Little Hawks grind out 20-14 win over Rams

Back in the old days, last year for instance, Iowa City High would overwhelm opponents with a handful of phenomenal athletes who would break big plays seemingly at will. With players like Jess Holland, Tim Dwight, Kahlil Hill and Rob Thein on the field, the question wasn't if they'd break one, but when.

So who were those guys grinding out running yards and controlling the clock in a 20-14 win over Dubuque Senior last night? I mean, the address was right, Bates Field. And the uniforms were red, and the helmets bore the Tiger

But was that really City High? 'Definitely a different personality," said City High lineman John Pantazis.

"It's really no secret that we don't have a Jess Holland or a Tim Dwight on our team this year, but we've got a lot of real hard workers, a lot of dedicated players who believe we can run it, grind it and take control of the clock, and that's what's going to win it."

If the sixth-ranked Little Hawks are going to make a run at defending their Class 4A title in the postseason, this may be the style it will take.

City High (5-2) probably isn't going to blow away opponents as sold as Senior (4-3), as it has in years past. Its two losses were to second-ranked Iowa City West and third-ranked Cedar Rapids Prairie, but the Little Hawks hadn't beaten anyone of real stature until

"This was a very big game," Pantazis said, who played on both sides of the line. "I didn't feel like we had beaten a really quality opponent and tonight we did, and it feels great.

The Little Hawks held a tenuous 7-6 lead at intermission but took control quickly on the first drive of the third quarter, marching 65 yards in a 12-play drive that ended in tailback T.J. Kempf's four-yard touchdown run.

'We told our offensive line at halftime that we were going to put it on their shoulders, and they responded." City High Coach Larry Brown said.

After running for just 56 yards in the first half, the Little Hawks rolled up 172 rushing yards after intermission. Of 29 carries, only six went for more than 10 yards, and none was longer than Justin Coyer's 30-yarder late in the fourth quarter.
