LaSalle polishes off regular season with 26-0 win

Five years after the lights first were lit on the LaSalle football field, many among the scores of volunteers who made that possible saw them go out for perhaps the last time Friday night.

Led by the brothers Grobstich, the Lancers made it a happy finale, defeating Postville, 26-0.

LaSalle High will close at the end of the school year and merge next fall with Regis to become Xavier.

The first of LaSalle's 35 football teams to win conference or district titles back-to-back retained its Class 1A District 6 crown at 6-0, and enters the

playoffs next Wednesday at 6-2 overall. Postville finished 4-3, 5-4.

"Hopefully," Coach Duane Schulte said, the Lancers' three fourth-quarter touchdowns will give them momentum going into the post-season. "But," he added, "we know whoever we play will be tough.

"With as much pressure that was on these kids to repeat as district champions and carry on LaSalle's strong football tradition, they did a great job.

"I'm not happy we lost, but I'm proud of how our kids played," said Postville Coach Chris Evers said. "They're coming around. We're very young (six seniors).

Senior quarterback Craig Grobstich

scored the first two TDs, on runs of 28 and 17 yards. But his freshman brother Matt, a third-string fullback before injuries elevated him to the starting lineup midway through the season, had the big numbers.

He finished with 142 yards on 35 carries, 88 on 21 in the second half, the last 7 for LaSalle's third TD, with 6:32 left, following Scott Shoger's 20-yard return of his second interception.

Schulte recited the names of the players blocking for Grobstich — Dan Corbett and Seth Anderson in the backfield, Chris Miller, Neil Ryan, Blake Reed, Andy Schumacher, Scott Halapua, John Sakulin and John Hoffman up front.

Brian Shedek, his injury healed, ran tough after replacing Grobstich on LaSalle's final scoring drive, 13 plays covering 72 yards. Shedek carried on seven of the last eight plays, 29 of the last 51 yards. He plowed in from the 4 with 19.5 seconds left.

Corbett's 22-yard sweep on that drive gave him 76 yards on 14 carries.

Postville got 39 of its 51 first-half yards on its last possession and finished with 47 — 27 running, 20 on its only pass completion in 14 attempts. Postville had two first downs the first half, none the second.

LaSalle totaled 298 yards rushing. Craig Grobstich was 6-11-0 passing, for 62 yards.

The Lancers scored their first TD with 5:40 left in the first period, after successive 15-yard penalties — one a face-mask call, unusual against the team with the ball — forced Postville to punt from its 6. Shoger returned 10 yards to the 28, then Craig Grobstich went all the way on a keeper left.

LaSalle spent most of the second period threatening in vain. Grobstich passed 17 yards to Josh Barta for one apparent touchdown, but it was nullified by a procedure penalty. Then the line judge signaled a TD on 3-yard Matt Grobstich plunge, but after a long confab, the officials ruled Grobstich had lost a fumble at the 2.

Mustangs roll, 34-6

Jay Davis rushed for 229 yards and four touchdowns to lead the Mustangs to a 34-6 victory Friday at Tipton, a victory that gave the Mustangs the District 5 title and a berth in next week's playoffs.

Mount Vernon improved to 7-2 overall, 6-1 in the district. Tipton closed at 5-4, 4-3.

■ **DURANT-BENNETT 20, SOLON 18** — Steve DeLong gathered in a 22-yard pass from Nate Horn with 2:20 remaining as the Wildcats stunned the Spartans in a Class 2A District 6 game at Durant.

Horn completed 17 of 26 passes for 312 yards and three touchdowns. He was intercepted

twice. Gage Huston caught 10 balls for 182 yards.

Durant-Bennett improved to 1-8 overall, 1-6 in the district.

Brent Owen passed for 166 yards and two touchdowns for the Spartans (5-4, 4-3). Keith Mahoney rushed for 102.

■ **MARION 49, VINTON-SHELLSBURG 26** — Matt Wycoff rushed for 252 yards on 26 carries and scored 4 touchdowns to lead host Marion (6-3, 4-3) over Vinton-Shellsburg (0-9, 0-7) in Class 3A District 4 play.

The Indians led, 42-14, at half-time on the strength of Wycoff's rushing and the passing combination of quarterback Alex Dvorsky to receiver Tony Millius. Dvorsky and Millius connected on touchdown passes of 35 and 30 yards.

■ **DUBUQUE SENIOR 28, C.R. REGIS 21** — Scott Boleyn scored on a 31-yard pass reception and added a 30-yard touchdown run in leading the Rams (6-3) over the Royals in Mississippi Valley Conference play at Dubuque.

■ **ALBURNETT 35, MIDLAND 0** — Ryan Hemphill rushed 22 times for 150 yards and three touchdowns and scored on a 55-yard pass from Matt Strand to lead the host Pirates (4-5, 4-3) past Midland (0-9, 0-7) in Class 1A District 6.

■ **NORTH LINN 57, IOWA CITY REGINA 14** — Bret Haughenbury picked up 287 rushing yards and added four touchdowns and Andy Hanson threw for another score as the Lynx (6-3, 5-2) rolled at Coggon.

■ **EAST BUCHANAN 27, LISBON 0** — John Pettlon rushed for 103 yards and two touchdowns in leading the Buccaneers (9-0, 7-0) in District 8 play at Lisbon (6-3, 4-3).

ressed. On the Hawks' second play from scrimmage from their own 20-yard line, he burst through the middle, headed for the left sideline and raced 80 yards for a touchdown only 1 minute, 54 seconds into the game.

The next time he touched the ball he broke loose for 27 more yards, and had four other rushes that netted 10 yards or more.

"There was a lot of running room, a lot of big holes," Sanderson said. "That was good because it was slippery and it was hard to make cuts."

Sanderson also had a 41-yard punt return.

"Ben is a gamer," Jelinek praised. "When the whistle blows and the cameras are on, he's going to be there to play. He's a great

tailback. If there's a better one around, I'd like to see him."

Prairie built a 21-0 halftime lead thanks to Sanderson's first two TD jaunts and a 52-yard pass play from quarterback Jeremy Snyder to Gary Wright.

Jefferson made it 21-7 with 9 seconds left in the third period thanks to some razzle-dazzle. Tailback Matt Johnson handed to wide receiver Ben Bosenberg on a reverse, and Bosenberg pulled up and threw a perfect pass to D.J. Willis who turned it into a 77-yard touchdown.

The J-Hawks got the ball back on an inside kick, but the Hawks' Elias Jones stepped in front of an Andrew Kuennen pass and returned it 79 yards for a touch-

down with 10:12 left in the game.

That broke Jefferson's back.

"It wasn't so much of what we *didn't* do, it was what they did," said Jefferson Coach Dave Jacobson, who led the J-Hawks to a 4-5 record. "They came out and played very well in the first half and we really challenged our kids at the start of the second half. We came out strong, and if it wasn't for that interception at 21-7, we could have possibly been 21-14."

Sanderson took a pitch and zipped 33 yards for a TD with 6:52 left to complete the scoring.

Prairie had 385 total yards. Snyder completed 7 of 11 passes for 83 yards and the TD.

decent momentum, having easily handled winning teams in their last two games.

"We're only settling for one thing," senior quarterback Nick Whisler said. That would be a state title, a goal West High reached with a 13-0 record in 1995.

The Trojans (9-0) will start their playoff run Wednesday.

A week after handing fifth-ranked Cedar Rapids Prairie its lone loss of the season, West High dominated a Dubuque Hempstead (5-4) team that was looking to create its own post-season berth.

"We hope we've got a little momentum," said tailback Matt Weldon, who ran for 111 yards and three touchdowns on just 10 carries. "We've established one of our goals already, going undefeated, but we've got a lot of steps left."

The Trojans took control early, scoring 21 unanswered points to take a 21-3 lead into intermission.

Kicker Zach Schultz gave Hempstead its lone lead with a 37-yard field goal with 7:10 left in the first quarter. The score was set up by a muffed punt, which hit an unaware Trojan setting up for the return and was recovered by Hempstead's Aaron Bock at the West High 21.

The Trojans answered with an 11-

play, five-minute drive that culminated in Nathan Robinson's eight-yard TD run. Nate Kaeding's extra-point gave the Trojans a 7-3 lead.

Weldon accounted for most of the yardage on the next scoring drive, returning a punt 24 yards to his own 34-yard line, then gaining 43 yards on three sweeps to the right, the last going 24 yards for a score.

"A lot of teams have been aware of that (sweep)," Weldon said. "We just found weakness and decided to exploit it."

Weldon added an 18-yard touchdown run on a delay with 4:21 left in the first half and ended the scoring with a similar 13-yard TD jaunt with 9:25 left in the game.

Though all of West High's scoring came from the ground game — which totaled 225 yards on 32 carries — the passing attack was key, particularly in the first half, when Trojans quarterback Nick Whisler went 7-for-9 for 94 yards.

Whisler finished with 114 yards on 10-of-17 passing, a week after torching Prairie for 178 yards and two touchdowns.

"It's in the plan," Whisler said of the air attack. "We're going to need passing for sure when we get to the playoffs, when we play the best teams around."

Linn-Mar shuts out Kennedy

Lions close out 3-6 season with 2 straight wins

You can call Greg Purnell "Old 3-6" for the second time in three years, but this time the Linn-Mar football coach doesn't mind — too much.

"I'd much rather be 'Old 3-6' instead of 'Old 2-7,'" Purnell quipped following his team's season finale Friday night.

The reason for the coach's levity was plainly obvious. Purnell and his Lions had plenty to feel good about following their 28-0 victory over Cedar Rapids Kennedy at Armstrong Field.

No, it wasn't the best of seasons for Linn-Mar, which expected to contend for a Mississippi Valley Conference title this fall. But after losing six of its first seven games, a season-ending two-game win streak — including a convincing thumping of a city rival — can do nothing but help momentum heading into 1998.

"This is the best feeling in the world to come out here tonight, even though the weather was bad, and get a victory," said Linn-Mar running back-linebacker Keith Musser, who scored a pair of touchdowns and ran for 128 yards. "It's a great way to end it, especially with a shutout. We feel like we're rolling now, and we want the season to keep going. But we're still real happy with this."

As eager as Linn-Mar is to keep playing, Kennedy is just as excited to be turning in its pads and helmets. For the second straight week, the Cougars got blown off the ball on both sides of the line of scrimmage.

Kennedy (4-5) was convincingly outrushed, 286-168. Cougar scatback J.C. Steinburg accounted for nearly all of Kennedy's offense, picking up 144 yards rushing on 26 carries.

Like many of his teammates, Kennedy quarterback Kyle Bassett suffered his second consecutive off game, too, completing just 4 of 20 passes for a measly 32 yards. He was the MVC's leading passer coming into the game.

"It looked like we were pretty flat, huh?" Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "I don't know why. We had a good week of practice, and I thought the kids were ready to play. But I don't know (what went wrong)."

It wasn't just the Musser show for Linn-Mar, either.

Junior quarterback Buzzy Bussewitz showed improved poise in leading his team into the end zone four times. He completed 7 of 12 passes for 62 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

Halfback Jordan Wagner complemented Musser in the Lion backfield by running for 119 yards and a touchdown on 15 attempts.

Bussewitz and Wagner return for Purnell next season.

"I think our juniors learned what it takes to play in the MVC," Purnell said.

Linn-Mar scored a touchdown in each quarter.

Its first came off a fake field goal attempt late in the first quarter, when holder Bussewitz hit a wide open Brad Kinne from 4 yards out. The Lions made it 14-0 at the half on a 5-yard pass from Bussewitz to an equally alone Musser.

Musser culminated a 53-yard drive late in the third on a 3-yard TD run that made it 21-0. Wagner broke free from 29 yards out in the game's final minute.

"I'd just like to give credit to our seniors for hanging in there in a year of adversity," Purnell said. "And for continuing to give us the leadership necessary to win our last two games."
