## 0-1 requires some healing

**H**alf the high school football teams in Eastern Iowa take the field tonight with 0-1 records.

On the heels of two weeks of practice following several months of anticipation, a first-game defeat is a jolt.

Alburnett lost its opener last Friday night at home to Maquoketa Valley, 22-0. Many of the Pirates looked anguished and confused as Coach Jim Carver spoke to them at midfield after the contest.

The fact that Maquoketa Valley is a Class 2A team and Alburnett is a 1A meant little to the Pirate players. You begin a new season with a new start, and suddenly you're 0-1.

That's a lousy feeling. It's something that puts coaches to work.

"We feel we can talk to our kids and tell them the season's not over after the first ballgame," Carver said.

The trouble is, Alburnett visits another 2A squad tonight in Central City-Springville. The Catbirds appear to have a pretty talented team this fall.

"There just aren't any 1A teams we can play that are close to us," Carver said.

Theoretically, the Pirates could start this season 0-2 and say they're ready for their seven District 6 opponents in 1A because they gained valuable experience against two bigger programs. Realistically, losing to anyone shakes a team's confidence. Especially the confidence of teens.

"I'm in my 31st year of coaching (18 at Alburnett)," Carver said, "and every year the first ballgame seems to be such a big factor."

"I think when you lose your opener, kids are disappointed because they've lost the opportunity to go 9-0 in the regular season. I think that's what they're thinking about."

During last week's post-game discussion, Carver instructed his players not to point fingers at others but to look to themselves for answers and improvement. He then sent them off to a party at one of the players' homes.

"We don't do things on the weekend with the team," he said. "We like to wait until Monday when they're back in school, to give them the weekend and a full day at school with their friends."

Alburnett was 3-6 last year, but has a fairly experienced team this season and may do some good things in district play. The Pirates probably won't see as dangerous a passing game as it faced against Maquoketa Valley.

Getting enough boys to come out for football is a headache at some small schools, but not at Alburnett.

"We have 200 kids in our high school and 55 are out for football," Carver said. "We really try to work at that. Some kids may not be very good football players, but we try to give them that experience. I feel kind of sad for those kids who don't try it."

"I love high school football. I think there are so many opportunities for kids to learn things while they're playing that are so closely related to things they'll use the rest of their lives. For instance, you have a set of rules you have to live by. If you follow them, things will turn out positively. If you break the rules, there will be negative consequences. That's the same thing as in life."

Carver said some years his best player might be an offensive lineman who will never get his name in the newspaper for his good play. He said that also is a life lesson, presumably that recognition comes and goes but the satisfaction from doing something well lasts.

"We'll get there, we'll get there," Carver told his players after last week's game. "We got away from our game plan because we fell behind, and we panicked. But it'll work. It'll work."

### DNR census nets nice trout in less than classic water

**STRAWBERRY POINT** — One of Dave Moeller's favorite fishing holes does not look much like classic trout water. Rank weeds crowd both

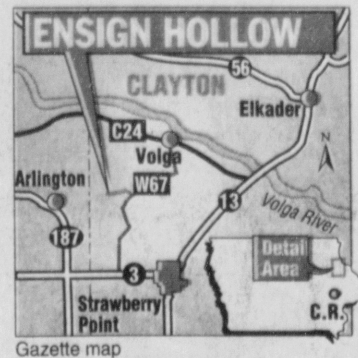
banks of Ensign Hollow, which seldom widens into anything resembling a pool.

But Moeller, Northeast Iowa District fisheries supervisor for the Department of Natural Resources, is not quite as keen on stream aesthetics as he is on big trout. And, as a DNR fish census confirmed Saturday, Ensign Hollow has plenty of them.

DNR fisheries workers, aided by members of the Hawkeye Fly Fishing Associ-

ation, counted 146 brown and rainbow trout in a ½-mile stretch of the creek.

The first pool surveyed yielded a 21-inch brown that weighed 3.95 pounds. Moeller was not surprised. He said the same fish measured 20 inches last year when he caught it during one of his

personal rod-and-reel surveys.

**BESIDES THE** 21-incher, which proved to be the day's biggest trout, dozens of other browns measured at least 16 inches, and dozens more measured between 12 and 16 inch-

es.

Whenever workers netted one of those big brown trout, oohs and aahs reminiscent of a Fourth of July fireworks audience issued from the dozens of trout enthusiasts lining the creek banks.

Saturday's survey was con-

ducted with the help of a backpack-mounted electroshock unit, which DNR fisheries technician Mark Winn used to coax the trout from beneath the more than 120

# Prairie rips Kennedy

### Sanderson's 4 touchdowns pace Hawks

**N**ow that the prep football season is two weeks old and Cedar Rapids Prairie has recorded a pair of impressive victories, you'd think Coach Craig Jelinek would start believing his 1997 Hawks are something special.

Not so fast.

"They put nine games on the schedule for a season," Jelinek said Thursday night.

#### PREP FOOTBALL

"If it was a two-game schedule we'd be champions, but that isn't the way it is."

Maybe not, but Cedar Rapids Kennedy Coach Don Knock is a believer in the ability of the Class 4A fourth-ranked Hawks.

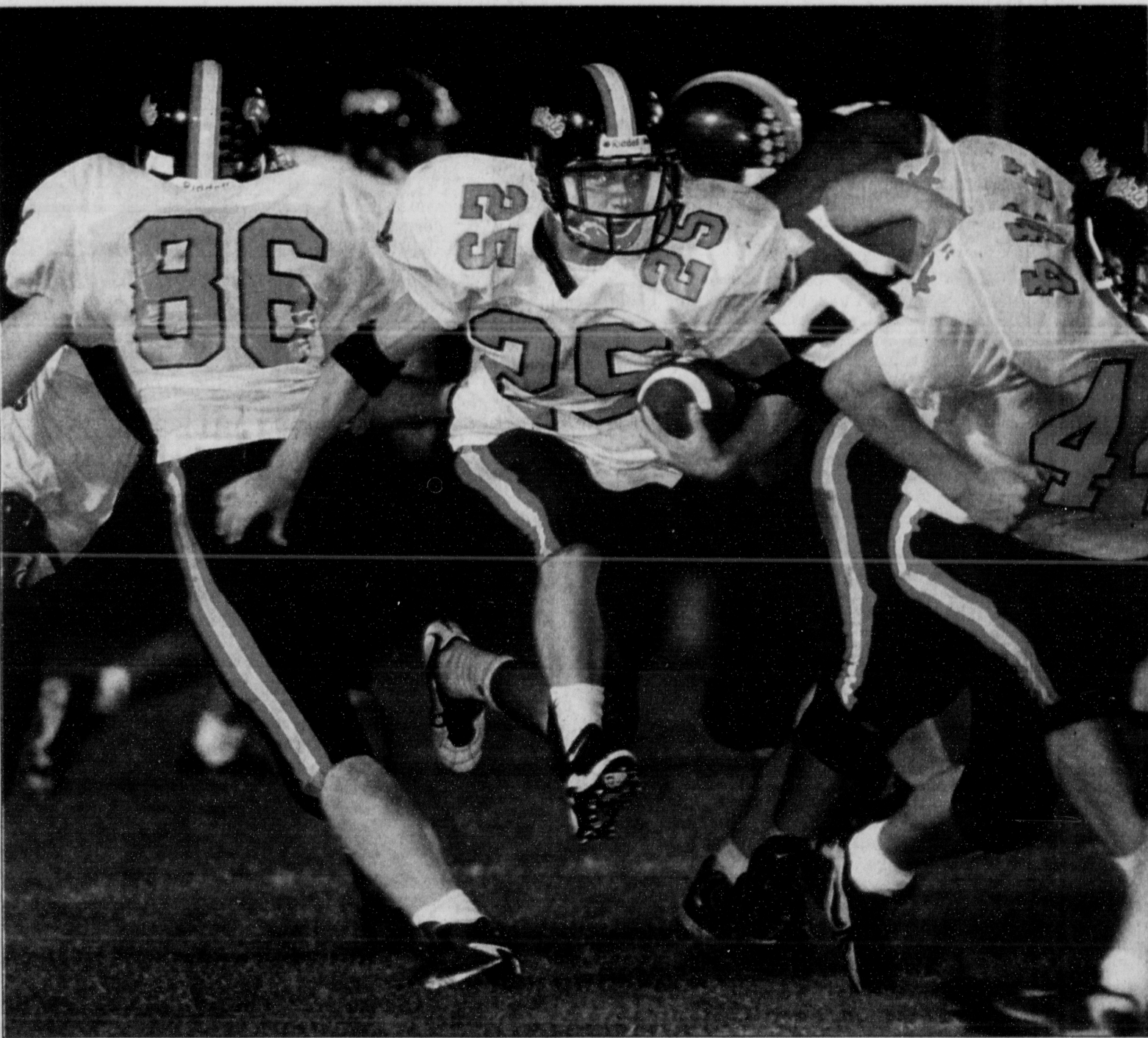
"It appears Prairie has a pretty good football team, there's no doubt about that," Knock said. "They did everything they had to do . . . and we just got our butts kicked."

Senior tailback Ben Sanderson rushed for 177 yards and scored four touchdowns and the Hawks dominated the line of scrimmage as Prairie whipped Kennedy, 41-13, in Mississippi Valley Conference play at balmy Kingston Stadium.

The Hawks improved to 2-0 after a season-opening victory over No. 5 Iowa City High. Kennedy dipped to 1-1.

The outcome was never in doubt as Prairie scored on

## Rummells shares lead in Classic

**SUTTON, Mass. (AP)** — Despite an intermittent drizzle that chilled his achy spine, Dave Rummells shot a 7-under-par 64 Thursday and was tied with Charlie Rymer for the first-round lead at the CVS Charity Classic.

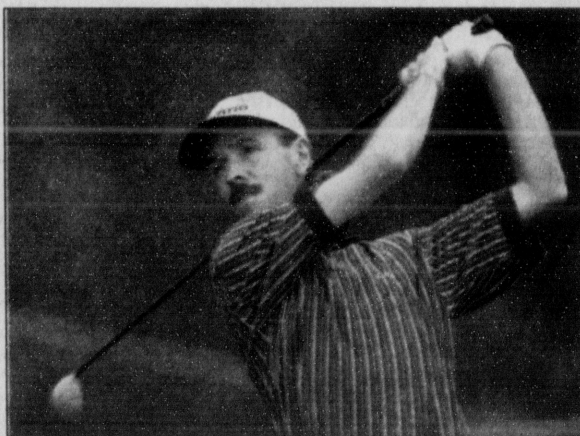
Playing in his sixth PGA Tour event since taking five months off for back treatment, Rummells made seven birdies. Rymer, who started on the back nine, parred his first seven holes before birdieing six of the next seven, then pulled even with Rummells with a birdie on No. 8.

Rummells birdied three consecutive holes before making the turn at 4-under.

Rummells felt a twinge in his back Feb. 1 in the third round at Pebble Beach, forcing him to withdraw. The problem was four bad discs — two degenerating, two bulging — that still keep him from playing a full schedule.

"(The doctor) told me not to hit, but I had to experiment some days. I'd go out and hit five balls and I'd realize I wasn't ready," Rummells said. "I really didn't feel healthy until mid-May. For as little as I've played, I'm off to a good start."

## QB knew — even while celebrating — trip to Iowa City loomed

Yup, Hawks get opportunity now for payback with Tulsa

Tulsa quarterback John Fitzgerald remembers the scene at Skelly Stadium last year after the Golden Hurricane stunned Iowa, 27-20, on a balmy Saturday night in Oklahoma.

The 19th-ranked Hawkeyes were heavy favorites, but Iowa was outplayed and outmaneuvered before 27,788 fans in the first appearance by a Big Ten

team in Tulsa.

"When we got in the locker room, everybody was just so excited, jumping and hollering and stuff," Fitzgerald said.

But Fitzgerald, who passed for 357 yards that night, also had a sobering thought amidst the jubilation.

"I think in the back of our minds, we knew that we were going to have to play them again," he said.

The time has come. Tulsa (0-1) and Iowa (1-0) meet again Saturday at Kinnick Stadium.

Tulsa entered that game last fall with a 0-2 record after losses

to SMU, 17-10, and Oklahoma

State, 30-9. The Golden Hurricane had compiled losing marks of 4-7, 4-6-1, 3-8 and 4-7 the previous four years and there was no indication 1996 would be any different. In fact it wasn't. Tulsa finished 4-7 last year, too.

But they whipped the Hawk-

eyes, who finished 9-3 and won a bowl game.

"We'd had two poor performances in the two prior games and we kind of felt a sense of urgency," said Tulsa receiver Wes Caswell, who tormented Iowa with seven catches for 120 yards and a touchdown. "The coach had told us that John was going to play quarterback and he was going to stay with John, no matter what. I felt a lot of confidence throughout the week knowing we were not going to go in and out with the quarterbacks."

Fitzgerald split time with

Troy DeGar against SMU and Oklahoma State, but Coach Dave Rader decided to go with the younger quarterback. Fitzgerald responded with the best game of his life.

Iowa took the opening kickoff and marched to a touchdown and 7-0 lead, but the rest of the game was a nightmare for the Hawks, who admit they were overconfident.

Tulsa quickly drove for a field goal and served notice it came to play. The Golden Hurricane used a variety of formations, spread the field with three and four wide receivers and proceed-

## Twins' Molitor weighing options

■ MINNEAPOLIS — Paul Molitor, a member of baseball's 3,000-hit club, is considering joining a new team next season if he's not happy with the Minnesota Twins' direction in 1998.

The Twins star has met twice in recent weeks with team owner Carl Pohlad to talk about his future. Pohlad has tried to make sure that Molitor, 41, stays with the organization in some capacity.

Molitor has three options: activate his option to play one more year with the Twins for \$2.75 million; retire; or become a free agent and sign with another team.

If Molitor doesn't retire, he said he will look at the Twins' efforts to improve and Tom Kelly's willingness to return as the team's manager before deciding whether to sign elsewhere.

"I think it's important at this time to allow yourself to keep all of your opportunities available to you," Molitor told the Star Tribune.

## Orioles' Davis eyes return

■ BALTIMORE — Eric Davis, who underwent colon cancer surgery in June, plans to play in a game for the first time in nearly four months during the Baltimore Orioles' current homestand.

"It's going to be legendary," Davis said with a huge smile crossing his face. "As good as our fans have been during the whole ordeal, they deserve to see it first-hand and not on the ESPN highlights."

Davis, 35, had a baseball-sized tumor removed from his colon June 13. The outfielder has since undergone seven two-hour chemotherapy treatments, the worst part being "there are no good movies to watch while I'm taking it."

## De La Hoya thinking big

■ LAS VEGAS — Oscar De La Hoya doesn't just want to beat Hector "Macho" Camacho.

"My goal is to become the first man to knock him out," said De La Hoya, who will defend the WBC welterweight title Saturday night.

The unbeaten De La Hoya has had to go the distance only four times in 25 fights. He, however, has failed to knock out opponents twice in his last three fights — against Miguel Angel Gonzalez in defense of the WBC super lightweight title Jan. 18 and against Pernell Whitaker when he won the welterweight title April 12. In his last fight June 14, De La Hoya knocked out David Kamau.

## Fittipaldi doing 'very well'

■ MIAMI — Racing champion Emerson Fittipaldi was doing "very well" after back surgery, but surgeons say it will take a few days to determine if he regains full mobility. "The best news of all is that Emerson is at least as good neurologically as he was before the surgery," said orthopedic surgeon Frank Eismont of Jackson Memorial Hospital.

Fittipaldi, a two-time winner of the Indianapolis 500 and a sports hero in Brazil, underwent an operation to repair a spinal fracture and relieve partial paralysis in his left leg.

## Indy cuts qualifying

■ INDIANAPOLIS — Practice and qualifying for the Indianapolis 500 will be halved starting next year, a major break in tradition as the Indianapolis Motor Speedway competes for race fans' money and attention.

Speedway president Tony George said the change was not intended to lure back the top teams and drivers from the rival Championship Auto Racing Teams series. Instead, he said, it was a move he had been considering for several years.

## Burton looking to move up

■ LOUDON, N.H. — Jeff Burton is tired of running second, and Sunday's CMT 300 at New Hampshire International Speedway might be just what he needs to move up one more spot.

Burton, who won the Jiffy Lube 300 on the one-mile oval in July, has been a runner-up in the last two races — finishing behind Jeff Gordon in the Southern 500 at Darlington and second to Dale Jarrett in last week's Exide 400 at Richmond.

Now, Burton, who has burst into Winston Cup stardom this season, will be going after his first season sweep at a race track.

## Rule interpretation briefly benches OSU athletes

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Twenty athletes at Ohio State were declared ineligible — and the eligibility of another 37 was questioned — because athletics administrators incorrectly interpreted a Big Ten rule.

None of the 57 athletes will be penalized because of the error. Ohio State declined to say who the athletes were or what sports they participate in.

"We simply missed on a reading of an interpretation," Ohio State Athletics Director Andy Geiger said Thursday. "I am convinced within our organization there was no effort to defraud. They just were looking at it one way and that is the problem."

The conference has restored eligibility to all fall athletes and is expected to do the same for the others.

The 20 fourth-year athletes were declared ineligible based on incorrect certification in their third year. Credits were incorrectly counted in the athletes' major.

Big Ten Conference rules specify that athletes entering their third year must pass 77 degree hours toward the specific major they have just declared.

Ohio State officials misinterpreted what comprised those 77 degree hours.

They believed classes taken by the

athletes while they were exploring other majors during their first two years would be counted toward the 77-hour requirement. According to Big Ten rules, they were not.

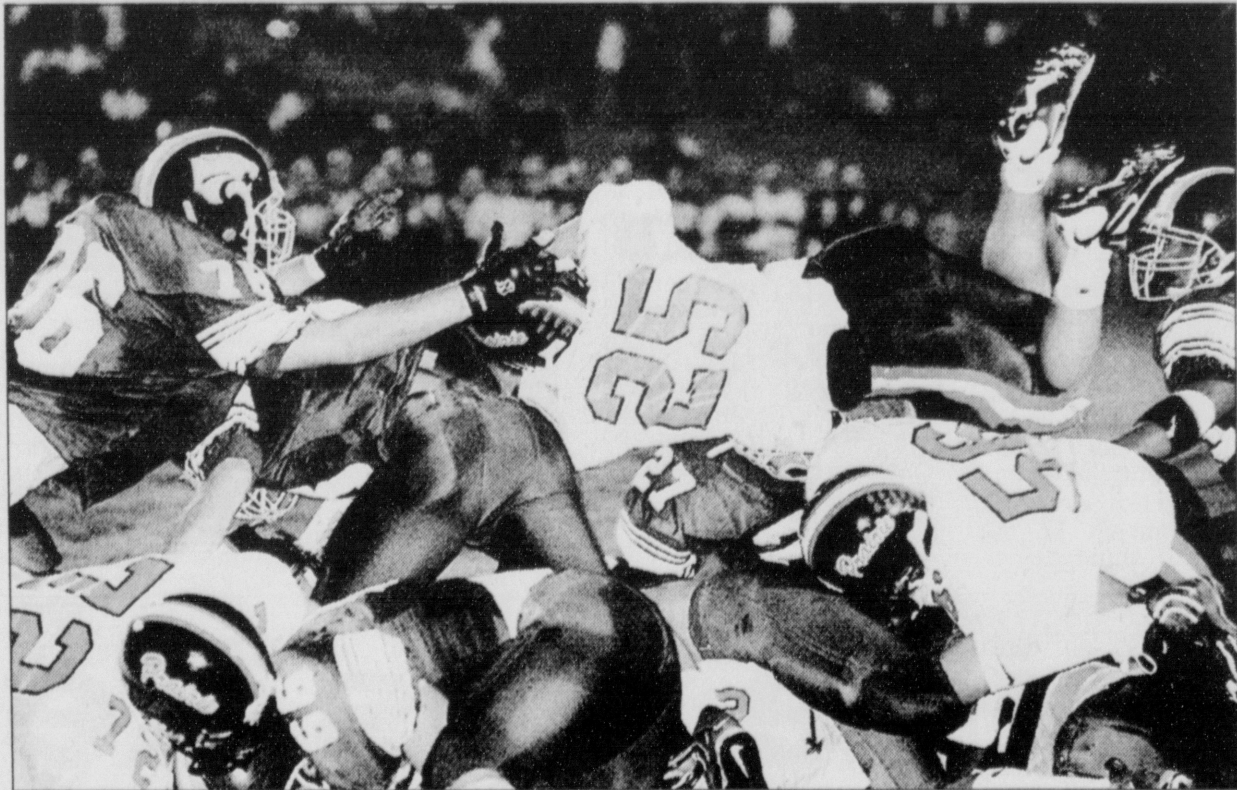
NCAA requirements are less stringent than the Big Ten's. Ohio State met all NCAA rules.

When the error was discovered in August, Ohio State immediately declared the 20 athletes in question ineligible and then petitioned the Big Ten to have the eligibility restored.

The Big Ten's Committee on Com-

pliance, chaired by Michigan faculty representative Percy Bates, restored the eligibility of the athletes participating in fall sports due to immediacy and is reviewing the cases of the others. The committee will still decide whether Ohio State will be penalized.

The eligibility of the first group submitted to the Big Ten was restored Aug. 27, the day before Ohio State opened its football season. Ohio State petitioned the Big Ten on behalf of the remaining 37 athletes, asking for a waiver of the 77-degree hour rule. That petition was approved for all 37.

four of its five first-half possessions to build a 27-0 halftime lead. It was 41-0 before Kennedy's J.C. Steinburg tallied a pair of fourth-quarter TDs against Prairie reserves.

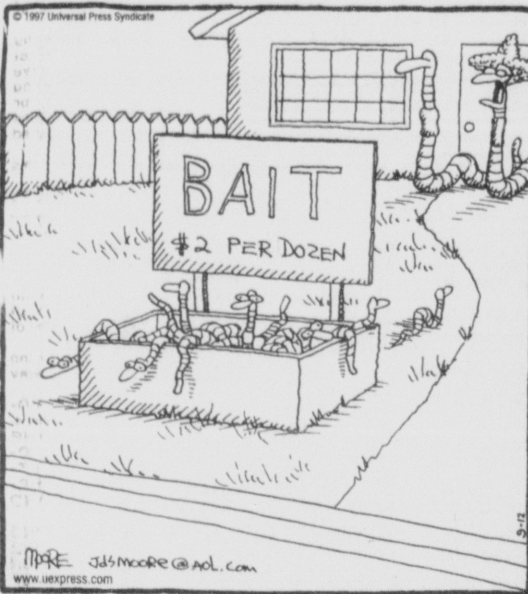
