# Xavier pushes **Prairie around**

Cedar Rapids Xavier enhanced its claim as the best team in town, battering Cedar Rapids Prairie, 21-0, in a Mississippi Valley Conference football game Friday night at John Wall Field.

"A lot of people said, 'Wait until you play the big boys," said Xavier lineman Blake Reed. 'They were saying that we couldn't play with the big schools. These (intracity) games are definitely a little more intense, and the wins are a little

The win kept the Saints (3-1) in a first-place tie in the MVC Mississippi Division race with Cedar Falls.

Xavier entered the game leading the MVC in total defense, and the Saints certainly didn't hurt their cause Friday. Prairie managed a thin 137 yards of total offense. The Hawks (1-3) not only failed to reach the end

zone; they also were shut out of the red zone.

"A tremendous defensive effort," said Xavier Coach Duane Schulte, who became a secondtime father earlier in the week. "Prairie is a hard-hitting team with good skill people. To get a shutout against them ... that's just a great effort."


"We did a lot of (repetitions) in practice to prepare us for their offense, and the coaches had a great gameplan," Reed said. "We got good pressure on their quarterback, our defensive backs played well, and we shut down the run."

Xavier used a short field to its advantage to score on its first drive of the game.

OUSTON (AP) - Neither Sammy Sosa nor the Chicago Cubs wound up with the lead Friday night.

Sosa hit his 66th home run, but the Cubs failed to take advantage and lost to the Houston Astros 6-2, leaving them tied for the NL wild-card spot with the New

The Mets lost to Atlanta 6-5. San Francisco, which began the day one game behind Chicago and New York,

Sosa temporarily gained the lead in his home run race with Mark McGwire by hitting a 462-foot drive into the third level of the Astrodome. About 45 minutes later, however, McGwire hit his 66th in the St. Louis Cardinals' game against

Derek Bell hit a two-run homer and Moises Alou singled home the go-ahead run in the fourth inning for the NL Central champion Astros. The Cubs lost for the fifth time in six games.

Facing friend and fellow Dominican Jose Lima, Sosa homered leading off the fourth inning. Lima also gave up Nos. 50 and 51 to Sosa at Wrigley Field on Aug.

Shortly after Sosa's homer at the Astrodome, a fan displayed a sign saying 'Sosa loves Lima.

Lima (16-8) has been generous with home runs this season. He leads the team with 34 home runs allowed, fourth in the

Sosa has four against the Astros this season. He has 157 RBI this season, fourth-most in NL history.

Mark McGwire answered Sosa's 66th homer with his 66th Friday night, a two-run shot in the fifth inning off

When Sosa took the lead in the home run derby for only the second time all season leading off the fourth at Houston, it prompted a collective groan from a sellout crowd at Busch Stadium and booing when Sosa's home run number was changed on the scoreboard.

With a runner on first, two outs and the fans on their feet, McGwire brought back the cheers when he hit a 1-2 pitch an estimated 375 feet into the left-field stands. It was the 21st time that McGwire and Sosa homered on the same day.

It also was McGwire's second homer this year against Montreal and first since he connected off Trey Moore on April 21.

On the first pitch from Bennett, McGwire nearly homered on a ball that landed just to the left of the foul pole in the upper deck in left field. Busch Stadium personnel inadvertently set off fireworks after the near-miss, but the fans didn't have to wait long for the real

Sosa led the home run race for 58 minutes on Aug. 19 before McGwire regained the lead with his 48th and 49th homers later in the same game at Chica-


Jim Amstutz, the new Director of Racing at Hawkeye Downs Speedway, has spent the last couple of weeks the retiring Larry Kemp, who is run-

"I had offers to get into it full-time and I never wanted to make that break from radio," he said. "Then I had to,

because the station I worked for got sold. I jumped into it, and I wish I would have done it a long time ago."

Hawkeye Downs Speedway enjoyed phenomenal growth during Kemp's 10year tenure. The facility went fromdrawing only a couple of hundred fans to its Friday night program when the track was first paved 10 years ago, to drawing thousands every Friday night over the past several years.

Kemp was also able to bring in many high-profile traveling series, including the American Speed Association, the

Still, Kennedy wasn't done.



But once the Little Hawks put things into gear, they kicked it into overdrive.

After battling to a scoreless tie for 21½ minutes with Waterloo East, No. 2 City High broke away for a 37-0 victory Friday at Bates Field.

The key? Defense, defense, defense

"They've gotten better every week, and they were pretty good to start with," City High Coach Larry Brown said of his defense, which permitted just 112 total yards and forced five turnovers. 'We're just getting more and more things fixed.

City (4-0) allowed 22 points in Week 1, 10 points in Week 2, and six in Week 3 before last night's blanking

"We definitely felt like we could have played better in the first half," City lineman John Pantazis said. "We're happy to get the shutout for the first time this season. That was a goal.

"Some nights our offense puts up 40 or 50 points, but sometimes our defense needs to dominate. And we did that tonight."

City failed to score twice in the first quarter after having the ball inside East's 10.

On its first drive, City turned the ball over on downs. One possession later, Little Hawk kicker Jason Messier missed a 26-yard field goal.

But an 11-play, 74-yard march - capped by fullback Ryan Hansen's 2-yard touchdown plunge put City on the scoreboard
