## What if ISU had thrived?

hat would life have been like for the Iowa football program had it not dominated Iowa State over the last dozen years?

What if ISU had consistently featured a competitive football team, a respected entity that could have held its own against the Hawkeyes on the scoreboard and in wooing in-state talent?

Iowa's Hayden Fry says he picked the brains of some of the game's sages when he was a novice college head coach at SMU in the 1960s. For advice in dealing with border wars in Texas. he turned to Duffy Daugherty, then Michigan State's coach. Daugherty was 10-7-2 against Michigan between 1954 and 1972, and was 7-2-1 against former Wolverines coach Bump Elliott.

Fry said Daugherty told him to do two things. One, dominate in-state recruiting. Two, win the majority of your intrastate games.

He forgot this: Three, walk on water. SMU was going against a pack of big Southwest Conference dogs in Texas.

But when Fry came to Iowa, he remembered Daugherty's counsel. His Hawkeyes lost three of their first four meetings with Iowa State, but Iowa quickly began to rule the recruiting roost. ISU's most recent win over Fry's Hawks came in 1982. Daugherty never had it that good against Michigan.

So we seemingly go into today's Iowa-Iowa State game with yet another mismatch about to transpire. Some think Dan McCarney's first ISU outfit will come out breathing enough fire to light every portable grill in the Cyclone Stadium parking lot. But, as has been shown a time or 12 since 1982, emotion alone doesn't win this game.

Again, consider what would have become of the Hawks had they gone 6-6 or worse against ISU in their last 12 meetings. How would the remainder of some of Iowa's more successful seasons have gone had that automatic win over the Cyclones been replaced by a confidence-

How much less preparation for Big Ten opponents could Fry's staff have done in the spring and August had the Iowa State game been more imposing and important? How many fewer good in-state players would have joined the Hawks had ISU provided an alternative to Iowa kids who wanted to stay close to home and win?

Of course, part of the reason Iowa State has been down in football is that Iowa has helped keep it down. Perhaps McCarney will lead Iowa State to the status he fully intends to attain. But he'll almost certainly have to beat his

once-beloved Hawkeyes to do so. Which brings us to today's matinee in Ames. Can McCarney get a leg up on his former employer today? Sure, but probably only if at least two of the fol-

lowing things happen: 1) The Cyclones have two or three 8minute scoring drives.

2) Iowa fumbles a lot.

3) ISU's defense takes a quantum leap forward from a week ago.

Ohio University rushed for 218 yards against the Cyclones Aug. 31. Last Saturday, TCU amassed 504 total yards with a balanced run-pass combination in its 27-10 triumph over ISU.

So what's to stop the Hawks from scoring early and often today, other than themselves?

Iowa State's emotion, you say? Hmmm. You can travel quite a distance on emotional fuel, but can you motor for 60 full minutes against a team that appears to be a lot better?

Stranger things have happened than the Cyclones winning today, but hey, the world is full of strange things. Bob Packwood kept a diary, the Harlem Globetrotters lost a game this week, and the hottest movie in the country is about three drag queens.

Still, an ISU win would be mighty, mighty peculiar. A close game might be a little odd.



week. The league's 21/2-month lockout, which prevented offseason signings, will be lifted Monday.

"If you're going to have a lockout, probably the best time to do it is the summertime," NBA Commissioner David Stern said.

The salary cap will rise from \$15.9 million last season to \$23 million this season, and rookies will be limited to three-year contracts. Training camps will open as scheduled on Oct. 6 and the season will start on time on Nov. 3.

Deputy commissioner Russ Granik said almost all the teams will be over the cap when business resumes Monday because of free agents they don't intend to re-sign.

"We think trading activity is pent up and is going to explode, especially among the expansion teams,"

## Cocaine raid nets Smith

MIAMI (AP) - Former Miami Dolphins running back Sammie Smith was charged Friday with intent to distribute cocaine after a raid in an Orange County neighborhood where he was considered a hometown hero.

Federal and local authorities described Smith as the biggest catch in a four-month effort to rid the crime-ridden Orlando suburb of Zellwood of cocaine dealers. Smith, a record-breaking running back at Florida State, could face life in prison, if convicted.

Smith, 28, who lives in Apopka, near Zellwood, had about 15 pounds of cocaine in his car when about 100 law enforcement officials in cars, helicopters and SWAT vehicles moved in Thursday evening, sheriff Kevin Beary said Friday.

# Lynx, all 18, pound LaSalle

5 straight scores in 2nd half key 36-6 victory

The North Linn football team is a living, breathing example of how quality can beat quantity any day of the week.

At least on Friday nights in September

With just 18 players suited up, the Lynx scored straight five touchdowns to open the game and beat Cedar Rapids LaSalle, 36-6, in a Class 1A District 6

opener at Lancer Field. The Lynx (3-0 overall) dominated every phase of the game in jumping to a 30-0 halftime lead, a fast start that didn't surprise Coach Mike Falconer.

"We had a really big game (last week) against Jesup where

Lynx quarterback Charles Mills and running back Luke Haughenbury were the key players for North Linn Friday night.

Mills, a junior, completed 8 of 16 passes for 107 yards and two touchdowns. He also scored a pair of TDs on 1-yard sneaks. Haughenbury, a senior, cared, turned and churned for 127 yards. He scored the Lynx first touchdown on a 3-yard run with 5:52 left in the first period.

North Linn finished with 218 yards on the ground.

"Luke is tough, and Charles Mills is just doing a fantastic job," Falconer praised.

"He's taking the pressure off Luke. Teams are keying on Luke, and without Charles at quarterback completing those passes, we'd be in trouble. (The opposition) would be able to come right up on the line and stuff Luke.

"We have a very well-balanced team. If they want to stop Luke, we're going to hit 'em somewhere else. If they want to stop that, we're going to give it to Luke.'

Haughenbury's opening TD capped a five-play, 22-yard drive set-up by his 22-yard punt return. Clay Schulte blocked a LaSalle punt on the Lancers' ensuing possession, giving the Lynx the ball on the LaSalle 23.

On their first play from scrimmage, Mills threw a spiral to Bret Haughenbury, who hauled snagged it in the left corner of the end zone for another quick six points.

North Linn had to work a little harder for its final three TDs, putting together drives of 78, 53 and 57 yards.

Luke Haughenbury and Eric Caryl were the workhorses in all three drives, the first of which ended with a 19-yard touchdown pass from Mills to Daniel Miller and the last two with Mills' 1-yard dives.

LaSalle (1-2) got its only score when Chad Klostermann - who missed last week's game with a groin pull - went 23 yards off a draw play for a touchdown with 3:27 left in the game.

"I was glad to see Chad run well, but it was too little, too late," Schulte said.




