Suns waive Mustaf

■ PHOENIX — The Phoenix Suns have waived forward Jerrod Mustaf, apparently clearing the way for them to sign unrestricted free agent Wayman Tisdale.

The Suns also announced that guard Winston Garland has signed a one-year contract and that rookie forward Antonio Lang signed a three-year contract. No financial details were disclosed.

Mustaf, 24, had two years remaining on a three-year, \$5 million contract extension he signed with the Suns in 1992. The Suns said they have agreed to buy out the remaining two years on his contract

about \$3.8 million — and release him.

The subtraction of Mustaf from Phoenix's roster opens an \$850,000 salary slot and the Suns are expected to use it soon to sign Tisdale to a one-year contract.

Missed conversion costs West

C.R. Kennedy survives late scare, 14-13

After failing to take advantage of numerous breaks offered up throughout the game, the Cedar Rapids Kennedy football team caught a huge one late in its Mississippi Valley Conference showdown with Iowa City West Thursday night.

Trojan place-kicker John Huyser watched his PAT attempt go wide left with just 40 seconds left and Kennedy ran out the clock on a 14-13 win over West at Kingston Stadium.

West's Daren Dickel caught a 5yard touchdown pass from a scrambling Ryan Hansen at the 40-second mark of the fourth quarter to pull the Trojans within one point.

West Coach Reese Morgan said he and his staff planned on going for the tie all the way.

"We had our coaches meeting three days ago, and that's when we decide if we should go for two (points) or one in that situation," Morgan said. "Our rationale is that we'll always go for one and try to go into overtime. It was a decision made three days ago.'

THE COUGARS took advantage of four West turnovers that gave them outstanding field possession throughout the first three quarters of play. Kennedy (1-2) scored touchdowns in each of the first two quarters, and led at halftime, 14-0, before the Trojans (1-2) rallied in the fourth period.

"That was pretty ugly," Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "But we did some things better. Our defense did the job for three quarters, but then we went to sleep in the fourth

Kennedy came out of the gates in a flurry, and used a 49-yard punt return by Joe Werling with 5:35 left PREP FOOTBALL

in the first quarter to bolt to a 6-0 lead. From then on, Knock turned his offense over to senior tailback Nick McClimon.

McClimon was making his first varsity start in relief of the injured Jimmy Bassett. McClimon was up to the task.

A slender 160-pounder, he followed his blocking flawlessly, picked his holes carefully, and finished with 191 yards on 31 carries. His only varsity experience before Thursday's game were "a couple" of carries late in a 1993 game.

"It was usually a power play," the soft-spoken McClimon said of the call that netted him his big yardage. "The line really stepped it up this

The Cougars started all four of their second quarter possessions in West territory, but came away with


just seven points. McClimon went in from 1 yard out with 7:10 left, capping a seven-play, 26-yard drive that began when Kennedy's Matt Smith

recovered a Trojan fumble. Kennedy's other second period possessions ended with a loss of downs on the West 26, a missed 24-yard field goal and a punt in the waning seconds.

West's fourth quarter scoring drives covered 98 and 62 yards. The 98-yard drive ate up almost five minutes and took 15 plays, the biggest a 22-yard pass from Hansen to Dickel that gave the Trojans a first down on Kennedy's 14.

Hansen completed 13 of 23 passes for 180 yards, including eight to Dickel for 93 yards.

West finished with 253 yards of total offense, 150 in the fourth quarter. Kennedy had 218 yards of offense with 205 coming in the first

Sites for prospective league would rather wait for real thing

BUFFALO, N.Y. - Buffalo wants baseball, but not that way. Pittsburgh needs money, but not if it means sinking the Pirates. In St. Petersburg, Fla., and Phoenix, they'd rather wait for the real thing.

Anyone trying to organize a rival baseball league in the wake of this season's major league meltdown won't find stadium doors swinging open to welcome them. Whatever problems the big leagues have, they still have friends and would-be friends in many, many places.

"At this point in time, our interest is pretty low," Rick Dodge, the city administrator in St. Petersburg, where they are trying to find a tenant for the Thunder Dome, said Thursday. "Our interest right now continues to be pursuit of major league baseball as we currently know it."

Since the baseball strike began, there have been water-cooler discussions about whether the players would form their own league. After the owners canceled the rest of the season Wednesday, those discussions became more serious

Player agent Dick Moss is trying to set up an eight- to 12-team league for next season. He did not return calls seeking comment, but potential sites mentioned include Buffalo, St. Petersburg and cities where the stadium isn't owned by the

"Every time somebody wants to start a new league, they call Buffalo," said Robert Rich Jr., who owns the Triple-A Bisons and their home, Pilot Field.

"But would we be burning our bridges and potentially eliminating ourselves from consideration for a major league baseball team? That would be a consideration for me," he said.

5 Seminoles get eligibility returned

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) The NCAA restored the eligibility Thursday of five suspended Florida State football players, freeing All-American linebacker Derrick Brooks and reserve offensive lineman Marcus Long to play Saturday.

However, the NCAA extended the two-game suspension of senior tailback Tiger McMillon to three games. Patrick McNeil had been suspended for three games and Forrest Conoly for four games.

All were disciplined for taking gifts from a prospective agent last November.

Florida State appealed the decision on McMillon and said a ruling was expected during a conference call Friday

"I believe our players have proved they have learned their lesson and have stepped up to these suspensions with real character," said Florida State President Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte. "I'm proud of them, and I am especially proud of Tiger McMillon. He came forward early on, and we gave him great credit for that.'

"We generally agreed with Florida State on the appropriate

sanctions for these young men," said Carrie Doyle, NCAA director of eligibility. "The facts indicate that McMillon's actions more clearly violated NCAA amateurism rules than (Brooks and Long) who received two-game suspensions.'

McNeil, a three-year starter at guard, will also miss a fourth game tacked on by Coach Bobby Bowden for an unspecified violation of team rules.

"Getting this all behind us is a relief, no doubt about it," said Bowden.

■ DUKE 43, ARMY 7 — Rob Baldin added to his impressive start to the season, scoring three touchdowns in helping Duke pound out a victory over visiting Army.

Baldwin's scoring runs of 7, 3 and 2 yards give him seven touchdowns after three games, the best performance by a Blue Devils running back since Randy Cuthbert, Duke's last potent running back, rushed for 10 touchdowns in the entire 1989 season.

want, too."

The problem arose over confusion about the calculation of in-state and out-of-state tuitions. The Big Ten Conference instructed schools to use a formula that apparently had been in violation of NCAA legislation since at least the 1970s.

Conference Commissioner Jim Delany launched an internal investigation into the situation when he took office in 1989.

"The NCAA says to calculate scholarships by a certain formula, but the Big Ten had a different formula," Gable said. "There were a lot of question marks. That case could be discussed for a long time."

The wrestling team, which awarded 7.39 scholarships more than allowed by the NCAA during the four-year period, now must cut back to make amends.

"From now on, we have to get back the money we so-called overspent," Gable said. "We need to get back about 1.8 scholarships each year. Normally, we can get five or six pretty good kids a year.

"Hopefully, I can get by cutting that in half. I'm going to have to get some help from the team to even do that.' Gable said one solution might

be to use two-sport athletes,

such as former Hawkeye John Oostendorp, who wrestled and played football.

Current Iowa lineman Mike Goff, a former heavyweight sectional champion in Illinois, has said he would consider wrestling if Gable is interested.

"I'm aware that he's interested. But it's football season, so I'll let him concentrate on that and see what happens," Gable said. "But that's the kind of thing we'll be looking at in the future.


