Cougars have fun in mud

Interception, long pass key Kennedy to 22-18 victory

Gazette sportswriter The mud was a minefield for Cedar Rapids Kennedy. A place where four fumbles nestled into the arms of the enemy.

The air was a much friendlier

Kennedy scored a pair of fluky touchdowns - one on a long pass, the other on an interception — and sidestepped its turnover woes in a 22-18 Mississippi Valley Conference football victory over Linn-Mar Friday night at soggy Armstrong Field.

"Any time you come up here and come away with a victory, it's a big win," said Kennedy Coach Don Knock. "We had a lot of turnovers and we could have folded our tents, but we stuck

The Cougars (3-2) ended a twogame slide and jumped into a second-place tie in the MVC Mississippi Division standings. They got a couple breaks along

With the momentum seemingly in the Lions' pocket and the Cougars trapped at their own 20-yard line, Kennedy quarterback Phillip Coonrod threw for Bryan Rempt on a deep out route along the left sideline.

The pass was high and Rempt barely got a hand on it. But the tip went to Wes Brant, who scampered the rest of the way for an 80-yard touchdown that gave the Cougars a 7-6 lead.

"I was breaking back to the ball so I could block for (Rempt), but the ball was suddenly right there in my hands," Brant said.
"I just hoped I wouldn't get caught from behind.

Linn-Mar stormed right back to take a 12-7 lead on Dan Cole's 5-yard run. The Cougars made matters worse for themselves, fumbling on the first play following Cole's score.


The Lions drove to the Kennedy 21 before the Cougars got their second break in the airwaves.

Buzzy Bussewitz's pass was deflected by Kennedy defensive end Scot Knock. Tom Shedek grabbed the loose ball and hauled it 85 yards to put Kennedy back in front, this time for

"Scot got a hand on it, and it was right there for me," Shedek said. "(Bussewitz) got a hand on my foot, but I was able to get

Kennedy scored its final touchdown on Coonrod's 4-yard run. Linn-Mar (1-4) got within 22-18 on a 1-yard run by Jordan Wagner with 1:18 left, but couldn't come up with the onside kick.

Saints Field at Cedar Rapids Xavier resembled a hog lot by night's end Friday.

It was a fitting resemblance considering the way the Cedar Rapids Washington defense hauled the Xavier offense to slaughter.

The Warriors held the Saints to 71 total yards and Michael Milam provided all the offense needed with a pair of touchdowns as Washington beat Xavier, 14-2, in a rainy, muddy Mississippi Valley Conference interdivisional battle at the quagmire called Saints Field.

Washington improved to 3-2 in the Valley Division with its second straight win. Xavier dropped to 3-2 and fell a game behind Cedar Falls for the lead in the Mississippi Division.

The Warriors defense — keyed by tackle Jason Levy (6-1, 290) and noseguard Anthony Cook

Trojans give City big Boot

Defense dominant in 18-0 drubbing

IOWA CITY — Consider Iowa City West a favorite to win this year's Class 4A football title. If history is any indication,

With its 18-0 win over rival Iowa City High Friday at Trojan Field, West not only seized control of the state title chase, in addition to the "Boot" trophy that goes to the annual City-West victor.

Four out of five times since 1993, the regular-season winner in this series has gone on to claim the 4A title.

In addition, the No. 3 Trojans (5-0) are in prime position for supremacy in the Mississippi

Valley Conference's Valley Division. City (4-1) fell to second in the Valley race.

This wins makes us feel that we can be the best," said West defensive back Curtis Jones, one of many Trojan defensive heroes in the shutout.

While West's defense was stellar, give the game ball to Chris Richardson. The 6-foot-1, 180pound senior tore up City's defense from the beginning. He finished with 105 yards on a career-high 29 carries on a cold, soggy night.

Richardson's first four carries went for 2, 19, 12 and 7 yards, setting up the game's first touchdown, a 1-yard Bruce Davis scoring run with 1:22 remaining in the first quarter. Nate Kaeding's extra point kick failed, but West delighted an estimated crowd of 4,200 by taking a 6-0 lead.

That was all the spark West needed, completely dominating the line of scrimmage from start to finish.

The 18-point victory margin was West's largest in the series since 1976 when the Trojans

'We haven't had a shutout yet (this season), and we wanted this game to be our first shutout," said Richardson, whose play at linebacker helped crunch City's rushing attack. "All week, we practiced gangtackling and everything. We wanted this one bad.'

As if a mighty offensive line and Richardson weren't enough firepower, the Trojans won the field-position battle when it

Little Hawks stall in rain

IOWA CITY - The highpowered air attack of Iowa City High was grounded Friday night.

Several factors were involved in the Little Hawks' offensive shutdown during an 18-0 loss to Iowa City West at Trojan Field:

· A cold, driving rain.

· Poor execution. · West's defense.

Second-ranked City (4-1) managed just 39 total yards and fumbled six times - losing three, two of which led directly to West touchdowns — in the setback.

Little Hawk quarterback Nick Linder, who entered Friday's contest averaging 155.3 passing yards a game, hit just 2 of 12 aerials for 24 yards.

"Nick just said that he was having a hard time gripping the ball," City Coach Larry Brown said. "He doesn't have great big hands, and the ball was wet."

Junior Steve Pfaller, the MVC's fourth-ranked receiver, was held without a catch. Meanwhile, City running back Matt Carlson rushed eight times for 17 yards — substantially less than his 108.0 average.

West's defense deserves a great deal of credit. But the Trojans know that it's not every day you catch City on an off night.

"Sometimes it's better to be lucky than good," West lineman Jeff Gordon said. "The ball kind of bounced our way. The weather might have helped us out a little bit.

"They made a few more mistakes than we did, and that's what led to the victory. They're a great team."



BOSTON (AP) - Charles Nagy put the Indians a win away from the ALCS with another dominant game in Fenway Park. They could get there because of Boston's decision not to use its best pitcher.

Four homers, two by Manny Ramirez, and Nagy's eight strong innings gave Cleveland a 4-3 victory Friday and a 2-1 lead in the best-of-5 division series. And it magnified Boston's controversial choice of Pete Schourek over Pedro Martinez in today's fourth game.

Schourek was 1-3 but pitched well in his last four starts. Martinez, last year's NL Cy Young award winner, would have pitched on three days' rest for the first time this season.

"Temptation? Yeah. Come to my senses? No," manager Jimy Williams said. "That's my opinion. I'll live with it, regardless of what other people believe."

"I could go" on Saturday, Martinez said, but Williams' decision "makes sense. He's protecting me. It's for the good of the team.'

Nagy, as he always is in Fenway, was excellent. He allowed just four singles and no walks and struck out three as he turned another Game 3 into a


