e all know what an Iowa State football win over Iowa today would represent.

It would make Southwest Texas State our undisputed state champion.

We also all know what an lowa win over the Cyclones would mean.

It would be dog biting man, the sun rising in the east and setting in the west, and performers being crude, rude and lewd at the MTV Music Video Awards Show. In other words, the same old same-old.

Intrastate classic, not. Classic bore. usually.

Every year, Hayden Fry says the Cyclones are bound to defeat his Hawkeves sooner or later. Every year, Jim Walden showers the Hawks with flattery. Every year, Iowa players say they don't want to be the ones who end the winning streak over ISU. Every year, Iowa State players bravely say they are a different team than their predecessors, and feel good about their chances against Iowa.

Every year, the Hawks win.

This game serves as a benchmark for the Hawkeyes. When they have a tough time beating the Cyclones, they have a tough time the rest of the season. When they roll over Iowa State, the rest of their season is a rollicking good time.

From 1983 to 1987, Iowa outscored the Cyclones 258-50. The Hawks won 46 games in those five years. They mugged Iowa State 29-10 in their 10-1-1 1991 season. But they only beat ISU 10-3 in 1988 on the way to a 6-4-3 year, and edged the Cyclones 31-28 a year ago before limping to a 6-6 record.

Iowa State wouldn't consider winning six games "limping" since it hasn't reached that plateau since 1989.

It's set in stone that the first rule in the ISU-Iowa series is that the Hawks win. Rule No. 2 is if you expect a Hawkeye rout, it will be a close game. And

The Cyclones have been flatter than compact discs when people thought they had a good chance of finally knocking off Big Brother. Since this isn't one of those years, maybe Iowa State can come into Kinnick Stadium today and kick up some sod.

The shopworn phrase "critical game" seems a bit absurd for a September contest, so let's just say this is a confrontation of significant importance for both squads. (It's a critical game.)

With a thrashing today, Iowa State football equals exhibition pro hockey scores in terms of statewide interest. Next Saturday's Western Michigan-ISU game wouldn't quite provide a scalper's

idea of utopia. Of course, the biggest subplot of the game stars Walden. The man under contract to Iowa State through 1997 is catching flak from hither and yon. Another thumping at the hands of the Hawks might fan the Ames flames into a dump-Walden wildfire.

Each year's team is different, and it might be grossly unfair to judge this season's Cyclones on just two games. But fairness went out of big-time college football with leather helmets.

The Hawkeyes find the trials and tribulations of Iowa State useful only for amusement purposes. Iowa needs a win itself. Next up are games at Penn State and Oregon, immediately followed by Big Ten duels with Michigan, Indiana and Illinois. So, a loss today could start

the Hawks tipping toward an abyss. The grumbling about Fry you heard last autumn would again reverberate after a loss to the Cyclones. Never mind the improved team athleticism and the coaches' recent seemingly good run of recruiting. The old man's lost it. He

can't even beat Iowa State. Today's losing coach will be reminded of what he's experienced hundreds of times before. To the people with the short rope and the tall tree, you're only

as good as your last game. The call here is ISU, 23-21. Or Iowa, 42-7. Somebody will go away happy. Probably.

Iowa, ISU return to battle

Players acquainted with just one result to intrastate rivalry

IOWA CITY - Tim Dwight was 7 years old the last time the Iowa Hawkeyes lost a football game to Iowa State. Tavian Banks and Ryan Driscoll

were a little older. They were

Dwight, Banks and Driscoll grew up thinking the Iowa-ISU series always has the same result, and those young Hawkeyes hope to keep it going today at Kinnick Stadium.

The Hawkeyes will be gunning for their 12th straight victory over the Cyclones in the 42nd renewal of this intra-

state series (2:35 p.m., KCRG-Channel 9 in Cedar Rapids). Driscoll, Iowa's new quarterback, called the series "a great

grudge match." "It will be neat," said the sophomore from Cedar Rapids. 'It's something I've watched since I was really small."

Dwight and Banks - the T 'n T boys — energized the Hawkeyes and U of I fans last week with dazzling debuts before a home crowd hungry for a return to glory

Coach Hayden Fry thinks the future looks good for Iowa, but he's not entirely sure about 1994. One thing he's sure about, though: The Cyclones will be hopping mad after their 28-14 loss to UNI last week.

"We know how much those people like to beat us," he said

Friday. "They always play the Hawks extremely tough, particularly here in Kinnick Stadium. For some reason they seem to play better over here than they do at their place."

History supports Fry's observation. The last three scores in Iowa City were 10-3, 45-35 and 21-7. Iowa State's last victory in the series came at Kinnick Stadium in 1982, 19-7.

Fry has reminded his players of THE STREAK in THE GAME, but they don't need much reminding.

Cedar Rapids can win title tonight at Memorial Stadium

It wasn't baseball at its finest, but it was baseball the way it was meant to be played.

The Cedar Rapids Kernels built a 4-1 lead and survived a furious ninth-inning rally to beat the Rockford Royals, 4-3, Friday night at Marinelli Field. It was the Kernels' 14th straight win and gave them a 2-0 lead in the Midwest League Championship Series.

The Kernels can end the best-of-5 series in Game 3 tonight at Memorial Stadium. Game time is 7. The Kernels will send right-hander Willard Brown (6-9) against Rockford right-hander Ken Ray (10-4). A victory tonight would

equal the season-best win streak for a professional baseball team this season, set earlier this summer by Rockford. Games 4 and 5, if necessary,

will be at Memorial Stadium Sunday and Monday.

"We dodged a lot of bullets tonight," said Kernels Manager Tom Lawless said.

Owners reject proposal, but Series not yet lost

Decision on season by early next week

NEW YORK (AP) - Maybe nobody wanted to be the bad guy.

The deadline for canceling the rest of the baseball season came and went Friday, with still no decision.

Baseball owners rejected the players' proposal for ending the month-old strike, but postponed until next week a call on whether to give up on one of the

most memorable seasons ever. Not that there's much of it left, anyway. The season is scheduled to end

Union head Donald Fehr said restarting the games "becomes progressively harder with each passing day, but we're not going to shut the doors until they shut them.'

Acting commissioner Bud Selig, who imposed the deadline last week, didn't mention it in his opening statement to reporters after a one-hour meeting between the sides. Then he was evasive about it during the question-and-an-

swer period. "I said all week long that common sense should prevail," he said. "We'll have no announcement on the season until very early next week."

BASEBALL STRIKE

Asked if Friday's events caused him to change the deadline, Selig said: "I don't think so really.

Asked if owners would say it was too late to complete the season in the event a deal is reached, Selig said: "It depends when the deal is made."

Some union officials and player agents had speculated that Selig's deadline wasn't firm.

In the event there isn't a deal, Selig said his name would be on the announcement to cancel the World Series for the first time since 1904.

"I'll take the responsibility. It will be mine," he said.

In rejecting the union's proposal, Selig said it didn't address the owners' desire for cost containment, which in management's proposal took the form


of a salary cap. "We have to establish a common ground, and tragically we have failed to do so at every level to this point," said Selig, who entered the talks for the first time Friday. "Nobody dreads these circumstances more than I do, or is


more dismayed by them. Owners still insist on a salary cap and players say they'll never agree to


"If they maintain the salary cap, this will go into the offseason, into next season and as long as there is a salary cap," said Texas Rangers pitcher Kevin Brown.

IOWA CITY - Iowa City West High's home opener was supposed to be an occasion for celebration, with the Trojans unveiling the school's new stadium and newly ranked football

Apparently, someone forgot to tell Linn-Mar, the Trojans' opponent in their opener.

The second-ranked Lions crashed West's stadium-opening party Friday night with a 35-14 victory in a Mississippi Valley Conference matchup.

The loss spoiled the debut of Trojan Stadium, West High's new football complex. The stadium was open for business just hours after construction workers finished the bleachers, a project which had threatened to push back the grand opening.

"This was a great night for so many people," said West Coach Reese Morgan. "We really appreciate the support. A lot of people worked very hard to make this

"Unfortunately, our team didn't play to the best of its

Linn-Mar battered No. 8 West with a punishing running game, with Josh Jacobs leading the way with 80 yards and two touchdowns and Andy Maloney

running for 89 yards. Todd DeWoody and Drew Porter added 49 and 33 rushing yards, respectively, as Linn-Mar showed plenty of backfield depth. The Lions racked up 270 of their 330 yards of offense on the ground.

"We go about two-deep at the running back positions," Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell said. 'We like to use all four guys and keep everyone fresh.

A Linn-Mar defense that held West to 158 total yards was highlighted by DeWoody's two interceptions, including an acrobatic catch that stopped a West

drive in the second quarter. Jacobs got most of the work on the Lions' first possession,

rushing for 26 yards on seven carries. Linn-Mar was helped by a pass interference penalty early in the drive, and Maloney added a 13-yard burst to give Linn-Mar a first-and-goal at the West 6.

Two plays later, Lion quarterback Jared Morris found Chad Pick with a 12-yard touchdown pass to complete a 13-play, 62yard march.

West responded on its next possession, driving from their own 29 behind the running of fullback Carlos Honore and the passing of Ryan Hansen, who found Darren Dickel, Vong Xaykosy and Corbin Bergman for first downs. Bergman scored on a 11-yard counter play to draw West within 7-6, but the Trojans botched the two-point try when Xaykosy fumbled into the end zone and Linn-Mar recovered.

The Lions didn't let West keep the momentum, scoring four unanswerd touchdowns to take a commanding lead.

Jacobs scored his touchdowns on the Lions' next two possessions as Linn-Mar took a 21-6 lead into halftime.



At 31, Jerry Rice has the NFL record for career touchdowns. No player has as many touchdown receptions. He holds three NFL postseason records, along with the Pro Bowl record for most catches.

Don't get the idea, though, that Rice is satisfied. He loves his job, has no desire or intention to slow down, and there's still a lot more he wants to do before he's through, whenever that happens to be.

"It's just the drive to be the ultimate receiver," said the San Francisco 49ers wide receiver. 'When my career is over, I would like to hold every record possible. It's going to take a lot of hard work, plus you have to stay healthy and you have to have a good group around you. If I can keep those guys around me, there's no telling what my potential might be.

Certainly, he's well on his

The 10th-year pro has never missed a game due to injury and he added to already imposing career marks when he became the league's all-time touchdown scoring leader.

His two touchdown receptions and 23-yard scoring run during San Francisco's season-opening 44-14 victory against the Los Angeles Raiders increased his career total to 127. That was one more than Jim Brown had when he retired in 1965 after nine seasons with the Cleveland

But he's in no hurry to look back on what's done. He's too busy playing, too busy preparing for the next game.

"I guess I'm doing something I really love. I like the competition and I like going up against the best. I like the challenge to me," he said.

Rice has no intention of slowing down Now, with every score, Rice break new ground, and other records are within reach.

> "Jerry is so much stronger and has so much more stamina than anyone else who has played at that position," said Bill Walsh, coach of the 49ers when the club drafted Rice out of Mississippi Valley State in the first round in 1985.

"He is the best ever, and I think he can stay atop for another five years and break every record by a mile," said Walsh, now Stanford coach.

"They'll be tough records to ever duplicate because the game has changed so much and there are so many substitutions.

And even though the focus Sunday will be on Joe Montana playing the 49ers for the first time since they traded him to Kansas City, the Rice story still rates at the very minimum as a

Rice made seven catches for 169 yards against the Raiders for his 45th 100-yard receiving game, second only to Don May nard's 50. He caught a pass in his team record 128th straight game, the fourth longest streak in league history.

He also increased his career receiving yardage total to 11,945 and very likely will become the fifth player in league history to surpass the 12,000 receiving yards while playing against Montana's new team.
