Fitch returns to his roots at Coe

Longtime NBA coach joins alma mater's Hall of Fame today

> By Jeff Dahn ill Fitch claims he's managed to stay busy since he was fired by the NBA's

"I'm watching the lockout, making sure nobody gets in,' Fitch joked, referring to the NBA's current labor strife.

Los Angeles Clippers last April

Fitch, 64, was in Cedar Rapids Friday as part of activities surrounding his induction into the Coe College Athletic Hall of Fame during today's football game between the Kohawks and William Penn at Clark Field.

A 1954 Coe graduate, Fitch played basketball and baseball at the school, then went on to coach basketball at Creighton, Coe, North Dakota, Bowling Green and Minnesota.

In 1970, he accepted the head coaching position with the expansion Cleveland Cavaliers of the NBA and has been a coach in the league ever since. He has also been with the Boston Celtics, the Houston Rockets, the New Jersey Nets and, most recently, the Clippers.

His 994 career wins rank second on the all-time NBA coaching list, and his 1,106 losses rank first. The 2,050 games he's coached in the league also rank

That's why - although unemployed - Fitch is keeping a watchful eye on the owner-imposed lockout.

"I'm still following basketball, but . . . I hate to see all this going on," he told a small gathering at Coe's Clark Alumni House. "But the truth be known, I've always thought we played too many games anyhow. If this makes 'em play fewer games, this may be the hard way down an easy road.

Fitch touched on a variety of topics during Friday's discussion, from his years at Coe to the challenges and thrills of coaching such NBA greats as Larry Bird and Hakeem Olajuwan. Fitch, Bird and the Celtics won an NBA title in 1991, and Fitch, Olajuwan and the Rockets made it the NBA finals in 1986.

After graduating from Wilson High School in Cedar Rapids, Fitch was recruited by Phog Allen at Kansas University, but a restriction in ROTC scholarships kept him from moving to Lawrence, Kan. After much soul-searching, he chose Coe.

"I learned how to learn at Coe," Fitch said. "It went from a negative to a positive. I was dis-

appointed and heart-broken because . . . I was all set to go to Kansas.

"A lot of people said I came to Coe because it was the only school I could spell.'

Fitch returned to coach his alma mater from 1958 to '62, and compiled a 44-40 record. It was his first head coaching job and set him on a career path that has never wavered.

"I was never smart enough to do anything but coach," he said.

Making the transition from college to professional basketball was not difficult, Fitch said, noting there's really not much difference between the two.

"It's easier to say what is the same," he said. "The fundamentals of the game, the court's the same size . . . the ball's still filled with air, and you play with five people. As a coach, I guess you adjust to the people . and when it comes right

down to it, the player-coach situ-

ation is pretty much the same.

"My players always use to say that I treated them all alike like a dog."



NEW YORK (AP) - The crowd roared, confetti poured and the World Series Champion New York Yankees — including ailing teammate Darryl Strawberry — made their way up Manhattan's Canyon of Heroes.

New York throws quite a

parade for world champs

Mayor Rudolph Giuliani and Yankees

Manager Joe Torre were on the lead float, but the crowd reserved its biggest cheers today for Strawberry, who is recovering from colon cancer surgery and missed the Series' four-game sweep of the San Diego

Chants of "Darryl! Darryl!" echoed in the skyscraper-lined canyon, as fans with blue and white painted faces, waving signs reveled in a blizzard of shredded paper as Strawberry rode past them in a red classic

The entire day was emotional for pitcher

Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez, who smiled and waved from the Yankees pitchers' float. Hours earlier, Hernandez was reunited with his mother, two daughters and ex-wife when they arrived from Cuba at about 3 a.m.

It was the first time he had seen them since he defected from Cuba in December on a raft. The Cuban government granted the family a temporary visa so they could attend the parade.

No crowd estimate was immediately available but hundreds of thousands stood 10 to 40 deep along the mile-long parade route from Battery City Park to City Hall.

"Jeter! Jeter!" teen-aged girls squealed, waving signs proposing marriage as Yankee heartthrob Derek Jeter passed by. Pitcher David Wells and catcher Jorge Posada preserved the memory by videotaping the crowd as the crowd filmed them.

And when a double-decker bus filled with family or backstage support people rode by, some in the crowd took up the chant: "Who are you? Who are you?'

Brooms of all sizes and shapes — kitchen brooms, garage brooms, whisk brooms were in evidence, signifying the Yankees four-game sweep of the San Diego Padres in the World Series.

At City Hall, where the mayor presented the players the keys to the city, trees were draped in paper streamers and confetti and the stage adorned in a rainbow of red, white and blue balloons.

The record-breaking 1998 Yankees won 125 games this season, including the playoffs and World Series, more than any other team in baseball history. It was the team's 24th World Series win - also a record.

The celebration — the second parade for the Yankees in three years - began at Battery Park shortly before noon.

The march included 13 marching bands 10 classic cars; eight Yankee floats; sever double-decker buses, six press trucks — and the Radio City Rockettes on a flatbed truck

ALBURNETT - West Branch. Spoiler. The two just don't seem to go together.

The Pirates overcame a 14-0 deficit to tie it on a rugged 15-play, 66-yard drive capped by a quarterback sneak by Matt Strand that turned into a 9-yard touchdown run with 8:09 left in the game.

Alburnett's momentum was fleeting, though.

Pat Gates returned the ensuing kickoff into Pirates territo-Six plays later, the Bears had the lead back in their hip pocket.

Howie Gates plunged in from a yard away on fourth down, giving the Bears a 21-14 advantage with 5:27 to go.

"I thought we had all the momentum after our touchdown tied it. I thought that was the thing that was going to get us going," said Alburnett Coach Jim Carver. "Then, they had the big run and we just sank."

'That was a real gut-check for us," Pedersen said. "We showed a lot of courage after they came back to tie it.

The avalanche was just beginning. Alburnett's next two possessions ended in interceptions, and West Branch tacked on a couple more touchdowns to turn it into a blowout.

Pat Gates got loose for a 21-yard run, then Howie Gates raced 37 yards for the final

touchdown. 'We just didn't play well tonight. We're really disappointed," Carver said. "I could see the effort, but somehow, some way, we just weren't getting things done.'

The Bears got more than a win for their effort. They got a day without practice Monday.

'Gentlemen, that was a hell of a ball game," Pedersen hollered to his troops in the middle of the field afterward.

West Branch started as well as it finished, jumping to a 14-0 advantage. Pat Gates scored on a pair of short touchdown runs late in the second quarter.

The Bears' defense was superb until the final minute of C.R. JEFFERSON 14 the first half. Alburnett had a total of minus-1 yard on its first five possessions.

But Strand teamed up with Jacob Fishell for a 53-yard bomb with 29 seconds left in the half

to trim the Bears' lead to 14-6. It was Strand's only completion in 14 attempts Friday. He

threw three interceptions. Ryan Hemphill was a workhorse for the Pirates, toting the ball 32 times for 134 yards. He got the call 13 times on Alburnett's 15-play game-tying drive.


