MES — Something special and somewhat surprising occurred in Cyclone Stadium Thursday night. Ohio University 5-foot-7 freshman quarterback Kareem Wilson scored on a 60-yard keeper 11 seconds into the fourth quarter, giving the Bobcats a 21-12 lead over Iowa State. The Cyclones and their 32,817 fans were stunned, and it looked like a typical ISU fade.

Nay, nay. The Cyclones got right back up and immediately began to wipe out its foe the way a Big Eight team is supposed to wipe out someone from the Mid-American Conference.

Sophomore tailback Troy Davis carried the Cyclones to victory with 104 of his school-record 291 rushing yards in the quarter, then got carried away by jubilant ISU students. The students swamped the field, ripped down a goalpost in swift and efficient fashion, and lifted and toted the newest sports hero on campus.

The first three quarters were the Iowa State football of familiarity, and familiarity breeds contempt. But this business of dominating a foe (any foe) and getting treated like heroes by the student body was weird, wild stuff.

"I don't feel bad at all that Gene's got to buy a damn new goalpost," a perspiration-drenched McCarney said in his first postgame press conference.

ISU Athletic Director Gene Smith wouldn't mind the stadium equipment remaining unharmed, but had to appreciate the enthusiasm all the same

In the first half, the grim numbers you saw and thought about were 14-6 and 0-11. The former was the halftime score, in favor of the Bobcats. The latter was the 1995 record you mentally projected for the Cyclones.

Never mind that Ohio was running the option the way Iowa State would have been happy to run it on a regular basis the last three years under Jim Walden. This was Ohio! Last year's only 0-11 squad in I-A. A team that hadn't won its season-opener since 1978. A team from the MAC

"I honestly think in the first half it was not a good look in some of our kids' eyes," McCarney said. "They might nave been thinking 'Here we go again But we weren't gonna let them go to the

"We took the bull by the horns and said this is a different era, a different team, and different things are gonna

happen.' And for one game, anyhow, different

things did happen. After Wilson's long run under the portable lights dimmed the hopes of the home folks, ISU came up with a field

goal and a touchdown in the next 4:20 to take a 22-21 lead with 10:29 to play. Instead of being content with the comeback, the Cyclones kept pounding on both sides of the ball. The ISU defense contained Wilson and his buddies. Quarterback Jeff St. Clair never turned the ball over, the offensive line blocked

and blocked, and Davis ran. Up the middle, around the corner, here, there and everywhere. Davis ran. Big chunks of yards and little clumps.

Why, it was like a dream for the nation's leading rusher. In fact, it almost was a dream-come-true since Davis said he dreamed Wednesday night about 300 yards and three TDs. If McCarney can get Davis to have dreams like that on 10 Friday nights before Thanksgiving, the turkey will taste good in these parts.

Another lad from Miami is said to be among the top prep backs in Florida and the U.S. He is Darren Davis, Troy's brother. Darren spent three weeks in Ames this summer visiting Troy.

"I can't make his (college) decision," Trov said.

Heat's tab: \$1 million, draft pick for talks with Riley

Miami mum while team negotiates with coach

NEW YORK (AP) - The Pat Riley tampering soap opera ended in unprecedented manner Friday when the New York Knicks received \$1 million and a firstround draft pick from the Miami Heat for allowing the Heat to pursue hiring Riley.

The Knicks withdrew the tampering charges they filed against the Heat June 29 for comments

by club executives interested in hiring Riley, who still had a year remaining on his five-year deal with New York.

"We proposed something we thought was fair and we're gratified with the outcome." Knicks President David Checketts said. "I had a price that I would agree to settle for and I made that clear a couple of weeks ago, and when I got what I was looking for, I was willing to settle."

Miami said it was negotiating

with Riley and wouldn't comment further until a final agreement was reached. When asked about the team's timetable for signing Riley, spokesman Mark Pray said: "All I can tell you is that it will be in the future.


The Knicks will receive the Heat's 1996 first-round draft pick previously acquired from the Atlanta Hawks. According to Checketts, if the pick is in the top five, Atlanta will retain the pick, and the Knicks will get it the following season. That also will be true if the choice is in the top five in succeeding seasons.

"I believe that the agreement they have reached is a constructive one that will serve the longterm best interests of both teams and their fans," NBA Commissioner David Stern said.

Little Hawks' new stable of players tough

Remember former Iowa City High thoroughbreds Tim Dwight and Rob Thein?

Forget about 'em. Coach Larry Brown has traded the talents of those two studs for a stable full of quarter horses.

And the presence of these new steeds is most noticeable on the defensive side of the

City High, the two-time defending Class 4A state champions, held Cedar Rapids Kennedy to 64 total yards of offense en route to a 24-0 win in a Mississippi Valley Conference prep football opener Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

City High's speed on defense was dazzling, as players like Joey Myles, Jesse Holland, Ryan Baumert and newcomer


DeWitt Lee spent more time in the Kennedy offensive backfield then most of the Cougar running backs.

"I just love to watch our defense play," said Brown, whose City High teams have won 35 of their last 38 games dating back to 1992. "There's a lot of speed out there and they can really get after it.

"This is the fastest team we've ever had. We could put two 4-by-1 relay teams out there and probably finish first and second in the state. We've got a very fast football team."

Kennedy quarterback Cory Hannen became intimately familiar with most of City High's defensive personnel during the course of the game. He finished with 13 "carries" nine sacks, one fall and three rushes for positive vardage — for a minus-64 yards.

"They're very quick," Kennedy Coach Don Knock conceded. "They've got only one linemen actually playing in their defensive front; all those other guys have 'back' numbers on their uniforms. They're big and they're quick, and we weren't quite ready for what they were doing up

Adam Jelinek says the biggest difference between playing fullback and tailback is being able to locate holes to run through.

He found enough of them Friday night to give his Cedar Rapids Prairie football team a season-opening victory.

Jelinek ran 23 times for 107 yards and a pair of touchdowns, including a five-yard scoring burst in overtime that gave the Hawks a 20-14 win over Waterloo West in a Mississippi Valley Conference lidlifter at John Wall Field.

"When you're playing tailback, you're having to see everything before you go," said Jelinek, a tailback his senior season after spending his previous two years on varsity as a starting fullback. "At fullback, you don't know what's there, you just go. I didn't run too bad tonight. Early on, I did OK, but I think I still ran a little hesitant. I just hope I get better every

"Since we're such a juniordominated team, this win gives us a lot of confidence. This proves we can really play in the Valley. I think we're going to have a good team this



under contract. Only the day after the tampering charge was filed did the Heat ask the Knicks for permission to negotiate with Riley, and general manager Ernie Grunfeld refused. A recent report in The New

York Times indicated that before Riley told the Knicks he was quitting, he gave the Heat a 14-point memo that included a list of demands, including 20 percent ownership, before he would coach that team.

Citing three unidentified sources, the newspaper said Arison acknowledged the memo in the hearing with Stern.

The Times also reported Riley contacted the Heat about a coaching job because he thought he would be released from his contract with New York in exchange for not jeopardizing the recent sale of the Knicks.
