6 yards on a sweep right on the first play and and the first of three Matt Gabel PATs made it 21-0 with 10:55 left

Only 17 seconds remained at that point, however, and City High couldn't score.

Dwight's 24-yard run with 2:55 left in the third quarter completed City High's scoring.

Ottumwa got on the board with 7 seconds left in the third when quarterback Mark Ellison and receiver Matt Untrauer hooked up on a 20-yard TD pass. Hamersley's touchdown run capped an 18play, 99-yard drive with 4:07 left in the game.

City High did suffer some injuries, including one to starting linebacker Andy Johnson. His status

Pospisil scored the game's final points on an 84-yard gallop around left end with 1:10 left in the third quarter.

"When we got the momentum (toward the end of the first half), we just decided we had to keep it going," Bellamy said.

"We tried to do a few new things offensively tonight that we only had until after last Friday to practice, so some of our players were confused at times. We got things straightened out

Pospisil led Mount Vernon with 121 yards on seven carries.

"We knew they were a good ballclub," Rogers said of Mount Vernon. "We knew we had to play an error-free, solid game to win, and we didn't.

"But I'm extremely proud of these kids. After about the fourth game of the season, nobody would have told you we would be here.

Rogers retiring

Wednesday night's Class 2A playoff loss to Mount Vernon ended the brilliant coaching career of Center Point-Urbana's Ted Rogers.

Rogers, who took Center Point and Center Point-Urbana to the playoffs 11 times, said he had resigned.

"I've know it was time since the beginning of the season," Rogers said. "I've just decided enough is enough. It was definitely a tough decision. I love the kids. But I sure don't have the energy level like I used to."

In his 21 years, Rogers compiled a 160-42 record and led his 1985 team to the Class 1A state championship, following a runner-up finish in 1984.



Waverly-Shell Rock and 1992 2A runner-up Solon bowed out in the first round of the Iowa prep football playoffs Wednesday night, but the three other defending champions advanced, although Bettendorf in 4A and Bedford in Class A both had close calls.

Top-ranked Bettendorf, winner of the last two 4A state titles, ran its winning streak to 30 with a 21-18 victory over No. 3 Davenport Assumption.

It was the third straight year Assumption has lost to Bettendorf in the first round of the playoffs after also losing to the Bulldogs in the regular season. Those are Assumption's only losses in the last three seasons.

Bedford, also ranked No. 1, edged Hamburg Southwest 13-6.
