Wisniewski fined \$50,000

NEW YORK — Oakland Raiders guard Steve Wisniewski was fined \$50,000 by the NFL on Thursday for two on-field incidents.

Wisniewski was fined \$30,000 for his third unneccesary roughness penalty of the season. Late in last Sunday's game with Detroit, he was penalized for launching himself into a Lions player in a downfield pileup after a pass play

Commissioner Paul Tagliabue added on a \$20,000 fine for Wisniewski's charging and making contact with a game official, also in the fourth quarter.

Earlier this season, Wisniewski, an eight-year veteran, was fined \$5,000 for unnecessary roughness in a Sept. 8 game against Kansas City, and another \$10,000 for an indentical foul in a Sept. 29 games against Chicago. Wisniewski has been fined \$65,000 this season for on-field misconduct.

No charges in death

■ CEDAR FALLS — No charges will be filed in the death of former Northern Iowa football player Randy Schultz, who died in a fight at his home.

The Black Hawk County attorney's office announced Thursday it would not charge anyone in the case. The county attorney's office looked into the matter after Cedar Falls police investigated and filed no

Schultz, 52, bled to death Oct. 4 from internal injuries after he fell against a table. Authorities said Schultz had been fighting with an unidentified family member.

That turnover was about the only thing Bryant, 18, did wrong in the Lakers' 90-80 win over the Dallas Mavericks. He hit all four of his shots - including a 3-pointer and a running dunk --- and added two assists.

Lee's contract rejected

■ NEW YORK — Travis Lee's record \$10 million contract with the Arizona Diamondbacks was rejected by baseball officials because part of the signing bonus was to be paid after 1997.

Under the deal agreed to last week between the expansion team and the first baseman, Lee was to be paid \$1.2 million on Oct. 16, \$3.6 million on Jan. 15 and \$500,000 next June 30.

The remainder was due by Dec. 1, 1997, but the Diamondbacks were given the option of converting it to a three-year major-league contract with salaries of \$1 million in 1998, \$1.5 million in 1999 and \$2 million in 2000.



Cougars strike early, then watch Wahlert roll

Gazette sportswriter Just more than halfway through the third quarter of Thursday night's Mississippi Valley Conference football game between Dubuque Wahlert and Cedar Rapids Kennedy, the clouds opened and it began to rain.

The short shower seemed eerily appropriate, considering Wahlert was busy raining on Kenne-

dy's homecoming celebration. The Golden Eagles broke a 7-7 tie with a pair of touchdowns in a 17-second span of the third period, and went on to whip the Cougars, 33-7, at

cold and windy Kingston Stadium. The win was the sixth straight for No. 9-ranked Wahlert (6-1), which translates into a third straight playoff berth.

"We told them this week that six wins usually gets you in. I think they deserved to know that," said Wahlert Coach Mike Cooper. "I'm just on Cloud 9 that we've won six games.'

Kennedy (3-4) had its two-game win streak snapped, and the loss will likely keep the Cougars home for the postseason.

"I thought we came out flat tonight," said Kennedy Coach Don Knock. "We've had three pretty emotional weeks, and with homecoming and playing on Thursday, it's tough to come out and play. Plus you're playing the No. 9 team in the state, and they're good. They have a good football team. . . . Once they got up on us, it was pretty much over.'

Wahlert was better than Kennedy on both sides 216 yards and three touchdowns on 27 carries to to cap a seven play, 69-yard drive.

"We've played outstanding defense for about four weeks now," Cooper said. "(The defense) showed a lot of courage tonight. (Steinburg) is a good back. He's as good a back as we've faced. We kind of shut him down, and we played a great second half.

It didn't start out that way.

Kennedy had the ball at its own 31 on its first possession of the night, and Steinburg exploded up the middle for a 69-yard touchdown run that staked the Cougars to a 7-0 lead.

'Maybe that was the kiss of death," Knock said of Steinburg's long run. "That was the worst thing that could have happened to us -- having all that success early. Although we ran the ball fairly well at times, we just couldn't get it downfield and into the end zone."
