Drat! This would have been an ideal day to traipse from garage sale to garage sale. Winter is soon upon us, and I understand you can find official City of Cedar Rapids snow shovels at discount rates all over town. They're practically walking out the door. In fact, they already have.

Ah, there's nothing like a good political scandal to take our minds off the mundane, namely Division I-A football in Iowa this fall. Had someone told you two months ago that Iowa and Iowa State would be two-touchdown underdogs to Illinois and Kansas State, respectively, your response might have been the following:

"Balderdash!" Or something along those lines.

The last time either Iowa or Iowa State won was five weeks ago, when the Hawkeyes beat, ahem, the Cyclones. The last time Iowa or Iowa State won when they weren't playing each other was Sept. 3 when the Hawks disposed of, ahem, Central Michigan.

The last time Iowa State won? That was so long ago that there were no strikes or lockouts in professional sports, almost no one had ever heard the phrase 'Life is like a box of chocolates," and O.J. Simpson was known only as a tongue-tied ex-jock sportscaster.

This may sound like heresy to many of you Hawks, but if either of our state's alleged "Big Two" is to win today, I give Iowa State the better chance.

Kansas is the second-best team in its own state, which used to be a cut-anddried condemnation. Now it only means the Jayhawks aren't as good as Kansas State. A great many teams in the nation aren't, including, obviously, Iowa State.

If ever there were a time for the Cyclones to make a three-hour stand, today might be it. They've had two weeks since their last game to lick their wounds. Maybe they'll summon something from deep down to stop the bleeding, if only for an afternoon.

And yet, Kansas is a team that has beaten the likes of Michigan State. ISU can clinch another losing season today, and probably will.

ALL IOWA HAS to do today is score some points against the Big Ten's best defense, and do so on the road with a quarterback, Mike Duprey, who is making his first collegiate start. And that's just for openers.

The Hawkeyes must also fend off a quarterback, Johnny Johnson, who is adept at both passing and running. They had enough trouble last week just stopping Indiana QB John Paci, who was proficient only at running.

On top of that, Iowa's specialty teams have looked like strangers to the arts of placekicking, punting, and returning kicks. That's with the exception of a gentleman from Davenport named Tavian Banks, who made up for some unremarkable returns last Saturday with a 60-yard sprint after fielding an Indiana

By no means is Banks a potential savior to what has become a dreary Hawkeye season, but at this point the best Hawk followers might have to hope for is a few cheap thrills and some reason to believe things are going to eventually get better in Hayden Fry's camp.

Illinois has been Team Schizo with a home loss to Purdue followed by a 24-10 win at its favorite road stop, Ohio State. However, this is the time of year in college football when things start to shake down. If you're a bowl team and/or a conference title contender, you show it. If you're merely marking time, you show that, too.

If Iowa is going to do more than mark time the rest of this season, it needs to prove it today. That doesn't mean it has to win, but it has to compete. It has to stand up to the Fighting Illini for four quarters without flinching.

Illinois is playing for something today and this year. Are the Hawkeyes?



"That's the best overall game we've put together this year," Washington Coach Wally Sheets said. "I'm proud of the way they came back after getting knocked pretty good last week by City High.

## Cyclones brace for Kansas' powerful rushing

Jayhawks love to run, and Cyclones struggle against it

The goal of Iowa State's football team for today's game against Kansas was summed up in four words by Cyclone Coach Jim Walden: "Don't get run over."

That may be easier said than done

for Walden's winless Cyclones, whose porous defense is matched against one of the best rushing attacks in the nation in today's homecoming game at Ames. Kickoff is 1 p.m. at Cyclone

"It's a big challenge," Iowa State sophomore linebacker Tim Sanders

Big does not quite capture the magnitude of the challenge facing Iowa State (0-5 overall, 0-1 Big Eight). The Cyclone rushing defense ranks 106th of 107 NCAA Division I-A teams, allowing

270.4 yards per game. Kansas (3-2, 0-1) is averaging 272.6 rushing yards per game, which ranks ninth nationally, despite rushing for just 70 yards in a loss to Kansas State in its last outing.

Further, Iowa State's run-oriented option attack faces a Kansas defense that is allowing only 83 yards rushing per game.

Yet, somehow, Iowa State is only a 14-point underdog.

Walden said the return of offensive linemen Doug Ragaller and, possibly, Mark Konopka, and quarterback Todd Doxzon could be the tonic for Iowa State's struggling offense. All three have been idled by injuries and in their absence the Cyclone offense has sputtered, managing only 264 yards and 13.2 points per game.

"I don't think Kansas is the key, I think our own players being out there will be the key," Walden said. "You

#### Holyfield scoffs at tests

ATLANTA (AP) - Former heavyweight champion Evander Holyfield says a diagnosis of sarcoidosis, a disease that often attacks the lungs and heart, will not interfere with his plans to make a comeback.

Holyfield said Thursday he plans to fight either in November or December in Atlanta before attempting another shot at a title bout.

He said he underwent tests this week under the supervision of his internist, Dr. Christopher Vaughns, who diagnosed the sarcoidosis.

"They said I passed all my tests and I could get back in there without a health problem,' Holyfield said. "I'm cleared to fight and I'm applying for a license."

## Massimino leaves UNLV for \$1.75 million

#### Ex-coach angrily defends himself, terms of deal

LAS VEGAS — At first speaking in a slow cadence, and then raising his voice and gesturing with his hands, Rollie Massimino on Friday night announced his resignation as basketball coach at UNLV.

Massimino will walk away with a settlement of \$1.75 million, to be paid in monthly installments over the next five

At a crowded press conference Massimino defended his controversial contract, saying in a loud voice — nearly a shout — that the supplemental contract he had agreed to "over a dish of macaroni" was not illegal.

"May I mention that whatever I went through, that you've got to understand, it's something very special, collegiate athletics and education," Massimino said, raising his voice. "I went through a lot. ... Now it is time to move on. Let's be happy and be excited and support the new coach, whoever he is."

Massimino also said: "I thought I

learned an awful lot in my life, until I went through this.'

UNLV Athletic Director Jim Weaver said there would be no basketball practice today, the first day it is allowed under NCAA rules. Weaver said there might not be practice until next Wednesday or Thursday.

He said Massimino's buyout will be funded by the university.

"The money will be coming from our athletic department budget. We will not be using any outside funds in order to that informal talks had been held

take care of the obligations with respect to this agreement," Weaver said. 'We think we have a shortfall of \$150,000 to \$180,000. We are very hopeful that money will be made up with new ticket sales."

Massimino will keep all the money UNLV is to pay him even if he gets another job, Weaver said.

Massimino's replacement is expected to be Tim Grgurich, a former Jerry Tarkanian assistant, now an assistant coach with the Seattle SuperSonics.

Guinn said that he had not talked with Grgurich yet, but sources had said

through intermediaries and that Grgurich did have an offer to consider.

Earlier in the week, a close friend said Grgurich was "very excited" about the possibility of returning to UNLV. Grgurich never moved his family out of town when he went to Seattle and has a clause in his SuperSonics contract that allows him to leave for any college job.

The mechanism for Massimino's removal was the discovery of a secret supplemental contract he had signed with former UNLV president Robert Maxson, a contract that had never gone before the school's Board of Regents for




