Kennedy took advantage of eight Wahlert turnovers, controlled the ball during the

Golden Eagles, 28-14, in a Mississippi Valley Conference season finale at Kingston Stadium.

The Cougars finished 6-3 and returned to the playoffs for the first time since they advanced to the semifinal round in 1993. Wahlert finished 3-6.

"This feels pretty good to me since I've never even been on a team with a winning record before," senior Ryan Hatfield said. "I didn't want my season to end . , . and now we get to play more games. Hopefully, we'll play more than one.'

Hatfield played a big role in the victory from his cornerback position. He picked off three fourth quarter, and beat the passes, recovered a fumble and

was credited with 10 tackles. A similar defensive effort was

turned in by junior Brett Kellogg, a 6-3, 210-pound junior who had three sacks and eight tackles. Kellogg is also looking forward to the postseason.

'We expect to win, but we know we're going to have to next Wednesday, and whatever comes next we'll stick it to 'em," he said.

Friday's game was unusual in many respects. Wahlert outgained Kennedy, 331-263, but four lost fumbles and four interceptions doomed the Golden Eagles at every turn.

"We have a pretty good offense, so we knew we had to step it up on defense and not let them score," Hatfield said.

The Cougar offense wasn't bad either. Junior tailback Derek Kielkopf carried 30 times for play hard and work hard until 156 yards, with touchdown runs of 5 and 56 yards. He has an unofficial 1,069 yards this sea-

Kennedy jumped to a 14-0 first quarter lead by scoring on two

The first drive covered 78 yards on 14 plays and ate 6:11 off the clock. Kellogg, subbing briefly for Kielkopf at tailback, carried the ball the last five plays from the 25, including a 1-yard dive for the touchdown.

The Cougars added another TD late in the quarter when quarterback Phillip Coonrod took one step back and threw a quickie over the middle to Bryan Rempt, who then went 43 yards to the end zone.

Kielkopf's touchdown trots came in the second half, and his 57-yard burst in the fourth quarter gave the Cougars' a 28-6 lead. Wahlert scored a touchdown on

Nick Wagner with 1:46 left in the second quarter and on a 77-yard pass from Wagner to Wes Digman 20 seconds after Kielkopf's long TD run.

"This was a typical Wahlert game for us," Kennedy Coach Don Knock said. "It seems like we jump up, then they come back. Their record doesn't indicate how good they are - if they would have been 5-3, they would have played even that much harder.

"We were really concerned because we thought our kids would come out and be too tight," he said. "We're very excited and very happy.

# Rogers still perfect 2nd time around

Rogers, successful in his first stint as football coach at Center Point and Center Point-Urbana, has been just as good in his return. The sixth-ranked Stormin' Pointers nudged No. 4 Mount Vernon, 7-6, to win the Class 2A District 6 championship in front of an estimated crowd of 3,000 Friday night.

"This was some defensive battle," said Rogers, who coached Center Point to a state championship in 1985, then stepped

"No way did I think we'd be unbeaten," he said. "I thought if we were 2-2 after four games, we had a chance for a successful

Both teams had nailed down week. Mount Vernon is 8-1, 6-1.

Center Point-Urbana finished with 221 yards of total offense. Mount Vernon netted 177 — all on the ground.



Denny entered the game with season statistics of 11 completions, two interceptions and 166 yards passing in his back-up role to senior Joe Egli. Friday, however, he clicked on 11 of 21 passes for 194 yards, and no interceptions.

Cedar Falls had been getting over twice as much yardage rushing rather than passing.

"We saw them on film and thought both of their quarterbacks were good athletes and could throw the ball," Xavier Coach Duane Schulte said.

"We had a couple of missed tackles here and there that might have been the difference in the game."

Sophomore running back Terrance Freeney — brother of former Northern Iowa All-Amer ica linebacker William Freeney supplemented Denny's pass. ing with 130 yards on 30 carries.

# Singh wobbles, but lands on top

## Leader birdies 6 of final 13 holes after a disasterous start

ATLANTA (AP) — When he added them up at the end of a wild second round in the Tour Championship, Vijay Singh had an even-par 70. Considering where he had been, it must have felt like another 63.

After three holes, his three-

stroke lead was gone. After four holes, his name wasn't even on the first two pages of the electronic scoreboard.

Singh experienced the best and the worst that East Lake

Golf Club had to offer Friday, but finished the second round right where he started - atop the leaderboard.

"I'm very satisfied that I got it back and I'm still in the lead," Singh said. "I'm going out tomorrow with a lot more confidence. I know I'm not going to have that bad of a start hopefully not."

One day after his course-record 63, Singh recovered a disastrous start with six birdies on the last 13 holes, putting him at 7-under 133 and giving him a two-stroke lead over Jim Furyk.
