Big 2nd half carries City High past Kennedy

Scott Gordon played only four defensive snaps in the third quarter Friday night, but his effort on the fourth play delivered the wakeup call Iowa City High needed.

One play after he caught the go-ahead touchdown pass, Gordon popped the ball loose from J.C. Steinburg on a long-gainer. It led to another City High score in a 28-7 victory over Cedar Rapids Kennedy in Mississippi Valley Conference football at Kingston Stadium.

"Any time you can get a turnover, you go for it," said Gordon, a senior

linebacker. "I made sure I could get the tackle on him and I went under his arm and tried to pop it loose."

"You could tell it just lit up everybody. That gave us a great opportunity to turn it around."

Fifth-ranked City High (2-1), played to a 7-7 stand-off by an inspired Cougar team in the first half, and scored four plays after Gordon forced a loose ball and John Pantazis recovered. Steinburg had gained 25 yards on the run and appeared headed for more, when Gordon intervened.

Little Hawk quarterback Tony Burrier dashed 34 yards on the next play and fullback Nathan Haag scored three

snaps later from the 3, giving City High a 20-7 lead on the last play of the third quarter.

City High ran 20 plays to Kennedy's 4 in the third period. In the first 19 minutes of the second half, the Little Hawks had a 30-8 bulge in plays.

"You can't ask your defense to be on the field that long," Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "If you don't have the ball, you can't score. I'm proud of the kids but we've got to quit being so good to people."

The City High option attack produced 355 rushing yards. Junior tailback Justin Coyer had 143 yards and two touchdowns on 27 carries, Burrier had

89 yards and Haag 87.

"We just came out and executed on both sides of the ball in the second half," City High Coach Larry Brown said. "Scott Gordon is a senior who's been there before. He played about every down for us last year and he made some big plays tonight. Kennedy has some excellent athletes and did a real nice job, though."

Steinburg, the Valley's leading rusher with 360 yards in his first two games, was explosive in the first half. He broke a half-dozen tackles on his first carry and roared 74 yards to a touchdown.

Steinburg had 142 yards on 12 carries

in the first half. But because City High had the lead, Steinburg carried the ball only five times in the last two periods. He finished with 169 yards.

Kennedy's defense, inspired by big plays from Tim Misfeldt and Randall Hinrichs, twice stopped City High drives inside the Cougar 25-yard line in the first half.

The Cougars had a chance to take the halftime lead, but failed on downs at the City High 7-yard line with three seconds left.

Not so sweet home-opener for Marion

It was a disappointing home start for the Marion football team Friday night at Thomas Park.

Senior Brandon Starr ran for 118 yards and two touchdowns and junior quarterback Tadd Crist threw a pair of touchdown passes to lead Maquoketa past Marion, 28-12, in a Class 3A District 4 prep football opener.

Marion had won its first two non-district games and was hoping for a quick start in district play. Instead, the Indians got trampled by Maquoketa's option offense and the passing of Crist.

"When I came here in 1979, Maquoketa had lost like 20 straight to Marion," Maquoketa Coach Mark Hillebrand said.

"We finally won one here in 1991 and I think this is our third straight win here. Early in the '80s if you would have told me that was going to happen, I would have said you were nuts."

Instead, the Cardinals drove Marion nuts with a two-pronged offensive attack that produced 408 total yards. Maquoketa's defense wasn't bad, either, holding Marion to 276 total yards and continually frustrating Indians senior quarterback Alex Dvorsky, who was 5 for 20 and had two passes intercepted.

"They're a good football team," Marion Coach Dave Messerli said.

Maquoketa had scoring drives of 96 and 78 yards in building a 14-0 lead by halftime. Crist, who completed 9 of 17 passes for 173

yards, threw a 37-yard touchdown pass to senior flanker Casey Stillmunkes for the Cardinals' first touchdown and Starr slammed in from the 1 for their second score. The latter came with 2:13 left in the half.

Maquoketa then took the second half's opening kickoff and marched 80 yards for a touchdown. Starr once again scored from the 1. The 13-play drive, all rushes, took 5 minutes, 48 seconds off the clock.

"That really hurt us," Messerli said. "They ran the option and it seemed like we had the quarterback stopped one time and the next time we didn't have the pitch man."

The 6-foot-5 Crist gained 47 yards running the option and a couple sneaks during the drive that pushed the Cardinals' lead to 21-0.

"Some people think he's not a tough kid," Hillebrand said. "But I think he's very comparable to where Sage Rosenfels was at the same point in his career."

Rosenfels, a red-shirt freshman, is Iowa State's second-string quarterback.

Hillebrand said he came into the game wary of Dvorsky, a three-year starter. A couple of dropped passes and some big hits from the Cardinal second-

ary perhaps made the Indians gunshy.

"We just weren't as sharp as we had been and that really hurt us," Messerli said.

Marion finally got on the scoreboard when sophomore Matt Wycoff crashed in from the 2-yard line with 2 seconds left in the third quarter. Wycoff had 102 yards rushing, his third game in excess of 100.

The Indians forced a Maquoketa punt and got the ball back at their own 28, but an illegal procedure penalty and three incompletions forced a punt and Maquoketa got the ball back at the Marion 43.

On fourth-and-3 from the 16, Crist whipped a touchdown pass to senior tight end John Claus that put the game away, 28-6, with 7:06 left.

Dvorsky's 6-yard touchdown pass to Billy Offerman with 4:07 remaining cut Marion's deficit to 28-12.

The Indians tried an onside kick, but the ball glanced out of bounds off a Maquoketa player and the Cardinals ran out the clock.

Next Friday: Marion plays at DeWitt Central, Maquoketa hosts Vinton-Shellsburg.

Ozburn, Phillips lift 9th-ranked Lions

Cameron Ozburn and Todd Philipps both scored a pair of touchdowns as ninth-ranked Lisbon opened Class A District 8 play with a 34-6 prep football victory over Iowa City Regina Friday night in Iowa City.

Philipps had 137 yards on four punt returns, including a 78-yard touchdown run for the Lions (3-0, 1-0).

Regina falls to 1-2, 0-1.

Jefferson's offense got untracked late in the second quarter, when the J-Hawks drove 53 yards — mostly on the strength of McCracken's crisp passing — to West High's 23-yard line. But Weldon squelched the threat with a diving interception in the left corner of the end zone.

The J-Hawks mounted another impressive drive early in the third quarter, down 28-0, moving to West High's 8-yard line after Garner's fumble recovery set

them up at their own 44. But a fourth-down pass fell incomplete to end that threat.

Weldon followed with his 91-yard TD run, which was opened up by a big block from Davis and a nifty spin move. On West High's next possession, Weldon took a five-yard pass from Whisler and ran 41 yards for a the score. Kaeding's kick made it 42-0.

Both coaches substituted freely after that, and Jefferson finally put points on the board with 57 seconds left in the game, on Josh Vranish's five-yard run.

"We made some mistakes, but West High played excellent on both sides of the ball," J-Hawks Coach Dave Jacobson said. "I'm very anxious to see how we respond for next week."

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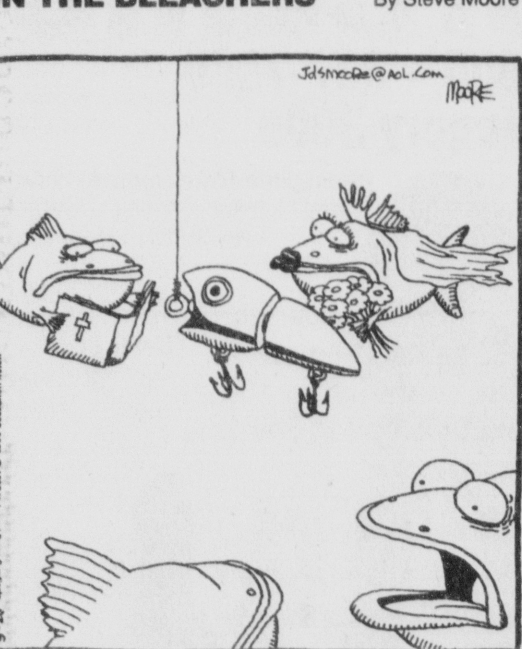
