# Talking sports, ad nauseam

ome people like driving. The rest of us just want to get there. Woody Hayes used to say three things can happen when you pass the football, and two of them are bad. I say a million things can happen to you when you drive, and only one isn't bad.

The one good thing is getting to your destination without aggravation. But even when that happens, a long drive can drag. So you switch on the radio.

Music is nice, but how many times in a lifetime can a person hear "Stairway to Heaven" without snapping? Human voices, talking about something or another, can help take your mind off many hours remain in a trip.

Thanks to out-of-state football trips this fall, I've found the radio airwaves more crammed with sports babble than ever. Spin that dial on a weekend night, and you'll find sports talk, sports talk,

That isn't necessarily a good thing. It seems every major city has an allsports radio station. This started in New York City a few years ago, and spread like a disease.

Minneapolis-St. Paul has one that offers amazingly trivial programming at times. Heading home from a Vikings game in September, I heard part of an hour-long show in which a man who publishes a fantasy-football newsletter (but clearly had no radio training) read statistics from that day's NFL boxscores.

En route to last Saturday's Ohio State-Wisconsin football clash, I flipped to a Madison station that was airing a pregame show. That was around 10:30 a.m., and I had joined the show in progress. Game time was 2:30 p.m.

I got rid of that in time to catch firstquarter "action" of the Florida State-Maryland mismatch on a Chicago station. Another flip found a talk show with a report from the Breeders' Cup, two hours before the first post.

Michael Feldman's "What Do You Know?" comedy show on public radio never sounded better than that morning.

NOWHERE IS SPORTS talk-radio more prevalent than Chicago. First, allsports station WSCR (The Score) came along. Recently, WLUP-AM went from rock to sports and changed its call letters to WMVP. Around the same time, all-news WMAQ-AM turned its nighttime programming over to sports talk. And WGN-AM has long featured sports talk on weekends.

I don't think I've ever heard a female call one of those shows. Score one for sisterhood.

Many callers have brilliant trade proposals that are almost always tilted in favor of a Chicago team. Others have ingenious advice for coaches, like throwing more screen passes.

Most say anything, no matter how unsubstantiated or absurd. Have you ever known a knowledgeable, sensible person who said this:

"Please excuse me, but I have to go

call a talk show.' Those programs do serve a purpose, though. They are cheap programming for the stations. Even in big cities, unfortunately, many hosts lack the personality or credentials to give a show substance. They usually are either sycophants, egomaniacs or both. WSCR always seems to have at least one cohost who is doing a bad imitation of the "Da Bears" guys from "Saturday Night Live.

None of this is to suggest that sports talk shows can't be entertaining or informative. When you're stuck in a car for a few hours, tuning in such a show (and it certainly doesn't have to be on sports) is better than finding money under sofa cushions.

The tricks are to have an authoritative, personable host with relevant guests, and to make callers ask direct questions to the guests instead of just spewing hot air.

One of the best things about sports is they're easy to understand and discuss with others. Sooner or later, though, you'd like some light to go with the heat.

"They hit hard," he said, shaking his



Three-time state champion Linn-Mar was in the playoffs for the ninth straight season. Kennedy is in the post-season for the fourth year in a row, but had never advanced past the quarterfinals.

The Cougars won with a punishing ground game that netted 223 yards, and the

main man was 5-foot-8

junior Jimmy Bassett.

Bassett, who made splash for Kennedy at midseason with 220 yards rushing at Dubuque Wahlert, sliced and slashed and darted his way to 121 yards on 29 carries against the Lions. He opened the scoring on a 5-yard run with 11:19 left in the first half.

"We felt we would run the football well," Knock said. "Maybe I was a little too conservative compared to last week. The offensive line came on so well.'




### Wathan hooks up with Boston

MANCHESTER — It took a few years to get it, but West Delaware celebrated its first home playoff football game in grand


