Concerns about the proposed policy surfaced at the Aug. 25 school board meeting. Principals and athletics directors at City High and West High suggested that allowing participation from students of outside schools hindered programs.

The school board will hear the proposal Tuesday and have the opportunity to accept or change it before it becomes policy. Grohe said the policy devised by the

The only change Grohe has proposed is a meeting among the principals and athletics directors at the two high schools each spring to determine which sports can accommodate students through sharing agreements.

"The question is, do we need to make this an official board policy, or operate like we are now," Grohe said.

Grohe indicated the school board might discuss giving preference to Regina students when considering shared agreements, because Regina parents pay property taxes that ultimately benefit the city's public high



Kennedy rolls, 52-14

During a first-half roll, assorted black splotches were left sprawled on the field and then eased off. Hey, you get in this Cedar Rapids Kennedy team's way, and you risk becoming part of the body count.

Big and booming, the Cougars flattened feisty Cedar Rapids Prairie, 52-14, Friday night in a Mississippi Valley Conference prep football game at Prairie.


Derek Keilkopf took advantage of huge running lanes cleared by the Cougars' offensive line and racked up 164 yards and four touchdowns on 17 carries. The Cougars (2-0) outrushed the Hawks (1-1), 346-140, and generally sat on top of them for three quarters.

"The line was big tonight," said Keilkopf, who scored on runs of 1, 33, 17 and 30. "They were knocking everybody down and out of the way. It's was pretty fun, just kind of picking which way to go.'

After Prairie's Jesse Dubishar tied the score at 14-14 with a 1-yard run and a two-point conversion run at six minutes, 34 seconds of the second quarter, the Cougars ran off an avalanche of 38 straight points to turn the game into a walkover.

Keilkopf answered Dubishar's score with his 33-yarder, his 17-yarder and his 30-yarder. Mark Mally, who finished with 123 yards on just five carries, broke through the line of scrimmage to turn a fullback dive into an 81-yard TD sprint, Ryan Hatfield turned one of Prairie's three turnovers into a 1-yard TD, and Brad Fowler booted a 29-yard field goal with 11:07 left in the fourth quarter to com-

plete Kennedy's crushing push. "We're a physical football team," Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "These guys take great pride in our weight program. That showed tonight. We wore them down in the second

And like any good high school running back, Keilkopf dished the credit all over his linemen. "All the line," Keilkopf said.

"Those guys deserve all of the credit. They were blasting all night.'

The Hawks traded punches with the Cougars all through a wonderful first half that ended with Kennedy holding a 28-14 lead. Quarterback Tom Hughes played pitch and catch with receivers Gary Mackey and Chicozie Ejiasi and ended the half six of nine for 141 yards and an interception.

When Keilkopf wasn't picking perfect screen pass called back by penalty, Prairie went to the well again, only this time, Hatfield had the play scouted. The senior waited in the flat, picked the ball out of the air and returned it 77 yards for a 7-0 Kennedy lead. "They caught me watching for

the deep pass the first time,' said Hatfield, who scored his other TD as a reserve running back. "The second time, I was watching the back all the way. The ball was just right there. It was one of those plays you always dream about.

A couple of the black splotches Kennedy left on the field in the first half turned out to be pretty important Prairie splotches. Dubishar, who carried 15 times for 29 yards in the first half, and Mackey left the game with leg injuries after the first half and left the Hawks with precious few options.
