It was a portent of things to come for the Indians, as West Delaware scored 21 first-quarter points and ruined Marion's Senior Night with a 42-6 victory. With the win, West Delaware

Marion averted the shutout with 1:05 left when Dan Tschopp dove over from the 3.

"They're a good football team," Messerli said of West Delaware. "They were more physical than us up front, that's for sure. Their backs run well and they've got a good defense. I don't think they've got very many weaknesses.'

West Delaware racked up 410 yards, 357 on the ground.
