
weekend as the AL ast champion Orioles play at the AL Central champ Indians in Games 3 today (3 p.m., KFXA


KOHAWK HOMECOMING



Ho-hum Trojans prevail

Second-ranked Iowa City West didn't appear to be the most inspired team in its 35-12 victory over Waterloo West Friday night, so some of postgame gloom was understandable, even though the Trojans improved to 6-0 in somewhat ho-hum fashion.

Cedar Rapids Kennedy's horses ran wild Friday night, and there was absolutely nothing Cedar Rapids Washington could do to corral them.

Kyle Bassett passed for 242 yards and a touchdown, and J.C. Steinburg rushed for 204 yards and four TDs as the Cougars stampeded the Warriors, 41-20, in a Mississippi Valley Con-

Stadium. Kennedy (4-2) totaled 486 yards of offense in a balanced attack that featured 244 yards on the ground and

mance he hoped to see from his team after a tentative, come-from-behind win over Waterloo East last week. 'The kids really came out to

That line, which features the likes of Kyle Knock, Tim Velky, David Riley and Josh Woodland, wore its pride on its sleeve Friday, and Bassett, Steinburg and receiver Ryan Pauly were the beneficiaries.

Bassett overthrew his receivers on three of his first four passes before settling into a groove. Five of his nine completions covered 24 vards or more, including a pretty 73-yarder to Pauly for a third quarter touchdown that put the Cougars up, 41-7.

Packers seek first stock offering in 47 years

Team says it needs money for salaries, Lambeau improvements

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) - Back in 1950, the Green Bay Packers asked the community to rescue a financially crumbling franchise by buying shares of stock at \$25 apiece.

Now, they're asking those same stockholders to bail them out again. The defending Super Bowl champions have called a special shareholders meeting on Nov. 13 to seek approval of a plan to raise up to \$80 million through their first stock sale in 47

The fund-raiser would keep the franchise viable in the face of skyrocketing player bonuses and salaries and also allow the team to create a largesse for Lambeau Field improvements or eventual replacement.

"If approved by the shareholders, this decision could some day be regarded as the most important in the

history of this storied franchise," team stability of this organization." president Bob Harlan said Friday.

The team's 1,915 shareholders will be asked to approve the sale of 400,000 new shares at \$200 each. If approved by stockholders and the league, the new stock would have watered-down voting rights.

"The shareholders, as you know, that's our elite group. Those are the people who own this ballclub," Harlan said. "We're asking them to make a vitally important decision we think will have a great bearing on the

The NFL Finance Committee will review the proposal Monday at the owners meetings in Washington, D.C., league spokesman Greg Aiello said.

The Packers first proposed a stock sale this spring, but the NFL said the team had to make some unspecified changes before receiving its blessing.

The team reportedly has about \$20 million in reserve, some of which is going to pay off quarterback Brett Favre's \$12 million signing bonus on his new \$47.25 million contract.



"I just saw it and caught it," Ebinger said. "Last year in a sophomore game, we had a fourth-down play, the same play, but I got hit in the end zone and I dropped it. This time, I couldn't drop it. I wanted it so bad.'

Ebinger lined up to kick the winning extra point but a bad snap eluded Mroch and the try failed.

Linn-Mar's Chris Nebraska returned the ensuing kickoff to the 42, but on third down Linn-Mar quarterback Buzzy Bussewitz was intercepted at the Regis 35 by Celichowski, who raced past a load of defenders to the Linn-Mar 7 with 52 seconds left.

"They ran that play, a deep throw to the outside, all game long," Celichowski said. "That was the only pass play they ran all night. I just read it all the way.

A pair of Ryan Brady runs took it to the 1 with 18 seconds remaining. After calling his final timeout, Vaughn rolled to the left on the next play and leaped over a defender into the end zone for the winning score.

Brady added the two-point conversion

"We've gotten better every week, and the attitude of these 30 guys, I couldn't be more proud," Regis Coach Mike Winker said. "We've never given up."
