Hawks-Ducks: Who will fly?

Bill Walsh saw Oregon as a middle-of-the-road football program with limited resources, the kind of team Stanford should handle. So it says in "Rough Magic," Lowell Cohn's book about Walsh's return to coaching Stanford's football team. It's unlikely Hayden Fry will look up on Oregon the same way today, when his Iowa Hawkeyes play there before a crowd of about only 30,000. Limited resources or not, in 1989 the Ducks made Iowa quack up in Kinnick Stadium, 44-6.

That was back when Oregon was good enough to go to a bowl game, albeit the Independence. The Ducks seemingly possess no such ability this year. Whether the Hawks do is still open to question.

If weather conditions allow, this could be a 38-35 game. Based on last week's play, defense isn't the calling card of either squad. The Ducks have allowed a combined 70 points in consecutive losses to Western Athletic Conference members Hawaii and Utah. Four of the Ducks' top six tacklers are defensive backs, which tells you all you need to know about how they defend their end zone.

Forget the Oregon Trail. These days, it's Oregon trails.

Given their sizes, facilities and budgets, Oregon and Oregon State should be in the WAC rather than the Pac-10. Oregon State hasn't been to the Rose Bowl for New Year's since 1965, which is seven years more recent than Oregon's last appearance in Granddaddy Bowl Game. Eugene is a pretty place with a lot of trees and liberal thinkers. A football factory, it isn't.

Pac-10 football as a whole seems to be sliding away. It is a paltry 10-9-1 in non-conference games and just 2-5 against the WAC. Not long ago, those were the sorts of numbers the Big Ten once held while holding its nose. Today, the Big Ten may honestly be the nation's premier football league, while the Pac-10 is better off bragging about its Pacific Ocean, its Sonora Desert and its great restaurants of San Francisco.

The Big Ten is even on a two-game Rose Bowl winning streak, with a three-peat likely next Jan. 2. Between 1975 and 1987, the Pac-10 won all but one Rose Bowl. What has caused this seismic shift in the competitive landscape of the two conferences?

"I think the Big Ten in the last four, five years, has much more speed and quickness than it used to have," Fry said. "It used to be we just had several players with speed. Michigan had an Anthony Carter and a few others that could really run. Now there are so many more Big Ten teams that have excellent speed."

"We've always had the big physical size and tough kids. But every team in the Big Ten has really added the speed factor. And that's been the equalizer more than anything else."

The NCAA knocked Washington off its high horse, and several other Pac-10 programs seem stuck in the gate. California, so convincing against Iowa in the Alamo Bowl, has lost to San Diego State and Hawaii. Arizona State fell at home to Louisville. Fresno State beat Oregon State. Stanford was lucky to get a tie at Northwestern. USC and UCLA have been blasted at Penn State and Nebraska, respectively.

But the Pac-10 has been anything but a soft touch for Fry, who is 3-6 against that league while at Iowa, including 0-4 in bowls. Washington, California, UCLA and Oregon have given his teams pastings. But the Ducks don't seem to have any paste left in their jar.

For the second straight week, the Hawkeyes have ventured to a scenic, wooded section of America to play a football game. It won't be 61-21 today, though a total of 82 points could again be scored.

The oddsmakers say Oregon by a point. But isn't Iowa as good as Hawaii or Utah? We don't know yet, do we?

Hawks put money on Banks

With Terry out, freshman back could see extensive play

EUGENE, Ore. — Ryan Terry is out, Tavian Banks is in.

Terry, the No. 2 tailback on the University of Iowa football team, will not play against Oregon today because of a sprained ankle, The Gazette

learned Friday from two members of the U of I athletic department.

Terry's absence opens the door for Banks, the red-shirt freshman from

Bettendorf who has looked good in limited duty as the third-string tailback. Banks is now No. 2 behind Sedrick Shaw, with freshman Tim Dwight No. 3.

Terry, a senior co-captain from Steubenville, Ohio, did not accompany the Hawks to Oregon. He hurt his ankle last week in the 61-21 loss at Penn

State. His status is questionable for next week's game against Michigan at Kinnick Stadium.

Banks has carried the ball nine times for 106 yards this season, a healthy average of 11.8 yards per carry. He has scored twice on explosive runs of 38 and 25 yards.

Terry has rushed 31 times for 169

yards and one TD this year. Shaw leads the team with 44 carries for 315 yards, an average of 105 yards per game.

Earlier this week, Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said he planned to give Banks and Dwight more action against Oregon. At the time, he did not reveal Terry's injury.

"Tavian is a tremendous runner," Fry said Tuesday. "I mean, he's magic. He makes something happen."

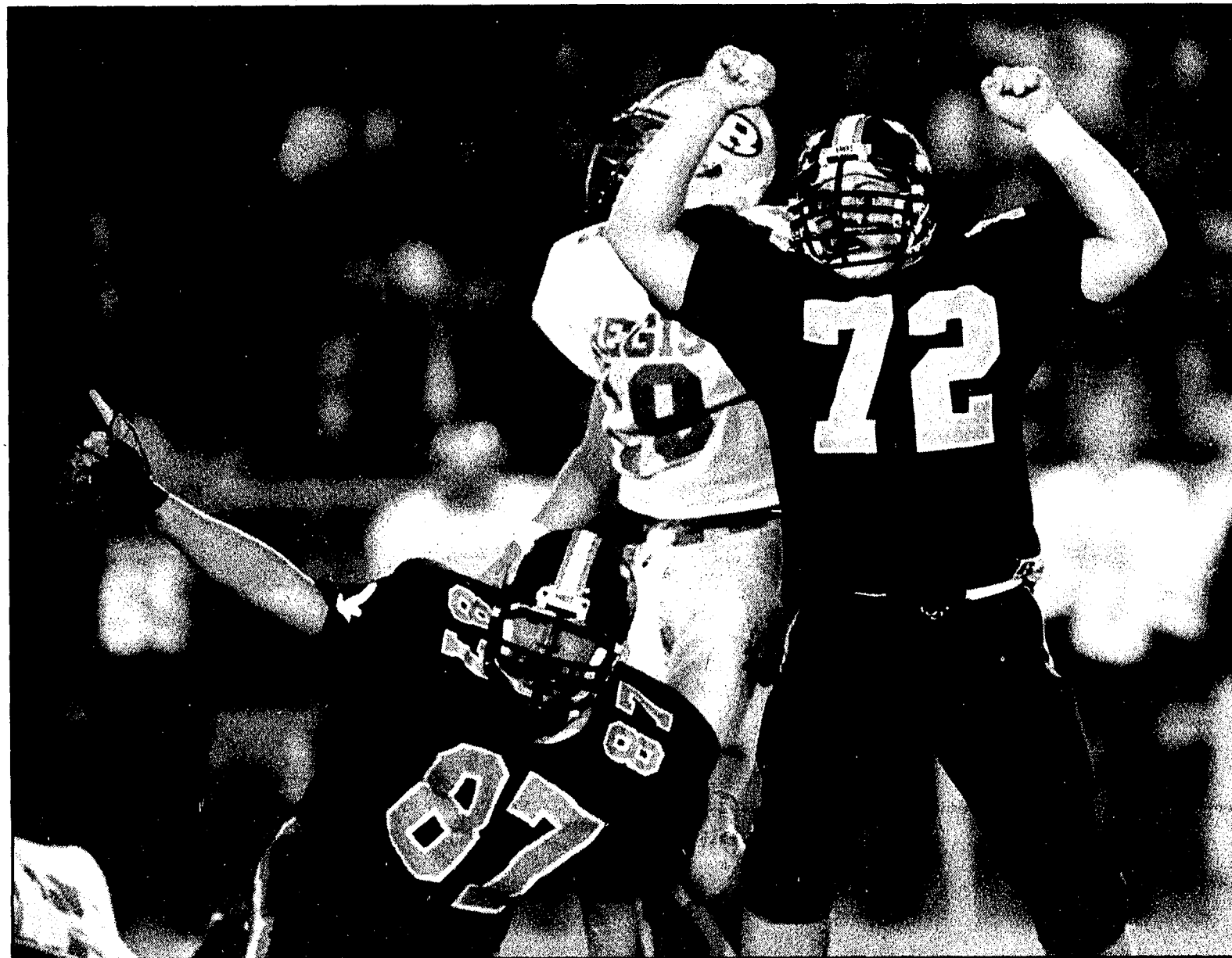
Lack of experience was keeping Banks off the field, kind of a Catch-22 situation.

"You have to understand, there are a whole lot of other responsibilities in that backfield, like blocking, picking up stunts and blitzes, reading the coverages," Fry said. "He just hasn't played enough."

The No. 2 tailback has been averaging 10 runs per game for Iowa this year. Today's forecast calls for temperatures near 90 degrees at kickoff, which means reserves could play a significant role.

Autzen Stadium has artificial turf, and Oregon Coach Rich Brooks estimates the on-field temperature could be more than 100 degrees because of the playing surface.

Kickoff is scheduled for 3 p.m.

Few new tricks left for UNI, McNeese State

Division I-AA powers know each other well

Northern Iowa and McNeese State expect the expected today.

The two NCAA Division I-AA powers meet at the UNI-Dome in Cedar Falls in a 1:30 p.m. homecoming contest for the Panthers.

It is the fourth time in three years the two have clashed.

"We know an awful lot about them, and they know an awful lot about us," said Panthers Coach Terry Allen.

"We know each other so well I don't know what else new we can come up with," Cowboys Coach Bobby Keasler said.

Keasler knows his team has trouble with the Panthers. Last year's 27-10 win in Lake Charles, La., was the Cowboys' first in the six-game series.

Keasler also knows the Panthers are awfully good at home. They are 90-25-1 in the dome and have won 29 straight regular-season games there.

"We're 0-3 (in the UNI-Dome), and that's what we're concerned about," he said.

Allen also knows a thing or two about the Cowboys — most importantly that they are good.

Ranked No. 2 nationally in I-AA, McNeese State is 3-0 and has won its last 10 regular-season games. The Cowboys are averaging 341.3 yards and 23.3 points per game while allowing just 12.

The Panthers are 2-1 and rated No. 9. "They've got a couple of guys on both the offensive and defensive side of the ball who are huge," said Allen, who is after his 50th career win. "They've got a couple 300-pounders on the offense, and they've got a defensive tackle that's 314 pounds."

Those 300-pound offensive linemen — left tackle Ronald Cherry (6-foot-4, 300)

and right guard Marcus Vidrine (6-5, 301) — have opened some mighty big holes for another of the Cowboys' top players, junior tailback Henry Fields.

Fields is averaging 126 yards per game.

Quarterback Kerry Joseph also is very "capable," according to Allen. Joseph has completed 31 of 69 passes for 379 yards after passing for 1,981 last year. He's also rushed for 111 yards.

Then there are wide receivers Skeet Owens and Terrence Davis, who has 10 catches for 127 yards. Owens has just three receptions this year, but has caught at least one pass in the last

Jordan to play fall ball

PHOENIX (AP) — No surprise, Michael Jordan will be allowed to play in the Arizona Fall League.

The Chicago White Sox were granted an exemption by the commissioner's office Friday to add an extra player — Jordan. The decision had been delayed for two weeks because of baseball's labor problems.

"There's a void in baseball right now, so the timing's very positive," Arizona Fall League executive vice president Steve Cobb said.

The league runs from Oct. 6 to Dec. 1 and is made up from six top prospects from all 28 teams. The White Sox did not originally list Jordan, so they asked for permission to include him.

Hawkeyes win at Illinois

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — The University of Iowa volleyball team opened the 1994 Big Ten season with a 4-15, 15-12, 15-12, 13-15, 15-11 win over Illinois in front of 2,012 fans.

Iowa hasn't defeated Illinois since 1990, when it also won in Huff Hall.

This victory marks the best start in Iowa volleyball history. The Hawkeyes now stand 11-1 overall and 1-0 in the Big Ten.

Illinois falls to 8-5, 0-1.

Katy Fawbush led Iowa with 22 kills and Jill Oelschlagler was next with 17.

Freshman Erin Borske recorded a career-high 25 kills.

"I can't say enough about the composure and poise of this young team," said Coach Linda Schoenstedt.

Scranton rushes for 263 yards as Solon rallies

Jon Scranton rushed for 263 yards and five touchdowns on 38 carries as Class 2A third-ranked visiting Solon overcame an early deficit to defeat Clarence-Lowden/Lincoln, 39-20, Friday night in District 6 prep football action.

The Spartans improved to 4-0 overall, 2-0 in district play.

The Rebels (3-1, 1-1) took a 14-13 lead in the second quarter. Quarterback Kyle Koth hooked up with Zach Meyer for a 53-yard touchdown. Then Brad Dierks recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and ran 25 yards for a touchdown.

But Scranton scored two touchdowns in the next 2:22 to give Solon a 27-14 lead at intermission.

Scranton had scoring runs of 34, 1, 7,

The Spartans totaled 351 yards rushing to the Rebels' 27.

■ **ALBURNETT 21, NORTH LINN 6** — Todd Neighbor scored three touchdowns and rushed for 164 yards on 38 carries as Alburnett won the Class 1A District 6 contest at Coggon. Matt Robinson had North Linn's touchdown, a 75-yard kickoff return in the first quarter. Gabe Robinson rushed for 122 yards on 14 carries for the Lynx.

■ **IOWA CITY WEST 20, CEDAR FALLS 0** — At Iowa City, Carlos

Honore ran for 149 yards and three touchdowns as Iowa City West shut out Cedar Falls, 20-0.

Honore scored on two 25-yard runs in the first quarter, the second set up by Nick Hansen's interception, before going in from eight yards out in the closing seconds.

Matt Bowersox also had an interception for the Trojans (2-2, 2-1). The Tigers fell to 1-3.

■ **MOUNT VERNON 28, CENTRAL CITY-SPRINGVILLE 0** — At Mount Vernon, the top-ranked Mustangs held Central City-Springville to 31 yards rushing and shut out the Catbirds, 28-0, in a Class 2A, District 6 tilt.

Mount Vernon (4-0, 2-0) ran for 309

yards — 138 by quarterback Luke McDermott and 79 from Matt Meyer. Meyer ran for three touchdowns and Vance Ellison caught a 12-yard strike from McDermott for another.

Scott Pospisil led the Mustangs with eight tackles, including a sack. Adam Flockhart added seven and Kip Sitzmore six.

■ **WEST BRANCH 81, CLEAR CREEK-AMANA 8** — With its No. 1 offense running only eight plays from scrimmage, West Branch rolled up 303 totals yards in just one half of football.

The Class 1A District 6 at Tiffin was called at halftime, the minimum a prep game can be played.

Up 49-0 after the first quarter, the Bears kept on rolling while holding Clear Creek-

Amana to minus-5 yards rushing and 56 yards passing.

West Branch, winning its 35th straight game, had 12 different players score, including two each from Tony Senio, Chad Gates and Chad Gade.

Senio scored on a 70-yard kickoff return and 28-yard fumble return, Gates on runs of 32 and 46 yards and Gade on a 17-yard run and a fumble recovery in the end zone.

Marion gets stung again, 32-24, in OT

Standing alone while his players wearily boarded their bus, Dave Messerli wore the expression of a coach whose team could easily be 4-0, but is instead 1-3.

In a must-win game for both principals, junior quarterback Eben Baumhover and reserve tailback Josh Frommelt — also a junior — led Western Dubuque past Messerli's Marion team, 32-24, in overtime Friday night at Thomas Park.

The loss left the Indians 0-2 in Class 3A District 5. The Bobcats evened their marks at 1-1, 2-2, keeping alive playoff hopes.

Messerli opened and closed his somber post-game interview asserting "the kids really played with courage."

"I thought we made some good defensive stands. But we broke down on coverage once. I don't know if these kids deserve to be in this situation. They've had three heartbreaking losses."

Messerli credited Baumhover with "a nice job on the bootlegs, especially on the extra points. We had defensive breakdowns on the bootlegs."

"We're not big and physical, but we'll get some breaks, and we'll win some."

Veteran Western Dubuque Coach Tom Kilburg said the Indians are "gonna win a lot of games. They're tough — a lot better than 1-3. We had to play well to beat 'em."

"We were pretty steady in the offensive line. We controlled the ball pretty well. Frommelt kept us going after our starting I-back (205-pound senior Kevin Kluesner) got hurt in the first half."

The muscular 170-pound Frommelt finished with 148 yards and two touchdowns on 24 carries.

Western Dubuque outgained Marion 266-156 on the ground, 130-52 in the air.

But Marion led twice during the first

eight minutes, twice stopped Western Dubuque inside the Marion 10 with the score 16-16, then popped Kane Lakose loose for an 80-yard kickoff return that preserved the tie after the Bobcats made it 24-all 38 seconds into the fourth period.

Western Dubuque won it on Baumhover's 4-yard fourth-down pass to Matt Rauhen. Baumhover bootlegged for the extra points, as he had following the Bobcats' three previous TDs.

Marion then had third down with the tip of the ball casting a shadow on the goalline. But the left side of Western Dubuque's line smothered Brad Holub and Brian Wendling for short losses to end the game.

A squibbed kickoff enabled Marion to begin the game at its own 40, and on third down senior fullback Mike Kalkwarf broke a 56-yard TD burst down the left side. Jeff Kinney passed to Josh Claypool for the extra points.

Zach Ungs returned the ensuing kickoff 67 yards to the Marion 19, and three plays later Kluesner scored from the 4.

One exchange later, Brian Benest blocked Baumhover's punt from the Bobcat 21, Marion claimed it at the 10, and Holub pushed over from the 1 on fourth down. Kinney passed to Claypool for the extra points.

Western Dubuque drove 79 yards in 12 plays to tie it again on Frommelt's 19-yard run up the middle and Baumhover's bootleg scamper around right end, two plays into the second period.

Late in the half, Spencer Northway batted down what would have been a Baumhover TD pass on fourth down at the Marion 7.

Midway through the third period, Baumhover hurled a perfect 35-yard pass to Ungs alone in the end zone, but the Bobcats were charged with a clip. They kept the series alive, however, until Baumhover misfired on a fourth-down

pass at the Marion 11.

The Indians paid for an arguable interference call late in the third period. It put Western Dubuque at the Marion 21. Frommelt covered the distance on three carries, the last from the 1.

Marion gave Lakose a narrow lane at the 35 on his kickoff return. He zipped

through it and traveled the final 50 yards by himself.

Ungs intercepted Kinney midway through the fourth period, but fumbled back to the Indians at their 20.

With 1:30 left, Claypool intercepted a Baumhover pass and returned 17 yards to the Marion 46.

Nick Morio bowled over from the 9 with 7:39 left to give Kennedy a 7-0 lead.

That advantage lasted all of 17 seconds as Jefferson's A.B. Casell fielded the ensuing kickoff from Ryan Ray, bobbled it, scooped it up and scampered around end untouched for a 95-yard touchdown. Charlie Huston's extra point tied the game, 7-7.

Kennedy set up its next score midway through the first quarter by blocking a Brian Long punt and recovering it at the Jefferson 8. Quarterback Brad Kellogg eventually snuck in for the 1-yard TD.

Morio scored on a 2-yard run with 11:04 left in the second to extend the Cougar lead to 21-7. Kennedy scored again before the half ended on a Nick McClimon 2-yard burst off tackle.

McClimon, subbing for injured regular Jimmy Bassett, carried the ball 20 times for 163 yards.

"The line is getting better every week," McClimon said. "The downfield blocking was great tonight, and there were just great holes."

Jefferson snapped off an impressive 16-play, 75-yard drive that took 7:33 to score its last touchdown early in the fourth. Quarterback Chad Micek, who replaced starter Dave DeSmidt in the second half scored on a 2-yard option run.

Linebacker Jason DeGroot thwarted any J-Hawk comeback hopes by picking off a Micek pass later in the fourth and rambling 32 yards for a touchdown. DeGroot also had two fumble recoveries in the game.

"I've never really had one like that before," he said. "The coaches were yelling to watch the tight end dump. I just kept my eyes on the tight end, and it was pretty obvious what he was running. I just stepped in front of it."

Ray finished the scoring for Kennedy with a 40-yard field goal on the last play of the game.

"That field goal at the end was something he needed for confidence," Knock said. "That's something we might need later in the year."

Stormin' Pointers give Dufoe 1st win

Center Point-Urbana ended three weeks of frustration and handed rookie coach Greg Dufoe the first win of his career.

Stormin' Pointers junior quarterback Casey Estling ran for two touchdowns and passed for two more, and junior halfback Tom Hayward ran 21 times for 126 yards to fuel CPU's 26-0 win Friday night in a Class 1A District 6 game at LaSalle.

CPU (1-1, 1-3), which finished with 387 total yards, manhandled LaSalle (0-2, 1-3) in the first half, scoring three of its four possession in building a 19-0 lead. The Stormin' Pointers rolled up 267 yards while holding LaSalle to minus-5 yards.

"My defensive coordinator, Scott Slifka, has our defense playing outstanding football," Dufoe said. "His defense will give us a chance to compete every Friday night."

Dufoe said the Stormin' Pointers had struggled offensively in losing overtime games to Central City-Springville and East Buchanan before getting spanked by West Branch, 34-0, especially getting hurt by penalties.

CPU struggled with penalties again Fri-

day, committing 12 for a total of 100 yards. An ineligible receiver downfield on a screen pass killed the Stormin' Pointers' first drive of the game, moving the ball back to the LaSalle 44 after they had moved to the 29.

"I thought it was a repeat of what we did the first couple of games," Hayward said. "We talked about it at the beginning of the week about how we can't be having all these penalties."

"But the quarterback kept us in sync and told us to keep our heads up. We kept our heads up and good things happened."

Following a LaSalle punt, CPU drove 60 yards in 10 plays, Estling sneaking the final 3 on third down. Chad Kreel's PAT kick made it 7-0 with 9.4 seconds left in the first quarter.

"I felt we could move the ball all night," said Estling, who gained 94 yards in 12 carries and completed 5-of-10 passes for 113 more yards. LaSalle lost 15 yards in three plays in its next possession and again was forced to punt.

Hayward's 27-yard gallop gave CPU a first down at the LaSalle 36. Three plays later, the Stormin' Pointers faced a fourth-and-10 when Estling dropped back and spied Roger

Brecht for a 36-yard touchdown pass play that put CPU ahead, 13-0, with 8:20 left in the first half.

Estling connected with Brecht from 14 yards out with 1:29 left in the half for a 19-0 lead. The big play of the drive was a 41-yard screen pass from Estling to Hayward.

Estling's 36-yard broken-field run with 10:31 remaining closed out the scoring.

LaSalle finished with 81 yards. The Lancers picked up 84 yards in two plays — a cherry-picker pass from junior Tony Fandel to senior Matt Corbett, who lateraled the ball to junior Josh Rank for a 50-yard play, and a 34-yard pass play from Fandel to junior Chad Klostermann.

Thirty-eight other plays produced a total of minus-3 yards.

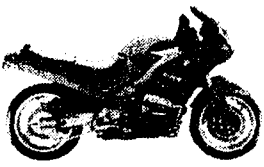
LaSalle Coach Duane Schulte was not discouraged.

"These guys aren't quitters, they just need to get experience," he said. "If they stick with it good things are going to happen this year and definitely next."
