C.R. Kennedy's playoff hopes washed away

Dubuque Senior overwhelms Cougars

Gazette sportswriter riday night at the quagmire formerly known as Kingston Stadium, Cedar Rapids Kennedy became the team formerly known as a playoff contender.

Too many fumbles, too many interceptions, too little offense, too little defense, too little dry turf to play on. Too much for the Cougars to overcome in a 49-14 loss to Dubuque Senior.

Forget making it to the playoffs now. With a week to go in the regular season, Kennedy (4-4) finds a .500 record its new and only priority.

"This is very disappointing for the 29 seniors on this team," said Kennedy Coach Don Knock, who had few kind words to say to his squad in an end-zone meeting following the game. "But it's just one of those deals." On the other hand, Senior (5-3) sud-

denly finds itself in a rare place alive in the race for one of 16 spots in the Class 4A playoffs. The Rams — who host Cedar Rapids Regis in their season finale next week - have never qualified for postseason play. "We knew if we wanted to get into

the playoffs, we had to get this one," said Senior running back Scott Boleyn, who scored three touchdowns and rambled for 218 yards on the soupy Kingston field. "We wanted it. We played

Senior was the better team up front on both sides of the ball, and that more than anything else, told the story of the

The Rams literally ran 42 offensive plays, attempting no passes. With the exception of a 20-yard bootleg run for touchdown, quarterback Ben Duve's night consisted solely of handing off to halfback Boleyn and fullback Jeff

Boleyn, a sturdy 180-pounder, contin-

"We knew it was sloppy and we had to come out and own the line of scrimmage," Boleyn said. "We came in thinking 'run the ball'. We just took advantage of it — the cold weather, the

sloppy field. Even coming down to their plays, we felt we had the advantage.'

"I thought the weather was a big factor," said Senior Coach Pat Murphy. 'The rain gods were looking upon us tonight because I think that affected them more than us. But I also felt we played pretty well. Our offensive line and defensive line controlled the line of scrimmage, and that was a big differ-

As were six Kennedy turnovers.

The Cougars fumbled twice and were intercepted once on their first three possessions, and Senior took advantage all three times to leap to a 21-0 firstquarter lead.

Smith popped over from the 3 for Senior's first score with just over three minutes gone in the game. Then, on Kennedy's ensuing possession, Boleyn picked off a Kyle Bassett pass in the flat and strutted 56 yards for another touchdown.

Kennedy immediately fumbled again in its own territory, and Boleyn broke loose on a 28-vard scoring jaunt for the three-touchdown advantage.

Boleyn scored on a 19-yard run in the second quarter, followed by another 3-yard Smith TD. Senior's other points came on a fumble recovery in the end zone and Duve's 20-yard naked bootleg

Kennedy scored in the second quarter on a 29-yard pass from Bassett to wide receiver Ryan Pauly and in the third on a J.C. Steinburg 27-yard run. Steinburg led the Cougars with 143 yards rushing on 28 carries.

Bassett — the MVC's leading passer was thoroughly grounded by the elements, completing just 2 of 5 passes for 37 yards. He was intercepted twice.

Still, Knock refused to let the weather be a crutch for his team. "Both teams played in it," he said. 'We've got some finesse stuff we do,

we're a little bit different offensively,

The fire, which heavily damaged two Harley Davidson mogarage, broke out at 1:58 p.m. and was under control within a minute of the fire department's arrival, Bok said.

The garage sustained some smoke damage as did the motorcycles that were stored there, he said. He estimated the total

damage at \$25,000. The cause of the fire was a lamp that was knocked to the ground and ignited some gasoline on the floor, said Bok. Brands was apparently knocked backward when the gasoline caught fire.

A two-time NCAA champion for the Hawkeyes, Brands was second in the 1996 Olympic Trials. He also won world titles in 1993 and '95 and also was a member of the 1994 United States team. His brother, Tom, who is also an assistant coach at Iowa, won a gold medal in the 1996 Olympics.
