"lowa's team" vs. Iowa State

f you haven't seen Northern Iowa's football team play the last four years, you've missed the most consistently exciting and effective squads from an Iowa state school.

UNI not only has won 39 games and lost just 12 in that time, but it also has won four consecutive Gateway Conference championships, good for four straight NCAA Division I-AA playoff berths. One of those led to a trip to the national semifinals.

Beyond that, the Panthers have played fun football. They've featured all sorts of offensive weapons like ace quarterbacks, bullish running backs, blazing receivers and kick-returners, and a twotime first-team All-America placekicker.

Four players who have been in the program since Terry Allen took over in 1989 are now in the National Football League. That's obviously an impressive number for a I-AA program.

One of them, New York Jets wide receiver/kick returner Kenny Shedd, is perhaps the most thrilling player from an Iowa school in the 1990s to date.

To show how far UNI has come under Allen, it goes to Iowa State not seeking respect, but merely a victory. The Panthers already have gained respect, partly because of their Gateway dominance, but partly because of the 27-10 whomping they gave the Cyclones in Ames two years ago.

UNI threw mighty scares at Iowa State in 1987 and 1988, and won at Kansas State in 1985 and 1989. But the game that put the Panthers over the top within their own state was the one on Jack Trice Field two years ago. Winning conference titles and going to the national playoffs are great, but UNI football is recognized by many Iowans for that 27-10 score.

Many Cyclone followers couldn't help but notice that Allen had many Iowans playing key roles in that 1992 clash. Shedd, who caught three passes for 92 yards that day, is from Davenport. Defensive back Jason McCleary, a member of this year's Panthers, is a Newton native who returned an interception 61 vards for a touchdown. Andre Allen, a 1993 All-American linebacker, had 10 tackles. He is from Des Moines.

ers from the Cedar Rapids, Quad Cities, Des Moines, Fort Dodge, and, of course, Waterloo-Cedar Falls areas. It may still surprise some to learn that each of those areas has produced fine college players the last several years

Kurt Warner of Cedar Rapids Regis closed his college career last year as the all-Gateway first-team quarterback. Sophomore Dedric Ward of Cedar Rapids Washington, had nine touchdown catches as a freshman.

Based solely on their roster, the Panthers are Iowa's team. But they're I-AA, so they'll never hog the headlines or open too many sportscasts. Yet, Allen, who was hired as head coach at age 32 by then-UNI athletic director Bob Bowlsby, has overseen a program that can't be ignored.

The truth remains, however, that a good I-A team should defeat a good I-AA team almost every time. Which leads us to the question of whether Iowa State is going to be a good I-A team this year. A win over UNI alone won't provide an affirmative answer, but a loss would put a nasty stamp on this alleged make-orbreak season for Jim Walden.

There's no excuse for the Cyclones not to win today, so the call here is an ISU triumph on the way to a 6-5 season. UNI has been very good in the 1990s, and probably will be again this year. But Iowa State should have more talent, more depth, and all the motivation a team needs.

With a solid victory over the Panthers, ISU would put one ghost to rest and set its sights on its game next week against its primary poltergeists, the Hawkeyes of Iowa.

And If Iowa State doesn't win today? Those winds that always gust through Cyclone Stadium will be cold indeed.

After two lackluster seasons, lowa unveils new players, look

IOWA CITY — Matt Purdy has read the articles. He's seen the rankings. He knows what people are saying.

Everybody is slamming the University of Iowa football team, saying they'll finish near the bottom of the Big Ten again this year.

The all-Big Ten offensive lineman doesn't blame them.

'We haven't deserved any respect," said Purdy, a 270-pound junior from Cedar Falls. "We've had two up-anddown years. We just have to find a way to destroy that image.

Step one begins today when the Hawkeyes open the 1994 season against Central Michigan at Kinnick Stadium (1:05 p.m., no TV).

Sports Illustrated ranked the Hawkeyes 53rd in the country entering the season, behind the likes of Bowling Green, New Mexico, Texas Christian, Rutgers and Western Michigan.

That's quite a drop for a program that finished in the Top 20 eight times from 1981 to 1991 during a golden era of Hawkeye football.


"I knew we were quick on defense," Purnell said. "But you practice three weeks and you don't really know how quick.

IOWA CITY - Some of the names from a season ago are missing from this year's Iowa City High football team, but the result remains the same.

Led by the passing of senior quarterback Zach Grabinski and the running of senior tailback Rob Thein, the Little Hawks beat highly regarded Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 34-14, Friday night in a Mississippi Valley Conference opener at Bates Field.

Grabinski completed 12 of 19 passes for 182 yards and one touchdown, and Thein rushed 19 times for 124 yards and

three TDs to lead a potent City High offensive attack.

The Little Hawks, officially entering the post-Tim Dwight era, finished with 416 yards of offense in a display slightly more dominating than the final score indicated.

Panthers shooting for repeat performance against intrastate rival

Iowa State begins its quest for that elusive winning season while Northern Iowa shoots for another playoff berth when the college football season kicks off for each today in Ames at 1 p.m.

It seems like not much has changed since the teams last met two years ago in Ames. With one big exception.

"You take that team lightly and you get stung. We found that out," said Iowa State Coach Jim Walden, who has had only one winning campaign in compiling a seven-year record of 28-47-2.

Wyoming, which appeared in the Copper Bowl, is Walden's alma mater.

"This is a team that for all intents and purposes should have beaten Wyoming a year ago, from everything I've seen," Walden said. "So, you're not talking about us stubbing our toe (two years ago).

Head finds basketball home at Eastern Michigan

James Head has found a basketball home, with "home" an apt description. Head, the basketball recruit signed to

a national letter of intent by Iowa last November and denied admission to the school last week, will enroll at Eastern Michigan University on a full scholarship. EMU's classes begin next week.

Eastern Michigan, a member of the Mid-American Conference, is in Ypsilanti, a neighbor city of Ann Arbor that is about 20 miles away from Head's hometown of Canton, Mich. Eastern Michigan was 15-12 last season, Ben Braun's ninth as head coach. The team

was 26-7 and reached the Final 16 of the NCAA Tournament in 1991.

"It was a tough decision," Head said Friday. "It being close to home wasn't a factor at all. It has a lot of good support programs, and I thought it was probably the best place for me. They recruited me in the very beginning. I think I'll have about the same opportunities as I would have had at Iowa."

His high school coach said Head had a plethora of college opportunities after Iowa denied his admission request.

"A lot of people offered James full

rides as soon as Iowa pulled the rug out," said Bob Brodie of Plymouth Salem High in Canton. "Penn State, Minnesota, Ohio State, Bowling Green, Marquette - a lot of them called right

"The only school we were interested in that didn't contact us was Michigan State. They didn't have a scholarship for this year, but wanted him for next

Brodie said the main factors in Head's decision were proximity and the fact fall classes at EMU haven't begun.

'Some, like Penn State, have already started school," he said. Ohio State's classes begin Sept. 21.

Minnesota starts the next day. "I didn't want to start behind in attending school," Head said. "I'd rather start like every other student.

Iowa rejected Head's admission Aug. 26, the same day the NCAA ruled Head had met its eligibility requirements.

"I think that everyone involved in the process - and I stress everyone knew that James was a marginal admit from the very beginning," Iowa Athletic Director Bob Bowlsby said Tuesday. 'That includes people at the high school, it includes the family, and it includes everybody associated with the

University of Iowa." Bowlsby said Iowa didn't receive

Head's final transcript until July further bogging down the process of deciding the player's academic status.

"I have copies of Federal Express forms for letters I sent to the University of Iowa and the (NCAA) Clearinghouse in June," Brodie said. "I saved those copies because I smelled a rat a long time ago.

"I still don't know why James wasn't admitted at Iowa."

Head professes no spite regarding his

situation with Iowa. "It's just an unfortunate thing that happened," he said. "I'm looking for better things ahead."

Selig: Sides have week to save season

NEW YORK (AP) - In another week, it might

be "Wait 'til next year" for baseball. Acting commissioner Bud Selig on Friday threatened to cancel the season unless owners and

players reach an agreement within a week. Selig, in a telephone interview from his office in Milwaukee, said he informed union head Donald Fehr of the Sept. 9 date during a telephone call Friday. Selig, however, said the owners' decision on the termination date wasn't final.

This appears to me to be the most pragmatic approach, but we'll discuss it early next week,' Selig said. "If you work the calendar back, it appears to be a logical date.

The sides have not met since Aug. 25 and no bargaining sessions are scheduled. There have been just two meetings since the strike began on Aug. 12.

Selig's announcement threatens the World Series, which has been played annually since 1905. The expanded playoffs were scheduled to start Oct. 4 and Selig said the clubs felt a pennant race was necessary before a postseason.

The Major League Baseball Players Association said it was not asked for any input by Selig. "That's his decision to make, I guess," said BASEBALL STRIKE

Eugene Orza, the union's associate general counsel. "I guess that's the date the clubs choose to take down the postseason. I don't have any control over that."

Selig, in a statement issued by the commissioner's office, said he picked the date after taking into account the time necessary to get players back into playing condition, the time needed to "meaningfully" complete the regular season and the logistics of the postseason.

"Discussions of the date will continue between Don and me next week," Selig said in the statement. "I am hopeful of reaching a resolution on the matter early next week.'

Fifteen more games were canceled Friday as the strike began its fourth week, increasing the total to 284, more than one-eighth of the season. Players' lost salary will pass the \$100 million mark Saturday and teams' lost revenue will surpass \$200 million Sunday.

Player agents said they believed the actual date to cancel the season may be around Sept. 16 but that Selig floated the earlier date in order to

shake out real bargaining positions.

"I've talked to a lot of managers, general managers," Selig said. "You have to have a meaningful finish to the regular season.'

Baseball's eighth work stoppage since 1972 was caused by owners' insistence that players agree to a salary cap, a concept the union says it never will accept.

Meanwhile, the Los Angeles Dodgers and Baltimore Orioles - two of baseball's wealthiest franchises - announced staff cutbacks Friday.

Before Selig's announcement, Labor Secretary Robert Reich criticized players and owners, saying baseball was "becoming a symbol of national

"If the parties don't want to resolve their dispute, well, then unfortunately, they're going to have to stew in their own juice," Reich said during an interview with Mutual-NBC Radio. "Baseball had been the emblem of the national pastime, the emblem of kids, the symbol of summer. It is now unfortunately becoming a symbol of national greed."

Wahlert 'lucky' in 14-7 win over Wash

Mike Cooper was the first one to admit it.

"We got lucky," the Dubuque Wahlert football coach said after wide receiver Rob Leary caught a 42-yard 'prayer' between two defenders with 2:36 left to give Wahlert a 14-7 season-opening victory Friday night over Cedar Rapids Washington at Kingston Stadium.

Leary's catch — on a 3rd-and-13 play - came after Washington defensive back Marsielle Clark jumped too soon in an attempt to pick off a woefully underthrown pass down the sideline from quarterback Brian

Standing at about the 20, the ball landed in the hands of Leary, who scampered the rest of the way for the winning points.

"What I didn't want to do was turn the ball over in that situation," Cooper said. "Usually on a deep route, if the ball in intercepted, it's back there deep. Their kid just misjudged it.

"I was thinking overtime."

"Marsielle just kind of misread it," said Washington Coach Wally "He comes up inside, and Aaron (Burrell), who was back behind him, misjudges it. (Leary) catches the ball in between two people, takes it in and scores.'

Defending champion and top seed Pete Sampras had no such problems at night, serving 17 aces and neatly dismissing a potential threat in Daniel Vacek, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3 in just over an hour and a half - slightly longer than his opening match two days earlier.

Sampras, whose injured left ankle sidelined him for six weeks before the tournament, looked much more impressive in his second match against a play**TENNIS**

er ranked No. 54 than in his first against a less challenging qualifier. This time, Sampras raised the level of his play, serving and volleying with authority and chasing down baseline shots as if he'd never been hurt. At this point in the tournament, no one is playing bet-




