We had a great week of practice and I think this was actually one of the better games we've played.

It came at the right time. Maquoketa improved to 4-1 in district play (6-1 overall) and kept pace with front-running West Delaware (5-0, 7-0). The teams meet next Friday at Maquoketa.

"We said this was the most important game of the three we have left," Maquoketa Coach Mark Hillebrand said. "Having Curtis Clark back made a heck of a difference in our passing game, and our offensive line really controlled things inside." Clark and Crist were not the

Cardinals' only weapons.


