Cedar Rapids Washington is alive. Needing three victories to have a shot at making the state playoffs, the Warriors scored 18 fourth-quarter points and defeated Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 39-21, Friday night in Mississippi Valley Conference football.

The Warriors are 4-3 and close with games at Dubuque Hempstead and home against Cedar Rapids Prairie.

Keith Lesmeister passed for 183 yards and three touchdowns, Casey Prince had 182 all-purpose yards and Dan Tyne kicked a crucial field goal and four extra points for the Warriors.

"There were a lot of reasons to win."

Washington Coach Paul James said. "We talked all week about what would mean the most to us: the playoffs, a winning season . . . The biggest thing was the pride of playing a city team."

James lauded his coaching staff for taking a team that had gone 2-15-1 as sophomores the past two seasons and put them in position to make the playoffs. "It's just been a great job with skills and working on the mental side of it," he said.

Lesmeister drilled a 15-yard touchdown pass to Jason Dougherty for Washington's go-ahead score, and Tyne kicked the point for a 28-21 Warrior lead with 10:05 remaining.

Tyne, a 5-foot-8 junior, booted a 30-

ington up, 31-21. James felt his team got a big emotional lift from the kick.

Prince closed the scoring with his second TD, a 3-yard slant with 2:16 left. He scored earlier from 19 yards.

Prince, a solid senior, had just 34 yards rushing at halftime but finished with 129 on 22 carries. He also caught two passes for 53 yards and punted six times for a 36.1-yard average.

'They have so much size on us that it was tough at first," Prince said. "I think it was us that was better conditioned. Cornish, continuing a terrific season, also caught a 30-yard touchdown pass over two Kennedy defenders in the first half. He has seven TD receptions in




